Purpose

The Community Small Grants program aims to build individual/groups skills and knowledge in land management practices and community participation, knowledge and skills with community organisations, groups or local communities.

Overview

The grants are part of the Community Small Grants and Education Scholarship Program 2018-2021 which supports community in building knowledge, skills and participation in land management practices.

Funding Availability:

• Maximum \$2000 per project.

Closing Dates for Funding Rounds (multiple rounds over 3 years):

- Applications will be assessed within 2 weeks of the following Rounds.
- Submit your applications by:
 - 2019: 1 April, 1 July, 1 October
 - 2020: 1 February, 1 March, 1 April 1 July, 1 October
 - 2021: 1 February, 1 March

Example

Examples of Skills and Knowledge, and Community Participation Projects that can be funded (group, network or associations)- up to \$2000 (per group/per year maximum 3 applications):

- Public Awareness raising events- such as involvement in festivals, public displays, static displays, ore development of educational resources/kits, online resources.
- Public/Closed Workshops- such as tailored workshops for your group members, or public workshops inviting local community, this includes development of resources or kits that facilitate workshop activities
- Public/Closed Field based events- where activities will build local community knowledge in on ground activities and land management practices, this can include a examples such as: community tree planting events, farm visits or demonstration site visits, or project plan development where community is involved in planning activities open to the public or specific to your group
- School programs- that build students/school communities knowledge of relevant environmental, agricultural or cultural land, and emergency management issues
- Closed Group training events- where a training event is tailored/delivered to a community group to build relevant skills to local projects or initiatives such as pest training for 1080/pindone use, chemical application training, weed ID and training, drone/app training, property planning etc

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Community groups
- Landcare groups
- Schools
- Local Aboriginal Land Councils (LALCs)
- Committees/Associations
- Not for profit organisations
- Industry/producer groups

Eligibility Criteria

• The group/organisation must have been in operation for at least 6 months

- Your organisation/ community group must either be incorporated OR auspiced by an organisation that is incorporated or has an ABN. Unincorporated groups can access financial assistance; however, a tax invoice from a supplier (e.g. caterer, guest speaker) must be issued for payment directly to Hunter LLS.
- Your project must aim to build community participation and knowledge and skills with community organisations or local communities
- Maximum of 1 application per group per financial year
- All applications should determine budgets based on quotes/actual costs. All projects should retain all receipts for project activities, as projects may be audited on completion.
- All recipients must use Hunter LLS evaluation forms (for projects and scholarships, and submit evaluation results to Hunter LLS) within 2 weeks of end of contract date/project completion with Final Reports.
- Applicants/groups must be residing in or registered in the Hunter Local Land Services region
- All Projects must be completed within the agreed contract date, or on or before the 30th May of the financial year the grant was offered.

Ineligible Activity/ Criteria

- · Activities that have already been funded
- · Activities that are of personal or private benefit
- Your organisation/group is subject to an Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC), Local Land Services (LLS), Department of Primary Industries (DPI) or other legal investigation
- Activities that do not align with the intended outcomes (skills and knowledge in land management practices and/or building community participation, skills and knowledge within organisations and communities)
- Capital items generally will not be funded, unless there is a strong justification (where the items directly support learning outcomes).

Project funding aims to deliver a dynamic and diverse range of arts and cultural experiences to communities across NSW, contribute to the development of a vibrant and accessible arts and cultural sector, and support the employment and development of professional NSW-based artists and arts and cultural workers.

Funding is available for a wide range of arts and cultural activity, including:

- creation of new work, practice-based research or experimentation and professional development
- production, exhibition, presenting, publishing or recording, touring and festivals
- promotion and marketing, market and/or audience development activity
- conservation and/or development of collections and archives (including Aboriginal Keeping Places and the digitisation of collections)

- purchase of capital infrastructure and equipment
- partnerships, capacity building and sustainability.

Funding is not available under this program for filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

There is **no upper limit** to the amount of funding you may request.

However, to be competitive, you must provide a level of detail in your written application, support material and budget appropriate to the level of your funding request

This expectation will vary according to the following levels of funding request:

- applying for less than \$20,000
- applying for at least \$20,000 but less than \$140,000
- applying for \$140,000 or more

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a grants for projects category:

Applicant type

You must be an:

- an Australian citizen or
- permanent resident or
- organisation/ group located in Australia

Project focus

Your project must be a clearly defined arts and cultural activity.

Benefit

Your project must benefit NSW by either:

- employing NSW artists or arts and cultural workers; and/or
- providing arts and cultural experiences to the people of NSW.

You are ineligible to apply for Project funding if:

- you are a Major Performing Arts company, State Significant Organisation, State Cultural Institution or Key Festival; or
- your project has commenced or already taken place
- you are applying for filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

Purpose

The purpose of the Community Presenter Touring Grant is to extend the reach of professional productions to smaller towns and remote communities in NSW that do not have a professional performing arts venue, by providing funds towards the performance fee of touring productions.

Overview

The Grant supports the presentation of professional, NSW-based productions to non-professional venues in regional NSW. Funds for this Grant have been made available by Arts NSW on behalf of the NSW Government. This is a three-year initiative.

Applicants can submit a proposal for funding to:

- extend a regional tour to one or more non-professional venues in regional NSW;
- support a new tour to two or more non-professional venues in regional NSW.

Grant funds can be used to support up to 50% of the performance/delivery fee of a touring production.

Applicants can apply for:

- between \$500 and \$4,000 per venue;
- up to \$12,000 for a consortium of three or more venues.

We strongly encourage you to read the guidelines & FAQs, and speak to Arts on Tour staff and/or your regional arts organisation before starting on an application.

Limitations

Who can apply?

Community presenters can apply for this Grant. For the purposes of this grant a community presenter is an individual or organisation who takes on the responsibility of presenting a professional production or performance in a non-professional venue, including financial management, fee negotiation, contracting, marketing and technical provisions.

A community presenter might be:

- · Regional arts organisation;
- Community group;
- · Local council:
- Lead organisation representing a consortium of non-professional venues;
- Tour coordinator or Producer (defined as the person or organization who is taking the financial risk on the tour);
- Professional performing arts presenter coordinating a 'mini tour' to non-professional venues as part of a regional tour;
- Self-presenting artist or producer.

Purpose

The Contemporary Music Touring Program (CMTP) supports national touring activity undertaken by Australian musicians performing original contemporary music. It provides travel support of up to \$15,000 for artists and their manager for tours in Australia that include performances in regional and remote areas.

Overview

Under the CMTP performances of original Australian contemporary music can include a wide range of different musical styles.

Applications must contain one tour only. The tour must comprise of performances in at least three venues outside of the performer's hometown and must include at least one performance in a non-metropolitan area.

Where over 75% of your itinerary is to remote and/or very remote locations, you are entitled to request additional funding of up to \$15,000, to a maximum total grant request of \$30,000. The Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA) helps determine the regional and remote reach of the tour.

Joint tours, where two or more independent performers are undertaking the same tour itinerary, are eligible under this program. These should be submitted as a single application. In such cases, the funding cap of \$15,000 still applies (unless the tour is eligible for additional remote or very remote funding).

We encourage the inclusion of additional activities which extend opportunities for community participation, such as workshops, master classes and all-age performances.

The Australia Council offers two grant rounds each year for the Contemporary Music Touring Program.

In 2018, the grant rounds will close on:

- Tuesday 6 February for projects starting after 1 May 2018. This grant round has now closed.
- Tuesday 2 October for projects starting 1 January 2019

Each round closes at midnight on the closing date. Technical and administrative support will not be available after 5pm on the closing date.

Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application approximately 12 weeks after the closing date.

Priority

Tours that include a majority of regional destinations or assist performers from regional areas are a priority for funding.

Limitations

Who can apply

Funding on a tour by tour basis is available to enable professional musicians to tour live music performances within Australia. Touring musicians must be performing original Australian contemporary music. Funding can be provided to performers, managers, agents, and music networks on behalf of professionals working in the Australian music industry.

Who can't apply

You can't apply for a grant if:

- you received a grant, or administered a grant, from the Australia Council in the past and that grant has not been satisfactorily acquitted
- you owe money to the Australia Council.

You can't apply for the following activity:

- a tour to less than three venues
- tours to metropolitan venues only
- overseas tours or overseas performers
- tours which are primarily school-based (except for applications seeking TRAX funds where the school is the primary venue of a remote or very remote location)
- a series of performances at one festival
- competitions, such as 'Battle of the Bands' events
- attendance at conferences

Overview

Copyright Agency's aim is to support members and stakeholders to create, award, present, publish, and promote work by Australian creators that connects with audiences.

They also offer grants to leading organisations to help build literacy skills for children and young adults, and partnerships to support key national writers' festivals.

The Cultural Fund's grants for organisations can be for a single project or for up to three years. Please contact the Cultural Fund to discuss a potential proposal before submitting and application.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Legally constituted organisations and incorporated associations may apply.
- Individuals or sole traders are not eligible to apply for these grants.
- · Applicants may only submit one application per round to the Cultural Fund.
- Applicants must have acquitted any overdue Cultural Fund grants to be eligible to apply for further funding.

Activities supported include:

- Skills development and professional development opportunities for emerging creators and people working in publishing
- Publishers, literary magazines and journals
- Professional mentorships, residencies, internships
- Conferences, art book fairs, symposia
- Educational and cultural institutions
- Partnerships with major national writers' festivals
- Awards and prizes for writers and visual artists
- Writing, publishing and visual arts industry associations
- Theatre companies to provide opportunities for playwrights
- Literary and literacy-building organisations

The Cultural Fund will not support the following activities:

- Projects which do not ultimately benefit writers or visual artists or the publishing/visual arts sectors
- Projects where creators are not paid a fee
- Emerging writers or visual artists who haven't published or exhibited work
- Community-based writing programs
- University-based artist-in-residency programs which do not connect with audiences outside the university
- Niche writers' festivals
- Translations into other languages for overseas audiences
- Projects which do not connect with audiences
- Writers to self-publish their work
- Film script development, film festivals, and projects aimed at the film industry
- Research for purely academic audiences
- Projects primarily aimed at music or dance audiences
- Publishing and exhibition costs
- Website development or maintenance costs
- Development of apps
- Digitisation of back issues, previously published work, or catalogues of works
- · Business or overhead costs
- Capital works
- General administrative costs Book launches or exhibition openings

Enterprise Business & Ideas will support new business proposals or ideas that will create changes and benefit the screen industry more broadly. Enterprise Business & Ideas will also support businesses to develop strategic/business plans, engage business consultants or business mentors and engage a new company placement that will help their business to evolve or innovate, and build capacity.

Overview

The aims of Enterprise Business & Ideas are to:

- Identify and support new ideas or business proposals that drive change and capitalise on success, both for companies and the screen industry.
- Build capacity by supporting businesses to diversify, innovate, and develop pathways to sustainability.
- Share information and experience between industry practitioners, to build capability.
- Encourage practices and business structures that recognise the value of creative collaborators who generate and develop screen story content.
- Promote the business opportunities and commercial benefits of gender equity, diversity and inclusion.

Funding:

- Maximum \$200,000 per year for up to two years for a business or idea.
- Maximum \$100,000 per year for up to two years for company placements full-time or part-time.
- Maximum \$20,000 for a strategic/business plan (up to \$10,000), consultant (up to \$5,000) and/or mentor (up to \$5,000).

Applications are open all year round. For a strategic/business plan, consultant and/or mentor, or if you are applying for a Company Placement without submitting an application for a Business or idea, there is a one-stage process for assessment with a four-week turnaround for decisions.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Applicants may apply as any Australian entity (sole trader, company, not-for-profit, etc.) However, we will not be able to contract with a Trust.
- Screen Australia want commercially and creatively minded people who will challenge the status quo and introduce new approaches and ideas for the creation, distribution and monetisation of screen story content.
- Applicants may be from the screen industry or related industries such as advertising and media as long as the business proposal or idea is for the screen industry.

Each year the Foundation assists Australian Public Institutions to undertake a wide range of visual arts projects in all Australian states and territories and helps to promote Australian arts in the international arena.

The Foundation also instigates initiatives where there is a perceived need for action.

The Foundation provides funding for a range of visual arts projects Australia-wide.

Funding criteria:

- The Foundation encourages applications from all over Australia.
- The Foundation is a funder of innovative projects.
- The Foundation is a funder of projects providing increased access to the visual arts.
- Projects will be expected to attract considerable public exposure.
- Projects should demonstrate the highest levels of professional practice.
- The Foundation may be the sole grant provider or the lead donor or a participant in a collaborative funding with other private and/or public donors.
- The Foundation will not normally support projects that have been almost fully funded from other sources.

Application procedure:

- Contact the Gordon Darling Foundation to request the current year's application form and detailed guidelines.
- Applicants are encouraged to phone the Foundation to discuss their proposed application prior to submission.
- The closing dates for applications are 7 January, 31 May and 30 September respectively.

Priority

Preference will be given to projects which will tour.

Limitations

Who is eligible?

The Foundation can only provide funding to Public Institutions in Australia.

Individuals wishing to apply for funding for projects are required to partner with a Public Institution which then takes responsibility for the project.

The Trustees will normally award only one application per organisation in any given year.

Funding may be provided for:

- catalogues and publications
 - that are scholarly
 - that provide a permanent record of an exhibition, collection, artist or movement
 - the Foundation does **not** fund souvenir or promotional publications
- exhibition development excluding marketing or promotional costs
- professional education initiatives including individual professional development
- · research projects
- symposia

The Foundation does not normally fund:

- · capital works
- general or core activities
- retropective funding
- recurrent funding of a project

- To increase the State's market share of film and television production by attracting potential projects to film in NSW;
- To familiarise practitioners with NSW locations for their projects;
- To provide an opportunity to connect local and international practitioners with local technical and creative talent, studio and post-production and visual effects facilities for their projects and to support new and sustainable partnerships between organisations of International significance and local practitioners and facilities.

The program offers long-form footloose productions scouting assistance for location surveys for eligible projects and may include covering some of the costs associated with on-ground travel including accommodation, domestic flights, vehicle hire and location manager services. Eligible projects are feature films, tele-movies, mini-series, TV series or reality programs.

The program is open to projects prior to commencement of pre-production and prior to or during financing. For international inbound visits, Create NSW generally works with Ausfilm to facilitate a suitable itinerary, however, enquiries can also be made direct to Create NSW Screen Destination Attraction area.

Limitations

Eligibility

The program offers long-form footloose productions scouting assistance for location surveys for eligible projects and may include covering some of the costs associated with on-ground travel including accommodation, domestic flights, vehicle hire and location manager services. Eligible projects are feature films, tele-movies, mini-series, TV series or reality programs.

The program is open to projects prior to commencement of pre-production and prior to or during financing. For international inbound visits, Screen NSW generally works with AusFilm to facilitate a suitable itinerary, however, enquiries can also be made direct to Screen NSW Production Attraction & Incentives area.

Applications for location inbounds and scouting assistance will be considered on a rolling basis at any time during the year and assessed against the following criteria by a member of the Screen NSW Production Attraction & Incentives staff, and considered by the Director of Production Attraction & Incentives:

- The proposed project is genuinely 'footloose' that is, is not already locked in to production in NSW;
- The proposed project is likely to create a significant economic benefit for the State in jobs and skills development and boost the profile of NSW worldwide;
- Demonstration of a proposed significant spend in NSW;
- Track record of the applicant and partners;
- The availability of funds;
- Alignment with Screen NSW organisational priorities.

Applicants to other Screen NSW programs are eligible to apply to this program but assistance is usually restricted to location advice and Reel Scout packages.

Established in 1975, the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation provides grants to promote and encourage music and the music-related performing arts.

Overview

The grants provided are non-recurring (i.e. one-off grants rather than a periodical payment) and are determined by the four trustees of the trust.

- Two (including the Chairman) are appointed by the PPCA;
- One is appointed by the Musicians' Union of Australia;
- One is appointed by the Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance (formerly Actors' Equity).

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for **one or more** of the following purposes:

• performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged

- scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education
- the promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public
- the aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income.

- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol)
- Accommodation
- Venue hire/ PA hire.

There is no specified limit to how much you can apply for. However, funds are finite and there is no guarantee that you will receive all or any of the funds you request.

It is unusual for grants to be approved in excess of :

- \$3,000 for an individual; or
- \$5,000 for a group or organisation

Limitations

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Although the trust is discretionary, the trustees are guided by the 'purposes' articulated in the trust deed. As a result, it is not their usual practice to approve funding for any project of a commercial nature. This would include:

- Bringing new and emerging producers to the industry, while harnessing the skills of experienced producers
- Works that address gaps in content/genre/age groups.

In every project we provide funding for, we ensure that it is produced to the highest standards. We do this by including creative input and regular consultation as a condition of our investment.

What we look for:

Audience

All projects must primarily target the Australian child audience and must, in our opinion, be likely to be of interest to Australian children.

Television projects should be aiming for either 'P' or 'C' classification as defined by ACMA for the commercial networks and Pay TV, or a G classification for ABC.

Feature film projects should be aiming for a 'G' or 'PG' rating from the OFLC Classifications Board.

For information on what constitutes a 'P', 'C' or 'G' or 'PG' program, have a look at the ACTF's FAQs.

Subject matter

Projects may be based on an original idea, or adaptations of a novel or other work. We look for originality and new ideas not already in the marketplace or currently on television.

If the project is an adaptation of someone else's work (such as a novel, play, character or concept developed by one of the team), the applicant must obtain, or at least option, an assignment of all the necessary rights from the creator prior to making an application.

Options should have a reasonable length of time to run following any ACTF Development Funding approval to allow for the project's development, commissioning and financing.

Copies of all contractual documentation demonstrating that the applicant has obtained the necessary legal rights to deal with the material on which the project is based must accompany the application. If such options or chain of title documents are not provided with the application, the project will not be considered in that round.

Any project containing indigenous content, themes or story lines must be accompanied by written permission from the relevant indigenous community authorising the Applicant's use of such material.

Format and genre

We provide funding for television series, one-off television programs, telemovies and feature films.

Before submitting an application for a television program, it is useful to familiarise yourself with the types of formats, series lengths and episode lengths broadcasters usually commission for your intended audience's age group.

Before submitting an application for development of a feature film it is worthwhile speaking with local distributors about their requirements in this area and their interest in the genre and age group.

Finance is open to all genres, but preference will be given to drama content which typically has higher development requirements than other genres.

Levels of Development funding

We will only fund one stage of development on any project at a time. To develop a feel for the levels of funding and stages of development that we have previously funded, please look at the funding section of the ACTF website.

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

Applicant and Creative Team

We will consider the experience of the creative team when assessing projects for funding. Whilst it does not require that all of the proposed team have experience in their relevant area, projects with a strong and experience creative team are preferred.

The Regional Filming Fund offsets costs associated with shooting in regional areas of NSW. Regional NSW is defined as all areas in NSW outside the Sydney Metro area (excluding the ACT).

Overview

Screen NSW funds production of Australian projects in the following categories:

- feature films
- content-rich factual and documentary television or web programs and series
- adult and children's television drama and narrative comedy including series, miniseries, web series and telemovies
- animation productions
- creative interactive screen entertainment

Applicants may request up to 35% of the budgeted NSW Regional Spend.

NSW Regional Spend is the total of the below the line shooting expenses directly associated with filming in regional NSW. Eligible NSW Regional Spend expenses are limited to:

- location fees
- travel (for cast and crew traveling from other parts of NSW)
- accommodation
- per diems
- local suppliers & services (e.g. construction contractors, security, traffic control etc.)
- catering
- salaries for regionally based cast and crew

Regional spend does not include any above-the-line expenses (including development expenses), indirect costs, company overheads, contingency or post-production expenses.

Support is provided as a grant. The maximum grant per production is \$100,000.

Priority

Screen NSW is committed to supporting increased participation in the industry of people from under-represented groups including women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, people from CaLD backgrounds, people with disability, LGBTQI people, people from western Sydney and people from regional NSW. Priority will be given to teams including people from under-represented groups.

Limitations

Who is eligible?

Screen NSW general eligibility requirements can be found in the Screen NSW Terms of Trade, which should be read in conjunction with these guidelines.

- At least one of the Key Creatives must be NSW based.
- The production company must be registered in NSW and have its principal place of business in NSW.
- The production must film on location in Regional NSW for a minimum of five shooting days.
- At least 50% of the total budget must be expended in NSW.
- Productions must be fully financed at the time of application, with the exception of contributions being sought from Screen NSW and other state, federal or international agencies (Note: we will only consider an application where those agencies have confirmed their contribution or if the application has been submitted to a funding round running concurrently with the Screen NSW round).
- Productions that have been shortlisted for Screen Australia's Documentary Production Producer Program or Multi-Platform Drama Fund may apply.
- Feature films must have distribution in place.
- Television drama, narrative comedy and factual/documentary programs must have a financial commitment from a broadcaster, subscription service or distributor.

Screen NSW do not fund the production of:

- *infotainment, lifestyle, travel, magazine, sports, education, game shows and other magazine- style productions
- current affairs and news programs
- community television
- shorts, short features (under 60 minutes)
- projects being developed as part of a course of study

*For further guidance on the distinction between infotainment, lifestyle, magazine programs and documentary/factual programs refer to the advice on Screen Australia's website.

The Australian Government has announced \$10 million available over two years for this grant opportunity. The grant opportunity is demand-driven and will close once this funding amount has been exhausted.

The grant amount will be up to \$2,100 for 50 per cent of the cost of a micro, small or standard certified small business health check. The health check involves a certified CREST approved provider performing a cyber security test to determine your business risk and areas that need attention. - increase workforce participation by vulnerable and disadvantaged families.

The CCCF is an ongoing program.

The objective of the CCCF Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity is to support continuity of child care, in particular in disadvantaged or vulnerable communities, where service viability is affected by an unforeseen factor outside the control of the service such as:

FSFP provides funding to not-for-profit organisations to:

 - facilitating learning opportunities and promoting personal growth, wellbeing, and support child and youth development
 - creating opportunities to form new friendships and networks and share information and ideas to help them manage the demands of military life
- Support community capacity building and partnerships by:
 - developing new initiatives in response to emerging needs and priorities identified within the Defence community
 - identifying and nurturing partnership opportunities to support the delivery for a strengthened sense of community for Defence families

- Funded activities will not replicate services offered by DCO or the Department of Defence
- The grant request clearly demonstrates that the project will achieve value for money.

- The service meets the needs of Defence families in remote locations
- Work with Defence families to develop longer term meaningful engagement with others in their community

Even then, due to the high demand for our limited resources, we can help only where needs are desperate and assistance is necessary to maintain the minimum standards of safety, security, protection and comfort for the individual or family. In cases where funding for expensive items of equipment is being sought, these items are to be retained by the organisation supporting the application as part of that organisation's equipment pool.

The following personal characteristics are indicative of some of the circumstances in which we may be able to assist:

- hold permanent Australian residency status or citizenship
- household income levels at or below the level of Centrelink benefits
- no major assets that could be realised
- no other resources that can be accessed (e.g. savings)
- families with young children, particularly single-parent families
- families with disabled children
- adults and children with disabilities particularly physical disabilities
- assistance has been sought/is being sought from other charitable organisations
- some unexpected catastrophic event has caused a crisis
- no assistance is available from family or extended family members
- time payment options have been exhausted in respect of utility and rental arrears if assistance is being sought for these items
- financial counselling, where appropriate, has been embraced in an effort to prevent future crises
- applicants have demonstrated some self-help behaviour and are endeavouring to plan for a viable lifestyle within their resources.

Applying for assistance - Requests for financial assistance should be addressed to:

- a completed Application for Financial Assistance Form signed by the applicant and the Social Worker or other responsible person.

 - some comment about the degree of difficulty and need the client is experiencing.
- copies of quotes obtained for any specific item requested for a client.
- copies of the relevant accounts if assistance is being sought for outstanding debts, eq, electricity, gas, telephone.

Limitations

Applications for assistance can only be accepted through social workers or other responsible persons holding official positions within organisations such as Area Health Services, welfare organisations, hospitals, or recognised church welfare departments. Applications can only be accepted by organisations holding DGR/ITEC status.

We would not usually approve requests for:

- retrospective funding of expenses, i.e. reimbursement of costs already met
- funeral costs
- travelling expenses, except for essential medical treatment
- car expenses, except where the vehicle is absolutely essential for access to medical treatment
- baby items
- repayment of loans & credit cards
- medical treatment that is available under the public health system within a reasonable time frame
- Rental bonds
- home modifications
- purchase of a vehicle
- vehicle modifications
- mobile phone bills
- additional funding where we have already provided earlier assistance.

Purpose

Aussie Cotton Farmers Grow Communities is a grant program initiated by the Bayer Fund, in partnership with FRRR. It aims to help support cotton growing communities across New South Wales and Queensland.

Overview

People living and working in rural and regional communities are best-placed to determine the groups and projects that most need support. For the sixth year running, cotton farmers have the opportunity to nominate a deserving not-for-profit group to receive one of thirty \$5,000 grants.

The nominated organisation must be a not-for profit community-based group that is undertaking projects and activities that offer clear public benefit. They must be operating with a charitable purpose (i.e. not intended to just benefit an individual).

Recipients could include organisations like early childhood services, halls, community events, meals on wheels, neighbourhood houses, agricultural societies or other local charitable organisations.

Limitations

Who can make a nomination?

Cotton Farmers aged over 18 years and actively engaged in farming cotton in one of the 14 Cotton Grower Association areas in NSW and QLD, may nominate a community project. An eligible not-for-profit organisation is one which:

- Supports projects and activities that offer clear public benefit for communities in rural, regional and remote locations in Australia;
- Contributes to rural and regional renewal, regeneration and development in Australia in social, economic, environmental, health, education, or cultural areas; and
- Is located in one of the Cotton Grower Association areas listed below:

Queensland:

- Darling Downs
- Central Highlands
- St George
- Dawson Valley
- Dirranbandi
- Macintyre Valley

New South Wales:

- Lower Namoi
- Gwydir Valley
- Macquarie
- Southern Valleys (Lachlan/Murrumbidgee)
- Upper Namoi
- Mungindi Water Users
- Walgett
- Darling River Food and Fibre (Bourke)

Community groups themselves are not eligible to apply - they must be nominated by a cotton farmer.

Eligibility

Nominated projects by not-for-profit community groups must demonstrate the following:

- Have a charitable purpose (i.e. address a need in the community and not benefit an individual);
- Demonstrate clear community support;
- Have a good prospect of longer-term viability and impact;
- Involve partnerships or leverage financial and/or in-kind contributions;
- Be differentiated from projects already in existence;
- Be supported by viable project management arrangements (and a financially sound organisation);
- Offer value for money;
- Demonstrate innovation;
- Grant funds must be spent down between December 2019 and November 2020.

What can't be funded?

- Projects that benefit an individual rather than a community;
- Scholarships or endowments;
- Projects outside of the 14 eligible Cotton Grower Association areas in NSW or QLD;
- Purely social, sporting or recreational activities. The encouragement or advancement of sport, recreation and social activities is not considered a charitable activity by the Australian Taxation Office. Applications from sporting organisations need to clearly demonstrate a benefit to the wider community;
- Underwriting deficits;
- Religious, politically partisan, or similar groups.

Australian Aid: Friendship Grants aims to bring a new and diverse group of partners from across Australia to contribute to the delivery of Australia's aid program.

Overview

The Friendship Grants program is a three-year, \$10 million grants program managed by DFAT. The program will provide funding to successful Australian community organisations (ACOs) who are already delivering effective international development work in the Indo-Pacific region.

The Friendship Grants program provides the Australian Government with an opportunity to:

- engage new partners in the Australian aid program;
- strengthen connections between Australian communities and communities in the Indo-Pacific region; and
- promote the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

The program is designed to support organisations to expand or enhance their existing international development work in the Indo-Pacific region through financially supporting a specific activity within a wider program of work.

As a grant applicant, you will need to demonstrate an existing and positive relationship with an in-country community and evidence that you are already undertaking international development efforts in that community.

Over the three-year program, there will be three annual, competitive rounds.

Eligible organisations may apply for one-off annual grants of between AUD\$30,000 and AUD\$60,000 (GST exclusive) to fund a specific Activity that makes up part of your organisation's longer-term work.

Funding is for a time-limited Activity of no more than 12 months' duration. The Activity must make up part of your organisation's longer-term program of work, but the Activity itself should commence after the Round 1 commencement date and funds must be fully spent within 12 months.

Your organisation will be required to match DFAT's funding contribution at a ratio of AUD\$1 for every AUD\$5 of Friendship Grants funds received.

Example

The types of Activities that will be funded include activities that assist and strengthen an overseas community's development or socio-economic situation, such as:

- income generation
- including microfinance, microenterprise or small business development;
- · basic education and training
- including literacy, primary, and vocational training;
- gender equality
- including women's economic empowerment and leadership, and ending violence against women and girls;
- disability inclusion;
- healthcare
- including primary healthcare;
- water supply and sanitation
- including providing access to safe water, and maintaining or improving water quality;
- protection and promotion of human rights
- including improving economic, social and cultural rights, the rights of people with a disability, and addressing Indigenous disadvantage;
- rural development
- including the development of agriculture and basic services;
- sustainable environmental and natural resource management;
- preparedness for, and long-term recovery from, natural disasters; and
- climate change adaptation and mitigation.

Development activities should help strengthen your overseas community's ability to sustain activities after Friendship Grant or other assistance has ceased.

Limitations

Eligibility

To be eligible for a Friendship Grant, your organisation must match AUD\$1 for every AUD\$5 that the Australian Government provides under the program (20% match).

To be eligible for a Friendship Grant, you must be an Australian community organisation that:

- is not currently accredited with DFAT (ie. not an Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP) partner);
- has a proven record in implementing activities in Overseas Development Assistance (ODA) eligible countries in the Indo-Pacific region:
- has letter of support from an in-country authority; and
- has existing relationships with in-country communities that assist in the planning and implementation of activities on the ground.

Eligible organisations must be not-for-profit and registered with the Australian Charities & Not-for-Profits Commission, a state or territory regulator, or the Office of the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations; eg.

- membership-based organisations;
- professional and peak bodies; and
- local government associations.

The organisation must also be:

- a legal entity able to enter into a legally binding agreement;
- where applicable, registered for the purposes of GST;
- permanently located in Australia;
- an Australian bank account holder; and
- able to provide supporting documentation as outlined in 'Attachments to the Application'.

The goal of the Friendship Grants program is to engage a diverse group of Australian community organisations in the delivery of Australian aid in our region.

The group of successful applicants will include, as far as possible, an overall mix of:

- groups reflecting Australia's cultural and demographic variety;
- type and size of organisations;
- type of Activity being undertaken; and
- geographic spread of organisations from across Australia.

Applications from consortia are welcome, provided there is a lead applicant who is the main driver and the other entities are eligible as per the list above.

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- for-profit organisation;
- a State or Territory Government agency or organisation;
- an organisation that is currently accredited with DFAT (including Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP) partners);
- · an individual;
- a community organisation not registered in Australia; or
- an organisation, which itself or its staff, volunteers, or in-country partners, appear on any of the following lists:
 - Asian Development Bank Sanctions List;
 - World Bank Listing of Ineligible Firms and Individuals;
 - The Australian Government's Listed terrorist organisations; and
 - The DFAT Consolidated List.

ACOs that have previously received a Friendship Grant and failed to meet their obligations under the grant agreement, including a full and proper financial acquittal, are not eligible to apply for another grant in any future round.

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- Research, conferences, seminars, training events and/or exchanges to Australia or partner country;
- · Costs associated with participants attending events;
- Substantial freight of goods and supplies to the overseas country;
- Major capital expenditure (purchase of buildings or land);
- Activities in locations listed as "do not travel" or "reconsider your need to travel" on Smartraveller;
- Activities that involve unskilled volunteers supporting orphanages or residential care institutions;
- Evangelism or missionary outreach, or similar activities by political organisations; or
- Activities that are determined to be contrary to the interests of the Commonwealth of Australia.

DFAT will not fund any activities in locations that are listed on the Smartraveller website as 'do not travel' or 'reconsider your need to travel'. This can be relevant to an entire country or an area within a country.

Purpose

The Community Commemorative Grants (CCG) are designed to provide funding for local community-based commemorative projects and activities that directly commemorate the involvement, service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel in wars, conflicts and peace operations.

Overview

This grants is part of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program. The Australian Government is providing a total of \$1 million (GST exclusive) during 2019-20 for the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program grants, with the funding pool divided between the Major Commemorative Grants and Community Commemorative Grants.

Grants up to a maximum of \$4,000 are available for local, community-based projects and activities.

These small grants are focused on the local community, commemorate the service and sacrifice of local community members, and are primarily accessed by the local community.

Some examples of CCG projects/activities include restoration of an honour board, purchase of a display cabinet for military memorabilia, and installation of a flagpole to display the Australian National Flag on days of commemoration.

The list below provides a guide to eligible grant projects and activities:

Grants up to \$4000 include:

• Community War Memorials, Commemorative Plaques and Honour Boards - new war memorials, where none exists and where the new memorial will be the focus of community commemoration and the restoration of existing war memorials, honour boards/ rolls and plaques

Grants up to \$3000 include:

- Restoration, Preservation and or/Display of Wartime Memorabilia the preservation, interpretation and display of wartime and military memorabilia and artefacts.
- Commemorative Events significant military unit reunions, i.e. 40th or 65th anniversary or the commemoration of significant military anniversaries, i.e. 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan. Note: Only one anniversary should be commemorated as it is considered that events to commemorate multiple anniversaries have the potential

to diminish the significance of each anniversary. The event must be held within a month of the anniversary being commemorated.

- Publications/Website the publication of wartime histories where similar works have not previously been published, i.e. unit histories, local wartime histories and letters from service personnel.
- Public Awareness Activity significant cultural and educational projects, i.e. exhibition, with a military focus and that add to the sum of knowledge on a particular topic or which provide access to information about Australia's wartime heritage.
- School Initiative school initiatives / projects undertaken by students which focus on military involvement and social impacts relevant to the community.

The assessment and notification of outcomes will be divided into three batches during the year. Each batch will contain applications that have been submitted to the grant opportunity over the preceding period. For example, the first batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity between the opening date of the application period and 3 July 2019. The second batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity over the next four months, ending 6 November 2019, and so on.

Cut-off dates for all three batches:

- Batch 1: 3 July 2019
- Batch 2: 6 November 2019
- Batch 3: 1100pm AEDT on 31 March 2020.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria:

To be eligible you must be one of the following entity types:

Additional eligibility requirements:

- Unincorporated Association grant activities over \$10,000.

To be eligible your grant activity must:

• Be a local community-based project or activity to a maximum of \$4,000 that directly commemorates the involvement, service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel.

Eligible expenditure:

You can only spend grant funding on eligible grant activities, including:

- a commemorative event (significant anniversary or reunion)
- a flagpole
- a publication

- an honour board or commemorative plaque
- digital content development (website or application)
- public awareness, cultural and/or educational activity
- school initiative
- · display or restoration of wartime memorabilia
- war/peace memorials (new where none currently exist or restoration of existing)

What the grant money cannot be used for:

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- projects of a commercial nature/projects for profit
- projects undertaken outside of Australia
- projects exclusively commemorating animals
- projects exclusively for research
- · projects commemorating individuals
- projects commemorating the post war deaths of service personnel
- sporting events
- recurring events/activities e.g. Anzac Day, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Veterans' Day, National Service Day except where the event relates to a significant anniversary.

Expenditure items that are not eligible are:

- capital expenditure for the purchase of assets such as office furniture and equipment, motor vehicles, computers, printers or photocopiers
- construction of or fit out, alterations and/or extensions to premises including museums, memorial halls and sporting facilities
- salaries/wages salaries and wages are considered to be a payment to someone employed by the applicant on an
 ongoing basis. For the purposes of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program, paying a person other than

The Honda Foundation acts as a charitable trust, providing financial assistance to charities and organisations doing amazing work across a range of social and environmental issues.

These include:

- Supporting the disadvantaged, disabled or those suffering from illness
- Relief for victims of natural disasters
- Promotion of innovation and new technologies

The Foundation understands the power of mobility. So, they also provide a 12-month Loan Vehicle Program which includes registration, insurance and all servicing costs, and is capped at 20 loan vehicles at any one time.

Applications are assessed twice a year in March and September, but close one month prior.

In 2019, the trustees meetings will occur on Thursday 21st March and Thursday 12th September.

Example

The Honda Foundation embraces causes that empower disadvantaged Australians. It aims to give back to the community and support those charities who work tirelessly to implement change in the lives of Australians. Donations from The Honda Foundation are broad-ranging and for example can be in the form of loan vehicles, power equipment, or funds to purchase a tangible product that supports local communities. Applications including admin costs, travel costs, wages and personal devices are generally not favoured by the Trustees during the approval process.

It can be advantageous for charities to apply to The Honda Foundation for an item or piece of equipment which will support a wider initiative for their community. For example, The Honda Foundation donated new cordless microphones to the Yooralla Strike a Chord choir in Victoria. The Strike a Chord choir comprises people who have experienced a stroke with a loss of speech called aphasia. However, singing and melody are processed by a different part of the brain to speech, so those living with aphasia can still sing. This donation had a two-fold effect - supporting a grassroots cause and also empowering choir members to sing and raise their morale.

Robust, charitable causes are the backbone of many Australian communities. The Honda Foundation receives hundreds of applications each year so applicants should keep in mind that their pitch should be framed around story telling as well, ensuring The Honda Foundation understands how a grant would change lives. Also, be solution-focused in your aim. Identify the challenge, and articulate the solution and how you would get to that solution. The Honda Foundation grants can range from as little as a few hundred dollars, to thousands of dollars. Where feasible, The Honda Foundation can, and has, supported projects in their entirety.

Limitations

Only approved Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) organisations within Australia are eligible to apply for monetary funding.

Purpose

Through IGA Community Chest and associated programs, well over \$80m has been raised to help local communities.

Overview

IGA Community Chest raises funds to support local communities, charities and other worthwhile causes. It could be in response to a major event like floods or bush fires or something as simple as new soccer balls for the local under 8's.

The money is raised in a number of ways but predominately through the purchase of products with an IGA Community Chest logo on the label or ticket.

When you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label a percentage is credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account.

In most states IGA Community Chest beneficiary cheques are distributed throughout the year, meaning you can apply at any time.

How are IGA Community Chest beneficiaries chosen?

There is a tiered system for choosing beneficiaries.

- For local activities the beneficiaries are chosen by the local stores
- Regional activities they are chosen by the region or group of stores
- State beneficiaries are chosen in consultation with the State Executive and Board.

Here is a couple of tips on becoming an IGA Community Chest beneficiary:

- It is best to approach your local IGA store directly. Prepare a pitch and it may include:
 - An overview of your organisation and/or the individual that you'd like supported;
 - What support are you looking for monies, donations of goods, providing team jumpers, holding regular fundraising at the store, group registrations at the store, etc;
 - How the donation will be used and your timing.
 - Is there anything you can offer in return to IGA?
 - Don't forget to include your contact details.

Example

The Humpty Dumpty Foundation The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Independent Grocers of Australia (IGA) made a significant difference to the lives of Sydney children. From January 2017, IGA made 11 donations across NSW and ACT to support much-needed medical equipment for hospitals to the value of \$150,000. IGA's support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation and the local community is immeasurable. The support to families in Sydney means children have access to medical equipment that is very much needed by the medical staff and, most of all, it is life-saving.

Westmead Children's Hospital Mint Fresh IGA in Baulkham Hills visited The Children's Hospital at Westmead in February to present a \$2,670 Aerogen Nebuliser to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The money for the nebuliser, which makes the administering of medications easier for children with respiratory illnesses.

Moruya District Hospital The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Dalmeny IGA purchase a piece of vital medical equipment for the Eurobodalla children. Local IGA retailers presented Moruya District Hospital with a jaundice detector valued at \$4,780 for the Maternity Unity. This jaundice detector is used to help clinicians determine the jaundice levels through the skin without harming the baby.

MX550 Patient Monitor IGA retailers and the Humpty Dumpty Foundation donated \$26,920 to fund a MX550 Patient Monitor for the Blacktown Hospital's special care nursery. The monitors are used daily to measure a child's blood pressure temperature, heart rate and respiratory rate to determine how well they are recovering from surgery.

The objectives of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program are to acknowledge and commemorate those who served Australia and its allies in wars, conflicts and peace operations. The Major Commemorative Grants category of the program is available to fund commemorative projects that have a national, state or territory focus.

Overview

This grants is part of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program. The Australian Government is providing a total of \$1 million (GST exclusive) during 2019-20 for the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program grants, with the funding pool divided between the Major Commemorative Grants and Community Commemorative Grants.

These are grants for major commemorative projects/activities that are significant, from a national or state/territory perspective.

MCG grants have a much wider focus than the local Community Commemorative Grants (CCG) category, and must be of national/state/territory importance and relevance.

MCG projects and activities are targeted at a national/state/territory audience, and have a broader impact than the local community. MCG grants are usually over \$4,000, with no set maximum grant amount for this category. However, overall program funding is limited, and value for money is considered in the assessment process.

The assessment and notification of outcomes will be divided into three batches during the year. Each batch will contain applications that have been submitted to the grant opportunity over the preceding period. For example, the first batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity between the opening date of the application period and 3 July 2019. The second batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity over the next four months, ending 6 November 2019, and so on.

Cut-off dates for all three batches:

- Batch 1: 3 July 2019
- Batch 2: 6 November 2019
- Batch 3: 1100pm AEDT on 31 March 2020.

Example

Some examples of eligible MCG projects/activities include installation of a State Memorial dedicated to all who served in the Royal Australian Navy, upgrading the State Avenue of Honour to commemorate the service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel, or publishing a book documenting the military history of a military unit from the Boer War to the present day.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria:

To be eligible you must be one of the following entity types:

- Indigenous Corporation
- Company
- Local Government
- Cooperative
- Incorporated Association
- Statutory Entity
- Trustee on behalf of a Trust
- Unincorporated Association grant activities under \$10,000 only.

Applications from consortia are acceptable, as long as you have a lead applicant who is solely accountable to the Commonwealth for the delivery of grant activities and is an eligible entity as per the list above.

Additional eligibility requirements:

• The Department cannot fund applications from an organisation that has outstanding acquittals for any previous DVA funding (if applicable).

You are not eligibleto apply if you are a:

- Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Non-Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Non-Corporate Commonwealth Statutory Authority
- Commonwealth Company
- Corporate State or Territory Entity
- Non-corporate State or Territory Entity
- Non-corporate State or Territory Statutory Authority
- International Entity
- Partnership
- Person
- Sole Trader
- Unincorporated Association grant activities over \$10,000.

To be eligible your grant activity must:

- Be a major project or activity that is significant from a national, state or territory perspective that will contribute to Australia's understanding of its wartime heritage.
- For a project to be considered significant, its focus should be wider than the local community and be available to a larger audience.

Eligible expenditure:

You can only spend grant funding on eligible grant activities, including:

- a commemorative event (significant anniversary or reunion)
- a flagpole
- a publication
- an honour board or commemorative plaque
- digital content development (website or application)
- public awareness, cultural and/or educational activity
- school initiative
- display or restoration of wartime memorabilia
- war/peace memorials (new where none currently exist or restoration of existing)

What the grant money cannot be used for:

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- projects of a commercial nature/projects for profit
- projects undertaken outside of Australia
- projects exclusively commemorating animals
- projects exclusively for research
- projects commemorating individuals
- projects commemorating the post war deaths of service personnel
- sporting events
- recurring events/activities e.g. Anzac Day, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Veterans' Day, National Service Day except where the event relates to a significant anniversary.

Expenditure items that are not eligible are:

- capital expenditure for the purchase of assets such as office furniture and equipment, motor vehicles, computers, printers or photocopiers
- construction of or fit out, alterations and/or extensions to premises including museums, memorial halls and sporting facilities
- salaries/wages salaries and wages are considered to be a payment to someone employed by the applicant on an
 ongoing basis. For the purposes of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program, paying a person other than
 a usual employee to deliver a one off service such as constructing a memorial, conducting research, designing or
 printing a program booklet is not considered to be a salary
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- council approval costs
- educational materials where DVA already provides similar resources for schools
- entertainment not of a commemorative nature
- fireworks
- general ongoing administration costs of an organisation such as electricity, phone and rent
- ongoing expenditure (e.g. website hosting, memorial maintenance)

The RAD Grants offer financial support for projects that will help Care Leavers and relevant Support Services find and access records created by non-government past providers of "care" from 1920 to 1989.

Overview

They are open to not-for profit organisations that hold records that are important to people who spent time in "care" as children.

Information about records that have been documented as a result of the grants round will be included on the Find & Connect website to assist Care Leavers in finding out what documents exist and where they can be found.

To be eligible, organisations must be not-for-profit and hold records about Forgotten Australians, Stolen Generations and/ or Former Child Migrants. Eligible organisations can also auspice projects that will make records held by organisations such as libraries made available to Care Leavers.

Each project can apply for funding up to \$15,000.

Organisations can submit multiple applications, providing each application is for a discrete project.

What will be funded?

Funded activities can include:

- Staffing costs to document and describe records; eg conducting a survey of records, organising and listing records, etc
- Creating indexes to assist in locating information about people, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records
- Preservation work on collections, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records
- Digitisation of collections, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records. Any digitisation must be done externally
- Innovative ways to use records that will assist Care Leavers develop a better understanding of their history in care, eg through photos, imagery or spoken word projects, etc

Limitations

Who can apply?

Australian not-for profit organisations that hold or have created records relating to children in 'care' during the period 1920-1989 are eligible to apply. These include, but are not limited to:

- Incorporated Associations incorporated under State/Territory legislation (commonly have 'Association', 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name)
- Incorporated Cooperatives incorporated under State/Territory legislation (commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name)
- Indigenous Corporations
- Companies not-for-profit proprietary companies or public companies, incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Australian or State/Territory legislation (except Universities); for example, many public benevolent institutions and churches

Your project may be eligible even if your organisation is not, as long as you partner with an eligible organisation – see the FAQs for more information

The Attorney-General's Department may provide legal financial assistance for people engaging with the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety.

Overview

The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety has been established to consider the quality and safety of aged care services in Australia, to ensure services provided are effective and efficient.

If a grant has been approved, payments are made by way of reimbursement to legal representatives after the work has been performed.

If you have been:

- called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a hearing of the Royal Commission, or
- requested to attend or attending an interview of the Royal Commission, or
- requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission, and/or
- complying with a notice to produced issued by the Royal Commission

You may be eligible for assistance with legal representation and disbursements costs.

If you have been called in your personal capacity you will be eligible for legal financial assistance.

If your organisation has been called, you may be eligible for legal financial assistance. The organisation will be subject to an assessment of whether they can meet the cost of its legal representation without incurring serious financial difficulty.

What costs are covered?

The department will pay for reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs that you incur as a witness for the Royal Commission. These could include your solicitor's costs (e.g. attendance or preparation of documents) and disbursements (e.g. solicitor's travel, photocopying).

Limitations

Who can get a grant?

Legal financial assistance may be provided to an entity, as defined below, for their reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs resulting from:

- being called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a hearing of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to attend or attending an interview of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission, and/or
- complying with a notice to produce issued by the Royal Commission, and
- where the entity, excluding an individual, would not able to meet these costs without incurring serious financial hardship.

Definition of an entity:

For the purposes of this opportunity entity means any of the following:

- an individual;
- a body corporate;
- a body politic;

Successful projects will need to fulfil the criteria relevant to either 'pathways to employment' OR 'literacy below. In addition all grants will be assessed against innovation criteria.

Innovation

The Foundation is particularly interested in exploring new and innovative ways to engage, empower and connect communities.

Pathways to employment

Grants in this category are looking to actively support people into employment. Successful applicants will go beyond resume writing and interview skills to actively engaging with local employers.

- Employment Pathways Programs that contribute to the building of employment confidence, conversational skills, resume building, presentation of experience and strengths both verbally and in written materials.
- Local business engagement Programs that actively facilitate engagement with local businesses to introduce or expand experience of workplace cultures, language and colloquialisms, and offer and provide recognition of direct activities that build on strengths and capabilities or introduce new 'in demand' skills. Programs may also provide support and coaching for new business initiatives that connect to business associations and market opportunities.
- Cross cultural conversations Projects should encourage intercultural conversations to share and recognise mutual contributions.
- **Transition support** Projects should look to encourage intercultural conversations to share and recognise mutual contributions.

Literacy

Grants in this category will focus on English literacy. Specifically, programs will teach applied and conversational English which can be used in both day-to-day and work environments.

- **Literacy** Programs that actively and innovatively develop literacy skills using means that engage with those that are unable or ineligible for other programs.
- Applied English practice We are also looking for programs that focus specifically on English literacy that can be applied in day to day and work environments. As well as facilitating pathways into employment, it is vital that social cohesion is also supported in proposed projects.
- **Community engagement -** Programs should link participants into the broader community. This could occur by engaging with a broad range of community organisations or additional interactions in a cross-cultural environment.
- Cross cultural conversations The Foundation looks specifically for projects that foster greater understanding between different cultures and faiths.

Limitations

Only organisations with DGR 1 status will be provided with a grant. Your organisation is welcome to partner with an organisation who has DGR 1 status so long as the application comes directly from the organisation with DGR 1 status.

Local government bodies are welcome to apply for specific projects through the annual Community Grants where these projects engage and empower the broader community including both new and emerging and receiving communities. However, any local government would need to have obtained DGR1 status.

There is no standard state-wide closing date for ClubGRANTS Category 1 or 2 funding. The purpose of this grant is to enable individuals and community groups to develop sustainable With One Voice Social Franchises through establishing a community choir.

Overview

To celebrate its 10-year anniversary, Creativity Australia is offering grants of up to \$10,000 to people or groups who are wanting to start their own With One Voice choir. Only 10 of these grants are available, and all applications must be submitted by Friday 30th August 2019.

Creativity Australia's With One Voice movement is a network community choirs that bring together people from all faiths, cultures, ages, abilities, backgrounds and socio-economic situations. We currently have 25 choirs located across Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Canberra and regional Victoria, with thousands of choir members ranging in age from nine to 90 years old, and we are growing monthly!

With One Voice choirs are set up and run by local volunteers using resources and materials provided by Creativity Australia.

By establishing a local community choir under the auspices of Creativity Australia, you hold a licence that enables the choir to fundraise to support projects and initiatives at a local level.

The choir is set up as an unincorporated association under the umbrella of Creativity Australia. This includes an independent bank account which is jointly managed by the local choir volunteers and Creativity Australia.

There are seven key components to the program:

- 1.Bringing together a diverse range of local community individuals and organisations to promote, commence and participate in the program;
- 2. Finding an extraordinary music leader who is empathetic and inspiring;
- 3. Finding a safe, nurturing space to hold rehearsals at that is accessible and close to public transport or infrastructure;
- 4. Seeking out diversity all ages, backgrounds and cultures are welcome, and there are no auditions;
- 5. Showcasing your choir by performing locally and celebrating accomplishments;
- 6. Nurturing social connections between choir members by rehearsing weekly, sharing a meal and facilitating the Wish List component; and
- 7.Building sustainability by develop community and business connections, recruiting volunteers and fundraising. The Creativity Australia team works with you and provides mentoring and support through each of these steps.

It can cost up to \$23,000 per year to run a With One Voice choir, though the majority of our choirs are able to secure donated or heavily discounted venues and/or food, taking the costs down to roughly \$15,000 per year.

The costs of running a choir for one year may include:

- Conductor (depending on total number of rehearsals and performances) \$10,000
- Venue \$5,000
- Supper \$5,000
- Resources (insurances, licences, uniforms, incidentals) \$3,000
- Possible Annual Total (without any donated or discounted support) \$23,000

The choir is responsible for raising the funds to keep the program running each year. Where in-kind or heavily discounted support can be found (such as venue and/or supper), this will reduce the total amount of fundraising the choir needs to undertake.

There are four key ways a choir can generate income:

- 1. Membership contributions;
- 2. Performance donations;
- 3. Donations from local businesses or government; and
- 4.Participants accessing National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) funding to pay for their choir participation through their NDIS plan.

Most With One Voice choirs can raise between \$6,000 - \$12,000 per year through membership contributions. A further \$1,000-\$3,000 can be raised through performances and donations. Some choirs raise significantly more funds through larger memberships, more donations and local funding grants and partnerships.

Creativity Australia welcomes applications to establish With One Voice choirs from all community-based groups or organisations that have an interest in building healthier, happier, more inclusive and stronger communities.

The lead applicant submits a grant application on behalf of the consortium partnership and must identify all other consortium members in the application.

Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you (as the lead applicant):

- are not an entity type listed above
- are not a specialist organisation with demonstrable sexual violence expertise as outlined above
- do not submit your application as part of a consortium partnership with one or more specialist organisations

What the grant money can be used for

Eligible grant activities include:

- design of training package

Purpose

To reduce crashes on Australian roads and to target those road locations where crashes are occurring.

Overview

The Australian Government will provide \$744.5 million to the Black Spot Program from the 2013 to 2014 financial year to the 2021 to 2022 financial year, with an on-going commitment of \$60 million each year following.

Road crashes are a major cost to Australians every year. Black Spot projects target those road locations where crashes are occurring. By funding measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at dangerous locations, the program reduces the risk of crashes.

The Black Spot Program makes an important contribution in reducing the national road toll under the National Road Safety Action Plan 2018–2020.

Anyone can nominate a 'black spot' for funding consideration, using the official nomination form. Candidate projects are first assessed by the relevant state road authority, which has details of the crash history of the site and the expertise to assess the appropriate treatment.

Community Consultation Widespread community consultation and participation is fundamental to this program, ensuring that local concerns are addressed.

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

Coordination States and territories play an important coordinating role. A Consultative Panel has been established in each state and territory. It consists of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry, the Australian Government, local government and state road and transport agencies. Panels provide comment to the Australian Government on nominations for Black Spot works.

Rural Projects More than 60% of road deaths and a significant proportion of serious injuries occur outside metropolitan areas. In line with national road safety policy objectives, approximately 50% of Black Spot funds in each state (other than Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory) are reserved for projects in non-metropolitan areas. This ensures that crash locations in rural areas are treated.

Limitations

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

What makes a site eligible for funding?

Funding is mainly available for the treatment of Black Spot sites, or road lengths, with a proven history of crashes. Project proposals should be able to demonstrate a benefit to cost ratio of at least 2 to 1.

For individual sites such as intersections, mid-block or short road sections, there should be a history of at least three casualty crashes over a five-year period. For lengths of road, there should be an average of 0.2 casualty crashes per kilometre per annum over the length in question over five years.

The requirement of a history of crashes ensures that those sites that have a recurrent problem are targeted first for treatment.

The Black Spot Program also recognises that there are road locations that could be considered as 'accidents waiting to happen'. Therefore, some program funds may be used to treat sites where road traffic engineers have completed a

Road Safety Audit and found that remedial work is necessary. This allows an opportunity for proactive safety works to be undertaken before casualties occur.

Funds cannot be used for the purchase of road-building plant or equipment, or for operational or maintenance costs.

The Trustees meet four times a year to decide on applications. If you apply in December, you find out in February. If you apply in March, you'll hear in May. We can't fund retrospectively so make sure you get the dates right.

Overview

A total of \$500,000 is available each year. You can apply at any time. Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis.

The National Cultural Heritage Account keeps Australian protected objects in Australia so they can be preserved and made available to the public.

Cultural organisations that can care for and provide permanent public access to Australian protected objects have a priority for funding.

Individuals can also apply if they intend to gift the object to an eligible cultural institution with a permanent public collection. In these cases, the grant and the gifting of the object must be simultaneous.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups can apply for funding even if they do not have a permanent public collection. This is because of the special significance of Class A objects of heritage to Indigenous communities.

How to apply:

You must apply in writing to us.

Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis and usually covers a proportion of the fair market value of the object. Fair market value is determined by recent auction prices or the actual price paid.

The National Cultural Heritage Committee considers applications and provides recommendations to the Minister for the Arts.

You might be asked to provide at least two independent valuations from valuers approved under the Commonwealth's Cultural Gifts Program.

Priority

The following Australian protected objects are priorities for funding:

- Class A objects in Australia and overseas
- Class B objects that have been denied an export permit
- Class B objects that have been granted an export permit on condition that they be available at fair market value for purchase by an eligible cultural organisation

To avert immediate risk of further damage caused by unexpected events to the heritage values of a State Heritage Register-listed item or item with a current Interim Heritage Order.

Overview

Emergency works funding is only for items listed on the State Heritage Register, or items with a current Interim Heritage Order, to protect and/or repair damage caused by unexpected events such as an extreme storm or accident.

Between \$1,000 (ex GST) minimum up to \$10,000 (ex GST) maximum in emergency works funding is available with no matching funding required. Each listed item can only receive emergency works funding once for each unexpected event.

Funding is available on an ongoing basis; however limited funding is available each financial year. Approval of funding depends on sufficient funds being available at any given time.

Example

Examples of eligible works:

- Repair of damage to an item caused by a traffic accident, for example, a vehicle ran into and damaged a State Heritage Register listed property.
- Short term protection, for example, propping and providing tarpaulins to protect a State Heritage Register listed building that has been damaged following an extreme storm.
- Removal of an item causing damage, for example, removal of a tree or electrical wires that have fallen during a
- Temporary relocation of a movable item, for example, to move an archival or museum collection as its usual location has been inundated by flood waters.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

To be eligible for State Heritage Register Emergency Works Funding the applicant must:

- Be an individual, organisation, community group, trustee or a NSW Local Council.
- Be the owner (or long-term lessee where the lease is 20+ years) and manager of a State Heritage Register listed item or item with a current Interim Heritage Order within New South Wales.
- Have legal responsibility for the item's maintenance and repair.
- Not have acquired or leased the item from a NSW Government agency in the last two years.
- Not have entered into a conservation agreement in the last two years.

State Heritage Register Emergency Works Funding can only be used:

- To address an emergency situation within the curtilage of a State Heritage Register listed item or to an item with an Interim Heritage Order, that has been caused by an unexpected event.
- For repair works that are not be covered by the applicant's/owner's insurance.

Note: OEH reserves the right to consider exceptional circumstances if the eligibility criteria are not fully met. Contact the Heritage Grants Team to discuss prior to applying.

In addition to be eligible for emergency works funding a project must meet at least one of the following:

 Be in a remote or rural location, as defined by any area except for those depicted in red in the population density map located at http://www.spatialonline.com.au/ARIA_2011/

Note: generally Metropolitan areas in NSW are Sydney, Newcastle, Wollongong and Canberra.

• Be from an applicant considered financially or socially disadvantage (such as a private owner on a pension or a community organisation relying on fundraising).

Ineligibility

Illegal dumping is an environmental crime and can cause serious environmental pollution, pose a risk to human health and impact local amenities and community pride. The EPA acknowledges that the health and wellbeing of Aboriginal people is related to the protection of the environment.

Overview

Program objectives:

Funding offered under the program aims to:

- 1.Reduce the impacts of illegal; dumping on Aboriginal land through clean up and prevention activities
- 2.Build and maintain collaborative approaches and partnerships to help manage and reduce the occurrence of illegal dumping

- 3. Integrate deterrence, surveillance, monitoring measures and community education to prevent illegal dumping activities on Aboriginal land
- 4. Incorporate cultural activities that enable Aboriginal people to care for Country, engage in knowledge sharing and gain skills in land management

Who can apply?

- NSW Local Aboriginal Land Councils LALC)
- Entities working in partnership with a LALC such as government agencies, local councils, non-government organisations, consultants and othe entities (written consent from the LALC is required).

What is the eligibility criteria?

Grants under this program are made available to organisations not individuals. To be eligible for a grant under the ALCUP program, you must meet the following criteria:

- projects must be in NSW
- applicants must be able to demonstrate that they are a LALC entity, or have the formal support of the LALC that manages the site on which the project is proposed
- projects must be relevant to the management of illegal dumping on Aboriginal-owned land and involve the clean-up, prevention and/or deterrence of illegally dumped waste and cultural activities to support Caring for Country
- applicants must have the means or support available to complete the project and related administrative work within 18 months
- applicants must have the capacity to administer the grant funds, or a letter of support from an incorporated organisation that will administer the grant funds, indicating their willingness to be responsible for managing the funds, administering the grant and keeping financial records of the grant activities
- applicants must not have any outstanding acquittals from previous NSW Government funding.

Priority

Key strategies supported

Make access difficult

At illegal dumping sites that were easily accessible to unauthorised vehicles, ALCUP funding saw fencing, gates, earth mounds, boulders and concrete bollards installed to restrict and control access. Tracks were also re-seeded once access was blocked.

Increase risks of getting caught

Increased surveillance activities, and installed signs in a number of illegal dumping hotspots identified by the project teams to deter unlawful activity. Some signs incorporate strong cultural messages, using local Aboriginal language and artwork.

Reduce opportunities for crime: don't give a reason to dump

Waste, weed and fire management issues are often intertwined. Following clean-up work, projects have included or allowed future activities, such as tree planting or cultural fire burns, to help property managers restore and maintain value of the land.

Remove excuses: educate and inform the community

Some projects are carried out in parallel with other waste and environmental education programs, such as school poster competitions. Projects have also used media and other publicity opportunities to raise awareness.

Limitations

What projects will not be funded?

The ALCUP program provides funding for new projects whose dominant purpose is achieving clean-up and prevention of illegal dumping. Therefore, it will not fund:

- projects that have already commenced
- projects and activities that are not directly related to, or are not for the dominant purpose of, achieving the clean-up, long-term prevention and deterrence of illegal dumping
- projects which focus on the clean-up of small litter items (such as cigarette butts, cigarette packets, food containers, plastic bottles, confectionary wrappers)

Purpose

Prescribed Bodies Corporate (PBC) Capacity Building Funding is available to provide support PBCs maximise the economic and social potential of native title through the effective and sustainable management of their land.

Overview

The primary objective of this funding is to assist PBCs generate economic benefits through the effective and sustainable management of their land. This funding aims to contribute to the outcomes described in Annexure 1 (Section 22) of the IAS Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme, with a particular focus on the outcome 'Indigenous

Australians use their land and sea assets to create economic and social benefits'. This funding will support this outcome by building the capacity of PBCs to maximise the economic and social potential of native title.

What can be funded?

There are three elements to this funding:

- 1. direct support to increase the capacity of PBCs to take advantage of economic opportunities;
- 2.support for training to build long-term organisational capacity within PBCs and to procure professional expertise (for example, business or agribusiness consultancies, accountancy or legal services); and
- 3. direct support for effective native title agreement-making.

It is strongly recommended all potential applicants discuss proposals with their local PM&C Regional Network office in the early stages of development and before preparing an application.

How much funding is available?

A total of \$20.4 million is available over the first four years, comprising:

- \$2.519 million in 2015-16;
- \$5.037 million in 2016-17;
- \$6.296 million in 2017-18 and
- \$6.548 million in 2018-19.

Funding for the programme is ongoing, but funding amounts have only been allocated until 2018-19.

Limitations

Who can apply for funding?

All PBCs are eligible to apply for the funding. Native Title Representative Bodies and Service Providers (NTRBs-SPs) and other third parties, for example, law firms and interest groups, can also apply to receive and administer the funding on behalf of, and with the authorisation of, one or more PBCs.

Applicants must also meet all eligibility criteria outlined in the IAS Grant Guidelines, and undergo financial viability checks and a risk assessment.

What cannot be funded?

Activities which will not be funded are stipulated in the IAS Grant Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme. These activities include but are not limited to:

- applications that do not clearly address at least one of the IAS programme streams
- activities that are more appropriately funded by other Government agencies (including State/Territory and local Government) under their priorities
- retrospective items or activities, and
- costs reasonably covered by proponent parties.

PBCs will not be funded for costs that would be payable under the 'Basic Support Funding' under the Native Title and Land Rights Activity under the Jobs Land and Economy Programme and administered by NTRBs-SPs, as this would duplicate available funding.

While eligibility for PBC capacity building funding is restricted to PBCs or support for PBCs only, PBCs can apply for funding under other IAS funding streams and Australian Government programmes. PBC capacity building funding is intended to complement other sources of grant funding. A specific activity cannot be funded under more than one programme.

- 1.Employment- The primary aim is to support activities for Indigenous Australians to overcome disadvantage in the labour market, connect them to real and sustainable jobs, to gain experience that builds work-readiness and contributes to the broader community. Sustainable employment implies an ongoing job which is not dependent on continuous government funding. The ongoing job may be part-time or full-time.
- 2. Indigenous participants prioritised for support will include youth, school leavers at risk of disengaging or long term unemployed, those not in the labour force, jobactive Streams B & C job seekers, those in the Community Development Programme (CDP) and Disability Employment Services (DES are considered disadvantaged).

The types of activities that may be funded include:

The objective of the fund is to provide projects that improve the lives of people who live in regional areas. Round Three of the Fund will see another \$100 million made available for projects that improve the lives and wellbeing of regional NSW communities. This includes a dedicated \$50 million for projects for young people.

Overview

The objectives of the fund are:

- 1.to boost the liveability of communities in regional areas by providing new or upgraded social and sporting infrastructure or community programs that have strong local support
- 2.to provide programs and infrastructure that enhance opportunities for young people to be work ready and thrive in regional NSW.

There is a total of \$100 million available in Round Three, including at least \$50 million for projects that improve the lives of young people (12-24 years old). The remaining funding can be provided for other local community and sporting infrastructure, street beautification, and community programs and events. Funds will be split across regional NSW according to a funding formula based on population and the cost of construction in each Local Government Area. Each eligible council will be informed in writing of the funding available for their Local Government Area.

Projects must seek grant funding of \$50,000 or more. Projects requiring grant funding of more than \$1 million will only be considered where there is a financial co-contribution of at least 25 per cent of the total grant amount. The financial cocontribution may be from the applicant or other funding sources, but must be confirmed.

Example

The Stronger Country Communities Fund supports projects which improve local infrastructure. Examples include:

- building new community facilities to be shared by all within the community such as parks, playgrounds, walking or cycle pathways
- refurbishing existing local facilities such as schools and health centres, community centres, libraries
- enhancing local parks and the supporting facilities such as kitchens and toilet blocks.

Limitations

Eligible applicants are:

- the 93 regional NSW councils, regional Joint Organisations of councils, the Lord Howe Island Board and the Unincorporated Far West groups
- incorporated, not-for-profit organisations or other organisations that have a public purpose and carry out activities in NSW, including Local Aboriginal Land Councils. Applicants must hold an Australian Business Number (ABN), Australian Company Number (ACN) or be registered under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. Applicants must have or be able and willing to purchase at least \$20 million public liability insurance. The cost of public liability insurance can be included in the project budget as part of the administration costs.

Ineligible applicants are:

- an individual or group of individuals
- an unincorporated organisation
- a for-profit commercial organisation.

Youth-related projects must be for:

- development of new or upgrades to existing infrastructure for young people; or
- delivering programs for young people.

Youth-related projects must be aligned to the areas of community, wellbeing, connectivity and work readiness.

General community amenity projects must be for:

- construction of new, or upgrades to existing, local community infrastructure
- construction of new, or upgrades to existing, local sporting infrastructure
- capital works related to street beautification and other public places that promote the health, happiness and wellbeing
 of the community
- delivering programs that benefit the local community
- infrastructure to assist the delivery of general community programs.

Projects are not eligible for funding if they are:

- located outside an eligible Local Government Area
- exclusively for planning activities e.g. master planning or heritage studies
- for the maintenance or construction of local roads or other ongoing core service infrastructure works that are the ordinary responsibility of council or other levels of government
- for the delivery of essential or core government services that should be funded from another source, such as local government, the NSW Government or the Australian Government
- seeking retrospective funding to cover any project component that is already complete before funding is announced
- seeking grant funding for ongoing staff or operational costs beyond three years from project announcement for programs; or any ongoing staff or operational costs for infrastructure projects
- for a general works package without specific scope, costs and location e.g. 'upgrading lighting at sports ovals' without identifying the work required, number of sites or the locations
- exclusively for marketing, branding, advertising or product promotion providing direct commercial and/or exclusive private benefit to an individual or business
- not clearly providing benefits that will significantly contribute to the objectives of the fund.

All applicants must submit a letter of inquiry of no more than two pages briefly describing the mission and history of the applying organization, goals of the initiative(s), specific objectives, and accompanying strategies. The letter must also state the organization's current annual operating budget and primary sources of income. Applicants based in the United States must also include as appendices the IRS 501(c)(3) documentation letter and a copy of the most recent IRS Form 990. Please do not submit proposals or any other materials such as annual reports, press coverage materials, or DVDs with a letter of inquiry.

Overview

The Gay and Lesbian Foundation of Australia (GALFA) raises and distributes funds for activities that benefit lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTIQ) people, and allied communities, in Australia. GALFA is Australia's peak LGBTIQ philanthropic organisation.

Due to the large amount of requests recieved in the first part of 2018 for small grants GALFA have decided to change the way we roll out the small grants.

They will now run 4 small grant rounds each calendar year.

- The first round closing date: March 10 2019.
- Second round June 9, 2019.
- Third Round September 8, 2019.
- Fourth Round December 6, 2019.

They will endeavour to process and access applications within 7 days of each round.

GALFA welcome applications that are particularly creative and innovative, and those that are put forward by individuals and organisations that have not received small grant funding in the previous 2 years.

They also look for projects that work as partnerships between individuals and organisations. Applicants can apply for up to \$500.

Limitations

Please note, funds are not available for for-profit organisations. GALFA only funds projects benefiting LGBTIQ people in Australia.

Who Can Apply?

Eligible applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Must be a permanent resident or community group, operating in Australia.
- Applicants need only be a group of people with a common interest.
- It is preferred that individuals / groups apply through an Auspice organisation, but it is not a necessary requirement.

 - Will the project encourage future projects and or events in the community?

Restrictions:

The following are ineligible for funding:

- Projects that do not benefit the LGBTIQ community
- Projects that have commenced or been completed.
- Costs of organising and running competitions, prizes, awards, or fundraising events (for example, judges expenses, administration and infrastructure costs).
- Projects managed by grantees who have not acquitted previous grants from GALFA.
- Grantees that received a GALFA small grant in the previous 2 years.
- Limited and Propriety Limited companies which are for-profit organisations.

Content grants include funds specifically dedicated to Specialist Radio Programming. This portion of our content grants funding is available to support ongoing ethnic, Indigenous and RPH programs. For applicants looking to apply for Specialist Radio Programming funds, you must complete a separate grant application specifically requesting this funding.

Priority

The Content Grants Advisory Committee (CGAC) will apply the following priority weightings on assessment scores from:

- regionally-based organisations (5%)
- lower-income organisations with limited capacity to fund initiatives (5%).

These applicants will receive a weighting on their assessment score as described in section 8 below. An applicant may qualify for both weightings.

Limitations

Who is eligible to apply?

You can apply for a Content grant if you are a current or prospective community broadcaster producing content for broadcast by a recognised community broadcasting station.

While the application process is open to any producer, the grant itself must be managed by an eligible organisation listed below. We encourage you to negotiate an auspice agreement with any auspice organisation you work with.

Eligible organisations include:

- a community radio station with a long term or temporary licence
- a community television station
- an incorporated non-profit community broadcasting sector organisation
- a Remote Indigenous Media Organisation or Remote Indigenous Broadcasting Service
- an incorporated not-for-profit organisation producing video content with an agreement for broadcast via a licensed community broadcasting entity or recognised community broadcasting aggregator / distributor such as community television online platforms
- Incorporated not-for-profit organisations auspicing applications for program groups broadcast on a community radio station.

What conditions apply?

- The production must be first broadcast by a recognised community broadcasting organisation and must continue to be made available to that organisation for re-broadcast upon request. Prior permission is required from the recognised community broadcasting organisation to re-broadcast funded content elsewhere.
- You must acknowledge the CBF's financial support as detailed on the CBF website
- You must ensure a sample of the production is made available for publication on the CBF website.
- The CBF will not acquire a copyright interest in funded content. The owner of copyright in a work is the creator unless the creator has assigned copyright in advance, such as through a presenter's, employment, auspice or broadcast agreement.

What can you use the grant for?

Content development and distribution costs directly associated with the production and delivery of a specific program or project, such as:

- project specific wage support: presenters, producers, cast, crew, project management, technicians
- program specific needs: research materials, music and copyright purchases, relevant project specific insurance such as defamation insurance for a special broadcast event, travel, marketing, development resources, TV studio hire, venue hire, small equipment, equipment hire, catering, materials for set design, costumes and props, makeup, interpreters, subtitles and captioning, program specific training, phone/internet costs, program website costs, production support and facilities
- organisational support: administration costs for funded projects (up to \$1,000 per project).

What can't you use the grant for?

- Ongoing specialist program costs (Indigenous, Ethnic, RPH programs), which can be applied for as a Specialist Radio Programming component of your Content Grant application
- Operational costs, training, or equipment which can be applied for as part of a Development & Operations grant application
- Costs incurred prior to 1 December 2017
- Overseas travel
- Costs that could be met by an organisation's in-kind contribution, such as studio hire fees and admin staff work time
- Contingency costs.

The proportion of the co-contribution may be considered in assessment. Such contributions are in addition to any in-kind or volunteer support.

Who is eligible to apply?

To apply for this grant, you will need to provide evidence that this situation could not have been reasonably anticipated prior to the most recent CBF grant round, cannot wait until the next round and cannot be covered by your organisation's reserves. This could include:

Emergencies:

- Replacing essential equipment and related expenses to restore basic transmission following an unforeseen event such as flood, bushfire, lightning or theft
- Replacing essential operational equipment and related expenses not able to be reasonably anticipated
- Unexpected changes at your studio or transmission site such as a sudden need to relocate
- A financial loan while an insurance claim is being processed and/or funds are raised
- Other costs associated with maintaining transmission and/or operations not able to be reasonably anticipated.

Opportunities:

- A matched funding opportunity for a project
- Other costs associated with a time-limited opportunity

Grants will be considered outside the normal grant rounds – you will normally receive advice about the outcome of your application within one week.

Application methods: Discuss your project with a CBF Grants Support Team member listed below. If eligible, you will be provided with a link to our online grant application in SmartyGrants.

Example

Limitations

Limitations

To be considered eligible for a Quick Response grant, you will need to answer yes to the following guestions:

- Has this emergency/opportunity arisen unexpectedly? That is, that it could not have been reasonably anticipated during a previous funding round and cannot wait for the next funding round.
- Can you provide evidence of the emergency/opportunity in your application? Such as:
 - Photos of equipment needing replacing
 - Documentation from ACMA, local council, landlord, owners corporation, utility company, real estate agency
 - Insurance documentation
 - Evidence of support from funding partners
 - Hyperlinks or screenshots of the unique equipment sale
 - Financial statements demonstrating costs cannot be met from organisation reserves
- Can you provide the following information required within the grant application?
 - Your latest Annual Report with financial statements, even if you have supplied this information to the CBF previously
 - Your current Strategic and/or Business Plans

- A description of your transmission setup, any apparatus licenses and block diagram of the current and proposed transmission chain (for transmission projects)
- An agreement with a registered training organisation (for training projects)
- A competitive quote for any equipment purchases over \$2,000
- A clear and detailed project budget
- Contact information for your organisation and a key individual involved in the proposal

Funding conditions

To receive a Quick Response grant, you must meet the following funding conditions.

- Amount we may fund:
 - Emergencies: 100% of the financial cost of the project
 - Opportunities: maximum of 50% towards the total financial cost of the project
- Loans will need to be fully repaid within the agreed time-frame (even if insurance does not cover the full amount). If loan repayments are not provided within the agreed timeframe, the CBF will not consider grant applications from the organisation.
- You must provide evidence of the emergency or opportunity taking place outside of CBF grant rounds.
- You must provide evidence that costs cannot be met from organisation reserves.

Guide for how much to apply for annually:

- Infrastructure/small equipment up to \$750 per program, and up to \$5,000 per applicant organisation per program
- Program materials up to \$1,000 per applicant organisation per program type
- Subscriptions/news sources up to \$120 per program
- Music up to \$720 per program, and up to \$5,000 per applicant organisation per program type
- Local travel up to \$500 per program, and up to \$2,000 per applicant organisation per program type
- Program marketing up to \$600 per program, and up to \$1,200 per applicant organisation per program type
- Program website costs up to \$200 per program, and up to \$1,000 per applicant organisation
- Conference registration up to \$2,000 per applicant organisation per program type
- Broadcaster meeting expenses up to \$1,000 per applicant organisation per program type
- Community/broadcaster engagement: administration/consultation fees for the station up to \$250 per program as a transitional measure
- Phone/internet expenses up to \$120 per program, and up to \$500 per applicant organisation per program type
- Indigenous program wages up to \$75 per hour of programming
- Outside broadcast/special broadcasting events up to \$2,500 per applicant organisation
- Program specific training/mentoring up to \$500 per program, and up to \$2,500 per applicant organisation.

Limitations

Who is eligible to apply?

- A community radio station with a long term or temporary broadcast licence
- Incorporated not-for-profit organisations auspicing applications for program groups broadcast on a community radio station.
- A Remote Indigenous Media Organisation or Remote Indigenous Broadcasting Service.

Who is not eligible to apply?

- An applicant seeking support for TV content should apply for programming support under Content grants. RPH licensed stations. RPH stations may apply for funding support through Content grants and Development & Operations grants.

In a Good Place is a national grants program with the objective of providing support for community-driven initiatives that reduce social isolation, increase social participation and connectedness, and increase help-seeking of members within rural, regional and remote communities who are at risk of, or are experiencing, mental health issues.

Overview

In a Good Place supports rural, regional and remote communities in their efforts to strengthen the mental health of atrisk and vulnerable members of their communities via projects, services or activities that are preventative or responsive in nature and which are designed to engage those less likely, unable due to distance and isolation, or ineligible to participate in mainstream mental health services. The program is open primarily to non-clinical approaches which are communitybased and accessible at a grassroots level in a range of settings.

Grants of up to \$20,000 are available from an annual funding pool of \$200,000. \$100,000 is available this round.

Priority

Priority will be given to initiatives that:

- 1. Are delivered via non-clinical first providers of mental health care, such as school counsellors and teachers, members of the clergy or pastoral care teams, neighbourhood or community groups, or via technological or other innovative methods;
- 2. Improve accessibility and availability of mental health services, tools or support to areas with limited or no access to the same:
- 3. Provide innovative responses that are inclusive, building social connections that lead to better mental health;
- 4. Confront stigma surrounding help-seeking behaviour.

Preference will be given to projects:

- Serving communities with populations under 10,000 in rural, regional and remote communities nationally; Run by, and based in, the beneficiary community/ies;
- Responding to specific population mental health and wellbeing issues within a local community;
- Sustainable beyond the period of the grant;
- Do not duplicate an existing service or program.

There is a preference for projects that are initiated and delivered by local community and not-for-profit organisations, rather than organisations from outside of the beneficiary community. Organisations from outside of beneficiary communities applying for funds will need to provide sufficient evidence that the local community endorses the organisation and the project, or has initiated the partnership to deliver the project.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Community groups and not-for-profit organisations with an ABN or Incorporation Certificate. There is no special tax status required.
- Organisations registered as charities with the ACNC are preferred but not essential.
- If your project involves working directly with children / youth under 18 years, your organisation must have policies and procedures around working with children, Working with Children Checks, and the handling of child abuse complaints, or the project may not be funded.

What cannot be funded?

- Retrospective projects; i.e. projects that have already occurred or which will have occurred by the time funds are
- Purely sporting, social or recreational activities;
- Projects that support private businesses and commercial activities (excepting social enterprises).

What types of projects can be funded?

FRRR welcomes all project applications that meet the program objectives and criteria, including:

- Non-clinical mental health approaches which are community-based and accessible at a grassroots level in a range of
- Projects that can demonstrate improved outcomes relating to reduced social isolation, increased participation in community life, and increased help-seeking of beneficiaries;
- Purchase of equipment or resources to enable delivery of a program, service, or activity locally (quotes must be provided for items over \$500);
- Development or provision of culturally-appropriate activities and resources;
- Delivery of community-based therapeutic programs and activities such as arts, theatre, gardening, community dinners, or informal mentoring and peer support groups, which engage vulnerable and at-risk members of the community;
- Projects that reduce stigma, increase local knowledge and understanding of mental health, promote awareness, and strengthen the skills of first responders within communities;
- Projects that are clearly aligned to, linked with, supported by or collaborating with other local, state or industry services focused on improving mental health;
- Projects that foster local partnerships that help to strengthen grassroots support mechanisms for local residents;
- Projects that can be sustained over time beyond the initial grant; and
- Salaries and wages may be supported if linked to the delivery of the project and where ongoing funding for the position is not required. Preferably, where a grant supports wages, the project will leave a legacy and build the capacity of local community groups and services to be able to respond and support needs or continue activities beyond the grant.

The goal of this funding opportunity is to tackle and answer the most critical clinical questions affecting women diagnosed with breast and ovarian cancer, with the potential to transform the clinical management of both of these conditions by delivering high impact patient outcomes significantly faster than existing funding mechanisms.

Overview

Emerging evidence suggests that there is significant overlap in the mutation profile and endocrine-driven signaling pathways of patients with breast cancer and ovarian cancer. These developments clearly offer exciting new opportunities to support collaborative cancer research projects that benefit many more women compared to tumour-specific approaches.

The Initiative will complement existing national research programs, operated independently by the OCRF and NBCF.

Excellence in project design and infrastructure, complemented by an outstanding team of scientists must be demonstrated.

Funding

The total funding available is AUD\$1 million over 3 to 5 years which will fund one or two research projects. The total requested budget must not exceed AUD\$1 million. All applications will be subject to a thorough budget review as part of the peer review process.

- Have demonstrated past experience in or future potential for a career in ovarian and/or breast cancer research.

The Strengthening Rural Communities program gives small rural, regional and remote communities across Australia the opportunity to access funds that can benefit and help secure their future prosperity. Grants are available for a broad range of initiatives that directly and clearly benefit local communities.

Overview

Funding Available

The Strengthening Rural Communities program includes two tiers of grant funding. For this round, FRRR invites applications from not-for-profit community organisations for the Small and Vital tier only:

- 1.Small and Vital grants
- Grants of up to \$10,000 are available; Applications for the Small and Vital tier of this grants program are accepted anytime via our online application portal (Grants Gateway); Applications are assessed by FRRR on a quarterly basis.
- 2. Larger Leverage grants (not available this round)
- Grants between \$10,001 \$25,000 are available; •The Larger Leverage grants will open in August 2019 and will be offered twice a year.

Targeted Donor Funds:

FRRR partners with a wide range of donors, many of whom have specific regional and issue-based preferences or requirements. Priority

The Tackling Tough Times Together (TTTT) rolling grants program supports communities in areas significantly impacted by the immediate and longer-term effects of drought to sustain and strengthen their connectedness, skills, resources and leadership, and to facilitate strong and adaptable communities.

Overview

The objectives of the program are to:

- 1. Reduce social isolation by facilitating strong social cohesion and connection;
- 2. Support and engage the community in leadership development and skills training;
- 3. Support opportunities for social and educational participation and address disadvantage caused by the drought, for children and young people;
- 4.Reduce volunteer fatigue and build the capacity, capability and sustainability of local not-for-profit organisations to provide support to their communities, particularly where they are playing an increased role during the drought; and
- 5. Support local economic recovery or renewal through projects that stimulate economic activity and cash-flow within communities.

Grants are available for projects that directly benefit the immediate and medium-term needs of drought affected communities.

Three streams of grants are available:

- 1.Up to \$20,000;
- 2.Up to \$60,000: Applicants must initially speak to the FRRR Program Manager before lodging an application; and
- 3.Up to \$150,000: Applications for this stream are by Expression of Interest, and applicants must speak with the TTTT Program Manager before submitting an Expression of Interest. Multi-year projects are welcomed.

Criteria for applications up to \$60,000 and \$150,000

- Provide broader, more medium term impact multi-year grants will be considered;
- Offer activities that could be repeated over a period of time;
- Deliver larger scale activities that provide short term relief to alleviate the impact of drought;
- Support a coordinated approach with a regional focus;

- Enhance resourcing, stability and continuity of events and programs being delivered by local not-for-profit organisations: and
- Support the delivery of activities and services that cost more due to the remoteness of their location.

- · Providing training and support to potential and current community leaders to further build capacity, capability and to drive community led responses to the issues that matter to them. This may include forums and training workshops;
- Salaries and wages will be supported where this relieves pressure on volunteers, assists in delivering grant projects, and creates short-term employment opportunities for local people.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Community groups and not-for-profit organisations with a current ABN or incorporation status.
- Projects led by local communities will be given strong preference.
- Please note no specific tax status is required.

What cannot be funded?

Applications from sporting organisations need to clearly demonstrate benefits to the wider community beyond competitive sports-related activities (please contact FRRR if you wish to discuss);
- Commonwealth, State and Local Government core business and areas of responsibility;
- Projects that do not directly support drought affected communities;
- Projects that benefit a single individual rather than a community;

- The project must not duplicate an existing project or service;
- Retrospective projects, i.e. projects that have already occurred or which will have occurred by the time funds are received:
- Projects that are for animal welfare;
- Projects outside Australia and overseas travel; nor
- Projects that support private businesses and commercial activities (excepting not-for-profit social enterprise).

Overview

Be Connected is an Australian government initiative committed to increasing the confidence, skills and online safety of older Australians. Be Connected aims to empower everyone to use the internet and everyday technology to thrive in our digital world. All be Connected Network Partners have access to a grants program to support their delivery of digital literacy programs.

Activation grants are one-off grants awarded to new organisations joining the Be Connected Network. All organisations who join the network before August 2019 will be able to apply for a \$2,000 Activation grant.

The activation grant is designed to get you started in the Be Connected network, and for the funding, we expect partners to support at least 30 older people over 10 months (15 if located in outer regional, remote or very remote areas). You'll need to support learners through the Be Connected website, and further guidance on how to do this is provided to all network partners.

Funding can be spent on anything that will help you support older Australians to gain digital skills, including new devices, broadband fees, or expenses for digital mentors or volunteers.

Activation grants are available until August 2019, with applications assessed and funding awarded on a monthly basis.

The Be Connected program (previously referred to as Digital Literacy for Older Australians - DLOA) aims to support people over the age of 50 who do not engage with digital technology to thrive in a digital world and it includes a \$20m grant program which will run until June 2020.

Limitations

What can the grant be used for?

The funding can be spent on activities that can be justified as supporting older Australians to gain basic digital skills and confidence such as:

Points to note:

One of the team will be in touch with you within the next 2 to 3 weeks to process your application and welcome you into the network. You are able to apply for an activation grant as soon as you've completed the join the network form - you don't have to wait for the phone call from us.
- 2. Your organisation must achieve the target of the activation grant 15 or 30 people gaining basic digitals skills in a maximum of 10 months - before you are able to apply for any other Be Connected grants. The activation grants form part of the Government's Be Connected program that includes a \$20 million grant program, which will finish in June 2020.

Who is not eligible?

Eligible projects:

To be eligible your New and Existing Incubators project must:

- include eligible activities and eligible expenditure
- have an eligible project value of at least \$52,000 for projects in major cities
- have an eligible project value of at least \$40,000 for projects in regional areas.

Eligible activities:

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and may differ between the two components. Examples of eligible activities include:

- expanding mentor networks to new mentors with national or international expertise

Joint applications are acceptable and encouraged, provided you have a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project and is eligible to apply.

Who is not eligible?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an individual, partnership or trust (however, an incorporated trustee may apply on behalf of a trust)
- a Commonwealth, state or territory government agency or body (including government business enterprises and corporate Commonwealth entities).

Additional eligibility requirements:

In order to be eligible you must provide:

- evidence from your board (or chief executive officer or equivalent if there is no board) that the project is supported, and that you can complete the project and meet the costs of the project not covered by grant funding
- for grants over \$50,000, an Accountant Declaration that confirms you can fund your share of the project costs. You must use the Accountant Declaration form available on business.gov.au and GrantConnect.

Eligible projects:

To be eligible your New and Existing Incubators project must:

- include eligible activities and eligible expenditure
- have an eligible project value of at least \$52,000 for projects in major cities
- have an eligible project value of at least \$40,000 for projects in regional areas

Multiple projects: You can apply for up to two grants at the same time from either component. If both projects are supported you must have successfully completed one of the projects including submitting a satisfactory final report, before you can apply for another grant. You can only have two projects running at the same time.

Eligible activities:

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and may differ between the two components. Examples of eligible activities include:

- expanding mentor networks to new mentors with national or international expertise
- providing or facilitating access for start-ups to new resources (such as purchase of technical equipment) to promote or facilitate international trade
- providing or facilitating access for start-ups to new knowledge (such as customer acquisition and/ or business development methods) to promote or facilitate international trade
- facilitating start-ups' access to new international networks (e.g. investors, customers peer firms).

This is not an exhaustive list of eligible activities. We may approve other activities where they are consistent with the program objectives and expected outcomes. The Program Delegate makes the final decision on whether an activity is eligible.

They are looking for killer medtech ideas to prototype stage projects that can change the face of healthcare. If you are unsure if your technology fits, reach out and ask.

How it works:

- 1. Entrepreneurs and innovators of Australia are invited to submit their story
- 2. Refine pitch and strategy in pre-Rapid Fire Round (RFR) training
- 3. Smash your 1 minute pitch at the RFRs in Sydney and Melbourne
- 4. Take advantage of the mentoring and training at the Medtech bootcamp
- 5. Impress the judges at the gala dinner finals and win up to \$10000 prize money
- 6. Build strategy and skill up in the accelerated technology roadmap
- 7. Pitch to the Actuator panel:
 - Take out the \$30,000 grand prize
 - Entry into the Actuator Accelerator
 - Up to \$200,000 investment.

What's at stake:

- \$30,000 Grand Prize + up to \$200,000 seed equity investment: The startup that takes out the top prize at the Investor Deal Pitch will get access to up to \$40,000 in total prize money, entry into The Actuator Accelerator, and access to up to \$200,000 seed equity investment.
- Five \$10,000 Finalist Prizes: The top five startups at our National Gala Dinner pitch night get up to \$10,000 each

Limitations

Eligibility

All entrepreneurs across Australia are eligible to apply.

Projects at the idea through prototype stage of development are eligible.

Teams can be anyone that makes sense, you can join a team or pick up team members.

Not-for-profit organisations are eligible. Business concepts should focus on sustainability of the business, products and services to be offered, and innovation in the business model. Not-for-profit applicants are strongly advised to speak with Actuator staff before submitting their application.

MedTech: devices, diagnostics, instrumentation, bionics, health services, digital health (we aim for inclusivity in our criteria - if it is reasonably medtech oriented, it's eligible)

Rules

- Entry Registration must be received by the deadline, no exceptions
- Individuals/teams may enter multiple ideas but only one may progress to the Rapid Fire Round
- All presentations must follow outlines restrictions with respect to time, allowable props, etc. Violation of presentation rules may result in disqualification.
- Applicants are required to sign a waiver allowing The Actuator the rights to photograph and film participation in the competition for marketing purposes.
- All teams are required to participate in media and press opportunities related to the competition, including but not limited to media interviews and content for press releases. Participation in media and press opportunities does not require teams to disclose any proprietary or otherwise confidential information related to their business or product concepts. The Actuator is available, upon request, to provide consultation to help avoid such disclosures.
- Award money must be issued to an ABN, not a person and must be used to further develop the product/concept that was pitched (or a reasonable pivot from this). For the \$10,000 finalist award, there are parameters for how the money is to be spent with portions going to stage 0 development, prototype development, administrative tasks, legal costs and international travel to participate in MedTech's Got Talent organised functions. For the \$30,000 there are no parameters aside from it being applied toward commercialisation of the product/concept.

Purpose

To create a more just society by giving every young person in Australia an equal opportunity to access the skills to negotiate life's journey.

Overview

Matana's focus is on improving the welfare and wellbeing of young people from severely disadvantaged or marginalised backgrounds, or whose concerns and issues are not readily funded from other sources. Recognising that disadvantage takes many forms, we prioritise projects and organisations that address the causes of youth disadvantage by:

- Providing programs primarily targeting school retention and increased education achievement for students who are at risk of dropping out of school or who have already dropped out. The focus is on early identification, customised learning and mentoring.
- Providing programs that target employment skills development, employment and career pathways and transitions into employment.
- Providing programs that target social and community connectedness, personal significance and social and emotional outcomes.
- Providing services in geographical areas across Australia where funding is difficult to source.

We welcome applications from financially viable organisations which work to improve the lives and opportunities of disadvantaged young people, particularly where their core activities correlate with our funding priorities. Wherever possible, you will need to demonstrate the tangible impact of your organisation's work in improving the welfare or wellbeing of disadvantaged young people.

There is no minimum or maximum amount, but as a guide, grants are usually in the range of \$1,000 to \$10,000. However, assessment will be made on an individual basis. We also encourage grantseekers to apply to other sources to facilitate joint funding of projects.

Grants may be sought at any time.

Limitations

Matana can only make grants to organisations that hold the following ATO endorsements:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Item 1
- Tax Concession Charity (TCC)

Evidence of endorsements is required at the point of application. If your organisation does not have Item 1 DGR and TCC status, unfortunately we will not be able to consider your application.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications that request funding for:

- Operating costs including salaries and administration costs, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Capital and building expenditure, including equipment, vehicles, travel, furniture, books and conferences, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Retrospective funding or budget deficits
- Fundraising events and campaigns
- Medical programs or research
- Religious activities, where the applicant project involves religious instruction.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications for funding from:

- Individuals, state and federal government bodies
- Organisations outside Australia.
