Purpose

The Community Small Grants program aims to build individual/groups skills and knowledge in land management practices and community participation, knowledge and skills with community organisations, groups or local communities.

Overview

The grants are part of the Community Small Grants and Education Scholarship Program 2018-2021 which supports community in building knowledge, skills and participation in land management practices.

Funding Availability:

• Maximum \$2000 per project.

Closing Dates for Funding Rounds (multiple rounds over 3 years):

- Applications will be assessed within 2 weeks of the following Rounds.
- Submit your applications by:
 - 2019: 1 April, 1 July, 1 October
 - 2020: 1 February, 1 March, 1 April 1 July, 1 October
 - 2021: 1 February, 1 March

Example

Examples of Skills and Knowledge, and Community Participation Projects that can be funded (group, network or associations)- up to \$2000 (per group/per year maximum 3 applications):

- Public Awareness raising events- such as involvement in festivals, public displays, static displays, ore development of educational resources/kits, online resources.
- Public/Closed Workshops- such as tailored workshops for your group members, or public workshops inviting local community, this includes development of resources or kits that facilitate workshop activities
- Public/Closed Field based events- where activities will build local community knowledge in on ground activities and land management practices, this can include a examples such as: community tree planting events, farm visits or demonstration site visits, or project plan development where community is involved in planning activities open to the public or specific to your group
- School programs- that build students/school communities knowledge of relevant environmental, agricultural or cultural land, and emergency management issues
- Closed Group training events- where a training event is tailored/delivered to a community group to build relevant skills to local projects or initiatives such as pest training for 1080/pindone use, chemical application training, weed ID and training, drone/app training, property planning etc

Eligibility Criteria

• The group/organisation must have been in operation for at least 6 months

- Your organisation/ community group must either be incorporated OR auspiced by an organisation that is incorporated or has an ABN. Unincorporated groups can access financial assistance; however, a tax invoice from a supplier (e.g. caterer, guest speaker) must be issued for payment directly to Hunter LLS.
- Your project must aim to build community participation and knowledge and skills with community organisations or local communities
- Maximum of 1 application per group per financial year
- All applications should determine budgets based on quotes/actual costs. All projects should retain all receipts for project activities, as projects may be audited on completion.
- All recipients must use Hunter LLS evaluation forms (for projects and scholarships, and submit evaluation results to Hunter LLS) within 2 weeks of end of contract date/project completion with Final Reports.
- Applicants/groups must be residing in or registered in the Hunter Local Land Services region
- All Projects must be completed within the agreed contract date, or on or before the 30th May of the financial year the grant was offered.

Ineligible Activity/ Criteria

- · Activities that have already been funded
- Activities that are of personal or private benefit
- Your organisation/group is subject to an Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC), Local Land Services (LLS), Department of Primary Industries (DPI) or other legal investigation
- Activities that do not align with the intended outcomes (skills and knowledge in land management practices and/or building community participation, skills and knowledge within organisations and communities)
- Capital items generally will not be funded, unless there is a strong justification (where the items directly support learning outcomes).

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Purpose

The International Conservation Grants target projects that focus on alleviating community-driven threats to wildlife.

Overview

The project must result in measurable outcomes for wildlife, as a result of specific community action(s). The target audience (people) can be an in situ community or a community not located in the immediate locale of the wildlife. Zoos Victoria defines an in situ community as a community of local people who are directly impacted by, or directly impact a project.

The total funding pool for this round is \$80,000, with a maximum of \$20,000 per project available.

Priority

Preference may be given to projects that focus on species (including closely related species) which are in Zoos Victoria's animal collection.

Example

Two project examples are listed below:

- 1. Threat: an in situ community in Madagascar is cutting down trees for kitchen firewood, resulting in deforestation and less habitat for lemurs; and a consequent decrease in lemur numbers. Behaviour change action: local communities make fuel briquettes and fuel efficient stoves. Measurable outcome related to people (measure of behaviour uptake), e.g. number of women using briquettes and stoves; related benefits such as income generation from sale of stoves, and increase in skills from producing own stoves. Measurable outcome for wildlife: decrease in amount of firewood being extracted from forest (threat reduction); increase in number of lemurs in the forest.
- 2. Threat: an Australian community has an increasing consumption of mobile phones, which leads to increase in demand for coltan (high level conductor found in many electronic devices) in gorilla habitat. This threatens gorilla populations. Behaviour Change Action: Recycle your mobile phone. Measurable outcome related to people (measure of behaviour uptake), ie. number of phones donated for recycling. Measurable outcome for wildlife: decrease in amount of coltan extracted from gorilla habitat. Increase in number of gorillas in coltan mining areas.

Limitations

Selection Criteria:

- Wildlife impact must be located outside Australia. However, the target audience for the behaviour change may be located within Australia, or within the locale of the wildlife.
- Projects need to demonstrate how they are facilitating community action and/or changing behaviour in their target audience in order to alleviate threats to wildlife.
- Measurable outcomes for people and wildlife must be tangible/measurable targets, not just an "increase". In many cases this requires projects to have baseline data to measure success against. Measurable reductions in threat are also valid measures of success.
- Projects with a conservation education focus must demonstrate tangible outcomes for wildlife raising awareness/ knowledge alone does not change behaviour.
- Project timeline must not exceed 12 months. However, Zoos Victoria recognises that some measures of success take longer than 12 months to eventuate. Please state goals of 12 month funding in the context of the project's long-term success.
- Projects that include reintroduction or relocation processes must be endorsed by relevant government bodies.
- Project must ensure that the welfare of animals in the wild is paramount and in accordance with governing welfare agencies.
- If the budget includes salaries, Zoos Victoria will only support these for local/national organisation staff (not expatriate staff).
- Salaries must not exceed 40% of the funding requested from Zoos Victoria.

Overview

Funding is available for a wide range of arts and cultural activity, including:

- creation of new work, practice-based research or experimentation and professional development

- you are receiving Multi-year Program funding from Create NSW,
- you are already receiving Annual program funds from Create NSW for the same period, or
- you are applying for filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

Purpose

Through our Arts program area we aim to help build the calibre and capacity of Australia's arts organisations and support them to raise the bar of aspiration and achievement in the sector. We seek to foster appreciation of the arts and to develop opportunities for greater access to the arts, particularly in rural and regional areas.

Overview

A dynamic and well-resourced arts sector is central to a culturally rich, vibrant and innovative society. The Foundation is interested in enhancing the calibre and capacity of the arts sector and supporting excellent organisations to raise the bar of aspiration and achievement.

Objectives:

- To support first-rate artistic institutions and organisations in metropolitan and regional Australia which are distinctive in artistic achievement, imagination and innovation in fostering development across a sector or art form.
- To support such institutions to host artists in high-calibre professional development and/or leadership opportunities of at least 12 months (e.g. fellowships, apprenticeships, mentorships, internships).

Proposals that are collaborative and/or share knowledge with the broader sector are encouraged. In general, the recommended minimum grant amount for institutions and organisations is \$100,000 and these are usually considered as multi-year grants. We encourage all organisations to apply regardless of their size; in the case of smaller organisations, the award can be for small amounts over multiple years.

Applicants are required to speak with the Arts Program Manager if submitting an Expression of Interest (EOI).

The Ian Potter Foundation rarely awards the full amount of any project. Please ensure that you have alternative providers of funding, and that your application clearly considers any possible grant from the Foundation in this context. Please also refer to the Funding Principles section for further information.

Limitations

The Ian Potter Foundation can only make grants to organisations with BOTH Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Item 1 and Tax Concession Charity (TCC) status.

Purpose

The purpose of the Community Presenter Touring Grant is to extend the reach of professional productions to smaller towns and remote communities in NSW that do not have a professional performing arts venue, by providing funds towards the performance fee of touring productions.

Overview

The Grant supports the presentation of professional, NSW-based productions to non-professional venues in regional NSW. Funds for this Grant have been made available by Arts NSW on behalf of the NSW Government. This is a three-year initiative.

Applicants can submit a proposal for funding to:

- extend a regional tour to one or more non-professional venues in regional NSW;
- support a new tour to two or more non-professional venues in regional NSW.

Grant funds can be used to support up to 50% of the performance/delivery fee of a touring production.

Applicants can apply for:

- between \$500 and \$4,000 per venue;
- up to \$12,000 for a consortium of three or more venues.

We strongly encourage you to read the guidelines & FAQs, and speak to Arts on Tour staff and/or your regional arts organisation before starting on an application.

Limitations

Who can apply?

Community presenters can apply for this Grant. For the purposes of this grant a community presenter is an individual or organisation who takes on the responsibility of presenting a professional production or performance in a non-professional venue, including financial management, fee negotiation, contracting, marketing and technical provisions.

A community presenter might be:

- · Regional arts organisation;
- Community group;
- · Local council;
- Lead organisation representing a consortium of non-professional venues;
- Tour coordinator or Producer (defined as the person or organization who is taking the financial risk on the tour);
- Professional performing arts presenter coordinating a 'mini tour' to non-professional venues as part of a regional tour;
- Self-presenting artist or producer.

Purpose

The Contemporary Music Touring Program (CMTP) supports national touring activity undertaken by Australian musicians performing original contemporary music. It provides travel support of up to \$15,000 for artists and their manager for tours in Australia that include performances in regional and remote areas.

Overview

Under the CMTP performances of original Australian contemporary music can include a wide range of different musical styles.

Applications must contain one tour only. The tour must comprise of performances in at least three venues outside of the performer's hometown and must include at least one performance in a non-metropolitan area.

Where over 75% of your itinerary is to remote and/or very remote locations, you are entitled to request additional funding of up to \$15,000, to a maximum total grant request of \$30,000. The Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA) helps determine the regional and remote reach of the tour.

Joint tours, where two or more independent performers are undertaking the same tour itinerary, are eligible under this program. These should be submitted as a single application. In such cases, the funding cap of \$15,000 still applies (unless the tour is eligible for additional remote or very remote funding).

We encourage the inclusion of additional activities which extend opportunities for community participation, such as workshops, master classes and all-age performances.

The Australia Council offers two grant rounds each year for the Contemporary Music Touring Program.

In 2018, the grant rounds will close on:

- Tuesday 6 February for projects starting after 1 May 2018. This grant round has now closed.
- Tuesday 2 October for projects starting 1 January 2019

Each round closes at midnight on the closing date. Technical and administrative support will not be available after 5pm on the closing date.

Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application approximately 12 weeks after the closing date.

Priority

Tours that include a majority of regional destinations or assist performers from regional areas are a priority for funding.

Limitations

Who can apply

Funding on a tour by tour basis is available to enable professional musicians to tour live music performances within Australia. Touring musicians must be performing original Australian contemporary music. Funding can be provided to performers, managers, agents, and music networks on behalf of professionals working in the Australian music industry.

Who can't apply

You can't apply for a grant if:

- you received a grant, or administered a grant, from the Australia Council in the past and that grant has not been satisfactorily acquitted
- you owe money to the Australia Council.

You can't apply for the following activity:

- a tour to less than three venues
- tours to metropolitan venues only
- overseas tours or overseas performers
- tours which are primarily school-based (except for applications seeking TRAX funds where the school is the primary venue of a remote or very remote location)
- · a series of performances at one festival
- competitions, such as 'Battle of the Bands' events
- attendance at conferences

They also offer grants to leading organisations to help build literacy skills for children and young adults, and partnerships to support key national writers' festivals.

The Cultural Fund's grants for organisations can be for a single project or for up to three years. Please contact the Cultural Fund to discuss a potential proposal before submitting and application.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Legally constituted organisations and incorporated associations may apply.
- Individuals or sole traders are not eligible to apply for these grants.
- Applicants may only submit one application per round to the Cultural Fund.
- Applicants must have acquitted any overdue Cultural Fund grants to be eligible to apply for further funding.

The Cultural Fund will not support the following activities:

- Emerging writers or visual artists who haven't published or exhibited work
- Community-based writing programs
- University-based artist-in-residency programs which do not connect with audiences outside the university
- Niche writers' festivals

- Translations into other languages for overseas audiences

Purpose

Established in 1975, the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation provides grants to promote and encourage music and the music-related performing arts.

Overview

The grants provided are non-recurring (i.e. one-off grants rather than a periodical payment) and are determined by the four trustees of the trust.

- Two (including the Chairman) are appointed by the PPCA;
- One is appointed by the Musicians' Union of Australia:
- One is appointed by the Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance (formerly Actors' Equity).

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for **one or more** of the following purposes:

- performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged
- scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education
- the promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public
- the aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income.

A grant under the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation can be used for costs associated with the above, including:

- Tuition fees
- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol)
- Accommodation
- Venue hire/ PA hire.

There is no specified limit to how much you can apply for. However, funds are finite and there is no guarantee that you will receive all or any of the funds you request.

It is unusual for grants to be approved in excess of :

- \$3,000 for an individual; or
- \$5,000 for a group or organisation

Limitations

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Although the trust is discretionary, the trustees are guided by the 'purposes' articulated in the trust deed. As a result, it is not their usual practice to approve funding for any project of a commercial nature. This would include:

- investments in recordings (e.g., studio time, producers fees, session musician fees, manufacturing or distribution costs);
- concert or festival promotion or staging costs;
- tour support:
- artist management expenses; or
- equipment purchases.

You should also note that the trustees are unlikely to approve applications seeking funding for the majority of costs related to a project, and look to applicants to contribute and/or explore additional funding sources.

Secondary Criteria

- The project builds on previous participation in NSW museum development programs (e.g. Standards Program, Museum Advisor Program, internships at state/federal institutions etc.)
- Collaborative projects involving two or more museums/cultural centres and/or other community organisations. In the case of fully collaborative applications, all contributing organisations should be named, however one museum/cultural centre should be identified as the lead organisation or project manager
- The level of community access to the organisation and its collection (opening hours, website etc)
- The financial situation of the applying organisation (ie is the organisation more in need of assistance than others).

There is one round of Project Development Grants offered annually.

Projects cannot commence before mid-December 2019 and must be completed no later than 31 December 2020. Acquittal reports are due by 28 February 2021.

Priority

- Innovative use of new and emerging media platforms
- Bringing new and emerging producers to the industry, while harnessing the skills of experienced producers
- Works that address gaps in content/genre/age groups.

In every project we provide funding for, we ensure that it is produced to the highest standards. We do this by including creative input and regular consultation as a condition of our investment.

What we look for:

Audience

All projects must primarily target the Australian child audience and must, in our opinion, be likely to be of interest to Australian children.

Television projects should be aiming for either 'P' or 'C' classification as defined by ACMA for the commercial networks and Pay TV, or a G classification for ABC.

Feature film projects should be aiming for a 'G' or 'PG' rating from the OFLC Classifications Board.

For information on what constitutes a 'P', 'C' or 'G' or 'PG' program, have a look at the ACTF's FAQs.

Subject matter

Projects may be based on an original idea, or adaptations of a novel or other work. We look for originality and new ideas not already in the marketplace or currently on television.

If the project is an adaptation of someone else's work (such as a novel, play, character or concept developed by one of the team), the applicant must obtain, or at least option, an assignment of all the necessary rights from the creator prior to making an application.

Options should have a reasonable length of time to run following any ACTF Development Funding approval to allow for the project's development, commissioning and financing.

Copies of all contractual documentation demonstrating that the applicant has obtained the necessary legal rights to deal with the material on which the project is based must accompany the application. If such options or chain of title documents are not provided with the application, the project will not be considered in that round.

Any project containing indigenous content, themes or story lines must be accompanied by written permission from the relevant indigenous community authorising the Applicant's use of such material.

Format and genre

We provide funding for television series, one-off television programs, telemovies and feature films.

Before submitting an application for a television program, it is useful to familiarise yourself with the types of formats, series lengths and episode lengths broadcasters usually commission for your intended audience's age group.

Before submitting an application for development of a feature film it is worthwhile speaking with local distributors about their requirements in this area and their interest in the genre and age group.

Finance is open to all genres, but preference will be given to drama content which typically has higher development requirements than other genres.

Levels of Development funding

We will only fund one stage of development on any project at a time. To develop a feel for the levels of funding and stages of development that we have previously funded, please look at the funding section of the ACTF website.

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

Applicant and Creative Team

We will consider the experience of the creative team when assessing projects for funding. Whilst it does not require that all of the proposed team have experience in their relevant area, projects with a strong and experience creative team are preferred.

Priority

Overview

The expected outcomes of the CCCF are to:

- improve early childhood development outcomes for vulnerable and disadvantaged children
- increase workforce participation by vulnerable and disadvantaged families.

The CCCF is an ongoing program.

The objective of the CCCF Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity is to support continuity of child care, in particular in disadvantaged or vulnerable communities, where service viability is affected by an unforeseen factor outside the control of the service such as:

- a natural disaster or extreme weather event
- another unforeseen event or circumstance which would result in market failure for the community.

FSFP provides funding to not-for-profit organisations to:

 - facilitating learning opportunities and promoting personal growth, wellbeing, and support child and youth development
 - creating opportunities to form new friendships and networks and share information and ideas to help them manage the demands of military life
- Support community capacity building and partnerships by:

 - identifying and nurturing partnership opportunities to support the delivery for a strengthened sense of community for Defence families

- Funded activities will not replicate services offered by DCO or the Department of Defence
- The grant request clearly demonstrates that the project will achieve value for money.

- Work with Defence families to develop longer term meaningful engagement with others in their community

In cases where funding for expensive items of equipment is being sought, these items are to be retained by the organisation supporting the application as part of that organisation's equipment pool.

The following personal characteristics are indicative of some of the circumstances in which we may be able to assist:

- household income levels at or below the level of Centrelink benefits
- no major assets that could be realised
- no other resources that can be accessed (e.g. savings)
- families with young children, particularly single-parent families

- some unexpected catastrophic event has caused a crisis
- no assistance is available from family or extended family members

Aussie Cotton Farmers Grow Communities is a grant program initiated by the Bayer Fund, in partnership with FRRR. It aims to help support cotton growing communities across New South Wales and Queensland.

Overview

People living and working in rural and regional communities are best-placed to determine the groups and projects that most need support. For the sixth year running, cotton farmers have the opportunity to nominate a deserving not-for-profit group to receive one of thirty \$5,000 grants.

The nominated organisation must be a not-for profit community-based group that is undertaking projects and activities that offer clear public benefit. They must be operating with a charitable purpose (i.e. not intended to just benefit an individual).

Recipients could include organisations like early childhood services, halls, community events, meals on wheels, neighbourhood houses, agricultural societies or other local charitable organisations.

Who can make a nomination?

- Supports projects and activities that offer clear public benefit for communities in rural, regional and remote locations in Australia;
- Contributes to rural and regional renewal, regeneration and development in Australia in social, economic, environmental, health, education, or cultural areas; and
- Is located in one of the Cotton Grower Association areas listed below:

Queensland:

- Darling Downs
- Central Highlands
- St George
- Dawson Valley
- Dirranbandi
- Macintyre Valley

New South Wales:

- Lower Namoi
- Gwydir Valley
- Macquarie

Community groups themselves are not eligible to apply - they must be nominated by a cotton farmer.

Eligibility

Nominated projects by not-for-profit community groups must demonstrate the following:

- Have a charitable purpose (i.e. address a need in the community and not benefit an individual);
- Demonstrate clear community support;
- Have a good prospect of longer-term viability and impact;
- Involve partnerships or leverage financial and/or in-kind contributions;
- Be differentiated from projects already in existence;
- Be supported by viable project management arrangements (and a financially sound organisation);
- Offer value for money;
- Demonstrate innovation;
- Grant funds must be spent down between December 2019 and November 2020.

What can't be funded?

- Projects that benefit an individual rather than a community;
- Scholarships or endowments;
- Projects outside of the 14 eligible Cotton Grower Association areas in NSW or QLD;
- Purely social, sporting or recreational activities. The encouragement or advancement of sport, recreation and social activities is not considered a charitable activity by the Australian Taxation Office. Applications from sporting organisations need to clearly demonstrate a benefit to the wider community;
- Underwriting deficits;
- Religious, politically partisan, or similar groups.

Australian Aid: Friendship Grants aims to bring a new and diverse group of partners from across Australia to contribute to the delivery of Australia's aid program.

Overview

The Friendship Grants program is a three-year, \$10 million grants program managed by DFAT. The program will provide funding to successful Australian community organisations (ACOs) who are already delivering effective international development work in the Indo-Pacific region.

The Friendship Grants program provides the Australian Government with an opportunity to:

- engage new partners in the Australian aid program;
- strengthen connections between Australian communities and communities in the Indo-Pacific region; and
- promote the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

The program is designed to support organisations to expand or enhance their existing international development work in the Indo-Pacific region through financially supporting a specific activity within a wider program of work.

As a grant applicant, you will need to demonstrate an existing and positive relationship with an in-country community and evidence that you are already undertaking international development efforts in that community.

Over the three-year program, there will be three annual, competitive rounds.

Eligible organisations may apply for one-off annual grants of between AUD\$30,000 and AUD\$60,000 (GST exclusive) to fund a specific Activity that makes up part of your organisation's longer-term work.

Funding is for a time-limited Activity of no more than 12 months' duration. The Activity must make up part of your organisation's longer-term program of work, but the Activity itself should commence after the Round 1 commencement date and funds must be fully spent within 12 months.

Your organisation will be required to match DFAT's funding contribution at a ratio of AUD\$1 for every AUD\$5 of Friendship Grants funds received.

The types of Activities that will be funded include activities that assist and strengthen an overseas community's development or socio-economic situation, such as:

- income generation
- including microfinance, microenterprise or small business development;
- · basic education and training
- including literacy, primary, and vocational training;
- gender equality
- including women's economic empowerment and leadership, and ending violence against women and girls;
- disability inclusion;
- healthcare
- including primary healthcare;
- water supply and sanitation
- including providing access to safe water, and maintaining or improving water quality;
- protection and promotion of human rights
- including improving economic, social and cultural rights, the rights of people with a disability, and addressing Indigenous disadvantage;
- rural development
- including the development of agriculture and basic services;
- sustainable environmental and natural resource management;
- preparedness for, and long-term recovery from, natural disasters; and
- climate change adaptation and mitigation.

Development activities should help strengthen your overseas community's ability to sustain activities after Friendship Grant or other assistance has ceased.

Limitations

Eligibility

To be eligible for a Friendship Grant, your organisation must match AUD\$1 for every AUD\$5 that the Australian Government provides under the program (20% match).

To be eligible for a Friendship Grant, you must be an Australian community organisation that:

- is not currently accredited with DFAT (ie. not an Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP) partner);
- has a proven record in implementing activities in Overseas Development Assistance (ODA) eligible countries in the Indo-Pacific region:
- has letter of support from an in-country authority; and
- has existing relationships with in-country communities that assist in the planning and implementation of activities on the ground.

Eligible organisations must be not-for-profit and registered with the Australian Charities & Not-for-Profits Commission, a state or territory regulator, or the Office of the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations; eg.

- membership-based organisations;
- professional and peak bodies; and
- local government associations.

The organisation must also be:

- a legal entity able to enter into a legally binding agreement;
- where applicable, registered for the purposes of GST;
- permanently located in Australia;
- an Australian bank account holder; and
- able to provide supporting documentation as outlined in 'Attachments to the Application'.

The goal of the Friendship Grants program is to engage a diverse group of Australian community organisations in the delivery of Australian aid in our region.

The group of successful applicants will include, as far as possible, an overall mix of:

- groups reflecting Australia's cultural and demographic variety;
- type and size of organisations;
- type of Activity being undertaken; and
- geographic spread of organisations from across Australia.

Applications from consortia are welcome, provided there is a lead applicant who is the main driver and the other entities are eligible as per the list above.

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- for-profit organisation;
- a State or Territory Government agency or organisation;
- an organisation that is currently accredited with DFAT (including Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP) partners);
- · an individual;
- a community organisation not registered in Australia; or
- an organisation, which itself or its staff, volunteers, or in-country partners, appear on any of the following lists:
 - Asian Development Bank Sanctions List;
 - World Bank Listing of Ineligible Firms and Individuals:
 - The Australian Government's Listed terrorist organisations; and
 - The DFAT Consolidated List.

ACOs that have previously received a Friendship Grant and failed to meet their obligations under the grant agreement, including a full and proper financial acquittal, are not eligible to apply for another grant in any future round.

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- Research, conferences, seminars, training events and/or exchanges to Australia or partner country;
- · Costs associated with participants attending events;
- Substantial freight of goods and supplies to the overseas country;
- Major capital expenditure (purchase of buildings or land);
- Activities in locations listed as "do not travel" or "reconsider your need to travel" on Smartraveller;
- Activities that involve unskilled volunteers supporting orphanages or residential care institutions;
- Evangelism or missionary outreach, or similar activities by political organisations; or
- Activities that are determined to be contrary to the interests of the Commonwealth of Australia.

DFAT will not fund any activities in locations that are listed on the Smartraveller website as 'do not travel' or 'reconsider your need to travel'. This can be relevant to an entire country or an area within a country.

The Community Commemorative Grants (CCG) are designed to provide funding for local community-based commemorative projects and activities that directly commemorate the involvement, service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel in wars, conflicts and peace operations.

Overview

This grants is part of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program. The Australian Government is providing a total of \$1 million (GST exclusive) during 2019-20 for the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program grants, with the funding pool divided between the Major Commemorative Grants and Community Commemorative Grants.

Grants up to a maximum of \$4,000 are available for local, community-based projects and activities.

These small grants are focused on the local community, commemorate the service and sacrifice of local community members, and are primarily accessed by the local community.

Some examples of CCG projects/activities include restoration of an honour board, purchase of a display cabinet for military memorabilia, and installation of a flagpole to display the Australian National Flag on days of commemoration.

The list below provides a guide to eligible grant projects and activities:

Grants up to \$4000 include:

Community War Memorials, Commemorative Plaques and Honour Boards - new war memorials, where none exists
and where the new memorial will be the focus of community commemoration and the restoration of existing war
memorials, honour boards/ rolls and plaques

^{*} Ritchies reserves the right to change the terms of any of its cards, programs or clubs at any time.

Grants up to \$3000 include:

- Restoration, Preservation and or/Display of Wartime Memorabilia the preservation, interpretation and display of wartime and military memorabilia and artefacts.
- Commemorative Events significant military unit reunions, i.e. 40th or 65th anniversary or the commemoration of significant military anniversaries, i.e. 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan. Note: Only one anniversary should be commemorated as it is considered that events to commemorate multiple anniversaries have the potential to diminish the significance of each anniversary. The event must be held within a month of the anniversary being commemorated.
- Publications/Website the publication of wartime histories where similar works have not previously been published, i.e. unit histories, local wartime histories and letters from service personnel.
- Public Awareness Activity significant cultural and educational projects, i.e. exhibition, with a military focus and that add to the sum of knowledge on a particular topic or which provide access to information about Australia's wartime heritage.
- School Initiative school initiatives / projects undertaken by students which focus on military involvement and social impacts relevant to the community.

The assessment and notification of outcomes will be divided into three batches during the year. Each batch will contain applications that have been submitted to the grant opportunity over the preceding period. For example, the first batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity between the opening date of the application period and 3 July 2019. The second batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity over the next four months, ending 6 November 2019, and so on.

Cut-off dates for all three batches:

- Batch 1: 3 July 2019
- Batch 2: 6 November 2019
- Batch 3: 1100pm AEDT on 31 March 2020.

Purpose

Through IGA Community Chest and associated programs, well over \$80m has been raised to help local communities.

Overview

IGA Community Chest raises funds to support local communities, charities and other worthwhile causes. It could be in response to a major event like floods or bush fires or something as simple as new soccer balls for the local under 8's.

The money is raised in a number of ways but predominately through the purchase of products with an IGA Community Chest logo on the label or ticket.

When you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label a percentage is credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account.

In most states IGA Community Chest beneficiary cheques are distributed throughout the year, meaning you can apply at any time.

How are IGA Community Chest beneficiaries chosen?

There is a tiered system for choosing beneficiaries.

- For local activities the beneficiaries are chosen by the local stores
- Regional activities they are chosen by the region or group of stores
- State beneficiaries are chosen in consultation with the State Executive and Board.

Here is a couple of tips on becoming an IGA Community Chest beneficiary:

- It is best to approach your local IGA store directly. Prepare a pitch and it may include:
 - An overview of your organisation and/or the individual that you'd like supported;
 - What support are you looking for monies, donations of goods, providing team jumpers, holding regular fundraising at the store, group registrations at the store, etc;
 - How the donation will be used and your timing.
 - Is there anything you can offer in return to IGA?
 - Don't forget to include your contact details.

Example

The Humpty Dumpty Foundation The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Independent Grocers of Australia (IGA) made a significant difference to the lives of Sydney children. From January 2017, IGA made 11 donations across NSW and ACT to support much-needed medical equipment for hospitals to the value of \$150,000. IGA's support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation and the local community is immeasurable. The support to families in Sydney means children have access to medical equipment that is very much needed by the medical staff and, most of all, it is life-saving.

Westmead Children's Hospital Mint Fresh IGA in Baulkham Hills visited The Children's Hospital at Westmead in February to present a \$2,670 Aerogen Nebuliser to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The money for the nebuliser, which makes the administering of medications easier for children with respiratory illnesses.

Moruya District Hospital The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Dalmeny IGA purchase a piece of vital medical equipment for the Eurobodalla children. Local IGA retailers presented Moruya District Hospital with a jaundice detector valued at \$4,780 for the Maternity Unity. This jaundice detector is used to help clinicians determine the jaundice levels through the skin without harming the baby.

MX550 Patient Monitor IGA retailers and the Humpty Dumpty Foundation donated \$26,920 to fund a MX550 Patient Monitor for the Blacktown Hospital's special care nursery. The monitors are used daily to measure a child's blood pressure temperature, heart rate and respiratory rate to determine how well they are recovering from surgery.

The objectives of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program are to acknowledge and commemorate those who served Australia and its allies in wars, conflicts and peace operations. The Major Commemorative Grants category of the program is available to fund commemorative projects that have a national, state or territory focus.

Overview

This grants is part of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program. The Australian Government is providing a total of \$1 million (GST exclusive) during 2019-20 for the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program grants, with the funding pool divided between the Major Commemorative Grants and Community Commemorative Grants.

These are grants for major commemorative projects/activities that are significant, from a national or state/territory perspective.

MCG grants have a much wider focus than the local Community Commemorative Grants (CCG) category, and must be of national/state/territory importance and relevance.

MCG projects and activities are targeted at a national/state/territory audience, and have a broader impact than the local community. MCG grants are usually over \$4,000, with no set maximum grant amount for this category. However, overall program funding is limited, and value for money is considered in the assessment process.

The assessment and notification of outcomes will be divided into three batches during the year. Each batch will contain applications that have been submitted to the grant opportunity over the preceding period. For example, the first batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity between the opening date of the application period and 3 July 2019. The second batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity over the next four months, ending 6 November 2019, and so on.

Cut-off dates for all three batches:

- Batch 1: 3 July 2019
- Batch 2: 6 November 2019
- Batch 3: 1100pm AEDT on 31 March 2020.

Example

Some examples of eligible MCG projects/activities include installation of a State Memorial dedicated to all who served in the Royal Australian Navy, upgrading the State Avenue of Honour to commemorate the service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel, or publishing a book documenting the military history of a military unit from the Boer War to the present day.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria:

To be eligible you must be one of the following entity types:

- Indigenous Corporation
- Company
- Local Government
- Cooperative
- Incorporated Association
- Statutory Entity
- Trustee on behalf of a Trust
- Unincorporated Association grant activities under \$10,000 only.

Applications from consortia are acceptable, as long as you have a lead applicant who is solely accountable to the Commonwealth for the delivery of grant activities and is an eligible entity as per the list above.

Additional eligibility requirements:

• The Department cannot fund applications from an organisation that has outstanding acquittals for any previous DVA funding (if applicable).

You are **not** eligibleto apply if you are a:

- Person
- Sole Trader
- Unincorporated Association grant activities over \$10,000.

To be eligible your grant activity must:

- Be a major project or activity that is significant from a national, state or territory perspective that will contribute to Australia's understanding of its wartime heritage.
- For a project to be considered significant, its focus should be wider than the local community and be available to a larger audience.

Eligible expenditure:

You can only spend grant funding on eligible grant activities, including:

- a commemorative event (significant anniversary or reunion)
- a flagpole
- a publication
- an honour board or commemorative plaque
- digital content development (website or application)
- · public awareness, cultural and/or educational activity
- school initiative
- display or restoration of wartime memorabilia
- war/peace memorials (new where none currently exist or restoration of existing)

What the grant money cannot be used for:

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- projects of a commercial nature/projects for profit
- projects undertaken outside of Australia
- projects exclusively commemorating animals
- projects exclusively for research
- projects commemorating individuals
- projects commemorating the post war deaths of service personnel
- sporting events
- recurring events/activities e.g. Anzac Day, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Veterans' Day, National Service Day except where the event relates to a significant anniversary.

Expenditure items that are not eligible are:

- capital expenditure for the purchase of assets such as office furniture and equipment, motor vehicles, computers, printers or photocopiers
- construction of or fit out, alterations and/or extensions to premises including museums, memorial halls and sporting facilities
- salaries/wages salaries and wages are considered to be a payment to someone employed by the applicant on an
 ongoing basis. For the purposes of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program, paying a person other than
 a usual employee to deliver a one off service such as constructing a memorial, conducting research, designing or
 printing a program booklet is not considered to be a salary
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation

To be eligible, organisations must be not-for-profit and hold records about Forgotten Australians, Stolen Generations and/ or Former Child Migrants. Eligible organisations can also auspice projects that will make records held by organisations such as libraries made available to Care Leavers.

Each project can apply for funding up to \$15,000.

Organisations can submit multiple applications, providing each application is for a discrete project.

What will be funded?

Funded activities can include:

- Staffing costs to document and describe records; eg conducting a survey of records, organising and listing records, etc
- Creating indexes to assist in locating information about people, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records
- Preservation work on collections, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records
- Digitisation of collections, provided it takes place as part of a project to document and describe records. Any digitisation must be done externally
- Innovative ways to use records that will assist Care Leavers develop a better understanding of their history in care, eg through photos, imagery or spoken word projects, etc

Limitations

Who can apply?

Australian not-for profit organisations that hold or have created records relating to children in 'care' during the period 1920-1989 are eligible to apply. These include, but are not limited to:

- Incorporated Associations incorporated under State/Territory legislation (commonly have 'Association', 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name)
- Incorporated Cooperatives incorporated under State/Territory legislation (commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name)
- Indigenous Corporations

- Companies not-for-profit proprietary companies or public companies, incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Australian or State/Territory legislation (except Universities); for example, many public benevolent institutions and churches

The SYV program grants aim to foster the ability of ex-service organisations (ESOs) and non ex-service organisations to support the needs of younger veterans as they transition out of the Australian Defence Force (ADF), establish themselves into civilian life, and manage the challenges their ADF service presents through different stages of their civilian life.

Overview

In the 2019-20 funding round the priority is on activities that support the development of well-researched and tailored services for the younger veterans' community, with a particular focus on services supporting those at risk of experiencing poor mental health.

A total of \$1.001 million (GST exclusive) has been announced for the 2019-20 financial year for the SYV program.

There is no minimum or maximum grant amount for this grant opportunity.

The project commencement date must be after the application lodgement date.

Funding is not available as a reimbursement for costs incurred prior to the project commencement date.

Program outcomes

- Outcome 1: support the development of well researched and tailored services for the younger veterans' community, with a particular focus on services supporting those at risk of experiencing poor mental health.
- Outcome 2: develop capability within the Veteran community that services the unique needs of the younger veterans' community.

- Outcome 3: fund organisations that can sustainably deliver services to the younger veterans' community now and into the future.
- Outcome 4: increase collaboration amongst organisations to expand services and harness existing expertise for the benefit of the younger veterans' community.
- Outcome 5: increase awareness of younger veterans' community issues and/or services within the Australian and Veteran communities, where doing so would benefit the younger veterans' community.

Priority

2019-20 Priority Outcomes

Please note: in the 2019-20 funding round, priority will be given to applications that support the development of well-researched and tailored services for the younger veterans' community with a particular focus on services supporting those 'at risk' of experiencing poor mental health (Outcome 1).

These priority activities must:

- be based on research into a particular aspect of mental health and social well-being issue/s experienced by younger veterans, as they transition to civilian life
- develop and implement service delivery model/s to address the identified issue/s
- include measureable outcomes around the extent to which the funded activity addressed the identified issue/s and include assessment of why it was successful/unsuccessful

Overall, the SYV program objectives are to:

- expand on existing or well established services offered to the younger veterans' community to new regions within Australia or in development of new services that will be offered in more than one location
- raise awareness of the important issues faced by the younger veterans' community.

Example

Examples of eligible activities supported in previous SYV funding rounds include:

- developing a program of local activities to address stigma and raise awareness of mental health issues faced by younger veterans
- developing and delivering a program to support younger veterans seeking to enter tertiary institutions
- train the trainer programs that provided sustainable capability to train veteran-led disaster response teams.

Limitations

EITHER:

• an Ex-Service Organisation (ESO) that specifically provides support and services to members of the younger veterans' community; and/or are adapting their business model to focus on this cohort

The purpose of this grant is to enable individuals and community groups to develop sustainable With One Voice Social Franchises through establishing a community choir.

Overview

To celebrate its 10-year anniversary, Creativity Australia is offering grants of up to \$10,000 to people or groups who are wanting to start their own With One Voice choir. Only 10 of these grants are available, and all applications must be submitted by Friday 30th August 2019.

Creativity Australia's With One Voice movement is a network community choirs that bring together people from all faiths, cultures, ages, abilities, backgrounds and socio-economic situations. We currently have 25 choirs located across Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Canberra and regional Victoria, with thousands of choir members ranging in age from nine to 90 years old, and we are growing monthly!

With One Voice choirs are set up and run by local volunteers using resources and materials provided by Creativity Australia.

By establishing a local community choir under the auspices of Creativity Australia, you hold a licence that enables the choir to fundraise to support projects and initiatives at a local level.

The choir is set up as an unincorporated association under the umbrella of Creativity Australia. This includes an independent bank account which is jointly managed by the local choir volunteers and Creativity Australia.

There are seven key components to the program:

- 1. Bringing together a diverse range of local community individuals and organisations to promote, commence and participate in the program;
- 2. Finding an extraordinary music leader who is empathetic and inspiring;
- 3. Finding a safe, nurturing space to hold rehearsals at that is accessible and close to public transport or infrastructure;

- 4. Seeking out diversity all ages, backgrounds and cultures are welcome, and there are no auditions;
- 5. Showcasing your choir by performing locally and celebrating accomplishments;
- 6. Nurturing social connections between choir members by rehearsing weekly, sharing a meal and facilitating the Wish List component; and
- 7. Building sustainability by develop community and business connections, recruiting volunteers and fundraising. The Creativity Australia team works with you and provides mentoring and support through each of these steps.

It can cost up to \$23,000 per year to run a With One Voice choir, though the majority of our choirs are able to secure donated or heavily discounted venues and/or food, taking the costs down to roughly \$15,000 per year.

The costs of running a choir for one year may include:

- Conductor (depending on total number of rehearsals and performances) \$10,000
- Venue \$5.000
- Supper \$5,000
- Resources (insurances, licences, uniforms, incidentals) \$3,000
- Possible Annual Total (without any donated or discounted support) \$23,000

The choir is responsible for raising the funds to keep the program running each year. Where in-kind or heavily discounted support can be found (such as venue and/or supper), this will reduce the total amount of fundraising the choir needs to undertake.

There are four key ways a choir can generate income:

- 1. Membership contributions;
- 2. Performance donations;
- 3. Donations from local businesses or government; and
- 4. Participants accessing National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) funding to pay for their choir participation through their NDIS plan.

Most With One Voice choirs can raise between \$6,000 - \$12,000 per year through membership contributions. A further \$1,000-\$3,000 can be raised through performances and donations. Some choirs raise significantly more funds through larger memberships, more donations and local funding grants and partnerships.

Creativity Australia welcomes applications to establish With One Voice choirs from all community-based groups or organisations that have an interest in building healthier, happier, more inclusive and stronger communities.

We accept applications from:

- Local schools

Purpose

The aim of the Individual Capacity Building (ICB) Program is to provide people with disability the skills and confidence to participate and contribute to the community and protect their rights.

Overview

The ICB Program will achieve this by enabling systematic access to peer support, mentoring and other skills building for people with disability, carers and families, to develop their individual capacity. This could include activities that empower a person to be independent and to engage in social, economic and community life.

The grant can fund activities that align with the following two activity types:

Eligible grant activities

Tertiary education providers must award scholarships to students who meet and adhere to the following criteria for the duration of the scholarship:

- Are a new student to the tertiary education provider.
- Maintain ongoing residency in a regional area for the duration of each of study period. Where a course includes study outside a regional area (for example, for a clinical placement), residency away from the regional area is permitted for:
 - no more than one study period (not exceeding 6 months) per qualification where the qualification is longer than 2 years, or
 - 25% of the qualification length where the qualification is 2 years or shorter. In cases where the requirements of a compulsory placement exceed the permitted study period away from a regional area, approval must be sought from the Department of Education.
- Are enrolled at and study at a regional campus of a registered tertiary education provider

Reallocation of scholarships

If a scholarship student loses eligibility during the course of the scholarship period, no additional scholarship funding should be paid to the student. In this case, tertiary education providers can reallocate any future year funding associated with that student to a different student who meets the eligibility criteria.

Grants in this category are looking to actively support people into employment. Successful applicants will go beyond resume writing and interview skills to actively engaging with local employers.

- Employment Pathways Programs that contribute to the building of employment confidence, conversational skills, resume building, presentation of experience and strengths both verbally and in written materials.
- Local business engagement Programs that actively facilitate engagement with local businesses to introduce or expand experience of workplace cultures, language and colloquialisms, and offer and provide recognition of direct activities that build on strengths and capabilities or introduce new 'in demand' skills. Programs may also provide support and coaching for new business initiatives that connect to business associations and market opportunities.

- Cross cultural conversations Projects should encourage intercultural conversations to share and recognise
 mutual contributions.
- Transition support Projects should look to encourage intercultural conversations to share and recognise mutual contributions.

Literacy

Grants in this category will focus on English literacy. Specifically, programs will teach applied and conversational English which can be used in both day-to-day and work environments.

- **Literacy** Programs that actively and innovatively develop literacy skills using means that engage with those that are unable or ineligible for other programs.

Purpose

To reduce crashes on Australian roads and to target those road locations where crashes are occurring.

Overview

The Australian Government will provide \$744.5 million to the Black Spot Program from the 2013 to 2014 financial year to the 2021 to 2022 financial year, with an on-going commitment of \$60 million each year following.

Road crashes are a major cost to Australians every year. Black Spot projects target those road locations where crashes are occurring. By funding measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at dangerous locations, the program reduces the risk of crashes.

The Black Spot Program makes an important contribution in reducing the national road toll under the National Road Safety Action Plan 2018-2020.

Anyone can nominate a 'black spot' for funding consideration, using the official nomination form. Candidate projects are first assessed by the relevant state road authority, which has details of the crash history of the site and the expertise to assess the appropriate treatment.

Community Consultation Widespread community consultation and participation is fundamental to this program, ensuring that local concerns are addressed.

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

Coordination States and territories play an important coordinating role. A Consultative Panel has been established in each state and territory. It consists of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry, the Australian Government, local government and state road and transport agencies. Panels provide comment to the Australian Government on nominations for Black Spot works.

Rural Projects More than 60% of road deaths and a significant proportion of serious injuries occur outside metropolitan areas. In line with national road safety policy objectives, approximately 50% of Black Spot funds in each state (other than Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory) are reserved for projects in non-metropolitan areas. This ensures that crash locations in rural areas are treated.

Limitations

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

What makes a site eligible for funding?

Funding is mainly available for the treatment of Black Spot sites, or road lengths, with a proven history of crashes. Project proposals should be able to demonstrate a benefit to cost ratio of at least 2 to 1.

For individual sites such as intersections, mid-block or short road sections, there should be a history of at least three casualty crashes over a five-year period. For lengths of road, there should be an average of 0.2 casualty crashes per kilometre per annum over the length in question over five years.

The requirement of a history of crashes ensures that those sites that have a recurrent problem are targeted first for treatment.

The Black Spot Program also recognises that there are road locations that could be considered as 'accidents waiting to happen'. Therefore, some program funds may be used to treat sites where road traffic engineers have completed a Road Safety Audit and found that remedial work is necessary. This allows an opportunity for proactive safety works to be undertaken before casualties occur.

Funds cannot be used for the purchase of road-building plant or equipment, or for operational or maintenance costs.

Purpose

The Community Road Safety Grants Program aims to provide community groups across NSW with the opportunity to implement small scale, local programs within their communities consistent with the NSW Road Safety Plan 2021.

Overview

These projects contribute to increased road safety awareness and understanding, and support safer road use through education of safer behaviours and reduced road trauma.

Projects should align with the internationally recognised Safe System approach to improving road safety which takes a holistic view of the road transport system and the interactions among the key components of that system. The road user, roads and roadsides, the vehicle and travel speeds are part of that system and all have a role to play in helping to keep road users safe.

Applications made as part of the program must be evidence-based, using research or best practice principles. They must address identified local issues, targeting a specific group or issue, and align with the NSW Road Safety Plan 2021.

Funding

Grants up to \$5000 (plus GST) are available for local community road safety projects, such as educational projects to increase road safety awareness in specific communities.

A limited number of more substantial road safety grants are also available, with funding up to \$30,000 (plus GST). Detailed project plans will be required to demonstrate the need, road safety benefit, and proposed expenditure of projects.

Objectives

The objectives of Community Road Safety Grants projects are to:

- Facilitate opportunities for community organisations to work with their communities to improve road safety.
- Develop and implement local projects that improve road safety.
- Contribute to achieving targets in the NSW Road Safety Plan 2021.

The selection criteria is different for applicants applying for up to \$5,000 and those applying for up to \$30,000. See pages 9-10 of the guidelines document for more information.

Example

Some of the successful projects in Round Four of the grants included:

- Road safety workshops targeting culturally and linguistically diverse communities
- Road safety seminar series and newly arrived migrants
- Driver mentoring assistance for disadvantaged youth
- Awareness campaign targeting children's safety around cars.

Limitations

Eligibility

Transport for NSW will only fund NSW community-based organisations.

Applications for grants that may impact upon road infrastructure will be subject to approval by Roads and Maritime Services or local councils before being granted.

Proposed projects need to identify the road safety problem, and propose an effective way to address the issue. Proposals will be assessed by a panel using standard assessment criteria.

The following types of organisations are **ineligible** to apply:

- Individuals
- Research organisations
- NSW Government departments
- Local councils (Transport for NSW already funds the Local Government Road Safety Program)
- Road safety education programs targeting students or teachers in government and non-government schools (Transport for NSW already funds the education sectors for road safety education programs)
- Schools (Transport for NSW already funds the education sectors for road safety education programs).

Funding is not available for:

- Salary costs of staff to manage the project implementation
- Infrastructure already managed by councils or Roads and Maritime Services
- Projects that already receive funding or sponsorship from Transport for NSW.

The Regional Employment Trials program provides local stakeholders in selected regions, including businesses, not-forprofits and local government agencies, with grants to trial local approaches to delivering employment related projects. Regions are primarily based on Regional Development Australia boundaries, unless indicated otherwise.

Overview

- strong connections between regional stakeholders, including employment services providers

Purpose

The Habitat Action Grant program is a devolved grant program directing money raised from the NSW Recreational Fishing Fee toward projects that improve local fish habitats across NSW.

Overview

Angling clubs, individuals, community groups, local councils and organisations interested in rehabilitating fish habitats in freshwater and saltwater areas throughout NSW can apply for large grants of between \$2,000 and \$40,000.

Habitat rehabilitation projects which may be funded include:

- removal or modification of barriers to fish passage
- rehabilitation of riparian lands (river banks, wetlands, mangrove forests, saltmarsh)
- re-snagging waterways with timber structure
- removal of exotic vegetation from waterways and replace with native species
- bank stabilisation works
- reinstatement of natural flow regimes

Projects should aim to run for 1 year. The starting date is the date that the contracts have been co-signed by both the applicant and NSW DPI. This will usually occur early in the calendar year.

Allowance will be provided for conditions out of the applicant's control such as flooding or drought where survivorship of plantings or stability of instream works will be put at risk if undertaken in unsuitable conditions. Requests for project variations will need to be made in writing (email) to the Habitat Action Grant Administrator.

Matching funding is a requirement for funding, however this does not need to be in physical cash. Other contributions towards the project count as an 'in-kind' contributions and can include any voluntary labour (hands on work), project management time (administration, reporting, etc.) and cost of machinery use for example. It can also include on-going maintenance of a site (capped at 3 years after project completion).

You MUST contact one of the following DPI staff to discuss your project and ensure applications are consistent with priorities for funding. They can also provide assistance on completing your application.

Habitat Action Grants open annually in August and are open for a 7-8 week period.

Priority

Applications from recreational fishers or which demonstrate the support of local recreational fishers will be given preference.

Limitations

Eligibility and priority areas:

Who can apply?

Anyone who is interested in rehabilitating fish habitats in NSW can apply for a Habitat Action Grant including individual recreational fishers, fishing clubs and organisations, educational institutions, councils, community groups, individuals and so on. Joint applications are also encouraged.

Funding applications must relate to the enhancement of recreational fishing by improving fish habitat.

Applications should:

- show consultation has occurred with NSW DPI Fisheries representatives listed below mandatory
- be technically sound and utilise best practice methods
- have an understanding of permits required for projects including instream and bank works such as resnagging, fish hotels, and erosion control activities. Permits do not have to be obtained prior to submitting the funding application
- have matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis (cash and/or in-kind support by the applicant or project partners)
- have letters of support from recreational fishing clubs/long term fishers in the area of works and project partners.

What project items are ineligible for funding?

Projects that would not receive favourable consideration include:

To provide support for people undertaking projects that will make a positive difference to the natural living environment, in land, sea or air, rural or urban.

Overview

Grants are usually under \$10,000. The Foundation also grants on behalf of donors, and their programs can be over \$10,000 e.g. the landscape restoration and education grants. If you have a project over \$10,000, check with the Foundation first.

Universities and academics can only apply for up to \$5,000.

The Foundation is looking for projects around:

- flora and fauna conservation (Australia-wide)
- threatened mammal conservation (Australia-wide)
- landscape restoration and education (Victoria only)

These projects should involve any of the following:

- · monitoring, recording and sharing data
- delivering community education

- Gardens- bush good gardens, sensory gardens, veggie gardens, chicken houses, water tanks, arboretums etc. (particularly in kinders and schools)- we're too small to fund all these projects around Australia so please don't apply
- Animal or wildlife refuges and their activities
- Pure academic research- academic applicants need to show how their research is directly linked to a community group doing conservation work. The Anzac Community Grants Program (ACGP) provides small grants for a range of projects that commemorate and educate New South Wales communities about the service and sacrifices of current and former military servicemen and women. Projects which support activities benefiting the NSW veteran community are also eligible for funding.

Overview

The Anzac Community Grants Program provides grants of up to \$2,000 for a range of projects that either promote appreciation and understanding of the service and sacrifice of military service personnel or support activities and services to enhance the wellbeing of the NSW veteran community.

Educational institutions, ex-service organisations, community groups, local government associations, museums and historical societies are encouraged to apply for an ACGP grant.

Categories

- Local community historical research and education: Projects that inform and educate the wider community about the service and sacrifice of NSW's veterans and their families.
- Preservation or display of war memorabilia: Preservation and/or research materials. Display of war memorabilia, artefacts and/or research materials relevant to the local community.
- Public commemorative events, arts and culture: Events that honour or mark military anniversaries and pay tribute to the service and sacrifice of NSW veterans.
- Provide support to members of the NSW veteran community: Activities such as excursions and milestone reunions.

- Catering, refreshments and associated catering equipment (limited to \$300)

Educational:

- Educational materials that are an integral part of a project (this only includes materials that are being created for the project), digital materials are encouraged
- Interpretive/information signage
- School trips/community group visits or excursions to sites, locations or establishments of military significance

Heritage:

- Display cabinets for the display of wartime memorabilia
- New honour boards/rolls (including digital honour boards/rolls)
- Plaques, medallions or presentation items (small orders only)

Other:

- Freight (must be directly related to the project)
- · Landscaping or gardening
- Lighting
- Marketing and advertising (e.g. advertising, promotional collateral, marketing activities, public relation, graphic design, associated printing costs)
- Publishing or editing costs (for first editions only)
- Research expenses (i.e. photocopying, the purchase of photographs, copies of records that are an integral part of the project. General administration expenses are not eligible
- Salaries/wages for tradespeople, professionals, external suppliers and short term personnel (with a valid ABN) who are engaged with delivering the project
- Transport bus/coach hire if reasonable and integral to the project

Ineligible costs:

Limitations

Eligibility criteria:

- Applications must be for an existing war memorial commemorating Australia's military heritage and the war memorial must be located within the State of NSW or, if located outside NSW, of direct and substantial relevance to the State.
- The definition of a "memorial" includes public monuments, memorial places, landscaped spaces, buildings, sculptures, trees and avenues as well as indoor fixtures such as honour boards, plaques, busts or bas-relief sculptures.
- An application may be made by any organisation, provided the owner or custodian of the memorial, local RSL subbranch and local council support the bid, where applicable
- Before applying to the Community War Memorials Fund the memorial must first be recorded on the Register of War Memorials in NSW (warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au).
- Applications must be for the repair, protection and/or conservation of existing memorials.
- Applications relating to memorials located on either private or public property are eligible for funding, however the memorial must have a public function and be accessible to the public.
- The State War Memorials Committee will announce grants biannually, with applications closing on Anzac Day and on Remembrance Day. However, the Committee may make extraordinary grants as circumstances require.
- Applications to fund works that have already been completed are not eligible.
- The State War Memorials Committee may in extraordinary circumstances approve applications that do not meet all of the above criteria.

The National Cultural Heritage Account helps Australian public cultural organisations buy significant objects that they could not otherwise afford.

Overview

A total of \$500,000 is available each year. You can apply at any time. Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis.

The National Cultural Heritage Account keeps Australian protected objects in Australia so they can be preserved and made available to the public.

Cultural organisations that can care for and provide permanent public access to Australian protected objects have a priority for funding.

Individuals can also apply if they intend to gift the object to an eligible cultural institution with a permanent public collection. In these cases, the grant and the gifting of the object must be simultaneous.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups can apply for funding even if they do not have a permanent public collection. This is because of the special significance of Class A objects of heritage to Indigenous communities.

How to apply:

You must apply in writing to us.

Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis and usually covers a proportion of the fair market value of the object. Fair market value is determined by recent auction prices or the actual price paid.

The National Cultural Heritage Committee considers applications and provides recommendations to the Minister for the Arts.

You might be asked to provide at least two independent valuations from valuers approved under the Commonwealth's Cultural Gifts Program.

Priority

The following Australian protected objects are priorities for funding:

- Class A objects in Australia and overseas
- Class B objects that have been denied an export permit
- Class B objects that have been granted an export permit on condition that they be available at fair market value for purchase by an eligible cultural organisation

Illegal dumping is an environmental crime and can cause serious environmental pollution, pose a risk to human health and impact local amenities and community pride. The EPA acknowledges that the health and wellbeing of Aboriginal people is related to the protection of the environment.

Overview

Program objectives:

Funding offered under the program aims to:

- 1. Reduce the impacts of illegal; dumping on Aboriginal land through clean up and prevention activities
- 2. Build and maintain collaborative approaches and partnerships to help manage and reduce the occurrence of illegal dumping
- 3. Integrate deterrence, surveillance, monitoring measures and community education to prevent illegal dumping activities on Aboriginal land
- 4. Incorporate cultural activities that enable Aboriginal people to care for Country, engage in knowledge sharing and gain skills in land management

Who can apply?

- NSW Local Aboriginal Land Councils LALC)
- Entities working in partnership with a LALC such as government agencies, local councils, non-government organisations, consultants and othe entities (written consent from the LALC is required).

What is the eligibility criteria?

Grants under this program are made available to organisations not individuals. To be eligible for a grant under the ALCUP program, you must meet the following criteria:

- projects must be in NSW
- applicants must be able to demonstrate that they are a LALC entity, or have the formal support of the LALC that manages the site on which the project is proposed
- projects must be relevant to the management of illegal dumping on Aboriginal-owned land and involve the clean-up, prevention and/or deterrence of illegally dumped waste and cultural activities to support Caring for Country
- applicants must have the means or support available to complete the project and related administrative work within 18 months
- applicants must have the capacity to administer the grant funds, or a letter of support from an incorporated organisation that will administer the grant funds, indicating their willingness to be responsible for managing the funds, administering the grant and keeping financial records of the grant activities
- applicants must not have any outstanding acquittals from previous NSW Government funding.

Priority

Key strategies supported

Make access difficult

At illegal dumping sites that were easily accessible to unauthorised vehicles, ALCUP funding saw fencing, gates, earth mounds, boulders and concrete bollards installed to restrict and control access. Tracks were also re-seeded once access was blocked.

Increase risks of getting caught

Increased surveillance activities, and installed signs in a number of illegal dumping hotspots identified by the project teams to deter unlawful activity. Some signs incorporate strong cultural messages, using local Aboriginal language and artwork.

Reduce opportunities for crime: don't give a reason to dump

Waste, weed and fire management issues are often intertwined. Following clean-up work, projects have included or allowed future activities, such as tree planting or cultural fire burns, to help property managers restore and maintain value of the land.

Remove excuses: educate and inform the community

Some projects are carried out in parallel with other waste and environmental education programs, such as school poster competitions. Projects have also used media and other publicity opportunities to raise awareness.

Limitations

What projects will not be funded?

The ALCUP program provides funding for new projects whose dominant purpose is achieving clean-up and prevention of illegal dumping. Therefore, it will not fund:

- projects that have already commenced
- projects and activities that are not directly related to, or are not for the dominant purpose of, achieving the clean-up, long-term prevention and deterrence of illegal dumping
- projects which focus on the clean-up of small litter items (such as cigarette butts, cigarette packets, food containers, plastic bottles, confectionary wrappers)

The Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Grant (EDAEG) initiative aims to promote diversity, innovation and service responsiveness in the NSW workforce by subsidising the salary, development and support costs of Aboriginal employees in public service agencies or local government authorities.

Overview

The objectives of the Grant are to:

- encourage the permanent employment and professional mobility of Aboriginal people in NSW public service agencies and local government authorities, with special incentives for the employment of Aboriginal people with a disability, and
- promote innovation in achieving education, employment and training outcomes for Aboriginal people.

The EDAEG comprises three elements.

1. Permanent (Ongoing) Employment – \$30,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant to subsidise the permanent employment of an Aboriginal person.

The proposed position must be at a minimum Clerk Grade 7 or above, based on the Crown Employees (Public Sector – Salaries 2018) Award or equivalent for local government authorities. An existing mainstream position can be converted to an Aboriginal Identified position, on the condition that the position remains a permanent Aboriginal Identified position in your organisational structure.

2. Temporary (Term Employment) Secondment - \$20,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the salary cost of a temporary position (Minimum six months, up to twelve months) that will provide a significant skill development opportunity for an Aboriginal person who is already permanently employed in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

Agencies may apply for funding of graded positions at the minimum grade 5 or equivalent of Local Government Authority that shows career mobility and progression for an Aboriginal person. Funding amounts are based on the below table

Grade	Grant Amount	Approx. Salary
5-6 (or equivalent)	\$20,000	\$83,000*
7-8 (or equivalent)	\$30,000	\$94,000*
9 and above	\$40,000	\$108,000*

^{*}This amount is inclusive of superannuation and any other employer entitlements.

3. School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SBAT) - \$10,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the creation of a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship for an Aboriginal student in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

The Apprenticeship or Traineeship must be established under the provisions of the Apprenticeship and Traineeship Act 2001; approved by the Board of Studies; and contribute to the attainment of the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

Limitations

Eligibility

The EDAEG provides funding to organisations (not individuals) to support Aboriginal education, employment and training.

^{*}If the position for either the Permanent or Temporary Element is part-time a Pro-rata amount will be calculated against the positions proposed hours.

Organisations applying for funding under the EDAEG must be registered, based in NSW and provide services within the State.

To be eligible, organisations must be a:

- NSW public service agency; or
- NSW local government authority operating under the Local Government Act 1993

Ineligibility

Grant applications will be deemed ineligible for the following circumstances:

Permanent and Temporary:

- positions that form part of an organisation's bulk or annual recruitment intake;
- existing positions within an organisations staffing structure (Unless a permanent position has been converted to an identified role);
- a position(s) that has previously been funded under the Grant;
- employment of a person who was unemployed (Temporary element); or
- a position(s) that has been filled prior to applying for EDAEG.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs.

SBAT:

- an apprenticeship or traineeship position has been already filled prior to the organisation's application to the EDAEG i.e. no retrospective funding.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs. The Department will consult with other Government agencies when it considers the funding application. Applicant organisations will need to advise the Department on the application form whether they have applied or have received other Government funding for the project.

Purpose

Prescribed Bodies Corporate (PBC) Capacity Building Funding is available to provide support PBCs maximise the economic and social potential of native title through the effective and sustainable management of their land.

Overview

The primary objective of this funding is to assist PBCs generate economic benefits through the effective and sustainable management of their land. This funding aims to contribute to the outcomes described in Annexure 1 (Section 22) of the IAS Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme, with a particular focus on the outcome 'Indigenous

Australians use their land and sea assets to create economic and social benefits'. This funding will support this outcome by building the capacity of PBCs to maximise the economic and social potential of native title.

What can be funded?

There are three elements to this funding:

- 1. direct support to increase the capacity of PBCs to take advantage of economic opportunities;
- 2. support for training to build long-term organisational capacity within PBCs and to procure professional expertise (for example, business or agribusiness consultancies, accountancy or legal services); and
- 3. direct support for effective native title agreement-making.

It is strongly recommended all potential applicants discuss proposals with their local PM&C Regional Network office in the early stages of development and before preparing an application.

How much funding is available?

A total of \$20.4 million is available over the first four years, comprising:

- \$2.519 million in 2015-16;
- \$5.037 million in 2016-17;
- \$6.296 million in 2017-18 and
- \$6.548 million in 2018-19.

Funding for the programme is ongoing, but funding amounts have only been allocated until 2018-19.

Limitations

Who can apply for funding?

All PBCs are eligible to apply for the funding. Native Title Representative Bodies and Service Providers (NTRBs-SPs) and other third parties, for example, law firms and interest groups, can also apply to receive and administer the funding on behalf of, and with the authorisation of, one or more PBCs.

Applicants must also meet all eligibility criteria outlined in the IAS Grant Guidelines, and undergo financial viability checks and a risk assessment.

What cannot be funded?

Activities which will not be funded are stipulated in the IAS Grant Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme. These activities include but are not limited to:

- applications that do not clearly address at least one of the IAS programme streams
- activities that are more appropriately funded by other Government agencies (including State/Territory and local Government) under their priorities
- retrospective items or activities, and
- costs reasonably covered by proponent parties.

PBCs will not be funded for costs that would be payable under the 'Basic Support Funding' under the Native Title and Land Rights Activity under the Jobs Land and Economy Programme and administered by NTRBs-SPs, as this would duplicate available funding.

While eligibility for PBC capacity building funding is restricted to PBCs or support for PBCs only, PBCs can apply for funding under other IAS funding streams and Australian Government programmes. PBC capacity building funding is intended to complement other sources of grant funding. A specific activity cannot be funded under more than one programme.

Purpose

Tailored Assistance Employment Grants are available to provide funding to connect working age Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples with real and sustainable jobs, as well as support Indigenous school student's transition from education to sustainable employment.

Overview

The Department invites applications for grant funding for activities that primarily contribute to employment outcomes.

The objectives of the programme are to:

- Get Indigenous Australians into work.
- Get remote jobseekers work ready, through community and other activities and work experience.
- Foster Indigenous business.
- Assist Indigenous Australians to generate economic and social benefits, including through the effective and sustainable management of their land.
- Assist Indigenous Australians to progress land and sea claims and township leases under Commonwealth native title and land rights legislation.

What can be funded?

This open grant funding process will support services or activities that will have a positive impact on the Government's priority area of:

- 1. Employment— The primary aim is to support activities for Indigenous Australians to overcome disadvantage in the labour market, connect them to real and sustainable jobs, to gain experience that builds work-readiness and contributes to the broader community. Sustainable employment implies an ongoing job which is not dependent on continuous government funding. The ongoing job may be part-time or full-time.
- 2. Indigenous participants prioritised for support will include youth, school leavers at risk of disengaging or long term unemployed, those not in the labour force, jobactive Streams B & C job seekers, those in the Community Development Programme (CDP) and Disability Employment Services (DES are considered disadvantaged).

The types of activities that may be funded include:

- Tailored assistance to support employers to engage and retain Indigenous jobseekers into real and sustainable ongoing jobs, as well as address barriers to recruitment and retention.
- Support for Indigenous senior school students to gain work exposure through School Based Apprenticeship/ Traineeship activities, including activities that support and school students to transition from education into sustainable employment or further education/training.

The Department encourages applications for the funding of activities tailored to local circumstances with the involvement of Indigenous communities.

Where funding is available, organisations will be able to apply for Tailored Assistance Employment grant funding at any time

Potential applicants are encouraged to discuss their proposal with their local PM&C Regional Network office before preparing an application.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

Organisation:

To be eligible for grant funding under the IAS, applicants must be a legal entity and have full legal capacity to enter into a Project Agreement with the Commonwealth. For example, applicants may be:

- Aboriginal Corporations (incorporated under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006 and administered by the Office of the Registrar of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporations [ORIC]).
- Incorporated Associations (incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Association' or 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name).
- Incorporated Cooperatives (also incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name).
- Companies (incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 may be not-for-profit or for-profit proprietary company (limited by shares or by guarantee) or public companies).
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or State/Territory legislation (many public benevolent institutions, churches, universities, etc.).
- A partner on behalf of a Partnership.
- Trustees on behalf of a Trust.
- State/Territory or Local Governments.
- Where a particular need has been identified, the Department may also consider an individual or individuals (either jointly or separately) for contractual arrangements.

An unincorporated association is not a legal entity and will not be contracted by the Department.

Community groups that may not be eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible organisation.

Individual:

While it is expected that grant funding will primarily be provided to organisations, individuals will not be precluded from receiving grant funding, unless otherwise specified in the application documentation.

Incorporation requirements:

All organisations receiving grant funding of \$500,000 (GST exclusive) or more in any single financial year from funding administered by the Indigenous Affairs Group within the Department are required to:

Purpose

The Country Passenger Transport Infrastructure Grants Scheme (CPTIGS) provides subsidies to support the construction or upgrade of bus stop infrastructure generally owned and maintained by local councils across country NSW. The subsidies represent Transport for NSW's (TfNSW) financial contribution towards improving the accessibility and quality of kerbside passenger transport infrastructure in country areas. \$3,252,000 is available in this biennial 2019/21 funding round.

Overview

The Scheme aims to maximise benefits to country passengers through supporting:

- more accessible passenger transport especially better connections between bus stops and surrounding communities;
- an increase in the use of passenger transport in country areas through improved awareness of bus stop locations, kerbside information and improved security; and
- the development of minor infrastructure to complement passenger service development.

Eligible infrastructure components:

Subsidies can be used for the provision and/or upgrading of bus stop infrastructure components as follows:

- new shelters; or
- upgrades -
 - boarding areas especially levelling;
- basic boarding point;
- minor boarding point upgrade;
 - connecting footpath;
 - security/lighting;
 - signage;
 - standard bus stop hard stand;
 - street furniture,
 - tactile ground surface indicators (TGSIs).
- A new shelter has a maximum total grant value of \$10,000 which includes the shelter and associated works.
- An upgrade has a maximum total grant value of \$2,000 (Funding will be granted as per Appendix H of these Guidelines Notional Subsidy Rates).
- The Program allows for a new shelter OR upgrade/s at a location. Application CANNOT be made for a new shelter AND upgrade/s at the same location.

Priority

Funding allocation priorities and principles:

- Proposals that improve safety and accessibility are higher priority than those which enhance passenger comfort.
- Subsidies are to provide direct benefits to customers of passenger transport services contracted by TfNSW.
- Subsidy payments represent TfNSW's financial contribution towards the provision and upgrading of infrastructure to a minimum standard. Where a higher standard is preferred, the subsidy recipient is responsible for funding the additional cost.
- Equitable distribution of subsidy payments across country areas.
- Applications for subsidies from RRBSC regions take priority over projects for OMBSC areas.

Limitations

Eligibility:

The Scheme is open to applications from:

- local governments (councils and joint regional organisations);
- transport providers (including private bus operators); and
- incorporated community organisations including Aboriginal Land Councils.

The Scheme provides subsidies for improvements at:

- · regular bus stops;
- NSW TrainLink coach stops;
- bus stops adjacent to the entry/exit points of schools; and
- bus stops that support other modes of transport, including flexible transport options.

Funding Exclusions

- · research or studies;
- services;
- · management;
- conveyances or enhancement to conveyances for use by transport providers;
- projects that benefit conveyances or drivers only, not passengers;
- lifecycle maintenance or recurrent costs;
- sealing or delineation of roads or airstrips;
- road works:
- infrastructure enclosed on private land not accessible by the public;
- infrastructure for exclusive use by taxis services; and
- infrastructure for exclusive use by airports.

Purpose

The objective of the fund is to provide projects that improve the lives of people who live in regional areas. Round Three of the Fund will see another \$100 million made available for projects that improve the lives and wellbeing of regional NSW communities. This includes a dedicated \$50 million for projects for young people.

Overview

The objectives of the fund are:

1. to boost the liveability of communities in regional areas by providing new or upgraded social and sporting infrastructure or community programs that have strong local support

2. to provide programs and infrastructure that enhance opportunities for young people to be work ready and thrive in regional NSW.

There is a total of \$100 million available in Round Three, including at least \$50 million for projects that improve the lives of young people (12-24 years old). The remaining funding can be provided for other local community and sporting infrastructure, street beautification, and community programs and events. Funds will be split across regional NSW according to a funding formula based on population and the cost of construction in each Local Government Area. Each eligible council will be informed in writing of the funding available for their Local Government Area.

Projects must seek grant funding of \$50,000 or more. Projects requiring grant funding of more than \$1 million will only be considered where there is a financial co-contribution of at least 25 per cent of the total grant amount. The financial cocontribution may be from the applicant or other funding sources, but must be confirmed.

Example

The Stronger Country Communities Fund supports projects which improve local infrastructure. Examples include:

- building new community facilities to be shared by all within the community such as parks, playgrounds, walking or cycle pathways
- refurbishing existing local facilities such as schools and health centres, community centres, libraries
- enhancing local parks and the supporting facilities such as kitchens and toilet blocks.

Limitations

Eligible applicants are:

- the 93 regional NSW councils, regional Joint Organisations of councils, the Lord Howe Island Board and the Unincorporated Far West groups
- incorporated, not-for-profit organisations or other organisations that have a public purpose and carry out activities in NSW, including Local Aboriginal Land Councils. Applicants must hold an Australian Business Number (ABN), Australian Company Number (ACN) or be registered under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. Applicants must have or be able and willing to purchase at least \$20 million public liability insurance. The cost of public liability insurance can be included in the project budget as part of the administration costs.

Ineligible applicants are:

- an individual or group of individuals
- an unincorporated organisation
- a for-profit commercial organisation.

Youth-related projects must be for:

- development of new or upgrades to existing infrastructure for young people; or
- delivering programs for young people.

Youth-related projects must be aligned to the areas of community, wellbeing, connectivity and work readiness.

General community amenity projects must be for:

- construction of new, or upgrades to existing, local community infrastructure
- construction of new, or upgrades to existing, local sporting infrastructure
- capital works related to street beautification and other public places that promote the health, happiness and wellbeing of the community
- delivering programs that benefit the local community
- infrastructure to assist the delivery of general community programs.

Projects are not eligible for funding if they are:

- located outside an eligible Local Government Area
- exclusively for planning activities e.g. master planning or heritage studies
- for the maintenance or construction of local roads or other ongoing core service infrastructure works that are the ordinary responsibility of council or other levels of government
- for the delivery of essential or core government services that should be funded from another source, such as local government, the NSW Government or the Australian Government
- seeking retrospective funding to cover any project component that is already complete before funding is announced
- seeking grant funding for ongoing staff or operational costs beyond three years from project announcement for programs; or any ongoing staff or operational costs for infrastructure projects
- for a general works package without specific scope, costs and location e.g. 'upgrading lighting at sports ovals' without identifying the work required, number of sites or the locations
- exclusively for marketing, branding, advertising or product promotion
 providing direct commercial and/or exclusive private benefit to an individual or business
- not clearly providing benefits that will significantly contribute to the objectives of the fund.

Applicants based in the United States must be registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations. Applicants based outside the United States must show 501(c)(3) equivalency under U.S. law and, if invited to submit a proposal, will be asked to sign an affidavit stating this equivalency. Potential grantees without 501(c)(3) status will be asked for further documentation regarding the charitable purpose of the activity.

All applicants must submit a letter of inquiry of no more than two pages briefly describing the mission and history of the applying organization, goals of the initiative(s), specific objectives, and accompanying strategies. The letter must also state the organization's current annual operating budget and primary sources of income. Applicants based in the United States must also include as appendices the IRS 501(c)(3) documentation letter and a copy of the most recent IRS Form 990. The objective of the grant opportunity is to support research to reduce the impact of congenital heart disease.

Overview

For this grant opportunity \$20 million is available over 5 years from 2019-20 to 2023-24. You must complete your project by 30 June 2024.

The grant amount will be up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs (grant percentage). The maximum grant amount available is \$10 million.

The intended outcome of the grant opportunity is to provide new diagnoses and treatment options for those suffering from congenital heart disease.

Ideally projects will align with the National Strategic Action Plan for Childhood Heart Disease, and could target the Research Priorities in the Action Plan in particular:

- preventing neurodevelopmental and mental health complications

- The Murdoch Children's Research Institute project to enable the Australian Genomics Health Alliance to extend the Cardiovascular Genetic Disorders Flagship study, which aims to interrogate the genomic basis of disease in individuals and families with cardiomyopathies, arrhythmias and congenital heart disease.
 - The Cardiovascular Genetic Disorders Flagship study will provide genomic testing for up to 600 families with congenital heart disease, arrhythmia disorders and cardiomyopathies. It will pilot a model of clinical genomics as part of a patient's standard clinical management, and will contribute to the evidence base for harnessing genomic technologies to improve the diagnosis and health management of Australians.

Funding:

Partnership Projects are for five years or less and the maximum amount of NHMRC funding that may be requested for a single application is \$1.5 million

Objectives:

The objectives of the scheme are to:

- meet the need for a more effective integration of research evidence into health policy and service delivery
- create partnerships among policy makers, managers, service providers and researchers
- provide support to answer often complex and difficult questions that policy makers, managers and service providers face when making decisions and implementing policies that affect Australians' health and health care

- 4. Costs involved in linkage with, downstream translation and dissemination of research findings to those who will use the results as appropriate to the particular research aim. The application must provide a detailed justification of all costs.

- Have demonstrated past experience in or future potential for a career in ovarian and/or breast cancer research.
- Agree to execute a deed undertaking to comply with the Funding Agreement entered into by the Administering Institution, if funding is granted.

The PI and at least 50% of the nominated CIs must:

- Reside in Australia (or intend to reside in Australia) throughout the funding period.
- Be an Australian citizen, have resident status or have an appropriate visa to work in Australia for the entire duration of the funding period.
- Be affiliated with an Australian Institution

Funding is **NOT offered** for the following aspects of research related costs:

Sporting clubs have a choice of approved Service Providers and a variety of approved AED products and services.

The provision of an AED package will include:

- An AED
- AED familiarisation instruction
- A minimum of six years of essential defibrillator maintenance

Grants are available up to 50% of the selected AED package price in Zones 1 and 2 and up to 75% in Zone 3, capped at the levels stated below.

Applicants can request more than one AED.

Funding should be expended within six months of the date of signing the funding agreement.

Grants for AED packages are available up to:

• Zone 1: \$1,250 • Zone 2: \$1,300 • Zone 3: \$1,900

Priority

In determining priority for allocation of defibrillator package, the Office of Sport may consider:

- 1. Profile of participants and spectators of club and facility i.e. type and size, calendar of events, season dates, game schedule etc.
- 2. Facilities that provide the highest community access to the AED, including where the device will be installed, how it will be secured i.e. installation of AED in the building providing the highest level of access and available hours, installation of a 24 hour access cabinet, strategies to maximise community awareness around AED availability and

ease of use outside your clubs normal hours of operation. In Zone 3, in the absence of a secure building the AED should be in the custody of the club for use for the duration of the season, and then in the custody of the other sport in the case of a sharing arrangement.

- 3. Meet a demonstrated need in the community club or facility i.e. type of sport and physical activity undertaken, age profile and % of higher risk participants, stats of known medical conditions or previous incidents etc.
- 4. Address barriers faced by the club to access emergency services and clubs without an existing AED.
- 5. Capacity of organisation to apply systems and processes to successfully undertake the ongoing use, management and maintenance of AED.

Limitations

Who is eligible to apply?

- Incorporated, not-for-profit sports clubs or other organisations in NSW
- State or national sporting organisations on behalf of member clubs located in NSW, to a maximum of 10 per Zone
- Licensed sporting clubs, providing that the project directly benefits sporting activities
- Sport clubs associated with a school, church or university providing they are an incorporated not for profit club in their own right
- Councils, sport and recreational facilities owners on behalf of sports clubs
- Service clubs such as Rotary, CWA and Lions, on behalf of sports clubs

What is not included?

- Ongoing maintenance outside of the scope of the maintenance schedule and any extended warranty as specified by the Approved AED Panel Service Provider
- Accredited CPR, First Aid, ongoing or additional face to face AED familiarisation instruction
- Out of warranty repair of equipment
- Replacement costs of consumables including batteries and electrode pads
- Replacement or temporary replacement of the AED if it is damaged or unrecoverable through wear and tear, vandalism, accident, theft or misuse
- General first aid maintenance items or equipment (items requiring cleaning and disinfecting after use)

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

Grants are valued from \$2,000 to \$7,000, depending on how many interstate or overseas visitors are coming to your Championship, which time of year it is held and where the event is held.

There are no application deadlines for Championship grants, but you are asked to lodge your application at least three months prior to commencement of your event.

Limitations

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

This funding programs don't support conferences, conventions, symposiums, trade fairs, fundraising events, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

- Defined marketing activity

Tier 2: Applicants applying through Tier 2 are undertaking interstate marketing activity seeking to attract visitors from outside Tasmania.

- Up to \$10,000 in matched funding is available
- Interstate marketing focus
- In depth understanding of target audience and know exactly how to communicate with them
- Clearly defined marketing activity with a supporting marketing strategy

Priority

Preference will be given to quality applications that can demonstrate how the proposed event and associated marketing project will drive visitation to regional parts of the state outside of the high tourism season.

Limitations

Reasons you may not be eligible for a grant:

This funding programs don't support conferences, conventions, symposiums, trade fairs, fundraising events, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through our other funding programs you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

To support feminist scholars and activities.

Overview

The Feminist Review Trust funds projects internationally which represent the diversity of women's lives globally and support the creativity which with women fight the inequalities they face.

The maximum value of any individual award is UK £15,000 (or its equivalent). However, the Trustees rarely give out awards of this amount so when you prepare your application please bear in mind that you may only be offered partial funding. It is therefore helpful if you can identify different sub-elements in your application.

The Feminist Review Trust will fund:

Hard to fund projects. Some types of projects are difficult to fund. Typically these projects have no other obvious sources of funding. This might mean, for example, that traditional academic sources are either not interested in the area or that it is an activist project or that it is too feminist for most conventional funding sources. For example the Trust supported the writing and publication of the history of Rape Crisis in Scotland and the translation and updating sections of 'Women and Their Bodies' into Arabic and Hebrew.

Pump priming activities. This means that we will provide a small amount of funding to help start an activity in the hope that it will then be able attract sufficient funding to continue. For example we funded a project in Argentina to strengthen the capacity of organisations promoting women's rights and a project to provide audio visual equipment for a feminist social centre in Madrid. In each case these projects have hopefully helped to create a sustainable activity.

Interventionist projects which support feminist values. It is often difficult for projects around core feminist concerns such as abortion rights and domestic violence to find funding. For example the Trust has supported Asylum Aid (an independent charity workshop with asylum seekers in the UK) to promote its 'Charter of Rights' for Women Seeking Asylum. We supported the 40th Anniversary Campaign of Abortion Rights in the UK, a documentary about abortion in Trinidad and Tobago and a feminist art studio in Tbilisi, Georgia.

Training and development projects: we will fund projects which provide training in relevant areas. For example, the Trust has funded English lessons for sex workers in London; leadership skills training for women in the voluntary sector. and volunteer training as Glasgow Women's Library.

One off events: we supported Cine25 as part of the celebrations of 25 years of Women's Studies at the University of York (UK); a seminar for the Lileth Project (a violence against women housing related project), and a workshop on the gender dimensions of Bulgarian Immigration Policy.

Dissemination: we will fund the production and distribution of relevant material. Too often wonderful work has had a more limited impact than it should because it was not well of fully distributed The Trust will fund dissemination. . For example we have supported the production of a booklet on Asian women's experiences of higher education in the UK and the distribution of publications by the Rights of Women (a non-profit UK group)

Core funding: we realise that many groups struggle to raise core funding. The Trustees are willing to offer core funding to cover staff costs, accommodation etc., except in instances where applicants are seeking core funding to replace funding lost as a result of public sector cuts.

Other projects: if your application does not easily fit into any of the above categories we may still support it. For example, the Trust has funded a project to capture oral histories of women's experience of the menopause. Contact the Trust to discuss eligibility prior to submitting your application.

Limitations

What will the Trust not fund?

The Feminist Review Trust will not fund the following types of applications:

- Applications from students to support them on courses of any kind. This includes sub-degree, Bachelors, Masters and Doctorates. Nor will we fund doctoral fieldwork. Very, very exceptionally we might contribute up to £500 to assist a student from a poor country.
- Applications from academics to fund work which could be funded by more traditional sources of funding. This means that we are very unlikely to fund summer projects for US academics.
- Where we do fund academics we will not fund overheads, teaching buy-outs or equivalent.
- Applications to continue doctoral studies. Post-docs can be funded from more conventional sources. Applications from religious groups.
- Applications from UK organisations for core funding that has been lost or reduced due to statutory bodies' spending cuts.

Purpose

To create a more just society by giving every young person in Australia an equal opportunity to access the skills to negotiate life's journey.

Overview

Matana's focus is on improving the welfare and wellbeing of young people from severely disadvantaged or marginalised backgrounds, or whose concerns and issues are not readily funded from other sources. Recognising that disadvantage takes many forms, we prioritise projects and organisations that address the causes of youth disadvantage by:

Providing programs primarily targeting school retention and increased education achievement for students who are
at risk of dropping out of school or who have already dropped out. The focus is on early identification, customised
learning and mentoring.

- Providing programs that target employment skills development, employment and career pathways and transitions into employment.
- Providing programs that target social and community connectedness, personal significance and social and emotional outcomes.
- Providing services in geographical areas across Australia where funding is difficult to source.

We welcome applications from financially viable organisations which work to improve the lives and opportunities of disadvantaged young people, particularly where their core activities correlate with our funding priorities. Wherever possible, you will need to demonstrate the tangible impact of your organisation's work in improving the welfare or wellbeing of disadvantaged young people.

There is no minimum or maximum amount, but as a guide, grants are usually in the range of \$1,000 to \$10,000. However, assessment will be made on an individual basis. We also encourage grantseekers to apply to other sources to facilitate joint funding of projects.

Grants may be sought at any time.

Limitations

Matana can only make grants to organisations that hold the following ATO endorsements:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Item 1
- Tax Concession Charity (TCC)

Evidence of endorsements is required at the point of application. If your organisation does not have Item 1 DGR and TCC status, unfortunately we will not be able to consider your application.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications that request funding for:

- Operating costs including salaries and administration costs, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
