## Purpose

The Community Small Grants program aims to build individual/groups skills and knowledge in land management practices and community participation, knowledge and skills with community organisations, groups or local communities.

## Overview

The grants are part of the Community Small Grants and Education Scholarship Program 2018-2021 which supports community in building knowledge, skills and participation in land management practices.

### Funding Availability:

- Maximum \$2000 per project.

### Closing Dates for Funding Rounds (multiple rounds over 3 years):

- Applications will be assessed within 2 weeks of the following Rounds.
- Submit your applications by:
  - 2019: 1 April, 1 July, 1 October
  - 2020: 1 February, 1 March, 1 April 1 July, 1 October
  - 2021: 1 February, 1 March

## Example

Examples of Skills and Knowledge, and Community Participation Projects that can be funded (group, network or associations)- up to \$2000 (per group/per year maximum 3 applications):

- **Public Awareness raising events**- such as involvement in festivals, public displays, static displays, or development of educational resources/kits, online resources.
- **Public/Closed Workshops**- such as tailored workshops for your group members, or public workshops inviting local community, this includes development of resources or kits that facilitate workshop activities
- **Public/Closed Field based events**- where activities will build local community knowledge in on ground activities and land management practices, this can include a examples such as: community tree planting events, farm visits or demonstration site visits, or project plan development where community is involved in planning activities open to the public or specific to your group
- **School programs**- that build students/school communities knowledge of relevant environmental, agricultural or cultural land, and emergency management issues
- **Closed Group training events**- where a training event is tailored/delivered to a community group to build relevant skills to local projects or initiatives - such as pest training for 1080/pindone use, chemical application training, weed ID and training, drone/app training, property planning etc

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Community groups
- Landcare groups
- Schools
- Local Aboriginal Land Councils (LALCs)
- Committees/Associations
- Not for profit organisations
- Industry/producer groups

### Eligibility Criteria

- The group/organisation must have been in operation for at least 6 months

- Your organisation/ community group must either be incorporated OR auspiced by an organisation that is incorporated or has an ABN. Unincorporated groups can access financial assistance; however, a tax invoice from a supplier (e.g. caterer, guest speaker) must be issued for payment directly to Hunter LLS.
- Your project must aim to build community participation and knowledge and skills with community organisations or local communities
- Maximum of 1 application per group per financial year
- All applications should determine budgets based on quotes/actual costs. All projects should retain all receipts for project activities, as projects may be audited on completion.
- All recipients must use Hunter LLS evaluation forms (for projects and scholarships, and submit evaluation results to Hunter LLS) within 2 weeks of end of contract date/project completion with Final Reports.
- Applicants/groups must be residing in or registered in the Hunter Local Land Services region
- All Projects must be completed within the agreed contract date, or on or before the 30th May of the financial year the grant was offered.

#### Ineligible Activity/ Criteria

- Activities that have already been funded
- Activities that are of personal or private benefit
- Your organisation/group is subject to an Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC), Local Land Services (LLS), Department of Primary Industries (DPI) or other legal investigation
- Activities that do not align with the intended outcomes (skills and knowledge in land management practices and/or building community participation, skills and knowledge within organisations and communities)
- Capital items generally will not be funded, unless there is a strong justification (where the items directly support learning outcomes).

### Purpose

The Wildlife Heroes Bushfire Emergency Fund provides funding to support bushfire related emergency activities over the 2019-20 financial year.

### Overview

The Wildlife Heroes Bushfire Emergency Fund 2019 grant program is funded by the NSW Government through its Environmental Trust and managed by the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife.

Up to \$100,000 is available. The maximum grant available is \$10,000 for groups and \$1,000 for independent licence holders; and it is expected that the average grant will be of the order of \$2,500.

The program aims to achieve the following outputs:

- Increase number of wildlife emergency responders in NSW
- Decrease cost of emergency response to individual carers
- Increase number of wildlife that can be rescued and cared for during an emergency

- Enable wildlife groups to buy appropriate equipment and PPE for emergency response

The program aims to achieve the following outcomes:

- Improve efficiency, safety and effectiveness of wildlife emergency response operations
- Support wildlife volunteers to respond to emergencies (financially, organisationally, psychologically)
- Improve wildlife group emergency response capacity long-term

Grants will cover materials and activities that are carried out during a specific bushfire emergency event only.

## Limitations

### Who is Eligible to Apply?

FNPW considers proposals for funding from:

- NSW licensed wildlife volunteer groups
- Independent wildlife licence holders

Applicants must have a current group or independent rehabilitation licence issued by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

Eligible items the grant can pay for:

- fuel vouchers for volunteers working on emergency operations
- cages, tents, tables and other equipment
- animal food and formula
- feeding bottles, teats, syringes, needles, wipes
- wraps and pouches
- rehydration fluid and other first aid medication
- first aid kit materials
- PPE and safety equipment for volunteers including hats, sunscreen, fluoro vests, torches
- water and food for volunteer refreshments
- hiring fees for local hall or room to be used as a wildlife emergency operation centre

Ineligible expenses for this grant:

- stipends or personal payments for time worked
- administration costs
- any costs incurred as part of business as usual e.g. hotline expenses, normal office materials
- any costs not occurred as a result or in preparation for the designated emergency
- any item not on the eligible items list

## Purpose

Annual Organisation funding is provided on an annual basis to support Arts and Cultural Organisations (including service organisations) to deliver multiple arts and cultural activities throughout a single calendar or financial year. Funding can contribute to any aspect of an organisation's program.

## Overview

Funding is available for a wide range of arts and cultural activity, including:

- creation of new work, practice-based research or experimentation and professional development
- production, exhibition, presenting, publishing or recording, touring and festivals
- promotion and marketing, market and/or audience development activity
- conservation and/or development of collections and archives (including Aboriginal Keeping Places and the digitisation of collections)
- purchase of capital infrastructure and equipment
- partnerships, capacity building and sustainability.

Funding is not available under this program for filmmaking and screen production, mainstream animation and film festivals

There is no upper limit to the amount of funding you may request. However, to be competitive, you must provide a level of detail in your written application, support material and budget appropriate to the level of your funding request.

This expectation will vary according to the following levels of funding request:

- Applying for less than \$140,000
- Applying for \$140,000 or more.

You may not request funding for the total cost of your project. You must include an independent financial contribution (cash and/or in kind) from other sources. This amount varies according to the level of your funding request (see table on page 9 of the guidelines document).

## Limitations

### WHO CAN APPLY FOR FUNDING?

To be eligible for Annual Organisation funding you need to meet the following three criteria:

#### Applicant type

- You must be an organisation or group located in NSW\*.

#### Program focus

- Your program must be a clearly defined arts and cultural activity at its core.

#### Benefit

Your core program must benefit NSW by either:

- employing NSW artists or arts and cultural workers; and/or
- providing arts and cultural experiences to the people of NSW.

You are **ineligible** to apply for Annual Organisation funding if:

- you are a Major Performing Arts company, State Significant Organisation, or Key Festival
- you are a state or federal government department or agency, or State Cultural Institution
- you are an educational institution (including preschools, primary and secondary schools)
- you are receiving Multi-year Program funding from Create NSW,
- you are already receiving Annual program funds from Create NSW for the same period, or
- you are applying for filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

\* If you are an organisation based outside NSW and can demonstrate that your program fills a gap in the NSW arts and culture ecology, pre-approval to apply to this round must be sought no later than two weeks prior to the round closing.

## Purpose

The 2020 Australian Cultural Diplomacy Grants Program (ACDGP): Bushfire Renewal Round will focus on supporting the building, rebuilding and promotion of the creative industries in bushfire-affected areas of Australia.

## Overview

The objectives of the ACDGP 2020 are to:

- support bushfire affected communities to build, rebuild and promote creative industries by developing international connections and partnerships
- promote our economic, artistic and cultural assets to an international audience
- influence perceptions of Australia at home and abroad
- support innovative cultural collaboration and exchange
- expand audiences and markets
- build people-to-people links internationally
- leverage existing partnerships and foster engagement with key stakeholders in line with DFAT's 2017 [Foreign Policy White Paper](#)

## Grant amount

Grant applications for a maximum of \$60,000 per year for up to three years will be considered.

Co-contributions from you and other parties strengthen your application.

Funding is available for projects that:

- create a positive and contemporary image of Australia
- build people-to-people links
- strengthen engagement
- enhance markets and develop export opportunities, particularly in the Indo-Pacific region.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To be eligible you must be one of the following entity types:

- an Australian entity with an Australian Business Number (ABN) or Australian Company Number (ACN)
- an Australian consortium with a lead organisation
- an Australian registered charity or not-for-profit organisation
- an Australian local government body
- an Australian State/Territory government body
- a corporate Commonwealth entity
- an Australian statutory authority
- an Australian citizen or permanent resident of Australia.

Provide or develop child protection guidelines for your project if it involves people under the age of 18 years.

Individuals who intend the grant to be administered by a university should apply on behalf of the university, i.e. your university is the applicant.

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- not an Australian, a permanent resident of Australia or an Australian organisation.
- a previous applicant who has failed to provide a full and proper acquittal of an earlier ACDGP grant.

You can use the grant to pay for costs detailed in your budget and grant agreement, including:

- economy flights, modest accommodation costs, meals and travel allowances, other transport
- communication and translation
- venue hire and catering
- advertising and promotion, graphic design, photography and printed material
- production costs, including freight and artists' wages.

You cannot normally use the grant for:

- capital expenditure, including purchase of real estate and vehicles
- purchase of equipment (for example, musical instruments, computers, videos, photographic or printing equipment)
- covering retrospective costs or recurrent funding of activities
- activities which are already commercially viable in their own right
- activities which will provide commercial advantage to the applicant (e.g. Promotion of the applicant's own business)
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- subsidy of general ongoing administration of an organisation such as electricity, phone, rent, salaries (including for research assistants or administrative staff), honorariums or administrative charges levied by the applicant's organisation
- activities for which other commonwealth, state, territory or local government bodies have primary responsibility (e.g. Academic research, assistance to business, development assistance projects)
- activities undertaken by primary or high schools, including study tours, where travel by a significant number of students is the principal element of the proposal
- scholarships to individual students.

## Purpose

Screen Australia aims to support the creation of a diverse slate of quality, innovative, original, culturally significant small-screen storytelling that resonates with contemporary audiences.

## Overview

Screen Australia is required to place particular emphasis on “programs of interest or relevance to children”, they acknowledge the particular challenges and opportunities involved in producing programs for children, including the difficulties Commissioning Platforms have in monetising content, as well as the different relationship between first and subsequent windows created by the nature of the audience. For animation, preference will be given to those programs with Australian voices; or, on a case by case basis we may require a separate Australian voice track.

## What funding is available?

Screen Australia will not contribute more than 45 per cent of the total budget, inclusive of any **Producer Offset** amount, other than in exceptional circumstances.

Further, Screen Australia investment is capped at \$2 million in any one children's program, other than in exceptional circumstances. If a project is a co-production, this cap will normally be reduced pro rata according to the percentage of the non-Australian co-production partner(s)' contribution. So, for example if the co-production is a 60/40 Australian majority co production, the cap would be \$1.2 million.

For **official co-productions** the 45 per cent cap applies only to the Australian component of the budget. Please refer to the website for **further information** on the Children's program and **application deadlines**.

### Assessment criteria

Investment decisions will be made against the following criteria, and in the context of the slate management principles outlined on page 2:

- the quality of the proposal including its innovative and/or cultural significance;
- the project's potential to connect with its target audience;
- the track record and capacity of the creative team;
- the strength of the marketplace e.g. any ROW sales agent and the level of co-finance (excluding Screen Australia and the state agencies);
- diversity of slate.

**NOTE:** Applicants are encouraged to contact the **Program Operations team** on 1800 507 901 before applications are submitted to discuss any eligibility questions and ensure all the required supporting material is in place.

### Limitations

#### Who can apply?

Children's programs of any broadcast format is eligible for this program, including telemovies, telemovie packages and series (no distinction is drawn between series and mini-series).

The content can be animation or live action, preschool, drama or factual and do not have to be 'P' or 'C' program as classified by the ACMA. However, the primary audience for the content must be children, as opposed to families generally.

Children's Programs, animation or live action, which do not feature predominantly Australian voices will not be eligible.

Whilst Screen Australia will not normally fund long running series, in the case of children's programs we will give due consideration for applications to fund more than 26 viewing hours of any one project, including multiple series (whether or not they have been funded by Screen Australia).

Applicants and projects must meet the general eligibility requirements set out in Screen Australia's **Terms of Trade**, as well as the specific requirements of these guidelines. With the exception of official Co-Productions, it is Screen Australia's expectation that applications for direct funding will demonstrate that the project is written and directed by Australian citizens or residents.

Specific requirements apply to projects where there is **Indigenous community participation or content** involved. Please refer to our website for further information.

## Purpose

The Contemporary Music Touring Program (CMTF) supports national touring activity undertaken by Australian musicians performing original contemporary music.

## Overview

Under the CMTF performances of original Australian contemporary music can include a wide range of different musical styles.

The tour must comprise of performances in at least three venues outside of the performer's hometown. Tours that include regional and remote destinations, or which assist performers residing in regional and remote areas to tour, are a priority for funding.

- If your itinerary contains only metropolitan performances, you may request up to \$15,000.
- If your itinerary contains at least one regional or remote performance, you may request up to \$25,000.
- If 75% of your itinerary is to remote and/or very remote locations, you may request up to \$50,000.
- Please note: The minimum grant amount you can apply for is \$5,000.
- The Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA) helps determine the regional and remote reach of the tour.

Joint tours, where two or more independent performers are undertaking the same tour itinerary, are eligible under this program. These should be submitted as a single application. In such cases, the funding caps still apply.

We encourage the inclusion of additional activities which extend opportunities for community participation, such as workshops, master classes and all-age performances.

## Priority

Tours that include a majority of regional destinations or assist performers from regional areas are a priority for funding.

## Limitations

### Who can apply

Individuals or organisations may apply to tour live music performances within Australia. Touring musicians must be performing original Australian contemporary music. Funding can be provided to performers, managers, agents, and music networks on behalf of professionals working in the Australian music industry. Applications must contain one tour only.

### Who can't apply

You can't apply for a grant if:

- you received a grant, or administered a grant, from the Australia Council in the past and that grant has not been satisfactorily acquitted
- you owe money to the Australia Council.

You can't apply for the following activity:

- a tour to less than three venues
- overseas tours
- tours by non-Australian performers
- tours which are primarily school-based (except for applications seeking remote or very remote funds where the school is the primary venue of a remote or very remote location)
- a series of performances at one festival
- competitions, such as 'Battle of the Bands' events
- attendance at conferences

### Purpose

The Cultural Fund provides support to organisations for projects that deliver opportunities for authors, journalists, artists and key industry stakeholders in the writing, publishing, education, and visual arts sectors.

### Overview

Copyright Agency's aim is to support members and stakeholders to create, award, present, publish, and promote work by Australian creators that connects with audiences.

They also offer grants to leading organisations to help build literacy skills for children and young adults, and partnerships to support key national writers' festivals.

In most cases, the Cultural Fund's grants for organisations are for a single project for up to a year; however, in some instances funding for three years may be approve.

### Funding amounts

There are no set minimum or maximum amounts, however grants range from \$5,000 to \$20,000 per project/year.

**Note:** Those that wish to apply are advised to contact the Cultural Fund to discuss a potential proposal before submitting and application.

### Priority

Priority will be given to projects that will provide sustained and realistic support to writers and visual artists and to encourage greater audiences for their work.

### Limitations

#### Who can apply?

- Legally constituted organisations and incorporated associations may apply.
- If applying as a University, only one application from the University may be submitted per round.
- Individuals or sole traders are not eligible to apply for these grants

## Purpose

Enterprise Business & Ideas will support new business proposals or ideas that will create changes and benefit the screen industry more broadly. Enterprise Business & Ideas will also support businesses to develop strategic/business plans, engage business consultants or business mentors and engage a new company placement that will help their business to evolve or innovate, and build capacity.

## Overview

The aims of Enterprise Business & Ideas are to:

- Identify and support new ideas or business proposals that drive change and capitalise on success, both for companies and the screen industry.
- Build capacity by supporting businesses to diversify, innovate, and develop pathways to sustainability.
- Share information and experience between industry practitioners, to build capability.
- Encourage practices and business structures that recognise the value of creative collaborators who generate and develop screen story content.
- Promote the business opportunities and commercial benefits of gender equity, diversity and inclusion.

### Funding:

- Maximum \$200,000 per year for up to two years for a business or idea.
- Maximum \$100,000 per year for up to two years for company placements full-time or part-time.
- Maximum \$20,000 for a strategic/business plan (up to \$10,000), consultant (up to \$5,000) and/or mentor (up to \$5,000).

Applications are open all year round. For a strategic/business plan, consultant and/or mentor, or if you are applying for a Company Placement without submitting an application for a Business or idea, there is a one-stage process for assessment with a four-week turnaround for decisions.

## Purpose

Festivals Australia supports community participation in, and access to, the arts and aims to support partnerships and collaboration across the sector.



## Overview

The Festivals Australia program is part of the Australian Government's Arts and Cultural Development Program that supports participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture through developing and supporting cultural expression. Festivals Australia enables artists and organisations to shape Australia's cultural landscape, increase cultural diversity and inspire, educate and entertain communities across Australia.

The program seeks to celebrate the intrinsic capacity of the arts to engage, inspire and make meaning for all Australians, while supporting the celebration of place and promoting a sense of community identity. The Festivals Australia objectives are:

- to provide access to a diverse range of high-quality, innovative arts projects that grow audiences at festivals across regional and remote Australia;
- to support partnerships and collaboration across the arts sector; and
- encourage community participation in arts projects at regional and remote festivals.

To achieve these objectives, Festivals Australia will offer funding to support individual art projects that allow community members living in regional or remote Australia to participate in or appreciate an arts driven experience at:

- a festival – which is defined by Festivals Australia as a regularly presented program of events (for example annually or biennially) that is open to the public and provides an opportunity to gather and celebrate.
- a significant one-off community celebration – which is defined by Festivals Australia as a schedule of events that is open to the public and is focused on an anniversary or launch of great significance to the community. For example, a town or area's centenary celebrations, a significant anniversary of a major local event or the opening of a major new community resource could be the basis for an eligible significant one-off community celebration. F

Festivals Australia delivers two open competitive funding rounds opening in February and September each year.

### Grant amount

Approximately \$1.2 million is provided each financial year for the Festivals Australia program across two rounds opening in February and September each year.

There is no limit to the amount of funding that may be sought, however the average funding request is around \$40,000.

Funding is available through annual or multi-year agreements, subject to available funds. Multi-year funding is only available to support the development and delivery of a single project across financial years. Applicants seeking multi-year funding will be required to provide a strongly argued business case demonstrating the need for, and benefits of, multi-year support and additional budget information.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

To be eligible you must:

- be an Australian incorporated organisation
- have an active Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be registered for the purposes of GST, if required by the Australian Tax Office
- not have any outstanding reports, acquittals or serious breaches relating to any Australian Government funding. A serious breach is one that has resulted in, or warrants, the termination of a grant agreement.

Unincorporated groups are eligible for funding if auspiced by an organisation that meets the above criteria.

### Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an individual (unless auspiced by an organisation that meets the eligibility criteria)
- an unincorporated association not auspiced by an organisation that meets the eligibility criteria
- an organisation based outside of Australia.

### What activities are ineligible?

Festivals Australia will not fund:

- a project at a festival or one-off community celebration in a location deemed Code 1 by the by the Australian Statistical Geography Standard – Remoteness Areas (2011) (major city location)
- more than one project, per organisation, per festival
- an eisteddfod
- costs of the overall festival (Festivals Australia only funds a single discrete project within the festival)
- projects that will commence before the funding is approved
- projects which do not deliver arts outcomes
- projects that are a festival within a festival
- components of projects that are funded by other programs

## What can grant money be used for?

- artist fees
- travel costs (only within Australia)
- materials
- venue hire
- equipment hire
- project administrative costs (costs cannot be associated with the festival as a whole)
- temporary appointment of a project coordinator where a very strong business case demonstrates that it is essential to the delivery of the project.

Purchase of production equipment will only be considered where it is demonstrated to be more cost effective than hire.

## What activities are ineligible?

Festivals Australia will not fund:

- a project at a festival or one-off community celebration in a major city or metropolitan location
- more than one project, per organisation, per festival
- an eisteddfod
- costs of the overall festival (Festivals Australia only funds a single discrete project within the festival)
- projects that will commence before the funding is approved
- projects which do not deliver arts outcomes
- components of projects that are funded by other programs.

## What the grant money cannot be used for:

Expenditure items that are not eligible are:

- festival or business start-up costs
- general marketing
- catering
- security
- hire of amenities (toilets, garbage bins, heaters)
- insurance costs
- operating costs for the festival
- publication of festival programs
- infrastructure costs including building or fitting out permanent structures
- contingency costs.

## Purpose

The IVAIS grant provides funding to Indigenous visual art centres, industry service organisations, art fairs and arts hubs that are at the heart of Australia's world-famous Indigenous visual art movement.

## Overview

The IVAIS grant is a part of the Australian Government's Arts and Cultural Development Program (the Program). The Program supports participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture through developing and supporting cultural expression.

The intended outcomes of the IVAIS grant opportunity are:

- a professional, viable and ethical Indigenous visual arts industry that features strong participation and provides economic opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- the continued production, exhibition, critique, purchase and collection of Indigenous visual art.

Approximately \$400,000 per annum is earmarked to support new activities. Funding levels for new activities would generally range from \$5,000 to \$80,000 per annum depending on the scale and type of activity.

IVAIS is designed to provide base-level operational funding and it is expected that grant recipients will generate significant other income through art sales, fundraising activities, other government and philanthropic support.

One-off or new activities generally have a grant period of one to two years.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To be eligible, your organisation must:

- be one of the following entity types:
  - an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Corporation registered under the *Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006*
  - an organisation established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or State or Territory legislation
  - a company incorporated in Australia
  - a company limited by guarantee
  - an incorporated association
  - a not-for-profit organisation
  - a publicly funded research organisation
  - an Australian local government body
  - State or Territory Government
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN).
- be registered for the Goods and Services Tax, if required by the Tax Office
- have no overdue acquittals or serious breaches relating to Australian Government funding. A serious breach is one that has resulted in, or warrants, the termination of a grant agreement.

### Who is not eligible?

An entity is not eligible to receive a grant if it is:

- an individual
- unincorporated association
- overseas resident or organisation based outside Australia

### What the grant can be used for

The grant can only be used to:

- support the operations of Indigenous visual arts centres, hubs, marketing events and service organisations that provide professional support to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists in the production, promotion and marketing of their art
- provide opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists to develop, extend, market and generate income from their professional visual art practice
- provide employment and economic opportunities in the visual arts industry for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, particularly in remote communities
- provide opportunities for art centre staff, artists and board members to develop professional skills and gain experience
- contribute to strengthening the Indigenous visual art industry, including the delivery of professional services and support by industry service organisations

### Arts worker employment

IVAIS grant funds are also provided for the employment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander arts workers. Arts workers typically support the day-to-day functions of an art centre including, but not limited to, administrative assistance, studio technical assistance, artist support, art centre maintenance and community liaison.

### What the grant cannot be used for

Organisations cannot use the grant for activities that:

- are primarily focussed on community development or cultural maintenance
- will occur outside Australia
- have already occurred
- are the primary responsibility of other Australian, State or Territory government programs

The program does not fund visual art activities that focus on community development.

The Australian Government International Exhibitions Insurance (AGIEI) program is a funding program designed to offset insurance costs for touring major exhibitions of cultural material. Generally, these exhibitions include works from international collections.

### Overview

The program aims to assist cultural institutions to provide access to significant cultural material the Australian public would not otherwise have an opportunity to access. By providing assistance with insurance costs, the Australian Government is able to encourage and support the staging of major exhibitions drawn from some of the world's most historically significant and culturally rich collections.

The program delivers approximately \$2 million annually through a competitive funding round, with flexibility to consider additional out of round applications where significant opportunities arise. The program includes a two-stage application process which allows for in-principle support in the early stages of exhibition planning, followed by a final application closer to the exhibition opening.

### Priority

Criteria used to identify funding priorities and amounts:

- Funding contribution from other sources
- Geographical spread: the program aims to support venues across Australia and will prioritise tours that include venues that generally receive fewer international touring exhibitions. These include non-east coast venues (for the purposes of the program this means outside of Sydney, Melbourne, Canberra or Brisbane) and regional venues.
- Number of venues: multiple venue proposals will be prioritised over single venue proposals



- Partnerships
- Demonstrated ability to develop, manage and tour exhibitions of a similar nature to the proposed exhibition.
- Value for money

## Example

The following are general program funding scenarios for exhibitions:

- Single or multiple venue exhibitions which do not have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme (however described) applicants would be eligible to apply for the full cost of transit and static insurance.
- Single venue exhibitions which have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is only available in exceptional circumstances.
- Multiple venue exhibitions which have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is available for full costs of transit insurance. In addition, for those venues which do not have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is also available for static insurance. Funding for the full cost of transit and static insurance for venues with access to state schemes is available in exceptional circumstances.

Where an eligible exhibition is part of a broader international tour, funding for the cost of insurance for the exhibition's transit from and to another country would be determined on a case by case basis.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria:

Organisations eligible to apply for funding include Commonwealth, state and territory government collecting institutions; incorporated not-for-profit public collecting institutions, and incorporated not-for-profit bodies specialising in touring significant art and cultural collections. The proposal may be for either multiple or single venue exhibitions.

The cultural material in the exhibition must have a minimum value of:

- \$50 million for fine art exhibitions
- \$20 million for museological exhibitions.

The proposal may be for either multiple or single venue exhibitions.

Insurance cover may apply to multiple or single items within an exhibition that meets the minimum value threshold.

The exhibition is not eligible for support through a state indemnity scheme.

Applications from organisations with outstanding reports or financial acquittals from the AGIEI program, or from organisations that are otherwise in breach of an AGIEI funding arrangement, are not eligible for support.

### Exceptional circumstances:

Funding may be considered for proposals which do not meet the eligibility criteria (eg. where support is available through state indemnity schemes) under the following circumstances:

- The proposed exhibition supports, or is linked with, an event of special significance including but not limited to a commemorative anniversary, major international event such as CHOGM, G20, the Olympic Games, or an activity falling under a cultural Memorandum of Understanding.
- State capacity to contribute has been adversely affected by external events.
- Loans are conditional on use of the lender's preferred insurer or, for multiple venue tours, the provision of a single insurance policy. The level of state contribution will be a key consideration when assessing such proposals.
- The exhibition will tour to a venue outside of a major eastern Australian city (for the purposes of the program this means outside Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane or Canberra). State contributions will be considered in assessing such proposals.

Applications seeking support under exceptional circumstances will be considered on their merits on a case-by-case basis subject to funding availability.

Applicants are not eligible to apply for funding for:

- a commercial exhibition
- any costs of exhibition insurance incurred prior to funding being approved
- administration or management costs associated with obtaining insurance or meeting requirements stipulated by the insurer
- insurance of exhibition items such as plinths, display cases and frames (unless integral to the work).

### Purpose

Screen NSW provides location and production support to encourage screen projects to film in Sydney and NSW.

### Overview

The objectives of the location scouts and inbounds program include:

- To market NSW as Australia's premier screen production destination;
- To increase the State's market share of film and television production by attracting potential projects to film in NSW;
- To familiarise practitioners with NSW locations for their projects;
- To provide an opportunity to connect local and international practitioners with local technical and creative talent, studio and post-production and visual effects facilities for their projects and to support new and sustainable partnerships between organisations of International significance and local practitioners and facilities.

The program offers long-form footloose productions scouting assistance for location surveys for eligible projects and may include covering some of the costs associated with on-ground travel including accommodation, domestic flights, vehicle hire and location manager services. Applications for location inbounds and scouting assistance will be considered on a rolling basis at any time during the year and assessed against the following criteria by a member of the Screen NSW Production Attraction & Incentives staff, and considered by the Director of Production Attraction & Incentives:

- The proposed project is genuinely 'footloose' that is, is not already locked in to production in NSW;
- The proposed project is likely to create a significant economic benefit for the State in jobs and skills development and boost the profile of NSW worldwide;
- Demonstration of a proposed significant spend in NSW;
- Track record of the applicant and partners;
- The availability of funds;
- Alignment with Screen NSW organisational priorities.

Applicants to other Screen NSW programs are eligible to apply to this program but assistance is usually restricted to location advice and Reel Scout packages.

## Purpose

MADE IN NSW is a \$55 million fund over four years (2019/20 and 2022/23) to support the attraction to NSW of significant international and domestic feature film and major TV drama production.

## Overview

The program will create a pipeline of high-end screen production in NSW and build on the success of previous investment. The program will focus its investment in new film and TV projects that:

- significantly contribute to the NSW economy
- create high value jobs
- create new opportunities in western Sydney and regional NSW
- build the skills and capacity of established and emerging practitioners
- grow audiences; and
- contribute to NSW's reputation as the leading State in business and film.

## Limitations

Eligible projects:

- Feature films, telemovies, animation, mini-series and TV series
- International/Australian co-productions; and
- Fully internationally financed feature films and television projects from a local production companies

NOTE: eligible projects must be genuinely 'footloose', that is, not already locked in to production in NSW.

What qualifies as a NSW production expenditure?

Qualifying NSW Production Expenditure (QNSWPE) includes:

- Payroll subject to NSW Payroll Tax excluding payroll to non-NSW residents
- NSW workers' compensation payments
- Payments to a supplier of goods and services whose principal place of business is in NSW. Suppliers include independent contractors who are not subject to NSW Payroll Tax
- Payments to a supplier of goods and services which, although its principal place of business is outside NSW, has an office or branch in NSW which is supplying the goods or services, including fees and charges relating to the use of land within NSW
- Fees and charges relating to the use of land within New South Wales

- Inbound international or interstate travel to a NSW destination. Where a return fare is purchased fifty per cent (50%) of the fare qualifies as QNSWPE. The two-week rule for non cast members that is applied to the guidelines applies. That is the person must spend no less than two consecutive calendar weeks in NSW following arrival
- Inbound freight to a NSW destination
- Fringe Benefits Tax relating to benefits provided in NSW
- NSW Payroll Tax

But excludes:

- Goods or services which are sourced from outside NSW from a non-NSW supplier, even though they are used in the production of the project in NSW

## Purpose

The Museums & Galleries National Awards, or MAGNAs, began in 2011. They recognise excellent work nationally in the categories of exhibition, public programs and sustainability projects.

## Overview

The Awards are intended to:

- Encourage the continuous improvement and development of Australian museums and galleries
- Inspire and recognise best practice and innovation in the collecting sector
- Enhance the profile of museums and galleries in local and wider communities.

## Entry Levels:

Entry levels (per entry) are based on the project budget of that project/exhibition:

- Level 1: Project budget under \$20,000
- Level 2: Project budget \$20,000 - \$150,000
- Level 3: Project budget \$150,000 - \$500,000
- Level 4: Project budget over \$500,000

## Categories:

- **Exhibition or Gallery Fitout (Permanent):** A physical or virtual interpreted presentation of materials owned or borrowed by the institution.
- **Exhibition (Temporary/Travelling):** A temporary physical or virtual interpreted presentation of materials owned or borrowed by the institution.
- **Interpretation, Learning and Audience Engagement:** Community development and education projects developed by the institution to interpret and communicate the collection and stories.



- **Indigenous Project or Keeping Place:** A project or program developed specifically for Indigenous communities or by Indigenous people. May include gallery or exhibition development or interpretive programming and learning projects.

The awards ceremony will be held at the National Conference from the 18th - 21st May, 2020 in Canberra

## Limitations

### Eligibility:

Entrants must be an organisational member of Museums Galleries Australia.

### Conditions of Entry:

- The MAGNA Awards are open to all non-commercial museums, galleries, zoos, botanical gardens, historical societies, libraries, keeping places, science centres and other cultural and collecting institutions who are members of Museums Galleries Australia.
- Commercial galleries, auction houses and publishing interests are not eligible.
- Only members of Museums Galleries Australia are eligible to enter the MAGNA Awards.
- The MAGNA Awards are free to enter.
- Organisations can enter as many submissions as they want but each project/program can only be entered in one category.
- The Awards are not open to International entrants.
- Entries must come from organisations, associations or not-for-profit companies.
- Entries by individuals are not eligible.
- Entrants may submit multiple entries in any categories, but these can only be entered in one category.
- An impartial judging panel drawn from relevant sectors, and including a member of the museum-going public, will judge the entries.
- The judging panel reserves the right not to make an award in a category if it considered no award is merited; or to make a joint award in a category.
- Entries will not be returned.
- The winner of each entry will receive an award and certificate, and acknowledgement on the MGA website. Entries of high distinction will be recognised as Highly Commended.
- All entries will be credited as indicated on the entry form. Ensure the details on the entry form are correct and legible.
- By submitting an entry, the entrant grants permission to Museums Galleries Australia for the reproduction of winning entries for purposes of publicity and promotion at no charge; entrants must warrant they have the right to allow such use by Museums Australia.

### Entry Criteria:

Your project must have (mostly) been completed in the previous 12 months. We understand that some projects take more than a year to plan, develop and present. The main criteria is that it has not been entered before.

## Purpose

To support Australian and New Zealand songwriters and composers.

## Overview

APRA AMCOS support projects, events and organisations that benefit our members. Each year 1.75% of APRA's distributable revenue is allocated to fund hundreds of initiatives across the music industry in Australia and New Zealand.

Applicants must demonstrate how the project or organisation will benefit Australian and New Zealand songwriters and composers. APRA AMCOS' aim is to provide a funding contribution to projects that will help members to:

- Develop songwriting or composition skills
- Receive public recognition for their talent (awards or other forms of acclaim in Australia, New Zealand or overseas)
- Collaborate and co-write new songs or compositions
- Showcase their talent to a wider audience
- Further develop their music career by learning about the music industry

Through the Music Grants program, APRA AMCOS focus on supporting Australian and New Zealand songwriters and compositions, rather than funding recordings, recording artists, touring costs, or creative development projects that primarily benefit individual members.

Applicants can seek funding for any ONE of the following Grant Categories:

- **Awards and Recognition:** includes special events.
- **Industry Partners:** includes key organisations, peak music organisations special projects and small festivals.
- **Career Development:** includes APRA AMCOS branded events such as Songwriter Speaks, mentoring projects, craft development workshops and showcases.
- **Core funding:** includes peak music organisations (not special projects) and peak songwriting associations. Applications for this category should first be discussed with and approved by the Organiser.

## Priority

Preference will be given to:

- Projects or organisations that broadly benefit Australian and New Zealand songwriters and composers rather than an individual writer or a small number of writers.
- Applicants that can demonstrate a proven ability to plan and execute projects, or establish and maintain organisations that benefit Australian and New Zealand music.
- Organisations or projects which are non-profit in nature (although commercial projects are not excluded from eligibility)
- Applicants that demonstrate sponsorship or other financial contributions from third parties to the project or organisation. APRA Music Grants are not intended to fund your entire project.
- Applications that provide required budget information and support material.

## Limitations

Applications for an APRA AMCOS Music Grant may only be made by organisations or on behalf of projects whose primary aim is to promote the "use" or "recognition" of Australian or New Zealand musical compositions, not recordings or recording artists.

You are not eligible to apply if you have failed to acquit or meet the requirements of a grant received in a previous round.

## Purpose

The PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation provides grants to promote and encourage music and the music-related performing arts.

## Overview

The grants provided are non-recurring (i.e. one-off grants rather than a periodical payment) and are determined by the four trustees of the trust.

- Two (including the Chairman) are appointed by the PPCA;
- One is appointed by the Musicians' Union of Australia;
- One is appointed by the Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance (formerly Actors' Equity).

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for **one or more** of the following purposes:

- performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged
- scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education
- the promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public
- the aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income.

A grant under the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation can be used for costs associated with the above, including:

- Tuition fees
- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol)
- Accommodation
- Venue hire/ PA hire.

There is no specified limit to how much you can apply for. However, funds are finite and there is no guarantee that you will receive all or any of the funds you request.

It is unusual for grants to be approved in excess of :

- \$3,000 for an individual; or
- \$5,000 for a group or organisation

## Limitations

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Although the trust is discretionary, the trustees are guided by the 'purposes' articulated in the trust deed. As a result, it is not their usual practice to approve funding for any project of a commercial nature. This would include:

- investments in recordings (e.g., studio time, producers fees, session musician fees, manufacturing or distribution costs);
- concert or festival promotion or staging costs;
- tour support;
- artist management expenses; or
- equipment purchases.

You should also note that the trustees are unlikely to approve applications seeking funding for the majority of costs related to a project, and look to applicants to contribute and/or explore additional funding sources.

The Regional Performing Arts Touring program supports performing arts to reach regional and remote communities across Australia. Grants are available to support the net touring costs associated with a national tour.

### Overview

There is no limit on the amount that can be requested.

The Australia Council offers three grant rounds each year for Playing Australia. In 2020, the grant rounds will close on:

- Tuesday 4 February for projects starting after 1 May 2020 (11:59pm AEDT).
- Tuesday 2 June for projects starting after 1 September 2020 (11:59pm AEST).
- Tuesday 6 October for projects starting after 1 January 2021 (11.59pm AEDT).

Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application approximately 12 weeks after the closing date.

Peers will assess your application against the following four criteria.

- **Region**
  - The regional and remote coverage proposed by the itinerary.
- **Quality**
  - The artists and the arts workers involved the project.
  - The quality of proposed work.
  - The calibre of the company, including demonstrated evidence of good organisational planning, governance and management.
- **Engagement**
  - The plans to develop audiences and/or meet audience demand in the proposed locations.
  - Experiences offered to regional and remote communities – including audience attendance and where appropriate other participation activities, such as workshops and master classes.
  - Appropriate levels of engagement and partnerships developed with presenters to achieve audience goals.
- **Viability**
  - Evidence of a realistic and accurate budget.
  - The logic of the itinerary and the impact it has on the touring budget.
  - Appropriate level of support from other sources.
  - Capacity to deliver the project.

### Limitations

Who can apply?

Australia Council for the Arts accept applications from individuals and organisations.

Who can't apply?

You can't apply for a grant if:

- you received a grant, or administered a grant, from the Australia Council in the past and that grant has not been satisfactorily acquitted
- you owe money to the Australia Council.

What you can apply for:

You can apply for:

- interstate net touring costs, including freight, transport, accommodation and travel allowances outside of your home state
- a contribution towards tour coordination expenses.

What you can't apply for:

You can't apply for the following activity:

- projects where the performers and artistic personnel are not paid at Award rates
- projects that are to tour an international production
- touring projects that only include capital city or metropolitan presentations
- touring projects that do not include three or more interstate locations
- touring projects that only include presentations in schools
- tour dates that have already taken place
- projects with a budget in surplus.

In every project we provide funding for, we ensure that it is produced to the highest standards. We do this by including creative input and regular consultation as a condition of our investment.

#### **What we look for:**

##### ***Audience***

All projects must primarily target the Australian child audience and must, in our opinion, be likely to be of interest to Australian children.

Television projects should be aiming for either 'P' or 'C' classification as defined by ACMA for the commercial networks and Pay TV, or a G classification for ABC.

Feature film projects should be aiming for a 'G' or 'PG' rating from the OFLC Classifications Board.

For information on what constitutes a 'P', 'C' or 'G' or 'PG' program, have a look at the ACTF's FAQs.

##### ***Subject matter***

Projects may be based on an original idea, or adaptations of a novel or other work. We look for originality and new ideas not already in the marketplace or currently on television.

If the project is an adaptation of someone else's work (such as a novel, play, character or concept developed by one of the team), the applicant must obtain, or at least option, an assignment of all the necessary rights from the creator prior to making an application.

Options should have a reasonable length of time to run following any ACTF Development Funding approval to allow for the project's development, commissioning and financing.

Copies of all contractual documentation demonstrating that the applicant has obtained the necessary legal rights to deal with the material on which the project is based must accompany the application. If such options or chain of title documents are not provided with the application, the project will not be considered in that round.

Any project containing indigenous content, themes or story lines must be accompanied by written permission from the relevant indigenous community authorising the Applicant's use of such material.

##### ***Format and genre***

We provide funding for television series, one-off television programs, telemovies and feature films.

Before submitting an application for a television program, it is useful to familiarise yourself with the types of formats, series lengths and episode lengths broadcasters usually commission for your intended audience's age group.

Before submitting an application for development of a feature film it is worthwhile speaking with local distributors about their requirements in this area and their interest in the genre and age group.

Finance is open to all genres, but preference will be given to drama content which typically has higher development requirements than other genres.

##### ***Levels of Development funding***

We will only fund one stage of development on any project at a time. To develop a feel for the levels of funding and stages of development that we have previously funded, please look at the funding section of the ACTF website.

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

##### ***Applicant and Creative Team***

We will consider the experience of the creative team when assessing projects for funding. Whilst it does not require that all of the proposed team have experience in their relevant area, projects with a strong and experienced creative team are preferred.

##### **Priority**

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

Applicants should permanently reside in Australia or be Australian citizens. If the applicant is a company, it should be incorporated in Australia and have Australian-based management and control. We may require a personal company director's guarantee when contracting with companies.

We require all applicants to provide an Australian Business Number (ABN).

Funding is available for a wide range of arts and cultural activity, including:

Made available under the Regional Arts Fund allocation for NSW, Quick Response Grants offer funding of up to \$1,500 for regional artists, arts organisations and communities to respond to unique arts opportunities that present themselves at very short notice.

## Overview

Grants of up to \$1500 are available to support:

- Professional development opportunities for artists and arts workers involved in community programs that will increase their knowledge, skills and experience;
- Skills and or arts development for individuals and groups in regional communities through the employment of arts and cultural workers to conduct workshops, seminars and forums;
- Under exceptional circumstances, artists and/ or local community groups may apply to this program to assist in the costs of creative recovery projects for communities suffering from the impact of a natural disaster.

The Regional Filming Fund offsets costs associated with shooting in regional areas of NSW. Regional NSW is defined as all areas in NSW outside the Sydney Metro area (excluding the ACT).

## Overview

Screen NSW funds production of Australian projects in the following categories:

- feature films
- content-rich factual and documentary television or web programs and series
- adult and children's television drama and narrative comedy including series, miniseries, web series and telemovies
- animation productions
- creative interactive screen entertainment

Applicants may request up to 35% of the budgeted NSW Regional Spend.

NSW Regional Spend is the total of the below the line shooting expenses directly associated with filming in regional NSW. Eligible NSW Regional Spend expenses are limited to:

- local suppliers & services (e.g. construction contractors, security, traffic control etc.)

Support is provided as a grant. The maximum grant per production is \$100,000.

## Priority

Screen NSW is committed to supporting increased participation in the industry of people from under-represented groups including women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, people from CaLD backgrounds, people with disability,



LGBTQI people, people from western Sydney and people from regional NSW. Priority will be given to teams including people from under-represented groups.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible?

Screen NSW general eligibility requirements can be found in the [Screen NSW Terms of Trade](#), which should be read in conjunction with these guidelines.

- At least one of the Key Creatives must be NSW based.
- The production company must be registered in NSW and have its principal place of business in NSW.
- The production must film on location in Regional NSW for a minimum of five shooting days.
- At least 50% of the total budget must be expended in NSW.
- Productions must be fully financed at the time of application, with the exception of contributions being sought from Screen NSW and other state, federal or international agencies (Note: we will only consider an application where those agencies have confirmed their contribution or if the application has been submitted to a funding round running concurrently with the Screen NSW round).
- Productions that have been shortlisted for Screen Australia's Documentary Production Producer Program or Multi-Platform Drama Fund may apply.
- Feature films must have distribution in place.
- Television drama, narrative comedy and factual/documentary programs must have a financial commitment from a broadcaster, subscription service or distributor.

Screen NSW do not fund the production of:

- \*infotainment, lifestyle, travel, magazine, sports, education, game shows and other magazine- style productions
- current affairs and news programs
- community television
- shorts, short features (under 60 minutes)
- projects being developed as part of a course of study

The objective of the CCCF is to support child care services to address barriers to child care participation, particularly targeting disadvantaged and vulnerable families and communities.

### Overview

The expected outcomes of the CCCF are to:

- improve early childhood development outcomes for vulnerable and disadvantaged children
- increase workforce participation by vulnerable and disadvantaged families.

The CCCF is an ongoing program.

The objective of the CCCF Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity is to support continuity of child care, in particular in disadvantaged or vulnerable communities, where service viability is affected by an unforeseen factor outside the control of the service such as:

- a natural disaster or extreme weather event
- another unforeseen event or circumstance which would result in market failure for the community.

Up to \$9 million per year is available each financial year for allocation under the CCCF.

- any expense that is claimable under the service's insurance policy.

## Purpose

The Australian Government is providing an additional \$5 million in Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) special circumstance grant funding to support child care services in drought affected areas.

## Overview

An additional \$5 million in funding through the CCCF special circumstances grant was announced in November 2019.

This grant funding will help child care services experiencing financial pressure that puts the service at risk of closure due to the ongoing drought conditions.

This program complements a range of initiatives in the Step Up In Drought Budget Support package announced by the Government for drought-hit farmers, small businesses and rural towns.

Community Child Care Fund (CCCCF) Special circumstances grant opportunity is intended to support approved child care services that are:

- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community
- experiencing financial pressure and at risk of closure due to an unforeseen event or circumstance (including drought).

## Funding

Child care services in drought affected communities are eligible to apply for grant funding of up to \$10,000 under a streamlined process. The grant also allows for applications over \$10,000 where the service demonstrates greater financial need in order to continue providing child care in their community.

## Eligible drought affected areas

The **drought affected areas list** is based on the list of communities identified by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Cities and Regional Development for their **Drought Communities Programme**. The eligible communities were selected based on the level of need, determined using rainfall deficiency data from the Bureau of Meteorology, in conjunction with population and industry data (reliance on agriculture) to assess the overall economic impact of the drought in the region.

If a service is not located in an identified drought affected area and they require financial support, they can contact the CCCF team who can assist with grant funding on other grounds.

*Before applying, you should read and understand the grant guidelines.*

## Priority

Where relevant, funding preference will be given to services operating in an area of limited supply.

## Limitations

### Grant eligibility criteria

To be eligible to apply under this grant opportunity, the applicant must be:

- an approved provider under Family Assistance Law AND
- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community AND
  - at risk of closure due to viability issues resulting from an unforeseen event or circumstance, such as a natural disaster or extreme weather event OR
  - at risk of permanent closure due to another event or circumstance, where that closure would result in a lack of suitable child care (market failure) for the community OR
  - seeking to commence a new service in a community where another service has closed, resulting in a lack of suitable child care (market failure), and the new service will require funding to establish a viable operation.

Applicants will need to demonstrate that they are operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community, and/or that they are the only suitable service supporting a vulnerable or disadvantaged sector of their community.

## Overview

Financial assistance can be made available for almost any purpose considered necessary for the applicant's health and wellbeing, but the Trust is positioned as a provider of last resort assistance. Even then, due to the high demand for our limited resources, we can help only where needs are desperate and assistance is necessary to maintain the minimum standards of safety, security, protection and comfort for the individual or family. In cases where funding for expensive items of equipment is being sought, these items are to be retained by the organisation supporting the application as part of that organisation's equipment pool.

The following personal characteristics are indicative of some of the circumstances in which we may be able to assist:

- hold permanent Australian residency status or citizenship
- household income levels at or below the level of Centrelink benefits
- no major assets that could be realised
- no other resources that can be accessed (e.g. savings)
- families with young children, particularly single-parent families
- families with disabled children
- adults and children with disabilities particularly physical disabilities
- assistance has been sought/is being sought from other charitable organisations
- some unexpected catastrophic event has caused a crisis
- no assistance is available from family or extended family members
- time payment options have been exhausted in respect of utility and rental arrears if assistance is being sought for these items
- financial counselling, where appropriate, has been embraced in an effort to prevent future crises
- applicants have demonstrated some self-help behaviour and are endeavouring to plan for a viable lifestyle within their resources.

## Purpose

The Community Commemorative Grants (CCG) are designed to provide funding for local community-based commemorative projects and activities that directly commemorate the involvement, service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel in wars, conflicts and peace operations.

## Overview

This grants is part of the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program. The Australian Government is providing a total of \$1 million (GST exclusive) during 2019-20 for the Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program grants, with the funding pool divided between the **Major Commemorative Grants** and Community Commemorative Grants.

Grants up to a maximum of \$4,000 are available for local, community-based projects and activities.

These small grants are focused on the local community, commemorate the service and sacrifice of local community members, and are primarily accessed by the local community.

Some examples of CCG projects/activities include restoration of an honour board, purchase of a display cabinet for military memorabilia, and installation of a flagpole to display the Australian National Flag on days of commemoration.

The list below provides a guide to eligible grant projects and activities:

### Grants up to \$4000 include:

- Community War Memorials, Commemorative Plaques and Honour Boards - new war memorials, where none exists and where the new memorial will be the focus of community commemoration and the restoration of existing war memorials, honour boards/ rolls and plaques

### Grants up to \$3000 include:

- Restoration, Preservation and or/Display of Wartime Memorabilia - the preservation, interpretation and display of wartime and military memorabilia and artefacts.
- Commemorative Events - significant military unit reunions, i.e. 40th or 65th anniversary or the commemoration of significant military anniversaries, i.e. 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan. Note: Only one anniversary should be commemorated as it is considered that events to commemorate multiple anniversaries have the potential to diminish the significance of each anniversary. The event must be held within a month of the anniversary being commemorated.
- Publications/Website - the publication of wartime histories where similar works have not previously been published, i.e. unit histories, local wartime histories and letters from service personnel.
- Public Awareness Activity - significant cultural and educational projects, i.e. exhibition, with a military focus and that add to the sum of knowledge on a particular topic or which provide access to information about Australia's wartime heritage.
- School Initiative - school initiatives / projects undertaken by students which focus on military involvement and social impacts relevant to the community.

The assessment and notification of outcomes will be divided into three batches during the year. Each batch will contain applications that have been submitted to the grant opportunity over the preceding period. For example, the first batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity between the opening date of the application period and 3 July 2019. The second batch will contain all applications submitted to the grant opportunity over the next four months, ending 6 November 2019, and so on.

### Cut-off dates for all three batches:

- Batch 1: 3 July 2019
- Batch 2: 6 November 2019
- Batch 3: 1100pm AEDT on 31 March 2020.



## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria:

To be eligible you must be one of the following entity types:

To be eligible your grant activity must:

- Be a local community-based project or activity to a maximum of \$4,000 that directly commemorates the involvement, service and sacrifice of Australia's service personnel.

### Eligible expenditure:

You can only spend grant funding on eligible grant activities, including:

- a commemorative event (significant anniversary or reunion)
- a flagpole
- a publication
- an honour board or commemorative plaque
- digital content development (website or application)
- public awareness, cultural and/or educational activity
- school initiative
- display or restoration of wartime memorabilia
- war/peace memorials (new where none currently exist or restoration of existing)

### What the grant money cannot be used for:

The Department cannot provide a grant if you receive funding from another government source for the same purpose.

To improve circumstances for vulnerable members of the community, this program area supports organisations that seek to establish pathways for vulnerable individuals.

## Overview

The Community Wellbeing program area seeks to identify and support those organisations which have well thought out projects that seek to help vulnerable members of the community to overcome the challenging circumstances in which they find themselves.

To improve circumstances for vulnerable members of the community, this program area supports organisations that seek to establish pathways for vulnerable individuals such as: creating employment pathways for people with disabilities or otherwise vulnerable individuals assisting individuals and families at risk of or experiencing homelessness and all that goes with it.

Organisations of any size are encouraged to apply but the Foundation only considers grant applications in excess of \$100,000. Where appropriate such grants may be distributed over several years to total at least \$100,000, e.g. \$35,000 a year for three years. Smaller grants may also be considered.

## Overview

Ecstra Foundation is a new not-for-profit organisation working as part of the National Financial Capability Strategy, a network committed to building the financial capability of all Australians within a fair financial system.

Ecstra funds:

- initiatives that support consumer financial capability, inclusion and wellbeing through information, education, resources and programs
- collaborations that address the complex interaction between financial capability and personal health, income, employment, family background and social support structures
- initiatives that address the potential imbalances between consumers and financial service providers

- \$15,000 worth of travel with Jetstar anywhere on the Jetstar network
- Promotion of their community group or organisation on Jetstar's website and Facebook page
- National and local level media leverage to be facilitated by Jetstar PR agency partner

Criteria:

- The extent to which the community group or organisation is seeking funding to help enhance the lives of people in their local community in the areas of charity, health, sport, education or the arts.

Following the success of their work in Vanuatu and with the help of the Jetstar Flying Start Grant, the group is able to expand their initiatives into the Philippines.

The \$15,000 in flights will allow the establishment of regular communication channels between the global teams and the \$15,000 in cash will help to establish the local programs in Manila.

## Limitations

Entry is open to not-for-profit community groups and organisations of any size, who are seeking funding to help enhance the lives of people in their local community; and can be classified into one of the following categories.

- Charity
- Educational group or organisation
- Health group or organisation
- Sporting group or organisation

- Arts group or organisation

The community group or organisation should have a specific project in mind for how the grant will be used to benefit their local community.

## Purpose

Through IGA Community Chest and associated programs, well over \$80m has been raised to help local communities.

## Overview

IGA Community Chest raises funds to support local communities, charities and other worthwhile causes. It could be in response to a major event like floods or bush fires or something as simple as new soccer balls for the local under 8's.

The money is raised in a number of ways but predominately through the purchase of products with an IGA Community Chest logo on the label or ticket.

When you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label a percentage is credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account.

In most states IGA Community Chest beneficiary cheques are distributed throughout the year, meaning you can apply at any time.

### How are IGA Community Chest beneficiaries chosen?

There is a tiered system for choosing beneficiaries.

- For local activities the beneficiaries are chosen by the local stores
- Regional activities they are chosen by the region or group of stores
- State beneficiaries are chosen in consultation with the State Executive and Board.

Here is a couple of tips on becoming an IGA Community Chest beneficiary:

- It is best to approach your local IGA store directly. Prepare a pitch and it may include:
  - An overview of your organisation and/or the individual that you'd like supported;
  - What support are you looking for – monies, donations of goods, providing team jumpers, holding regular fundraising at the store, group registrations at the store, etc;
  - How the donation will be used and your timing.
  - Is there anything you can offer in return to IGA?
  - Don't forget to include your contact details.

## Example

**The Humpty Dumpty Foundation** The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Independent Grocers of Australia (IGA) made a significant difference to the lives of Sydney children. From January 2017, IGA made 11 donations across NSW and ACT to support much-needed medical equipment for hospitals to the value of \$150,000. IGA's support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation and the local community is immeasurable. The support to families in Sydney means children have access to medical equipment that is very much needed by the medical staff and, most of all, it is life-saving.

**Westmead Children's Hospital** Mint Fresh IGA in Baulkham Hills visited The Children's Hospital at Westmead in February to present a \$2,670 Aerogen Nebuliser to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The money for the nebuliser, which makes the administering of medications easier for children with respiratory illnesses.

**Moruya District Hospital** The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Dalmeny IGA purchase a piece of vital medical equipment for the Eurobodalla children. Local IGA retailers presented Moruya District Hospital with a jaundice detector valued at \$4,780 for the Maternity Unit. This jaundice detector is used to help clinicians determine the jaundice levels through the skin without harming the baby.

**MX550 Patient Monitor** IGA retailers and the Humpty Dumpty Foundation donated \$26,920 to fund a MX550 Patient Monitor for the Blacktown Hospital's special care nursery. The monitors are used daily to measure a child's blood pressure temperature, heart rate and respiratory rate to determine how well they are recovering from surgery.

The department will pay for reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs that you incur as a witness for the Royal Commission. These could include your solicitor's costs (e.g. attendance or preparation of documents) and disbursements (e.g. solicitor's travel, photocopying).

Legal financial assistance may be provided to an entity, as defined below, for their reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs resulting from:

- being called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a hearing of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to attend or attending an interview of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission, and/or
- complying with a notice to produce issued by the Royal Commission, and
- where the entity, excluding an individual, would not able to meet these costs without incurring serious financial hardship.

For the purposes of this opportunity entity means any of the following:

- an individual;
- a body corporate;
- a body politic;
- an incorporated body;
- an unincorporated body;

- another body or group not covered by paragraphs (a) to (e) that is formed for a common purpose, for example a consumer group.

For certainty, 'entity' includes a person who is an employee or former employee of any 'aged care service' defined in the Letters Patent issued on 8 October 2018 who is not representing that entity.

### Types of support:

VFFF provides support that falls under the following three categories:

**1. Core operations** This refers to organisational and administrative costs such as salaries and overheads that maintain the everyday operation of an organisation. VFFF primarily makes core operations grants for small to medium-sized organisations at a critical time of transition or development.

eg. Seed funding for CareerSeekers to establish the New Australian Internship Program. (\$200,000 over 3 years)

**2. Capacity Building** Capacity building grants aim to strengthen organisations by investing in core competencies such as business or operational planning, board development and governance, management capacity, staff training, leadership development and infrastructure. This support intends to enhance the ability of an organisation to operate more effectively beyond the conclusion of the grant.

eg. To establish the Northern Inland Aged Care Alliance, a group of nine residential care providers from New England and Northern Rivers, aiming to build viable not for profit aged care services in regional NSW communities. (\$50,000)

**3. Programs** This refers to costs that are directly related to the development, implementation, delivery and evaluation of a specific program or activity. Most VFFF grants under \$50,000 tend to be for programs as well as some larger grants.

eg. For Birrang to establish the Maranguka Driving Licensing Initiative to enhance social and economic participation among Indigenous people in Bourke, NSW. (\$223,832 over three years)

All organisations considering applying to VFFF are requested to read these guidelines and then contact them on (02) 9291 2727 before commencing an application. Applications can be made at any time.

## Limitations

VFFF makes grants to charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC). Grants between \$20,000 and \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW or Queensland. Grants above \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW.

VFFF does not provide funding for: Public fundraising appeals, Endowment funds established to provide a corpus for institutions, Disaster appeals or Political projects and/or lobby groups.

## Purpose

The grants provide small amounts of money that organisations and community groups can use to help their volunteers. The grants form part of the Government's work to support volunteers, as well as to encourage and increase participation in volunteering.

## Overview

The objectives of Volunteer Grants are to:

1. help community organisations to support the efforts of Australia's volunteers
2. help community organisations to support the inclusion of vulnerable people through volunteering
3. encourage, support and increase participation in volunteering.

The intended outcome of the program is to strengthen community functioning by increasing participation in volunteering.

Up to \$10 million is available in 2019-20. Funding of up to \$66,000 is available in each of the 151 Federal electorates.

Grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 are available to eligible not-for-profit community organisations. This funding is to be used to:

- purchase eligible small equipment items for use by volunteers
- contribute to volunteers' fuel costs
- contribute to transport costs for volunteers with disability who are unable to drive in association with their volunteering activity.
- assist with the costs of training courses for volunteers
- undertake background screening checks for volunteers.

**Note: To be eligible to apply you must be invited to apply by your Federal Member of Parliament. This is a new feature of this funding.**

**Contact your federal MP for more information about the grants and to register your interest.**

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To be eligible to apply you must:

- **be invited to apply by your Federal Member of Parliament**
- use a large proportion of volunteers in your organisation. At least 40 per cent of the organisation's staff must be volunteers
- be a not-for-profit organisation
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN) or be willing to provide a Statement by Supplier Form (reason for not quoting an ABN).
- have an account with an Australian financial institution

NOTE: If you are applying as a Trustee on behalf of a Trust, the Trustee must be an eligible entity as listed below.

be one of the following entities:

- Indigenous Corporation
- Company
- Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Corporate State or Territory Entity
- Non-corporate State or Territory Statutory Authority
- Cooperative
- Incorporated Association
- Statutory Entity
- Partnership
- Person aged 18 or over representing a volunteer based community group as an authorised signatory (eg president, chairperson, secretary, treasurer)

### Community groups that are not legal entities

Community groups that are not legal entities are eligible to apply for funding, however the application must be from an authorised signatory (president, chairperson, secretary or treasurer) within the community group. This means that:

- the individual, as a legal entity, is applying for the funding on behalf of their community group
- the individual will enter into a Grant Agreement with DSS
- the grant will be paid into the bank account of the community group represented by the individual
- the individual (aged 18 years or over) will be held legally responsible for making sure the grant is spent in accordance with the Grant Agreement.

The community group must operate independently with a formal governing structure that meets regularly and supports local community volunteers within its group.

The individual representing a community group must:

- be an authorised signatory (president, chairperson, secretary or treasurer) within the community group
- have obtained the full knowledge and agreement of the community group they are applying on behalf of
- provide the funding to the community group for expenditure on the requested items to benefit the volunteers of the community group
- keep evidence/receipts that document appropriate spending of the funding for five years.

### **Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?**

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- ***not nominated by your Member of Parliament***
- a Sole Trader
- a for-profit organisation
- a Non-corporate Commonwealth Entity
- a Non-corporate State or Territory Entity
- a Commonwealth Company
- a non-corporate Commonwealth Statutory Authority
- a Local Government Entity
- an International Entity

### **What the grant money cannot be used for**

You cannot use the grant for:

- items that do not directly benefit the organisation's volunteers
- advertising, logos, banners, display boards, uniforms, badging, or other things that advertise your organisation/ community group
- administration costs such as leasing, rental, hiring, labour, utilities, insurance and travel
- fees, charges, and subscriptions
- service charges, extended warranties and other labour costs
- conferences and functions
- vehicles and powered boats
- buildings, renovations and permanent fixtures - plumbing, kitchens, hot water systems, fencing, etc
- window coverings (such as curtains and awnings) and floor coverings
- consumable supplies - food, books, stationery (such as paper and folders), cleaning products, ink, toners, soil, sunscreen, maps, refilling of gas bottles, etc
- gift-cards (with the exception of pre-paid fuel cards)
- gym equipment, heart rate monitors.

Fuel costs that are not eligible:

- fuel already paid for by other sources
- fuel to operate the organisation's equipment, vehicles or machinery
- fuel used by paid staff, members or participants who are not volunteers of the organisation
- fuel costs to travel to and from a conference or event where the person is not volunteering.

Transport costs that are not eligible:

- transport already paid for from other sources e.g. State/Territory Governments, community groups
- transport which is not reasonably priced
- transport which is not for volunteering work
- travel for an organisation's paid staff
- travel for members or participants who are not volunteers of the organisation.

Ineligible training costs:

- costs that have already been paid for from other sources
- costs for courses that are not reasonably priced
- costs for the training of paid staff, organisational members or participants/clients of the organisation
- costs to meet the training expenses of other organisation's volunteers
- training materials, travel to and from training, and venue hire.

Background screening checks of volunteers that are not eligible:

- if they are already paid for from other sources or if they are not reasonably priced.

The Equipment and Facilities Grant Program supports schools and services to fund equipment and facilities that enable new services to establish and existing services to expand.

## Overview

Infrastructure Fund Objectives

The objectives of the Infrastructure Fund are to:

- Increase the number of approved before and after school care places for NSW government primary school children.
- Increase the number of NSW public primary schools with onsite Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) services in Metro and Inner Regional NSW.
- Increase the number of NSW public primary schools with access to OSHC services in Outer Regional, Rural and Remote NSW.

Applicants may seek up to \$30,000 (GST exclusive) for their project and applications will be assessed based on the level of demand for the increase in places and how well the proposed project will address the issue.

## Limitations

### Eligible applicants

NSW Government schools and not for profit OSHC providers or services supporting government school students that can demonstrate unmet demand and the capacity to establish a new service or to increase the number of approved places may apply for grants under the Program.

Applications must be submitted by an authorised officer, either:

- The school principal, if the proposed new service or service expansion is on a school site.
- A person legally able to enter into agreements on behalf of the approved provider or service provider, if the proposed new service or service expansion is not on a school site.

- Be supported with evidence of unmet demand for the service

- Have approval from Schools Infrastructure NSW (local Asset Management Unit) for any works proposed on a NSW government school site
- Request funding up to \$30,000 (excluding GST)
- Have any other required funding sources confirmed, if additional funding is required for the project
- Be for a service located in NSW
- Be for a legal activity

### What activities or projects can be funded?

Activities or projects are eligible for funding where the funding is to be used to increase the number of approved places for NSW government primary school children. This may be by establishing a new before and after school care service or expansion of an existing service.

The Equipment and Facilities Grants Program will support, but is not limited to, the activities and projects listed below:

- Kitchen upgrades and fit outs
- Air conditioning
- Office space
- Storage facilities
- Outdoor facilities - play equipment, seating, shaded area, vegetable gardens
- Furniture and soft coverings
- Project management (including tendering or regulatory costs)
- Necessary equipment to support additional places - Toys, games, educational resources

Any works which involve fittings or fixtures on Department sites will be owned by the Department (e.g. a new kitchen).

- Without landowner consent:
  - Projects on a NSW government schools require support from the School Principal and approval of Schools Infrastructure NSW
  - Projects not on NSW government schools require support from landowner if this is not the applicant
- That occurred prior to 1 July 2019
- Which increased approved places prior to 1 July 2019
- That received grant funding for the same increase in places from previous Infrastructure Grant rounds
- That are not aligned with NSW Department of Education policies
- At services outside NSW
- That aren't supported with the evidence of demand to increase places to the proposed amount
- That do not represent value for money.

- or be a non-Australian citizen/resident individual or organisation working in partnership with an Australian individual or organisation, where this will enhance Australian economic, cultural and social relations with the Arab world.
- and be willing to provide or develop child protection guidelines for your project if it involves people under the age of 18 years.

**What the grant money cannot be used for?**

You cannot normally use the grant for the following:

- capital expenditure, including purchase of real estate and vehicles
- purchase of equipment (for example, musical instruments, computers, videos, photographic or printing equipment)
- the covering of retrospective costs or recurrent funding of activities
- activities which are already commercially viable in their own right
- activities which will provide commercial advantage to the applicant (for example promotion of the applicant's own business)
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- subsidy of general ongoing administration of an organisation such as electricity, phone, rent, salaries (including for research assistants or administrative staff), honorariums or administrative charges levied by the applicant's organisation,

- Activities for which other Commonwealth, State, Territory or Local Government bodies have primary responsibility (for example academic research, assistance to business, development assistance projects), # activities undertaken by primary or high schools, including study tours, where travel by a significant number of students is the principal element of the proposal # scholarships to individual students, and # completed projects.

The NSW Training Awards are conducted annually by Training Services NSW to recognise outstanding achievement in the vocational education and training sector.

## Overview

There are 12 Award categories for the NSW Training Awards. They are:

#### Individual Awards:

The Award recognises the student's commitment to their formal studies at school, and in the workplace.



- **VET Trainer/Teacher of the Year:** The NSW VET Teacher/Trainer of the Year Award recognises innovation and excellence by a trainer/teacher providing nationally recognised training to students at a registered training organisation (RTO), or in partnership with an RTO.
- **VET in Schools Student of the Year (NSW only):** The NSW VET in Schools Student of the Year Award is open to full-time Year 11 or 12 school students undertaking accredited vocational education and training as part of their HSC studies.

### Organisation Awards:

- **Large Training Provider of the Year:** The Large Employer of the Year Award recognises a large enterprise which has achieved excellence in the provision of 'nationally recognised training' to its employees.
- **Small Training Provider of the Year:** The Small Training Provider of the Year Award recognises a registered training organisation that offers a specific range of training products and services and demonstrates excellence and high level performance in all aspects of vocational education and training.
- **Industry Collaboration Award:** The Industry Collaboration Award recognises exemplary skills development collaboration between at least one employer/industry body and at least one organisation delivering nationally recognised training.
- **Large Employer of the Year:** The Large Training Provider of the Year Award recognises a registered training organisation that offers a broad range of training products and services and demonstrates excellence and high level performance in all aspects of vocational education and training.
- **Medium Employer of the Year:** The Medium Employer of the Year Award recognises a medium enterprise which has achieved excellence in the provision of 'nationally recognised training' to its employees.

## Limitations

### Eligibility:

#### Apprentice of the Year, Trainee of the Year

Nominees must:

- be a permanent resident of Australia and undertaking training in New South Wales;
- have completed, or due to complete their training between 1 October 2018 and 29 September 2019 in a training course that leads to a nationally recognised outcome or qualification relevant to this award;
- have a registered training contract with the NSW Department of Industry;
- not still be enrolled in school;
- only be nominated by one nominator, either their registered training provider or employer;
- supply their Training Contract ID (TCID) number. If you do not know your TCID number, contact your local regional office on 13 28 11; and
- not be nominated in subsequent years for the same training contract.

#### Vocational Student of the Year

Nominees must:

- be a permanent resident of Australia and undertaking training in New South Wales;
- be a full-time or part-time student who is not undertaking an apprenticeship or traineeship;
- have completed, or due to complete, their vocational studies between 1 October 2018 and 29 September 2019, in a training course that leads to a nationally recognised outcome or qualification;
- only be nominated by their registered training provider; and
- not be nominated in subsequent years for the same qualification.

#### Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year

Nominees must:

- identify as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent; have completed, or be due to complete their training or vocational studies between 1 October 2018 and 30 September 2019 in a training course that leads to a nationally recognised outcome or qualification relevant to this award;
- have a registered training contract with the NSW Department of Industry and must supply their Training Contract ID (TCID) number OR, be a full-time or part-time student;
- not still be enrolled in school;
- only be nominated by one nominator, either their registered training provider, school or employer; and
- not be nominated in subsequent years for the same qualification.

#### School Based Apprentice/Trainee of the Year

Nominees must:

- be a permanent resident of Australia and undertaking training in New South Wales;
- have a registered training contract with the NSW Department of Industry;
- be undertaking/completing a Certificate II or above qualification through a School-Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship;

- supply their Training Contract ID (TCID) number. If you do not have the TCID number, contact your local regional office on 13 28 11; and
- be nominated by one nominator, either their registered training provider, employer or school.

To be eligible for this award, the nominee must currently be enrolled at school.

### **VET Trainer/Teacher of the Year**

- have delivered training in New South Wales between 1 January 2018 and 31 December 2018, which will lead/has led to nationally recognised qualifications or Statements of Attainment under the Australian Qualifications Framework national system
- must not have been selected as the NSW VET Trainer/Teacher of the year winner from the previous year. A one year gap must be present.

### **VET in Schools Student of the Year (NSW only)**

Nominees must:

- be a permanent resident of Australia and undertaking training in New South Wales;
- be undertaking accredited vocational education and training as part of their HSC studies;
- still be enrolled in school;
- not be undertaking a School-Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship; and
- be nominated by their registered training provider or school.

### **Large Training Provider of the Year**

To be considered a large training provider, your organisation must:

- be a registered training organisation or which the delivery of vocational education and training is the core business
- delivering 50 or more qualifications (which are listed on your scope of registration)
- only apply in the state or territory where the training is delivered

### **Small Training Provider of the Year**

To be considered a small training provider, your organisation must:

- be a registered training organisation for which the delivery of vocational education and training is the core business
- delivering less than 50 qualifications which are listed on your scope of registration)
- only apply in the state or territory where the training is delivered

### **Industry Collaboration Award**

## Purpose

To reduce crashes on Australian roads and to target those road locations where crashes are occurring.

## Overview

The Australian Government will provide \$744.5 million to the Black Spot Program from the 2013 to 2014 financial year to the 2021 to 2022 financial year, with an on-going commitment of \$60 million each year following.

Road crashes are a major cost to Australians every year. Black Spot projects target those road locations where crashes are occurring. By funding measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at dangerous locations, the program reduces the risk of crashes.

The Black Spot Program makes an important contribution in reducing the national road toll under the [National Road Safety Action Plan 2018–2020](#).

Anyone can nominate a 'black spot' for funding consideration, using the official nomination form. Candidate projects are first assessed by the relevant state road authority, which has details of the crash history of the site and the expertise to assess the appropriate treatment.

**Community Consultation** Widespread community consultation and participation is fundamental to this program, ensuring that local concerns are addressed.

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

**Coordination** States and territories play an important coordinating role. A Consultative Panel has been established in each state and territory. It consists of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry, the Australian Government, local government and state road and transport agencies. Panels provide comment to the Australian Government on nominations for Black Spot works.

**Rural Projects** More than 60% of road deaths and a significant proportion of serious injuries occur outside metropolitan areas. In line with national road safety policy objectives, approximately 50% of Black Spot funds in each state (other than Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory) are reserved for projects in non-metropolitan areas. This ensures that crash locations in rural areas are treated.

## Limitations

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

### What makes a site eligible for funding?

Funding is mainly available for the treatment of Black Spot sites, or road lengths, with a proven history of crashes. Project proposals should be able to demonstrate a benefit to cost ratio of at least 2 to 1.

For individual sites such as intersections, mid-block or short road sections, there should be a history of at least three casualty crashes over a five-year period. For lengths of road, there should be an average of 0.2 casualty crashes per kilometre per annum over the length in question over five years.

The requirement of a history of crashes ensures that those sites that have a recurrent problem are targeted first for treatment.

The Black Spot Program also recognises that there are road locations that could be considered as 'accidents waiting to happen'. Therefore, some program funds may be used to treat sites where road traffic engineers have completed a



Road Safety Audit and found that remedial work is necessary. This allows an opportunity for proactive safety works to be undertaken before casualties occur.

Funds cannot be used for the purchase of road-building plant or equipment, or for operational or maintenance costs.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

#### Primary Producer

When activated, grants are available to primary producers who meet the following criteria:

- You are a property owner, share-farmer or lessee in the grazing industry (as confirmed by your Land and Stock Return).

- Have fewer than 20 full time (or equivalent) employees;
- Under normal circumstances, derive more than 50 per cent of their total gross income from the small business enterprise.

- Are a registered business, partnership or sole trader with an Australian Business Number (ABN). If the business has applied to the ATO but not yet received an ABN, they may be considered eligible.

#### Not-for-profit organisations

When activated, grants are available to NPOs that meet the following criteria:

- They are located within the disaster affected area.
- They are incorporated charities or NPOs which are registered with the Australian Charities and Non-Profits Commission (ACNC) or an equivalent state regulatory body.
- These NPOs may include: non-profit schools, religious institutions, homeless hostels, aged persons homes, organisations relieving the special needs of people with disabilities, community child care centres, cultural societies, environmental protection societies, neighbourhood associations, public museums and libraries, scouts, sports clubs, surf lifesaving clubs, or traditional service clubs.

## Purpose

To provide support for people undertaking projects that will make a positive difference to the natural living environment, in land, sea or air, rural or urban.

## Overview

Grants are usually under \$10,000. The Foundation also grants on behalf of donors, and their programs can be over \$10,000 e.g. the landscape restoration and education grants. If you have a project over \$10,000, check with the Foundation first.

Universities and academics can only apply for up to \$5,000.

The Foundation is looking for projects around:

- flora and fauna conservation (Australia-wide)
- threatened mammal conservation (Australia-wide)
- landscape restoration and education (Victoria only)

These projects should involve any of the following:

- monitoring, recording and sharing data
- delivering community education
- providing community capacity building (e.g. training)
- research and science

Grants are awarded four times a year – February, May, August and November.

There are opening dates for these grant rounds, but no closing dates – a round is closed when a suitable number and spread of applications have been received to present to the Trustees. So it's best to get in as soon as you can when the round opens.

Here are dates when the rounds open and the application form appears online:

- 2nd December 2019 (funding released February 2020)- **closed**
- 1st April 2020 (funding released May 2020)
- 1st July 2020 (funding released August 2020)
- 1st October 2020 (funding released November 2020)
- 1st December 2020 (funding released February 2021)

The Trustees meet four times a year to decide on applications. If you apply in December, you find out in February. If you apply in March, you'll hear in May. If you apply in June, you'll hear in August. If you apply in September, you'll hear in November. See the Dates for applying page for dates. We can't fund retrospectively so make sure you get the dates right.

## Limitations

### Can you apply?

- Is your project about Australian flora and fauna conservation, threatened mammal conservation, or landscape restoration and education?
- Do you have partners?
- Is your project ready to go, and can you do it? Be sure before you apply.
- We fund projects as small as \$1,000, and sometimes fund over \$10,000, but grants are usually under \$10,000. Please don't just stick \$10,000 in the budget line – *we aren't a government agency and don't appreciate people asking for the maximum amount. Ask us for what the project **really** costs.*
- Universities – you can apply for up to \$5,000. But we don't fund pure research, you must be partnering with an 'on ground' group and be able to show it. **You must have a community partner.**
- All grant recipients must fill in a final report on-line at the end of their project. The signed grant conditions letter is your written agreement to this. Please don't apply unless you are willing to do this report. *If you don't report, you can't apply again.*
- If you're not sure whether to apply, email [Beth](#), who is more than happy to give advice before you make an effort to fill in the form. But please don't send documentation to read about your project.

### What will be funded:

- Projects that directly make positive changes to biodiversity conservation in Australia.
- Projects with long term objectives and values.
- Projects that show the following: enthusiasm, collaboration, passion, innovation
- Projects that use citizen science
- Projects that are about community education relating to conservation

### What we don't fund:

- Art projects

- School projects
- Advocacy
- Tree planting, fencing or pest plant or animal control
- Private property owners or farm projects
- Workshops alone, any workshops need to be a part of a larger project with an 'action' component
- Invasive monitoring
- Gardens- bush good gardens, sensory gardens, veggie gardens, chicken houses, water tanks, arboretums etc. (particularly in kinders and schools)- we're too small to fund all these projects around Australia so please don't apply
- Animal or wildlife refuges and their activities
- Pure academic research- academic applicants need to show how their research is directly linked to a community group doing conservation work. Research needs to be of benefit to those groups working on habitat or species conservation. eg. applications for research on how climate change will affect particular species without the research being done in conjunction with a group that can work towards conserving that species on the ground will not be accepted.

## Purpose

The objective of the Community War Memorials Fund is to help conserve, repair and protect war memorials across NSW to support community commemoration.

## Overview

The Community War Memorials Fund awards grants of up to \$10,000 (excluding GST). Grants for work to improve the accessibility of war memorials are capped at \$2,000 (excluding GST).

### Types of projects that might be funded:

- Specialist conservation advice for war memorials:
  - Condition assessment reports
  - Conservation management plans
  - Arborist advice for war memorial trees
  - Structural assessment reports
- Preservation work:
  - Protective measures for memorials e.g. repairs to damaged barriers and fences that surround and protect a memorial
  - Having protective coatings applied by a specialist conservator
  - Stabilisation of fabric
  - Painting
- Restoration work:
  - Removal of inappropriate accretions e.g. graffiti
  - Cleaning and corrosion removal by specialist conservators e.g. treatment of rusted original memorial gates or fences
  - Repairs to the damaged lettering on war memorial cenotaphs and rolls of honour e.g. regilding, repainting
  - Conservation and repairs to stonework on war memorials
  - Repointing mortar joints
  - Restoring war memorial landscapes to their original design, intent or purpose
  - Repairs to damaged sculptures
  - Replacement of decayed or missing elements where repair is not feasible
- Other:
  - Works to improve equitable access to a memorial (\$2,000 cap)
  - Relocation of memorials for public safety

**Important:** Applicants to the Community War Memorials Fund are expected to seek conservation advice from a qualified specialist before planning any physical work to a memorial.

The Community War Memorials Fund can award funding to pay for specialist heritage advice. If you do not have access to specialist heritage advice for your project, you should first submit a Community War Memorials Fund application for funding to have a condition assessment of your memorial undertaken.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria:

- Applications must be for an existing war memorial commemorating Australia's military heritage and the war memorial must be located within the State of NSW or, if located outside NSW, of direct and substantial relevance to the State.
- The definition of a "memorial" includes public monuments, memorial places, landscaped spaces, buildings, sculptures, trees and avenues as well as indoor fixtures such as honour boards, plaques, busts or bas-relief sculptures.
- An application may be made by any organisation, provided the owner or custodian of the memorial, local RSL sub-branch and local council support the bid, where applicable
- Before applying to the Community War Memorials Fund the memorial must first be recorded on the Register of War Memorials in NSW ([warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au](http://warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au)).
- Applications must be for the repair, protection and/or conservation of existing memorials.
- Applications relating to memorials located on either private or public property are eligible for funding, however the memorial must have a public function and be accessible to the public.
- The State War Memorials Committee will announce grants biannually, with applications closing on Anzac Day and on Remembrance Day. However, the Committee may make extraordinary grants as circumstances require.
- Applications to fund works that have already been completed are not eligible.
- The State War Memorials Committee may in extraordinary circumstances approve applications that do not meet all of the above criteria.

Projects that are not funded by the Community War Memorials Fund:

- Work that does not meet the eligibility criteria
- Inappropriate work and methods that do not align with best practice heritage conservation

- Work that has already been started or completed
- Constructing new war memorials
- Replacing existing war memorials
- Adding of new commemorative elements e.g. plaques, service badges
- Maintaining or replacing flagpoles
- Adding names to war memorials
- Capital expenditure for the purchase of assets e.g. office furniture, equipment
- Costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- Council approval costs
- Ongoing expenditure, i.e. website hosting, memorial maintenance
- Projects relating to the display of military memorabilia
- Work to graves
- Seating for war memorials
- Interpretive signage
- Work to war memorials that are not recorded on the NSW War Memorials Register

## Purpose

The Volunteer Museum Grant Program provides assistance to volunteer-initiated community museums and Aboriginal Cultural Centres (with artefact collections and displays) in NSW.

## Overview

This is a Create NSW devolved funding program, administered by Museums & Galleries of NSW (M&G NSW) on behalf of the NSW Government. The program provides access to funding for collection-focused projects, in addition to providing experience in the grant application process.

Leg Up Grants are “quick response” grants for volunteers in volunteer managed museums and Aboriginal Cultural Centres who require financial assistance to attend some form of skills development activity, or to bring such an activity into their museum.

### Amount available

The maximum amount that can be applied for under the program is: \$500

Note: Leg Up Grants require funding from Museums & Galleries of NSW to be matched dollar-for-dollar by the applying museum/cultural centre.

### Timeframe

Leg Up Grants can be applied for at any time throughout the year, until all funds are expended. Acquittals are due two months after the completion of the activity.

## Purpose

The Maritime Museums of Australia Project Support Scheme (MMAPSS) provides funding support to incorporated not-for-profit organisations caring for Australia's maritime heritage.

## Overview

**Objective** The objective of MMAPSS is to assist eligible organisations to:

- develop and implement objectives for collecting, managing, organising, preserving, conserving and communicating objects and/or collections of maritime significance;
- undertake projects that will increase standards of practice for the care and management of maritime objects and/or collections of significance; and
- provide quality public access to objects and/or collections of maritime significance through display, interpretation and community involvement.

Funding of up to \$15,000 is available to eligible organisations for projects that will increase standards of practice for the care and management of maritime objects and/or collections of significance. The object or collection must contribute to an understanding of Australia, its people and developments which have influenced its maritime history.

Joint submissions are encouraged with one or more organisations, and applicants may submit an application for more than one project although each organisation is only eligible for one MMAPSS project grant per year.

Funding for projects will be awarded to cover a 12 month period from 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021 for projects beginning in or after 30 June 2020. Funding can not be used for costs incurred before this date.

## Priority

Applications for projects with an education focus and or which involve intellectual development and input will be given a high priority. Preference will also be given to applications that can demonstrate good and effective planning.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To be eligible an organisation must:

- be an Australian legally incorporated not-for-profit organisation, such as a museum, historical society, or community based organisation;
- be actively involved in collecting, preserving, interpreting and exhibiting Australia's maritime heritage; and
- have a collection that is accessible to the public.

An organisation is not eligible if:

- the collection is privately owned;
- the collection is not accessible to the public, such as a club where access is restricted to members only;
- it is a major national, state or territory collecting institution; or

MMAPSS provides funding support for projects and internships that would not be eligible for other sources of funding. Projects and internships deemed eligible to apply for other funding schemes will be considered a low priority.

## Purpose

The National Cultural Heritage Account helps Australian public cultural organisations buy significant objects that they could not otherwise afford.

## Overview

A total of \$500,000 is available each year. You can apply at any time. Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis.

The National Cultural Heritage Account keeps Australian protected objects in Australia so they can be preserved and made available to the public.

Cultural organisations that can care for and provide permanent public access to Australian protected objects have a priority for funding.

Individuals can also apply if they intend to gift the object to an eligible cultural institution with a permanent public collection. In these cases, the grant and the gifting of the object must be simultaneous.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups can apply for funding even if they do not have a permanent public collection. This is because of the special significance of Class A objects of heritage to Indigenous communities.

### How to apply:

You must apply in writing to us.

Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis and usually covers a proportion of the fair market value of the object. Fair market value is determined by recent auction prices or the actual price paid.

The [National Cultural Heritage Committee](#) considers applications and provides recommendations to the Minister for the Arts.

You might be asked to provide at least two independent valuations from valuers approved under the Commonwealth's Cultural Gifts Program.

## Priority

The following Australian protected objects are priorities for funding:

- Class A objects in Australia and overseas
- Class B objects that have been denied an export permit
- Class B objects that have been granted an export permit on condition that they be available at fair market value for purchase by an eligible cultural organisation
- Class B objects that are overseas.

## Purpose

The 1,000 Jobs Package provides wage subsidies to support increased employment opportunities across remote Australia. Eligible employers could receive financial support for up to two years to hire Community Development Program (CDP) participants in ongoing jobs.

## Overview

Tranche Two of the 1,000 Jobs Package has a General stream and Youth Engagement Jobs (YEJ) stream. The General stream is open to any industry, if the proposed job and employer meet the eligibility.

The YEJ is for employers who want to create jobs to work with young people to strengthen their engagement with their culture and community and/or promote mental health and social wellbeing. YEJ can be filled by CDP Participants of any age and should be tailored to the needs of the local community.

### Grant amount and grant period

Over two years, eligible employers could receive:

- a wage subsidy of up to \$51,000 (GST exclusive) paid at an hourly rate in arrears.
- a retention bonus of up to \$5,000 (GST exclusive) for retaining a CDP participant in employment, paid in instalment.
- Tranche Two includes a Youth Engagement Jobs stream for employers who create employment opportunities for CDP participants to work with youth. Jobs under the Youth Engagement Jobs Stream are eligible for additional incentives, including:
  - a commencement payment of \$1,000 (GST exclusive) for employers.
  - an employee bonus of up to \$2,000 (GST exclusive) for remaining in employment, paid in instalments. Payments will be made to employers to be passed on to employees.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

To be eligible, a job must:

- be new
- be ongoing (an employer should have no known reason why the job would not continue)
- be part-time or full time for a minimum of 15 hours per week and up to 38 hours per week
- employ a current CDP participant in the job (at the time of employment)
- be located in a CDP region
- involve a normal employer/employee relationship.

To be eligible an employer must:

- have consulted with a representative of the NIAA on the job
- have consulted with the local CDP Provider on the job
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be registered for the purposes of GST
- have an account with an Australian financial institution
- be compliant with the relevant Commonwealth and state/ or territory legislation including but not limited to work place health and safety and workplace equality
- be one of the following entity types:
  - an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Corporation
  - a company incorporated in Australia
  - incorporated Associations
  - incorporated Cooperatives
  - organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or state/territory legislation including public benevolent institutions, churches, universities and Land Councils
  - an Australian state or territory government body
  - an Australian local government body
  - an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
  - a partnership or a joint (consortia) application with a lead organisation that satisfies the entity type
  - an individual with an ABN.
- Be financially viable.
- Have rectified any issues of previous non-compliance with existing Commonwealth agreements to the satisfaction of the Commonwealth, or be in the process of rectifying any issues of non-compliance with existing Commonwealth agreements to the satisfaction of the Commonwealth.

A job is not eligible for a grant if it:

- displaces an existing employee (with the exception of a job currently filled on a drive-in, drive-out or fly-in, fly-out basis)
- is a casual job
- is a religious occupation
- is to be fully funded under a Commonwealth, state or territory government program – employers can only claim for the unfunded portion of the job
- involves work that is not suitable and safe
- is likely to bring the program or the Commonwealth into disrepute

- is involved in the delivery of services under an executed CDP Funding Agreement (with the exception of a job funded under the YEJ stream).

An employer is not eligible for a grant if they are:

- engaging an employee to be employed under the Public Service Act 1999
- declared bankrupt or subject to insolvency proceedings – as relevant to the entity type
- listed as non-compliant under the Workplace Gender Equality Act 2012; or
- any organisation not included in the list above.

### Additional YEJ stream eligibility

A YEJ stream job must:

- meet all the Tranche Two general eligible criteria
- have duties that are primarily focused on working with youth to strengthen their engagement with their culture and community and/or promote mental health and social wellbeing.
- be filled by CDP participants that have (or have the ability to gain prior to employment) appropriate registrations or qualifications (i.e. working with vulnerable people registration).

### How much funding is available?

There is **no upper limit** to the amount of funding you may request.

However, to be competitive, you must provide a level of detail in your written application, support material and budget appropriate to the level of your funding request.

This expectation will vary according to the following levels of funding request:

- applying for less than \$20,000
- applying for at least \$20,000 but less than \$140,000
- applying for \$140,000 or more.

- you are applying for filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

Funding is not available under this program for the following activities:

- projects that do not identify and acknowledge Aboriginal cultural authority and agency
- where cultural knowledge or guidance is being utilised, but cultural knowledge holders are not being recompensed
- filmmaking, screen production, mainstream animation or film festivals

The Discovery Indigenous scheme objectives are to:

- support excellent basic and applied research and research training by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers as individuals and as teams;
- support national and international research collaboration;
- enhance the scale and focus of research in Australian Government priority areas; and
- support and retain established Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers in higher education institutions.

The intended outcomes of the Discovery Indigenous scheme are:

- expanded knowledge base and research capacity in Australia; and
- economic, commercial, environmental, social and/or cultural benefits for Australia.

## Funding Available:

- a salary at one of five levels for the DAATSIA recipient, for up to five consecutive years on a full-time basis

- To be eligible to apply as a DAATSIA candidate, the individual nominated must be an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researcher; as at the grant opportunity closing date not be nominated for more than one DAATSIA in any given year.
- To be eligible to apply as a CI, DAATSIA candidate or Partner Investigator (PI), the individual nominated must as at the grant opportunity closing date; have met their obligations regarding previously funded projects, including submission to the ARC of satisfactory final reports.
- A CI or DAATSIA candidate must meet at least one of the following criteria at the grant commencement date: be an employee for at least 20 per cent of full time equivalent (0.2 FTE) at an Eligible Organisation; or be a holder of an honorary academic appointment at an Eligible Organisation.
- A CI or DAATSIA candidate can be concurrently funded through the Discovery Program for a maximum of: two projects as a CI or one ARC Fellowship and one project as a PI; or one ARC Fellowship or project if the individual is also a Director on an active ARC Centre of Excellence or a Special Research Initiative project. Limits will be calculated at the closing time for submission of applications, and may be re-calculated as other grant opportunity announcements are made.

## Purpose

The Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Grant (EDAEG) initiative aims to promote diversity, innovation and service responsiveness in the NSW workforce by subsidising the salary, development and support costs of Aboriginal employees in public service agencies or local government authorities.

## Overview

The objectives of the Grant are to:

- encourage the permanent employment and professional mobility of Aboriginal people in NSW public service agencies and local government authorities, with special incentives for the employment of Aboriginal people with a disability, and
- promote innovation in achieving education, employment and training outcomes for Aboriginal people.

The EDAEG comprises three elements.

### 1. Permanent (Ongoing) Employment – \$30,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant to subsidise the permanent employment of an Aboriginal person.

The proposed position must be at a minimum Clerk Grade 7 or above, based on the Crown Employees (Public Sector – Salaries 2018) Award or equivalent for local government authorities. An existing mainstream position can be converted to an Aboriginal Identified position, on the condition that the position remains a permanent Aboriginal Identified position in your organisational structure.

### 2. Temporary (Term Employment) Secondment – \$20,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the salary cost of a temporary position (Minimum six months, up to twelve months) that will provide a significant skill development opportunity for an Aboriginal person who is already permanently employed in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

Agencies may apply for funding of graded positions at the minimum grade 5 or equivalent of Local Government Authority that shows career mobility and progression for an Aboriginal person. Funding amounts are based on the below table

Grade	Grant Amount	Approx. Salary
5-6 (or equivalent)	\$20,000	\$83,000*
7-8 (or equivalent)	\$30,000	\$94,000*
9 and above	\$40,000	\$108,000*

*\*This amount is inclusive of superannuation and any other employer entitlements.*

*\*If the position for either the Permanent or Temporary Element is part-time a Pro-rata amount will be calculated against the positions proposed hours.*

### 3. School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SBAT) – \$10,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the creation of a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship for an Aboriginal student in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

The Apprenticeship or Traineeship must be established under the provisions of the Apprenticeship and Traineeship Act 2001; approved by the Board of Studies; and contribute to the attainment of the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

## Limitations

### Eligibility

The EDAEG provides funding to organisations (not individuals) to support Aboriginal education, employment and training.

Organisations applying for funding under the EDAEG must be registered, based in NSW and provide services within the State.

To be eligible, organisations must be a:

- NSW public service agency; or
- NSW local government authority operating under the Local Government Act 1993

### Ineligibility

Grant applications will be deemed ineligible for the following circumstances:

Permanent and Temporary:

- positions that form part of an organisation's bulk or annual recruitment intake;
- existing positions within an organisations staffing structure (Unless a permanent position has been converted to an identified role);
- a position(s) that has previously been funded under the Grant;
- employment of a person who was unemployed (Temporary element); or
- a position(s) that has been filled prior to applying for EDAEG.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs.

SBAT:

- an apprenticeship or traineeship position has been already filled prior to the organisation's application to the EDAEG i.e. no retrospective funding.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs. The Department will consult with other Government agencies when it considers the funding application. Applicant organisations will need to advise the Department on the application form whether they have applied or have received other Government funding for the project.

To be an 'eligible documentary credit' under this program, a project must be a broadcast half hour or longer and have:

- been broadcast by a recognised broadcaster or channel; or
- had a commercial theatrical release; or
- been invited to screen at IDFA, Hot Docs, or equivalent.

Note that credits must fall within the definition of 'documentary' set out here. Corporate, education, training, sports, news programs etc are not acceptable.

The NATSIFAC Program funds service providers to provide flexible, culturally appropriate aged care to older Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people close to their home and/or community.

## Overview

The grant opportunity is intended to support special measures for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people by assisting NATSIFAC Program service providers, in locations where higher costs and reduced capacity to generate revenue constrain their ability to replace equipment, undertake building maintenance and upgrades, and provide quality, safe staff accommodation. The grant opportunity will assist service providers to deliver culturally safe, quality aged care services.

The key objective of the grant opportunity is:

- to provide a bi-annual funding opportunity to help NATSIFAC Program service providers address a clearly identified need, that:

- supports the delivery of aged care services; and - addresses the need for equipment purchase and replacement, minor building upgrades and construction of staff accommodation (refer to Glossary for definition).

The outcome of this grant opportunity is to support the delivery of safe and quality aged care service delivery to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

## Funding available

This grant opportunity provides up to \$4 million (GST exclusive) in 2019-2020. The maximum amount of funding available is:

- up to \$800,000 (GST exclusive) per service per aged care staff accommodation unit (maximum of two units);
- up to \$500,000 (GST exclusive) per service for minor renovations or upgrades to existing building/s; and
- up to \$100,000 (GST exclusive) per service for training, the purchase or replacement of equipment.

If an organisation is applying for funding for two or more services, a separate application must be submitted for each service location.

A separate application must be submitted per category and must not exceed the maximum amount of funding per category.

The grant period and time frame for spending the grant money will be dependent on the grant funding applied for, i.e. staff accommodation construction may take up to 2 to 3 years to complete; whereas purchase and installation of equipment may be completed within 3 months

## Priority

Funding will be prioritised to services located in geographical locations 6-7 under the Modified Monash Model.

The Modified Monash Model (MMM) is the Department of Health's classification system that categorises metropolitan regional, rural and remote areas according to both geographical remoteness and town size. Further information is available here: [Doctor Connect MMM Map Locator](#).

The department is unable to advise you of your eligibility to apply or of your MMM category. Potential applicants can find the classification of their location by using the Doctor [Connect MMM Map Locator](#).

## Example

Eligible grant activities may include but are not limited to:

- purchase of medical aids and equipment;
- purchase of other equipment assets directly related to the provision of aged care services, such as lifting devices, commodes, trolleys;
- building maintenance and upgrades of aged care assets;
- upgrades to utility services;
- upgrades to fire safety equipment;
- installation of security equipment and duress alarms; and
- staff accommodation

## Limitations

### Who is eligible to apply?

To be eligible you must be currently funded to deliver aged care services under the NATSIFAC Program

### Eligible activities

This is one off funding to meet an identified need. To be eligible your grant activity must:

- be consistent with the objective and outcome of this grant opportunity;
- be undertaken at the funded aged care service or an associated staff house;
- be limited to the maximum amount offered;
- include full quotes, including freight, installation and other ancillary costs by at least two suppliers.

### Eligible expenditure

You can only spend grant funds on eligible expenditure you have incurred on the agreed grant activities as defined in your grant agreement. The following expenditure must be included in your quotation(s):

- Freight, installation and other costs associated with the connection of equipment (e.g. hot water services) to essential services;
- travel for third parties (i.e. certifiers, tradesman), where the travel is essential to the successful completion of the grant activity; and
- insurances that are specifically required to cover the grant activity.

You must incur the expenditure on your grant activities between the start and end date of the funding period for it to be eligible.

The Decision Maker will make the final decision on what is eligible expenditure and may give additional guidance on eligible expenditure if required.

### What the grant money can *not* be used for

Bi-Annual grants must not be used for activities or items that are non-essential to aged care delivery or already funded under existing grant agreements. This includes construction of new aged care facilities and large-scale repairs to existing buildings and infrastructure.

In addition, Grants **must not** be used for:

- purchase of land or existing property;
- coverage of retrospective costs;
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation;
- major construction/capital works which consist of the purchase or construction of a new aged care facility, the demolition (whether or not followed by the replacement) and extensive renovation projects;
- activities that could bring the Australian Government into disrepute;
- staff accommodation not related to aged care service delivery, including re-housing, supported accommodation, large scale household removalist expenses, construction and large-scale repairs, beyond provision of linkages to accommodation services;
- medical aids, appliances and devices which are to be provided because of a medical diagnosis or surgical intervention and which would be covered under a Health Care system. Where items are required for the operation of the Activity, the item remains the property of the service provider;
- household items which are not related to the functional impairment (refer to glossary for definition) (i.e. general household furniture or appliances) – for care recipients not provided with residential based care;
- the lease or purchase of personal items;
- items which are likely to cause harm to the care recipients or pose a risk to others;
- ongoing operating (recurrent) costs (e.g. ongoing rent, utilities, salaries, insurances, maintenance contracts etc);
- travel for staff of the aged care service or aged care provider; and
- provision of aged care service delivery.

## Purpose

Prescribed Bodies Corporate (PBC) Capacity Building Funding is available to provide support PBCs maximise the economic and social potential of native title through the effective and sustainable management of their land.

## Overview

The primary objective of this funding is to assist PBCs generate economic benefits through the effective and sustainable management of their land. This funding aims to contribute to the outcomes described in Annexure 1 (Section 22) of the IAS Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme, with a particular focus on the outcome 'Indigenous Australians use their land and sea assets to create economic and social benefits'. This funding will support this outcome by building the capacity of PBCs to maximise the economic and social potential of native title.

### What can be funded?

There are three elements to this funding:

1. direct support to increase the capacity of PBCs to take advantage of economic opportunities;
2. support for training to build long-term organisational capacity within PBCs and to procure professional expertise (for example, business or agribusiness consultancies, accountancy or legal services); and
3. direct support for effective native title agreement-making.

It is strongly recommended all potential applicants discuss proposals with their local PM&C Regional Network office in the early stages of development and before preparing an application.

### How much funding is available?

A total of \$20.4 million is available over the first four years, comprising:

- \$2.519 million in 2015-16;
- \$5.037 million in 2016-17;
- \$6.296 million in 2017-18 and
- \$6.548 million in 2018-19.

Funding for the programme is ongoing, but funding amounts have only been allocated until 2018-19.

## Limitations

### Who can apply for funding?

All PBCs are eligible to apply for the funding. Native Title Representative Bodies and Service Providers (NTRBs-SPs) and other third parties, for example, law firms and interest groups, can also apply to receive and administer the funding on behalf of, and with the authorisation of, one or more PBCs.

Applicants must also meet all eligibility criteria outlined in the IAS Grant Guidelines, and undergo financial viability checks and a risk assessment.

### What cannot be funded?

Activities which will not be funded are stipulated in the IAS Grant Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme. These activities include but are not limited to:

- applications that do not clearly address at least one of the IAS programme streams
- activities that are more appropriately funded by other Government agencies (including State/Territory and local Government) under their priorities
- retrospective items or activities, and

- costs reasonably covered by proponent parties.

PBCs will not be funded for costs that would be payable under the 'Basic Support Funding' under the Native Title and Land Rights Activity under the Jobs Land and Economy Programme and administered by NTRBs-SPs, as this would duplicate available funding.

While eligibility for PBC capacity building funding is restricted to PBCs or support for PBCs only, PBCs can apply for funding under other IAS funding streams and Australian Government programmes. PBC capacity building funding is intended to complement other sources of grant funding. A specific activity cannot be funded under more than one programme.

## Purpose

Tailored Assistance Employment Grants are available to provide funding to connect working age Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples with real and sustainable jobs, as well as support Indigenous school student's transition from education to sustainable employment.

## Overview

The Department invites applications for grant funding for activities that primarily contribute to employment outcomes.

The objectives of the programme are to:

- Get Indigenous Australians into work.
- Get remote jobseekers work ready, through community and other activities and work experience.
- Foster Indigenous business.
- Assist Indigenous Australians to generate economic and social benefits, including through the effective and sustainable management of their land.
- Assist Indigenous Australians to progress land and sea claims and township leases under Commonwealth native title and land rights legislation.

## What can be funded?

This open grant funding process will support services or activities that will have a positive impact on the Government's priority area of:

1. Employment— The primary aim is to support activities for Indigenous Australians to overcome disadvantage in the labour market, connect them to real and sustainable jobs, to gain experience that builds work-readiness and

contributes to the broader community. Sustainable employment implies an ongoing job which is not dependent on continuous government funding. The ongoing job may be part-time or full-time.

2. Indigenous participants prioritised for support will include youth, school leavers at risk of disengaging or long term unemployed, those not in the labour force, jobactive Streams B & C job seekers, those in the Community Development Programme (CDP) and Disability Employment Services (DES are considered disadvantaged).

The types of activities that may be funded include:

- Tailored assistance to support employers to engage and retain Indigenous jobseekers into real and sustainable ongoing jobs, as well as address barriers to recruitment and retention.
- Support for Indigenous senior school students to gain work exposure through School Based Apprenticeship/ Traineeship activities, including activities that support and school students to transition from education into sustainable employment or further education/training.

The Department encourages applications for the funding of activities tailored to local circumstances with the involvement of Indigenous communities.

Where funding is available, organisations will be able to apply for Tailored Assistance Employment grant funding at any time.

Potential applicants are encouraged to discuss their proposal with their **local PM&C Regional Network office** before preparing an application.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

#### Organisation:

To be eligible for grant funding under the IAS, applicants must be a legal entity and have full legal capacity to enter into a Project Agreement with the Commonwealth. For example, applicants may be:

- Aboriginal Corporations (incorporated under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006 and administered by the Office of the Registrar of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporations [ORIC]).
- Incorporated Associations (incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Association' or 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name).
- Incorporated Cooperatives (also incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name).
- Companies (incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 – may be not-for-profit or for-profit proprietary company (limited by shares or by guarantee) or public companies).
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or State/Territory legislation (many public benevolent institutions, churches, universities, etc.).
- A partner on behalf of a Partnership.
- Trustees on behalf of a Trust.
- State/Territory or Local Governments.
- Where a particular need has been identified, the Department may also consider an individual or individuals (either jointly or separately) for contractual arrangements.

An unincorporated association is not a legal entity and will not be contracted by the Department.

Community groups that may not be eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible organisation.

#### Individual:

While it is expected that grant funding will primarily be provided to organisations, individuals will not be precluded from receiving grant funding, unless otherwise specified in the application documentation.

#### Incorporation requirements:

All organisations receiving grant funding of \$500,000 (GST exclusive) or more in any single financial year from funding administered by the Indigenous Affairs Group within the Department are required to:

- Incorporate under Commonwealth legislation – Indigenous organisations will be required to incorporate under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006; with other organisations incorporating under the Corporations Act 2001.
- Maintain these arrangements while they continue to receive any level of such funding.

#### What cannot be funded?

Activities that will not be funded are:

- Youth engagement and compulsory school-aged children activities that are not directly aimed at improving employment outcomes.



- Training that is not connected to sustainable employment. Activities, services or jobs that are the responsibility of the states and territories or other Commonwealth programmes that are already funded, including:
  - Adult vocational education and training (VET) activities.
  - Cultural heritage, land rights and land management activities subject to state or territory legislation
  - Employment services including Community Development Programme and jobactive
  - Funding for wages of employment positions irrespective of the project outcomes.
- Board or Executive positions in organisations where it is normally part of the organisations operational costs
- Retrospective funding for activities that have already commenced or completed.

- Production costs, including freight and artists' wages
- Only one participant per conference or meeting and only where the participant is a principal speaker and the subject of the conference is of direct relevance to the grant opportunity.

### What the grant money cannot be used for?

You cannot normally use the grant for the following:

- capital expenditure, including purchase of real estate and vehicles
- purchase of equipment (for example, musical instruments, computers, videos, photographic or printing equipment)

- The CBF will not acquire a copyright interest in funded content. The owner of copyright in a work is the creator unless the creator has assigned copyright in advance, such as through a presenter's employment, broadcast or auspice agreement.
- You must acknowledge the CBF's financial support as detailed in our Acknowledgment Toolkit.
- You must ensure a sample of the production is made available for publication on the CBF website.
- You will own the intellectual property rights in the content, except for any third-party intellectual property rights contained within the content. You will provide the CBF with a permanent, non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free licence (including a right to sub-licence) to use, reproduce, publish, and adapt the content for any purpose.
- Where third-party intellectual property rights exist in relation to the content, you must, at your cost, undertake reasonable endeavours to arrange for the CBF to be granted
- A permanent, irrevocable, free, world-wide, non-exclusive licence (including a right of sub-licence) to use, reproduce, publish and adapt the content containing the third party intellectual property rights for any purpose.

### What can you use the grant for?

Content development and distribution costs directly associated with the production and delivery of a specific program or project, such as:

- project specific wage support: presenters, producers, cast, crew, project management, technicians
- program specific needs: research materials, music and copyright purchases, relevant project-specific insurance such as defamation insurance for a special broadcast event, travel, marketing, development resources, TV studio hire, venue hire, small equipment, equipment hire, catering, materials for set design, costumes and props, make-up, interpreters, subtitles and captioning, program specific training, phone/internet costs, program website costs, production support and facilities
- organisational support: administration costs for funded projects (up to \$1,000 per project).

To apply for this grant, you will need to provide evidence that this situation could not have been reasonably anticipated prior to the most recent CBF grant round, cannot wait until the next round and cannot be covered by your organisation's reserves. This could include:

#### Emergencies:

- Replacing essential equipment and related expenses to restore basic transmission following an unforeseen event such as flood, bushfire, lightning or theft
- Replacing essential operational equipment and related expenses not able to be reasonably anticipated
- Unexpected changes at your studio or transmission site such as a sudden need to relocate

- A financial loan while an insurance claim is being processed and/or funds are raised
- Other costs associated with maintaining transmission and/or operations not able to be reasonably anticipated.

### Opportunities:

- A matched funding opportunity for a project
- Other costs associated with a time-limited opportunity

Grants will be considered outside the normal grant rounds – you will normally receive advice about the outcome of your application within one week.

**Application methods:** Discuss your project with a CBF Grants Support Team member listed below. If eligible, you will be provided with a link to our online grant application in SmartyGrants.

### Limitations

#### Limitations

To be considered eligible for a Quick Response grant, you will need to answer yes to the following questions:

- Has this emergency/opportunity arisen unexpectedly? That is, that it could not have been reasonably anticipated during a previous funding round and cannot wait for the next funding round.
- Can you provide evidence of the emergency/opportunity in your application? Such as:
  - Photos of equipment needing replacing
  - Documentation from ACMA, local council, landlord, owners corporation, utility company, real estate agency
  - Insurance documentation
  - Evidence of support from funding partners
  - Hyperlinks or screenshots of the unique equipment sale
  - Financial statements demonstrating costs cannot be met from organisation reserves
- Can you provide the following information required within the grant application?
  - Your latest Annual Report with financial statements, even if you have supplied this information to the CBF previously
  - Your current Strategic and/or Business Plans
  - A description of your transmission setup, any apparatus licenses and block diagram of the current and proposed transmission chain (for transmission projects)
  - An agreement with a registered training organisation (for training projects)
  - A competitive quote for any equipment purchases over \$2,000
  - A clear and detailed project budget
  - Contact information for your organisation and a key individual involved in the proposal

### Funding conditions

To receive a Quick Response grant, you must meet the following funding conditions.

- Amount we may fund:
  - Emergencies: 100% of the financial cost of the project
  - Opportunities: maximum of 50% towards the total financial cost of the project
- Loans will need to be fully repaid within the agreed time-frame (even if insurance does not cover the full amount). If loan repayments are not provided within the agreed timeframe, the CBF will not consider grant applications from the organisation.

The grant amount will be up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs (grant percentage), which includes the total eligible expenditure plus allowable in-kind contributions.

Subject to the rules of Commonwealth, State, Territory or local government grants, you may use these as contributions.

Only CRC-Ps of exceptional merit are likely to be awarded the maximum grant amount of \$3 million.

The maximum project period is three years.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible?

Each CRC-P must be an industry-led collaboration with a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project. Only an eligible lead applicant can apply for grant funding and submit an application on behalf of project partners. If your application is successful, the lead applicant is responsible for managing the project on behalf of the collaboration.

All partners must contribute resources to the CRC-P. We treat partners' proposed cash and in-kind contributions equally for the purposes of calculating the maximum grant amount.



## Who is not eligible?

You are not eligible to apply as a lead applicant if you are:

- a partnership
- a research organisation
- a trust (however, an incorporated trustee may apply on behalf of a trust)
- a Commonwealth, State, Territory or local government body (including government business enterprises)
- an entity where the majority of your funding is from government sources, for example grant programs
- an entity whose primary function is administrative or to provide support services to a CRC-P.

To be eligible your project must:

- have at least \$200,000 in total eligible project value

- be a short term, industry-identified and industry-led collaborative research project to develop a product, service or process that will solve problems for industry and deliver tangible outcomes
- benefit SMEs and increase their capacity to grow and adapt in changing markets
- include education and training activities.

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and can include:

- new research
- proof of concept activities
- pre-commercialisation of research outcomes
- industry-focused education and training activities, such as internships and secondments between industry entities and research organisations
- conferences, workshops, symposia related to the joint research
- related information sharing and communication initiatives related to the joint research.

In assessing track-record the Research Committee gives full recognition to applicants who may be comparatively new to research but who have relatively impressive performances in publishing in quality journals and/or who have demonstrably superior applied outputs and outcomes for the time they have been researchers.
- The need to encourage capacity building is also acknowledged.

The Research Committee particularly favours activities that seem likely to lead to improved systems of managing land, water, plants and animals in ways which will enhance the productivity and quality of food, fisheries, plants and forests, while simultaneously conserving the natural environment, preserving biodiversity, avoiding pollution of soils and water, and enhancing human welfare.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

- The project must be undertaken within Australia or countries of the south west Pacific region, under the umbrella of a university or other appropriate institution
- Funding will be limited to no more than three years and A\$30,000 annually
- If the project is a sub-project of a larger investigation it must be sufficiently discrete for the outputs and outcomes to be independently evaluated. (Projects that may be seminal to subsequent larger grants from other sources are attractive to the Foundation.)

### Purpose

The Brain Cancer Survivorship Grant Opportunity provides medical researchers with funding for the development of better approaches on the impacts of brain cancer to improve quality of life and the survivorship experience.

### Overview

The 2019 Brain Cancer Survivorship Grant Opportunity was announced as part of the Medical Research Future Fund and is an Initiative under the Australian Brain Cancer Mission.

There are no known prevention measures for brain cancer and for some types of brain cancer, no effective treatments. It is widely recognised that the key to improvements in this area is investment in research.

## Purpose

The objective of this grant opportunity is to prime teams working on 'proof of concept' stem cell research targeted towards a health care outcome. Funding for such priming programs will target two priority areas aimed at driving innovation and accelerating implementation into clinical practice.

## Overview

Funding will be provided to the top two ranked applications in each of the priority areas. The remaining funding will be provided in rank order to the best ranked applications from across the two priority areas.

### Priority 1: Stem cell therapies

- pluripotent stem cells (encompasses human embryonic and induced pluripotent stem cells. Applications will focus on derivatives of these stem cell types)
- tumour stem cells (defined as those cell types within a cancer able to initiate a tumour and/or drive ongoing tumour growth or regression post treatment).

## Purpose

Provides medical researchers with up to \$1 million to develop detailed research plans for significant research projects in the health and medical research sector that are innovative at a global level and have great potential to have a transformative impact on health care.

## Overview

The Department of Industry, Innovation and Science (the department) is responsible for administering the grant opportunity on behalf of the Department of Health.

The Stage One (Research Plan) grant opportunity will provide up to \$10 million and will fund up to ten projects.

- The minimum grant amount is \$250,000.
- The maximum grant amount is \$1 million.

The grant amount will be up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs (grant percentage).

You must complete your project within one year of execution of the grant agreement.

Funding is provided over one year to develop a detailed research plan. The research plan will cover up to five years of activity to take your idea from concept to outcome. Applicants must demonstrate how their idea is novel and transformative, and how it will bring together multidisciplinary research and industry partners to transform the idea into practical benefit for Australia.

The intended outcome of this grant opportunity is a detailed research and implementation plan that will form the basis of a Stage Two application that supports research into a range of new treatments for disease and medical services that can transform health care in Australia.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible?

To be an eligible organisation you must:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be incorporated in Australia and be one of the following eligible bodies:
  - a medical research institute
  - a university
  - a corporate Commonwealth entity
  - a corporation (including businesses and not for profits).

Joint applications are encouraged, provided you have a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project and is eligible to apply.

#### Additional eligibility requirements:

The Department can only accept applications where you provide:

- evidence from your board (or chief executive officer or equivalent if there is no board) that the project is supported, and that you can complete the project and meet the costs of the project not covered by grant funding
- letters of support from each project partner are provided
- a project plan
- a project budget
- details of intellectual property (IP) arrangements as per the requirements
- a trust deed (where applicable).

#### Who is not eligible?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an individual
- partnership
- trust (however, an incorporated trustee may apply on behalf of a trust)
- a Commonwealth, State, Territory or local government body (including government business enterprises)
- a non-corporate Commonwealth entity.

To be eligible your project must:

- include eligible activities and eligible expenditure
- align with the goals and objectives of the Medical Research Future Fund
- The Department cannot fund your project if it receives funding from another Commonwealth government grant. You can apply for a grant for your project under more than one Commonwealth program, but if your application is successful, you must choose either the grant or the other Commonwealth grant.

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and can include:

- developing a detailed research plan
- generation of data supporting the feasibility of the proposed project. Other activities may also be approved.

## Purpose

Through the Larger Leverage grants, small rural, regional and remote communities now have an opportunity to access funding to support more aspirational objectives, think bigger and leverage the ideas, creativity and resources of communities for bigger impacts and stronger, more connected communities.

## Overview

The Strengthening Rural Communities (SRC) program aims to give the thousands of small rural, regional and remote communities across Australia an opportunity to apply for funding that can support broad community needs. ## Purpose

The Strengthening Rural Communities program gives small rural, regional and remote communities across Australia the opportunity to access funds that can benefit and help secure their future prosperity. Grants are available for a broad range of initiatives that directly and clearly benefit local communities.

## Overview

### Funding Available

The Strengthening Rural Communities program includes two tiers of grant funding. For this round, FRRR invites applications from not-for-profit community organisations for the Small and Vital tier only:

#### 1. Small and Vital grants

- Grants of up to \$10,000 are available;
- Applications for the Small and Vital tier of this grants program are accepted anytime via our online application portal (Grants Gateway);
- Applications are assessed by FRRR on a quarterly basis.

#### 2. Larger Leverage grants (not available this round)

- Grants between \$10,001 - \$25,000 are available;
- The Larger Leverage grants will open in August 2019 and will be offered twice a year.

### Targeted Donor Funds:

FRRR partners with a wide range of donors, many of whom have specific regional and issue-based preferences or requirements. Of the \$440,000 available in the March 2019 funding round, \$299,000 is targeted towards specific focus areas and geographic regions. The table below provides an indication of these. ## Priority

Applications from not-for-profit organisations in communities of fewer than 15,000 people are prioritised, particularly those communities whose size, remoteness and relative access to services, funding, and resources present particular ongoing challenges.

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Not-for-profit community-based organisations from communities across rural, regional and remote Australia where funds support projects and activities that offer clear public benefit (i.e. are for a charitable purpose) and address a need in the community (see What Can be Funded below);
- Organisations with an ABN or Incorporation Certificate;

- An organisation is eligible to submit one application per grant round.

FRRR considers all eligible applications on their merit. Due to the volume of applications received, applications are assessed based on the documentation received at the time of application.

Projects funded in this round should be undertaken between July 2019 and June 2020. Projects cannot be funded retrospectively.

### Purpose

The Tackling Tough Times Together (TTTT) program gives drought affected communities across rural, regional and remote Australia the opportunity to access funds that benefit their immediate and long-term needs. Grants are available for grassroots, community-led initiatives that directly benefit local communities.

### Overview

This program is designed to provide flexible funding to support community-based activities that both help to relieve current stressors and symptoms, and most importantly, build capacity and resilience for the future. Funds could also support activities that engage your local community in being proactive, exploring options and creating something that will stand the test of tough times.

Three streams of grants are available:

1. Up to \$20,000 - Projects to be finalised within 18 months of approval;
2. Up to \$60,000: Projects to be finalised within 18 months of approval;
3. Up to \$150,000: Applications for this tier are by Expression of Interest. Multi-year projects (up to three years) are welcomed. Projects that deliver long-term community benefits are highly regarded.

**The objectives of the program are to:**

1. Reduce social isolation by facilitating strong social cohesion and connection;
2. Support and engage the community in leadership development and skills training;
3. Support opportunities for social and educational participation and address disadvantage caused by the drought, for children and young people;
4. Reduce volunteer fatigue and build the capacity, capability and sustainability of local not-for-profit organisations to provide support to their communities, particularly where they are playing an increased role during the drought; and
5. Support local economic recovery or renewal through projects that stimulate economic activity and cash-flow within communities.

### Round 16

Late May 2020 for applications received by 25 February 2020. EOIs for the \$150K tier have now closed.

### Round 17

Late August 2020 for applications received by 28 May 2020. EOIs for the \$150K tier must be received by 16 April 2020.

## Priority

The program has a strong preference to support grassroots organisations based in drought-affected regions over those delivering services to, but not based in affected regions. Projects led by local communities will be given strong preference.

Applications are welcome from any eligible organisation for any eligible purpose; however, the following applications will be prioritised:

- Projects initiated and delivered by local community groups;
- Organisations that do not have Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Tax status.

## Purpose

### Purpose

The Local Sports Defibrillator Program is about providing life saving equipment to NSW sporting facilities and clubs at a reduced cost.

### Overview

Sporting clubs have a choice of approved Service Providers and a variety of approved AED products and services.

The provision of an AED package will include:

- An AED
- AED familiarisation instruction
- A minimum of six years of essential defibrillator maintenance

Grants are available up to 50% of the selected AED package price in Zones 1 and 2 and up to 75% in Zone 3, capped at the levels stated below.

Applicants can request more than one AED.

Funding should be expended within six months of the date of signing the funding agreement.

Grants for AED packages are available up to:

- Zone 1: \$1,250
- Zone 2: \$1,300
- Zone 3: \$1,900

### Priority

In determining priority for allocation of defibrillator package, the Office of Sport may consider:

1. Profile of participants and spectators of club and facility i.e. type and size, calendar of events, season dates, game schedule etc.
2. Facilities that provide the highest community access to the AED, including where the device will be installed, how it will be secured i.e. installation of AED in the building providing the highest level of access and available hours, installation of a 24 hour access cabinet, strategies to maximise community awareness around AED availability and ease of use outside your clubs normal hours of operation. In Zone 3, in the absence of a secure building the AED should be in the custody of the club for use for the duration of the season, and then in the custody of the other sport in the case of a sharing arrangement.
3. Meet a demonstrated need in the community club or facility i.e. type of sport and physical activity undertaken, age profile and % of higher risk participants, stats of known medical conditions or previous incidents etc.
4. Address barriers faced by the club to access emergency services and clubs without an existing AED.
5. Capacity of organisation to apply systems and processes to successfully undertake the ongoing use, management and maintenance of AED.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible to apply?

- Incorporated, not-for-profit sports clubs or other organisations in NSW
- State or national sporting organisations on behalf of member clubs located in NSW, to a maximum of 10 per Zone
- Licensed sporting clubs, providing that the project directly benefits sporting activities
- Sport clubs associated with a school, church or university providing they are an incorporated not for profit club in their own right
- Councils, sport and recreational facilities owners on behalf of sports clubs
- Service clubs such as Rotary, CWA and Lions, on behalf of sports clubs

### What is not included?

- Ongoing maintenance outside of the scope of the maintenance schedule and any extended warranty as specified by the Approved AED Panel Service Provider
- Accredited CPR, First Aid, ongoing or additional face to face AED familiarisation instruction
- Out of warranty repair of equipment
- Replacement costs of consumables including batteries and electrode pads
- Replacement or temporary replacement of the AED if it is damaged or unrecoverable through wear and tear, vandalism, accident, theft or misuse
- General first aid maintenance items or equipment (items requiring cleaning and disinfecting after use)

Note: This is a general guide only. Sport clubs/organisations should refer to the details set out in the particular AED Providers' packages when making a choice of provider.

## Purpose

The purpose of the program is to support junior sport (under 18 y.o) in the NSW operational areas of Glencore's Coal Assets Australia.

## Overview

The program supports clubs and associations with projects that address their long term needs. Projects should have a focus on increasing the capacity of the club/association to support participation in junior sport on a sustainable (on-going) basis.

### What funding is available?

Maximum funding per club/association is \$7,500 so as to allow for multiple clubs/associations to benefit from the program.

Grants worked out on a scale of attendance and duration (see page five of the grant guidelines) up to a maximum of \$15,000 are available to eligible organisations who conduct a tour:

- held in the March – November period (tours held in December, January and February are not eligible)
- attracting more than 40 people from outside Tasmania
- staying five nights or more in paid commercial accommodation (hotel, motel, B&B, cabin)

Motorhome, caravan, camping and walking tours may also be eligible, but only for the days that participants spend in paid accommodation, and with the same ratio of 40% paid accommodation in regional areas.

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

## Limitations

Reasons you may not be eligible for a grant:

They won't fund conferences, conventions, symposiums, exhibitions, theatrical productions, concert series, touring arts products, trade fairs, fundraising events, markets, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through a Major Event Partnership you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

Provides business incubators with grants to access top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts. The \$23 million Incubator Support initiative supports the Australian Government's commitment to:

The \$23 million Incubator Support initiative supports the Australian Government's commitment to:

- deliver high quality services to start-ups to improve their chances of commercial success in international markets
- partner with first-generation migrant and refugee support organisations to assist migrant and refugee founders to establish their business both nationally and internationally
- assist start-ups with a regional focus to expand and scale their business.

#### Grant amount:

### Purpose

Championship grants of up to \$7,000 are on the table for eligible competitions that bring more than 100 competitors and supporters to Tasmania, who stay in paid commercial accommodation for three nights or more, and are able to promote pre- and post-championship travel within the state as part of their event marketing.

### Overview

Grants are worked out against set criteria up to a maximum of \$7 000 and are available to eligible competitions, championships and sporting events that:

- attract more than 100 people from outside Tasmania
- stay three nights or more in paid commercial accommodation (hotel, motel, B&B, cabin)
- promote pre- and post-championship holidays and regional touring as a part of their event promotion.



Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

Grants are valued from \$2,000 to \$7,000, depending on how many interstate or overseas visitors are coming to your Championship, which time of year it is held and where the event is held.

There are no application deadlines for Championship grants, but you are asked to lodge your application at least three months prior to commencement of your event.

## Limitations

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

This funding programs don't support conferences, conventions, symposiums, trade fairs, fundraising events, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through a Major Event Partnership you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

## Purpose

To create a more just society by giving every young person in Australia an equal opportunity to access the skills to negotiate life's journey.

## Overview

Matana's focus is on improving the welfare and wellbeing of young people from severely disadvantaged or marginalised backgrounds, or whose concerns and issues are not readily funded from other sources. Recognising that disadvantage takes many forms, we prioritise projects and organisations that address the causes of youth disadvantage by:

- Providing programs primarily targeting school retention and increased education achievement for students who are at risk of dropping out of school or who have already dropped out. The focus is on early identification, customised learning and mentoring.
- Providing programs that target employment skills development, employment and career pathways and transitions into employment.
- Providing programs that target social and community connectedness, personal significance and social and emotional outcomes.
- Providing services in geographical areas across Australia where funding is difficult to source.

We welcome applications from financially viable organisations which work to improve the lives and opportunities of disadvantaged young people, particularly where their core activities correlate with our funding priorities. Wherever

possible, you will need to demonstrate the tangible impact of your organisation's work in improving the welfare or wellbeing of disadvantaged young people.

There is no minimum or maximum amount, but as a guide, grants are usually in the range of \$1,000 to \$10,000. However, assessment will be made on an individual basis. We also encourage grantseekers to apply to other sources to facilitate joint funding of projects.

Grants may be sought at any time.

## Limitations

Matana can only make grants to organisations that hold the following ATO endorsements:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) - Item 1
- Tax Concession Charity (TCC)

Evidence of endorsements is required at the point of application. If your organisation does not have Item 1 DGR and TCC status, unfortunately we will not be able to consider your application.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications that request funding for:

- Operating costs including salaries and administration costs, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Capital and building expenditure, including equipment, vehicles, travel, furniture, books and conferences, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Retrospective funding or budget deficits
- Fundraising events and campaigns
- Medical programs or research
- Religious activities, where the applicant project involves religious instruction.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications for funding from:

- Individuals, state and federal government bodies
- Organisations outside Australia.
