## Purpose

The Community Small Grants program aims to build individual/groups skills and knowledge in land management practices and community participation, knowledge and skills with community organisations, groups or local communities.

## Overview

The grants are part of the Community Small Grants and Education Scholarship Program 2018-2021 which supports community in building knowledge, skills and participation in land management practices.

### Funding Availability:

- Maximum \$2000 per project.

### Closing Dates for Funding Rounds (multiple rounds over 3 years):

- Applications will be assessed within 2 weeks of the following Rounds.
- Submit your applications by:
  - 2019: 1 April, 1 July, 1 October
  - 2020: 1 February, 1 March, 1 April 1 July, 1 October
  - 2021: 1 February, 1 March

## Example

Examples of Skills and Knowledge, and Community Participation Projects that can be funded (group, network or associations)- up to \$2000 (per group/per year maximum 3 applications):

- **Public Awareness raising events**- such as involvement in festivals, public displays, static displays, or development of educational resources/kits, online resources.
- **Public/Closed Workshops**- such as tailored workshops for your group members, or public workshops inviting local community, this includes development of resources or kits that facilitate workshop activities
- **Public/Closed Field based events**- where activities will build local community knowledge in on ground activities and land management practices, this can include a examples such as: community tree planting events, farm visits or demonstration site visits, or project plan development where community is involved in planning activities open to the public or specific to your group
- **School programs**- that build students/school communities knowledge of relevant environmental, agricultural or cultural land, and emergency management issues
- **Closed Group training events**- where a training event is tailored/delivered to a community group to build relevant skills to local projects or initiatives - such as pest training for 1080/pindone use, chemical application training, weed ID and training, drone/app training, property planning etc

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Community groups
- Landcare groups
- Schools
- Local Aboriginal Land Councils (LALCs)
- Committees/Associations
- Not for profit organisations
- Industry/producer groups

### Eligibility Criteria

- The group/organisation must have been in operation for at least 6 months

- Your organisation/ community group must either be incorporated OR auspiced by an organisation that is incorporated or has an ABN. Unincorporated groups can access financial assistance; however, a tax invoice from a supplier (e.g. caterer, guest speaker) must be issued for payment directly to Hunter LLS.
- Your project must aim to build community participation and knowledge and skills with community organisations or local communities
- Maximum of 1 application per group per financial year
- All applications should determine budgets based on quotes/actual costs. All projects should retain all receipts for project activities, as projects may be audited on completion.
- All recipients must use Hunter LLS evaluation forms (for projects and scholarships, and submit evaluation results to Hunter LLS) within 2 weeks of end of contract date/project completion with Final Reports.
- Applicants/groups must be residing in or registered in the Hunter Local Land Services region
- All Projects must be completed within the agreed contract date, or on or before the 30th May of the financial year the grant was offered.

#### Ineligible Activity/ Criteria

- Activities that have already been funded
- Activities that are of personal or private benefit
- Your organisation/group is subject to an Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC), Local Land Services (LLS), Department of Primary Industries (DPI) or other legal investigation
- Activities that do not align with the intended outcomes (skills and knowledge in land management practices and/or building community participation, skills and knowledge within organisations and communities)
- Capital items generally will not be funded, unless there is a strong justification (where the items directly support learning outcomes).

### Purpose

Screen Australia aims to support the creation of a diverse slate of quality, innovative, original, culturally significant small-screen storytelling that resonates with contemporary audiences.

### Overview

Screen Australia is required to place particular emphasis on “programs of interest or relevance to children”, they acknowledge the particular challenges and opportunities involved in producing programs for children, including the difficulties Commissioning Platforms have in monetising content, as well as the different relationship between first and subsequent windows created by the nature of the audience. For animation, preference will be given to those programs with Australian voices; or, on a case by case basis we may require a separate Australian voice track.

#### What funding is available?

Screen Australia will not contribute more than 45 per cent of the total budget, inclusive of any **Producer Offset** amount, other than in exceptional circumstances.



Further, Screen Australia investment is capped at \$2 million in any one children's program, other than in exceptional circumstances. If a project is a co-production, this cap will normally be reduced pro rata according to the percentage of the non-Australian co-production partner(s)' contribution. So, for example if the co-production is a 60/40 Australian majority co production, the cap would be \$1.2 million.

For **official co-productions** the 45 per cent cap applies only to the Australian component of the budget. Please refer to the website for **further information** on the Children's program and **application deadlines**.

### Assessment criteria

Investment decisions will be made against the following criteria, and in the context of the slate management principles outlined on page 2:

- the quality of the proposal including its innovative and/or cultural significance;
- the project's potential to connect with its target audience;
- the track record and capacity of the creative team;
- the strength of the marketplace e.g. any ROW sales agent and the level of co-finance (excluding Screen Australia and the state agencies);
- diversity of slate.

**NOTE:** Applicants are encouraged to contact the **Program Operations team** on 1800 507 901 before applications are submitted to discuss any eligibility questions and ensure all the required supporting material is in place.

### Limitations

#### Who can apply?

Children's programs of any broadcast format is eligible for this program, including telemovies, telemovie packages and series (no distinction is drawn between series and mini-series).

The content can be animation or live action, preschool, drama or factual and do not have to be 'P' or 'C' program as classified by the ACMA. However, the primary audience for the content must be children, as opposed to families generally.

Children's Programs, animation or live action, which do not feature predominantly Australian voices will not be eligible.

Whilst Screen Australia will not normally fund long running series, in the case of children's programs we will give due consideration for applications to fund more than 26 viewing hours of any one project, including multiple series (whether or not they have been funded by Screen Australia).

Applicants and projects must meet the general eligibility requirements set out in Screen Australia's **Terms of Trade**, as well as the specific requirements of these guidelines. With the exception of official Co-Productions, it is Screen Australia's expectation that applications for direct funding will demonstrate that the project is written and directed by Australian citizens or residents.

Specific requirements apply to projects where there is **Indigenous community participation or content** involved. Please refer to our website for further information.

## Purpose

The Cultural Fund provides support to organisations for projects that deliver opportunities for authors, journalists, artists and key industry stakeholders in the writing, publishing, education, and visual arts sectors.

## Overview

Copyright Agency's aim is to support members and stakeholders to create, award, present, publish, and promote work by Australian creators that connects with audiences.

They also offer grants to leading organisations to help build literacy skills for children and young adults, and partnerships to support key national writers' festivals.

In most cases, the Cultural Fund's grants for organisations are for a single project for up to a year; however, in some instances funding for three years may be approve.

## Funding amounts

There are no set minimum or maximum amounts, however grants range from \$5,000 to \$20,000 per project/year.

**Note:** Those that wish to apply are advised to contact the Cultural Fund to discuss a potential proposal before submitting and application.

## Priority

Priority will be given to projects that will provide sustained and realistic support to writers and visual artists and to encourage greater audiences for their work.

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Legally constituted organisations and incorporated associations may apply.
- If applying as a University, only one application from the University may be submitted per round.
- Individuals or sole traders are not eligible to apply for these grants
- Applicants may submit only one application per round to the Cultural Fund.
- Applicants must have acquitted any overdue Cultural Fund grants to be eligible to apply for further funding.

Activities supported include:

- Skills development and professional development opportunities for emerging creators and people working in publishing
- Publishers, literary magazines and journals
- Professional mentorships, residencies, internships
- Conferences, art book fairs, symposia
- Educational and cultural institutions
- Partnerships with major national writers' festivals
- Awards and prizes for writers and visual artists
- Writing, publishing and visual arts industry associations
- Theatre companies to provide opportunities for playwrights
- Literary and literacy-building organisations
- Visual arts organisations Indigenous-led organisations to deliver projects to benefit Indigenous creators
- National Teacher Associations
- Projects to enhance the Copyright Agency's Reading Australia

The Cultural Fund will **not** support the following activities:

- Projects which do not ultimately benefit writers or visual artists or the publishing/visual arts sectors
- Projects where creators are not paid a fee
- Emerging writers or visual artists who haven't published or exhibited work
- Community-based writing programs
- University-based artist-in-residency programs which do not connect with audiences outside the university
- Niche writers' festivals
- Translations into other languages for overseas audiences
- Projects which do not connect with audiences
- Writers to self-publish their work
- Film script development, film festivals, and projects aimed at the film industry
- Research for purely academic audiences
- Projects primarily aimed at music or dance audiences
- Publishing and exhibition costs
- Website development or maintenance costs
- Development of apps
- Digitisation of back issues, previously published work, or catalogues of works
- Business or overhead costs
- Capital works
- General administrative costs Book launches or exhibition openings
- Publishers/galleries to market books

## Purpose

Enterprise Business & Ideas will support new business proposals or ideas that will create changes and benefit the screen industry more broadly. Enterprise Business & Ideas will also support businesses to develop strategic/business plans, engage business consultants or business mentors and engage a new company placement that will help their business to evolve or innovate, and build capacity.

## Overview

The aims of Enterprise Business & Ideas are to:

- Identify and support new ideas or business proposals that drive change and capitalise on success, both for companies and the screen industry.
- Build capacity by supporting businesses to diversify, innovate, and develop pathways to sustainability.
- Share information and experience between industry practitioners, to build capability.
- Encourage practices and business structures that recognise the value of creative collaborators who generate and develop screen story content.

- Promote the business opportunities and commercial benefits of gender equity, diversity and inclusion.

### Funding:

- Maximum \$200,000 per year for up to two years for a business or idea.
- Maximum \$100,000 per year for up to two years for company placements full-time or part-time.
- Maximum \$20,000 for a strategic/business plan (up to \$10,000), consultant (up to \$5,000) and/or mentor (up to \$5,000).

Applications are open all year round. For a strategic/business plan, consultant and/or mentor, or if you are applying for a Company Placement without submitting an application for a Business or idea, there is a one-stage process for assessment with a four-week turnaround for decisions.

### Limitations

#### Who can apply?

- Applicants may apply as any Australian **entity** (sole trader, company, not-for-profit, etc.) However, we will not be able to contract with a Trust.
- Screen Australia want commercially and creatively minded people who will challenge the status quo and introduce new approaches and ideas for the creation, distribution and monetisation of screen story content.
- Applicants may be from the screen industry or related industries such as advertising and media as long as the business proposal or idea is for the screen industry.

### Purpose

The outcome of the Program is to support a professional, viable and ethical Indigenous languages and arts network that features strong participation and provides for economic opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

### Overview

The ILA program grant opportunity is a part of the Australian Government's Arts and Cultural Development Program that supports participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture through developing and supporting cultural expression.

The ILA program commenced in 2015-16 and invests around \$20 million per annum to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to express, preserve and maintain their cultures through Indigenous languages and arts activities. The ILA program includes operational funding support to a network of 21 Indigenous Language Centres around the country working on capturing, preserving and maintaining over 150 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander languages.

The ILA program also supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to develop, produce, present, exhibit or perform Indigenous arts projects that showcase Australia's traditional and contemporary Indigenous cultural and artistic expressions.

## Grant amount

Applications for the open competitive grant funding must fall within one of the following parameters:

- a project period for up to 12 months and up to a maximum of \$100,000 per project. It is anticipated that most grants will be between \$20,000-\$80,000 depending on the scope of the grant activity and its complexity
- a project period for up to 24 months and up to a maximum of \$200,000 per project. It is anticipated that most grants will be between \$80,000-\$150,000 depending on the scope of the grant activity and its complexity.
- On occasion, funding may be available to meet an identified urgent or specialised need. In these instances, the application will be assessed against the assessment criteria on a value-for-money basis and within the available ILA program budget.

Funding under the competitive grant opportunity is for discrete one-off projects that must have clearly articulated outcomes for the community.

**Please note:** Larger funding amounts are available via application by **invitation only**. If your organisation receives an invitation to apply for this grant opportunity, you will need to submit an application to apply.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

#### Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

To be eligible you must:

- be one of the following entity types:
  - an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Corporation registered under the Corporations (Aboriginal and /or Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006
  - a company incorporated in Australia
  - a company incorporated by guarantee
  - an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
  - an incorporated association
  - a partnership
  - a registered charity or not-for-profit organisation
  - an Australian local government body
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be registered for the purposes of GST if required by the Australian Tax Office
- have an account with an Australian financial institution
- have no outstanding reports, acquittals or serious breaches relating to any Australian Government funding – a serious breach is one that has resulted in, or warrants, termination of a grant agreement
- not be bankrupt or subject to insolvency proceedings (as relevant to the entity type).

Where applicable, we will review your funding history, including your performance delivering projects and achieving outcomes, and your financial and performance reporting history.

Eligible organisations can apply as a consortium provided they nominate a lead organisation that also meets the eligibility criteria above.

Unincorporated associations are able to apply through an eligible auspicing body.

#### Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- a Commonwealth or State or Territory Government (including portfolio agencies)
- a school
- an individual
- an unincorporated association without an auspicing body
- an organisation based outside of Australia.

These eligibility criteria are subject to change, based on Australian Government policy. Funding recipients will be advised of any changes to the Program.

### Eligible grant activities

#### What can the grant money be used for?

The grant monies can only be used to fund activities for Indigenous languages and/or arts projects that align with Program objectives. These activities include:

- the engagement of consultants, specialists, experts or contractors (for example linguists, artist fees, art workers, curators, Indigenous language experts, Indigenous cultural experts),
- project administration (a maximum of 30 per cent of total grant monies) for items such as project management, report-writing, book-keeping, audits and financial management
- consultation on, as well as development, maintenance and storage of, language and/or arts resources and materials, including website(s), apps and hard-copy materials
- facilitation of access to language and/or arts resources and materials
- facilitation of language and/or arts workshops and/or community meetings
- domestic travel to meet with community and key stakeholders for the project

We do not fund ongoing organisational operational costs.

### **What the grant money cannot be used for?**

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- the ongoing employment of staff
- operational funding or ongoing administration costs of an organisation
- the conservation, exhibition or interpretation of museum artefacts
- projects, or components of projects that are also funded by other programs administered by the Australian Government
- cultural camps that do not deliver a language and/or arts outcome
- the staging and production of festivals
- infrastructure projects and projects including the purchase of non-arts assets
- activities with a primarily commercial focus or intent
- activities with a political or lobbying focus or intent
- international travel or activities that happen outside Australia
- interpreting and translating services
- purchase of land or buildings
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- major construction/capital works
- activities for which other Commonwealth or State or Territory or Local Government bodies have primary responsibility.

Additionally, Program funding cannot be used for activities that:

- are part of the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC) celebrations
- are the core business of schools, for example, teacher salaries and the development of teaching and learning resources that are for exclusive use in schools. If you are developing teaching and learning resources as part of your project you must demonstrate that they will be used outside the school setting, and have evidence to support this
- have received funding from another government source for the same purpose. If you are currently receiving funding from another government source, or through a previous round of the Program, your application will need to clearly distinguish how this project is different to your existing grant agreement
- include re-granting of funds to other groups or organisations without prior agreement from the Department
- fall within the scope of the Indigenous Advancement Strategy, Culture and Capability program – visit [www.dpmc.gov.au](http://www.dpmc.gov.au).

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# International Exhibitions Insurance (AGIEI) Program

## Purpose

The Australian Government International Exhibitions Insurance (AGIEI) program is a funding program designed to offset insurance costs for touring major exhibitions of cultural material. Generally, these exhibitions include works from international collections.

## Overview

The program aims to assist cultural institutions to provide access to significant cultural material the Australian public would not otherwise have an opportunity to access. By providing assistance with insurance costs, the Australian Government is able to encourage and support the staging of major exhibitions drawn from some of the world's most historically significant and culturally rich collections.

The program delivers approximately \$2 million annually through a competitive funding round, with flexibility to consider additional out of round applications where significant opportunities arise. The program includes a two-stage application process which allows for in-principle support in the early stages of exhibition planning, followed by a final application closer to the exhibition opening.

## Priority

Criteria used to identify funding priorities and amounts:

- Funding contribution from other sources
- Geographical spread: the program aims to support venues across Australia and will prioritise tours that include venues that generally receive fewer international touring exhibitions. These include non-east coast venues (for the purposes of the program this means outside of Sydney, Melbourne, Canberra or Brisbane) and regional venues.
- Number of venues: multiple venue proposals will be prioritised over single venue proposals
- Partnerships
- Demonstrated ability to develop, manage and tour exhibitions of a similar nature to the proposed exhibition.
- Value for money

## Example

The following are general program funding scenarios for exhibitions:

- Single or multiple venue exhibitions which do not have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme (however described) applicants would be eligible to apply for the full cost of transit and static insurance.
- Single venue exhibitions which have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is only available in exceptional circumstances.
- Multiple venue exhibitions which have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is available for full costs of transit insurance. In addition, for those venues which do not have access to a state or territory indemnity scheme funding is also available for static insurance. Funding for the full cost of transit and static insurance for venues with access to state schemes is available in exceptional circumstances.

Where an eligible exhibition is part of a broader international tour, funding for the cost of insurance for the exhibition's transit from and to another country would be determined on a case by case basis.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria:

Organisations eligible to apply for funding include Commonwealth, state and territory government collecting institutions; incorporated not-for-profit public collecting institutions, and incorporated not-for-profit bodies specialising in touring significant art and cultural collections. The proposal may be for either multiple or single venue exhibitions.



The cultural material in the exhibition must have a minimum value of:

- \$50 million for fine art exhibitions
- \$20 million for museological exhibitions.

The proposal may be for either multiple or single venue exhibitions.

Insurance cover may apply to multiple or single items within an exhibition that meets the minimum value threshold.

The exhibition is not eligible for support through a state indemnity scheme.

Applications from organisations with outstanding reports or financial acquittals from the AGIEI program, or from organisations that are otherwise in breach of an AGIEI funding arrangement, are not eligible for support.

#### Exceptional circumstances:

Funding may be considered for proposals which do not meet the eligibility criteria (eg. where support is available through state indemnity schemes) under the following circumstances:

- The proposed exhibition supports, or is linked with, an event of special significance including but not limited to a commemorative anniversary, major international event such as CHOGM, G20, the Olympic Games, or an activity falling under a cultural Memorandum of Understanding.
- State capacity to contribute has been adversely affected by external events.
- Loans are conditional on use of the lender's preferred insurer or, for multiple venue tours, the provision of a single insurance policy. The level of state contribution will be a key consideration when assessing such proposals.
- The exhibition will tour to a venue outside of a major eastern Australian city (for the purposes of the program this means outside Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane or Canberra). State contributions will be considered in assessing such proposals.

- insurance of exhibition items such as plinths, display cases and frames (unless integral to the work).

- Alignment with Screen NSW organisational priorities.

Applicants to other Screen NSW programs are eligible to apply to this program but assistance is usually restricted to location advice and Reel Scout packages.

## Purpose

MADE IN NSW is a \$55 million fund over four years (2019/20 and 2022/23) to support the attraction to NSW of significant international and domestic feature film and major TV drama production.

## Overview

The program will create a pipeline of high-end screen production in NSW and build on the success of previous investment. The program will focus its investment in new film and TV projects that:

- significantly contribute to the NSW economy
- create high value jobs
- create new opportunities in western Sydney and regional NSW
- build the skills and capacity of established and emerging practitioners
- grow audiences; and

## Limitations

Eligible projects:

What qualifies as a NSW production expenditure?

- Payments to a supplier of goods and services whose principal place of business is in NSW. Suppliers include independent contractors who are not subject to NSW Payroll Tax
- Payments to a supplier of goods and services which, although its principal place of business is outside NSW, has an office or branch in NSW which is supplying the goods or services, including fees and charges relating to the use of land within NSW
- Fees and charges relating to the use of land within New South Wales
- Inbound international or interstate travel to a NSW destination. Where a return fare is purchased fifty per cent (50%) of the fare qualifies as QNSWPE. The two-week rule for non cast members that is applied to the guidelines applies. That is the person must spend no less than two consecutive calendar weeks in NSW following arrival
- Inbound freight to a NSW destination
- Fringe Benefits Tax relating to benefits provided in NSW
- NSW Payroll Tax

But excludes:

- Goods or services which are sourced from outside NSW from a non-NSW supplier, even though they are used in the production of the project in NSW

### Purpose

To support Australian and New Zealand songwriters and composers.

### Overview

APRA AMCOS support projects, events and organisations that benefit our members. Each year 1.75% of APRA's distributable revenue is allocated to fund hundreds of initiatives across the music industry in Australia and New Zealand.

Applicants must demonstrate how the project or organisation will benefit Australian and New Zealand songwriters and composers. APRA AMCOS' aim is to provide a funding contribution to projects that will help members to:

- Develop songwriting or composition skills
- Receive public recognition for their talent (awards or other forms of acclaim in Australia, New Zealand or overseas)
- Collaborate and co-write new songs or compositions
- Showcase their talent to a wider audience
- Further develop their music career by learning about the music industry

Through the Music Grants program, APRA AMCOS focus on supporting Australian and New Zealand songwriters and compositions, rather than funding recordings, recording artists, touring costs, or creative development projects that primarily benefit individual members.

## Purpose

The PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation provides grants to promote and encourage music and the music-related performing arts.

## Overview

The grants provided are non-recurring (i.e. one-off grants rather than a periodical payment) and are determined by the four trustees of the trust.

- Two (including the Chairman) are appointed by the PPCA;
- One is appointed by the Musicians' Union of Australia;
- One is appointed by the Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance (formerly Actors' Equity).

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for **one or more** of the following purposes:

- performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged
- scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education
- the promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public
- the aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income.

A grant under the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation can be used for costs associated with the above, including:

- Tuition fees
- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol)
- Accommodation
- Venue hire/ PA hire.

There is no specified limit to how much you can apply for. However, funds are finite and there is no guarantee that you will receive all or any of the funds you request.

It is unusual for grants to be approved in excess of :

- \$3,000 for an individual; or
- \$5,000 for a group or organisation

## Limitations

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Although the trust is discretionary, the trustees are guided by the 'purposes' articulated in the trust deed. As a result, it is not their usual practice to approve funding for any project of a commercial nature. This would include:

- investments in recordings (e.g., studio time, producers fees, session musician fees, manufacturing or distribution costs);
- concert or festival promotion or staging costs;
- tour support;
- artist management expenses; or
- equipment purchases.

You should also note that the trustees are unlikely to approve applications seeking funding for the majority of costs related to a project, and look to applicants to contribute and/or explore additional funding sources.

The Australian Children's Television Foundation (ACTF) is a national, non profit organisation. It aims to provide Australian children with entertaining media made especially for them, which makes an enduring contribution to their cultural and educational experience. Australian children deserve to see local stories and their culture on their screens.

## Overview

By helping these people develop new children's programs, we remain true to our goal of creating programs that children, parents and educators can rely on to be engaging, entertaining, accessible, creative and innovative.

Before we provide funding, we assess the project against a range of criteria, including:

- The originality and quality of the story
- The experience of the team behind it
- Its potential to engage with young audiences.

Although overall quality is our primary consideration in assessing a project, we also seek to encourage:

- Diverse stories, voices and faces
- An Australian voice and point of view
- Innovative use of new and emerging media platforms
- Bringing new and emerging producers to the industry, while harnessing the skills of experienced producers

- Works that address gaps in content/genre/age groups.

In every project we provide funding for, we ensure that it is produced to the highest standards. We do this by including creative input and regular consultation as a condition of our investment.

## **What we look for:**

### ***Audience***

All projects must primarily target the Australian child audience and must, in our opinion, be likely to be of interest to Australian children.

Television projects should be aiming for either 'P' or 'C' classification as defined by ACMA for the commercial networks and Pay TV, or a G classification for ABC.

Feature film projects should be aiming for a 'G' or 'PG' rating from the OFLC Classifications Board.

For information on what constitutes a 'P', 'C' or 'G' or 'PG' program, have a look at the ACTF's FAQs.

### ***Subject matter***

Projects may be based on an original idea, or adaptations of a novel or other work. We look for originality and new ideas not already in the marketplace or currently on television.

If the project is an adaptation of someone else's work (such as a novel, play, character or concept developed by one of the team), the applicant must obtain, or at least option, an assignment of all the necessary rights from the creator prior to making an application.

Options should have a reasonable length of time to run following any ACTF Development Funding approval to allow for the project's development, commissioning and financing.

Copies of all contractual documentation demonstrating that the applicant has obtained the necessary legal rights to deal with the material on which the project is based must accompany the application. If such options or chain of title documents are not provided with the application, the project will not be considered in that round.

Any project containing indigenous content, themes or story lines must be accompanied by written permission from the relevant indigenous community authorising the Applicant's use of such material.

### ***Format and genre***

We provide funding for television series, one-off television programs, telemovies and feature films.

Before submitting an application for a television program, it is useful to familiarise yourself with the types of formats, series lengths and episode lengths broadcasters usually commission for your intended audience's age group.

Before submitting an application for development of a feature film it is worthwhile speaking with local distributors about their requirements in this area and their interest in the genre and age group.

Finance is open to all genres, but preference will be given to drama content which typically has higher development requirements than other genres.

### ***Levels of Development funding***

We will only fund one stage of development on any project at a time. To develop a feel for the levels of funding and stages of development that we have previously funded, please look at the funding section of the ACTF website.

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

### ***Applicant and Creative Team***

We will consider the experience of the creative team when assessing projects for funding. Whilst it does not require that all of the proposed team have experience in their relevant area, projects with a strong and experienced creative team are preferred.

## **Priority**

Projects with an offer of matched development funding from a broadcaster, distributor, coproducer or state agency will assist an application.

## **Limitations**

### ***Eligibility***

Applicants should permanently reside in Australia or be Australian citizens. If the applicant is a company, it should be incorporated in Australia and have Australian-based management and control. We may require a personal company director's guarantee when contracting with companies.

Made available under the Regional Arts Fund allocation for NSW, Quick Response Grants offer funding of up to \$1,500 for regional artists, arts organisations and communities to respond to unique arts opportunities that present themselves at very short notice.

### Overview

Grants of up to \$1500 are available to support:

- Professional development opportunities for artists and arts workers involved in community programs that will increase their knowledge, skills and experience;
- Skills and or arts development for individuals and groups in regional communities through the employment of arts and cultural workers to conduct workshops, seminars and forums;
- Under exceptional circumstances, artists and/ or local community groups may apply to this program to assist in the costs of creative recovery projects for communities suffering from the impact of a natural disaster.

Funding is primarily available for artist fees and associated costs

There is no deadline or closing date however there is a limited number of grants of up to \$1,500 available annually. The funds are allocated quarterly and once each quarter's allocation is expended, funds will not be available until the following quarter.

All applications must be submitted in SmartyGrants on the RANSW Quick Response Grant Application Form and successful applicants cannot re-apply within 12 months of a successful grant. The Regional Filming Fund offsets costs associated with shooting in regional areas of NSW. Regional NSW is defined as all areas in NSW outside the Sydney Metro area (excluding the ACT).

## Overview

Screen NSW funds production of Australian projects in the following categories:

- feature films
- content-rich factual and documentary television or web programs and series
- adult and children's television drama and narrative comedy including series, miniseries, web series and telemovies
- animation productions
- creative interactive screen entertainment

Applicants may request up to 35% of the budgeted NSW Regional Spend.

NSW Regional Spend is the total of the below the line shooting expenses directly associated with filming in regional NSW. Eligible NSW Regional Spend expenses are limited to:

- location fees
- travel (for cast and crew traveling from other parts of NSW)
- accommodation
- per diems
- local suppliers & services (e.g. construction contractors, security, traffic control etc.)
- catering
- salaries for regionally based cast and crew

Regional spend does not include any above-the-line expenses (including development expenses), indirect costs, company overheads, contingency or post-production expenses.

Support is provided as a grant. The maximum grant per production is \$100,000.

## Priority

Screen NSW is committed to supporting increased participation in the industry of people from under-represented groups including women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, people from CaLD backgrounds, people with disability, LGBTQI people, people from western Sydney and people from regional NSW. Priority will be given to teams including people from under-represented groups.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible?

Screen NSW general eligibility requirements can be found in the [Screen NSW Terms of Trade](#), which should be read in conjunction with these guidelines.

- At least one of the Key Creatives must be NSW based.
- The production company must be registered in NSW and have its principal place of business in NSW.
- The production must film on location in Regional NSW for a minimum of five shooting days.
- At least 50% of the total budget must be expended in NSW.
- Productions must be fully financed at the time of application, with the exception of contributions being sought from Screen NSW and other state, federal or international agencies (Note: we will only consider an application where those agencies have confirmed their contribution or if the application has been submitted to a funding round running concurrently with the Screen NSW round).

- Productions that have been shortlisted for Screen Australia's Documentary Production Producer Program or Multi-Platform Drama Fund may apply.
- Feature films must have distribution in place.
- Television drama, narrative comedy and factual/documentary programs must have a financial commitment from a broadcaster, subscription service or distributor.

Screen NSW do not fund the production of:

- \*infotainment, lifestyle, travel, magazine, sports, education, game shows and other magazine- style productions
- current affairs and news programs
- community television
- shorts, short features (under 60 minutes)
- projects being developed as part of a course of study

The Treasurer and the Minister for the Arts approve new additions to the register. The Department administers the register.

## Limitations

To be eligible for entry on the Register of Cultural Organisations (ROCO) an organisation must meet all the criteria of section 30-300 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 (the Act).

Organisations entered on the ROCO are endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) and are eligible to receive tax deductible donations in accordance with Division 30 of the Act.

## Purpose

The objective of the CCCF is to support child care services to address barriers to child care participation, particularly targeting disadvantaged and vulnerable families and communities.

## Overview

The expected outcomes of the CCCF are to:

- improve early childhood development outcomes for vulnerable and disadvantaged children
- increase workforce participation by vulnerable and disadvantaged families.

The CCCF is an ongoing program.

The objective of the CCCF Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity is to support continuity of child care, in particular in disadvantaged or vulnerable communities, where service viability is affected by an unforeseen factor outside the control of the service such as:

- a natural disaster or extreme weather event
- another unforeseen event or circumstance which would result in market failure for the community.

Up to \$9 million per year is available each financial year for allocation under the CCCF.

The amount of funding provided to applicants will be determined on a case-by-case basis, depending on the activity being funded, the type and impact of the unforeseen event, and the circumstances of the applicant. Funding provided under this grant opportunity is one-off and short-term.

Grants provided under this opportunity are intended to be supplementary. The main source of income for child care services is expected to be fee income from families, including as subsidised by Child Care Subsidy and Additional Child Care Subsidy payments.

## Limitations

### Grant eligibility criteria:

To be eligible to apply under this grant opportunity, the applicant must be:

- an approved provider under Family Assistance Law AND
- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community AND
  - at risk of closure due to viability issues resulting from an unforeseen event or circumstance, such as a natural disaster or extreme weather event OR
  - at risk of permanent closure due to another event or circumstance, where that closure would result in a lack of suitable child care (market failure) for the community OR
  - seeking to commence a new service in a community where another service has closed, resulting in a lack of suitable child care (market failure), and the new service will require funding to establish a viable operation.

While both for-profit and not-for-profit services are eligible to apply, CCCF funding must be spent on activities approved by the department, and cannot be used to directly generate or contribute to the profit of a child care service.

### What the grant money can be used for?

Special circumstances grants can be used for activities such as:

- implementing changes to business practices and/or models
- temporarily meeting standard child care operating costs
- helping with additional costs as a result of the unforeseen event or circumstance

- addressing health and safety requirements, directly related to an unforeseen event
- other reasonable activities, as agreed with the department, to ensure continuity of child care is maintained
- activities that respond to the needs of the child care community, such as additional transport services, family engagement and other support activities.

### What the grant money cannot be used for?

The following are examples of activities grant funding cannot be used for:

- activities not related to the delivery of child care services
- activities that are already fully funded by the CCCF program or any other government source or program # activities that have already occurred
- any expense that is claimable under the service's insurance policy.

To provide a ready and sympathetic source of funds for those needing relief from the effects of financial disadvantage, disease, and disability, and to make a real difference to the well-being and quality of life of those Australians we are able to assist.

## Overview

Financial assistance can be made available for almost any purpose considered necessary for the applicant's health and wellbeing, but the Trust is positioned as a provider of last resort assistance. Even then, due to the high demand for our limited resources, we can help only where needs are desperate and assistance is necessary to maintain the minimum standards of safety, security, protection and comfort for the individual or family. In cases where funding for expensive items of equipment is being sought, these items are to be retained by the organisation supporting the application as part of that organisation's equipment pool.

The following personal characteristics are indicative of some of the circumstances in which we may be able to assist:

- hold permanent Australian residency status or citizenship
- household income levels at or below the level of Centrelink benefits
- no major assets that could be realised
- no other resources that can be accessed (e.g. savings)
- families with young children, particularly single-parent families
- families with disabled children
- adults and children with disabilities particularly physical disabilities
- assistance has been sought/is being sought from other charitable organisations
- some unexpected catastrophic event has caused a crisis
- no assistance is available from family or extended family members
- time payment options have been exhausted in respect of utility and rental arrears if assistance is being sought for these items
- financial counselling, where appropriate, has been embraced in an effort to prevent future crises

- applicants have demonstrated some self-help behaviour and are endeavouring to plan for a viable lifestyle within their resources.

## Purpose

Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) Special Circumstances grant opportunity COVID-19 is intended to support approved child care services that are experiencing financial viability issues due to COVID-19.

## Overview

Up to \$9 million per year is available each financial year for allocation under the CCCF Special Circumstances Grant.

The Australian Government is working with state and territory governments and the child care sector to minimise the impact of COVID-19.

Grants are available through the Community Child Care Special Circumstances Fund for child care providers experiencing financial viability issues as a result of COVID-19, for example, withdrawals, reduced enrolments or service closures.

This grant funding is to help cover business costs, including wages, to ensure services impacted by COVID-19 can continue to operate.

All applications must nominate the period which the application is covering no more than 4 weeks in arrears. Applications for subsequent periods of support will be accepted.

The amount of funding provided to applicants will be determined on a case-by-case basis, depending on the activity being funded, the type and impact of the event or circumstance, and the circumstances of the applicant. Funding provided under this grant opportunity is intended to be one-off and shortterm.

## Limitations

### Grant eligibility criteria

To be eligible to apply, the applicant must be:

- an approved provider under Family Assistance Law AND
- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community

AND

- at risk of closure due to viability issues resulting from an unforeseen event or circumstance, such as in this case, the COVID-19 outbreak

OR

- at risk of permanent closure due to another event or circumstance, where that closure would result in a lack of suitable child care (market failure) for the community

OR

- seeking to commence a new service in a community where another service has closed, resulting in a lack of suitable child care (market failure), and the new service will require funding to establish a viable operation.

While both for-profit and not-for-profit services are eligible to apply under this grant opportunity, CCCF funding must be spent on activities approved by the department, and cannot be used to directly generate or contribute to the profit of a child care service.

### What the grant money can be used for?

Special circumstances grants can be used for activities such as:

- implementing changes to business practices and/or models
- temporarily meeting standard child care operating costs
- helping with additional costs as a result of the unforeseen event or circumstance

- other reasonable activities, as agreed with the department, to ensure continuity of child care is maintained
- activities that respond to the needs of the child care community, such as additional transport services, family engagement and other support activities.

The following are examples of activities grant funding cannot be used for:

- activities that are already fully funded by the CCCF program or any other government source or program

- any expense that is claimable under the service's insurance policy.

## Purpose

The Australian Government is providing an additional \$5 million in Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) special circumstance grant funding to support child care services in drought affected areas.

## Overview

An additional \$5 million in funding through the CCCF special circumstances grant was announced in November 2019.

This grant funding will help child care services experiencing financial pressure that puts the service at risk of closure due to the ongoing drought conditions.

This program complements a range of initiatives in the Step Up In Drought Budget Support package announced by the Government for drought-hit farmers, small businesses and rural towns.

Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) Special circumstances grant opportunity is intended to support approved child care services that are:

- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community
- experiencing financial pressure and at risk of closure due to an unforeseen event or circumstance (including drought).

## Funding

Child care services in drought affected communities are eligible to apply for grant funding of up to \$10,000 under a streamlined process. The grant also allows for applications over \$10,000 where the service demonstrates greater financial need in order to continue providing child care in their community.

## Eligible drought affected areas

The [drought affected areas list](#) is based on the list of communities identified by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Cities and Regional Development for their [Drought Communities Programme](#). The eligible communities were selected based on the level of need, determined using rainfall deficiency data from the Bureau of Meteorology, in conjunction with population and industry data (reliance on agriculture) to assess the overall economic impact of the drought in the region.

If a service is not located in an identified drought affected area and they require financial support, they can contact the CCCF team who can assist with grant funding on other grounds.

*Before applying, you should read and understand the grant guidelines.*

## Priority

Where relevant, funding preference will be given to services operating in an area of limited supply.

## Limitations

### Grant eligibility criteria

To be eligible to apply under this grant opportunity, the applicant must be:

- an approved provider under Family Assistance Law AND
- operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community AND
  - at risk of closure due to viability issues resulting from an unforeseen event or circumstance, such as a natural disaster or extreme weather event OR

- at risk of permanent closure due to another event or circumstance, where that closure would result in a lack of suitable child care (market failure) for the community OR
- seeking to commence a new service in a community where another service has closed, resulting in a lack of suitable child care (market failure), and the new service will require funding to establish a viable operation.

Applications for funding will also be accepted from authorised staff of approved child care services where they have been authorised to submit on behalf of the approved provider.

While both for-profit and not-for-profit services are eligible to apply, CCCF funding must be spent on activities approved by the department, and cannot be used to directly generate or contribute to the profit of a child care service.

Applicants will need to demonstrate that they are operating in a disadvantaged or vulnerable community, and/or that they are the only suitable service supporting a vulnerable or disadvantaged sector of their community.

## Purpose

The Honda Foundation aims to help fund and empower organisations that are focused on helping others.

## Overview

The Honda Foundation acts as a charitable trust, providing financial assistance to charities and organisations doing amazing work across a range of social and environmental issues.

These include:

- Supporting the disadvantaged, disabled or those suffering from illness
- Relief for victims of natural disasters

## Example

It can be advantageous for charities to apply to The Honda Foundation for an item or piece of equipment which will support a wider initiative for their community. For example, The Honda Foundation donated new cordless microphones to the Yooralla Strike a Chord choir in Victoria. The Strike a Chord choir comprises people who have experienced a stroke with a loss of speech called aphasia. However, singing and melody are processed by a different part of the brain to speech, so those living with aphasia can still sing. This donation had a two-fold effect - supporting a grassroots cause and also empowering choir members to sing and raise their morale.

Robust, charitable causes are the backbone of many Australian communities. The Honda Foundation receives hundreds of applications each year so applicants should keep in mind that their pitch should be framed around story telling as well, ensuring The Honda Foundation understands how a grant would change lives. Also, be solution-focused in your aim. Identify the challenge, and articulate the solution and how you would get to that solution. The Honda Foundation grants can range from as little as a few hundred dollars, to thousands of dollars. Where feasible, The Honda Foundation can, and has, supported projects in their entirety.

## Limitations

Only approved Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) organisations within Australia are eligible to apply for monetary funding.

## Purpose

Through IGA Community Chest and associated programs, well over \$80m has been raised to help local communities.

## Overview

IGA Community Chest raises funds to support local communities, charities and other worthwhile causes. It could be in response to a major event like floods or bush fires or something as simple as new soccer balls for the local under 8's.

The money is raised in a number of ways but predominately through the purchase of products with an IGA Community Chest logo on the label or ticket.

When you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label a percentage is credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account.

In most states IGA Community Chest beneficiary cheques are distributed throughout the year, meaning you can apply at any time.

### How are IGA Community Chest beneficiaries chosen?

There is a tiered system for choosing beneficiaries.

- For local activities the beneficiaries are chosen by the local stores
- Regional activities they are chosen by the region or group of stores
- State beneficiaries are chosen in consultation with the State Executive and Board.

Here is a couple of tips on becoming an IGA Community Chest beneficiary:

- It is best to approach your local IGA store directly. Prepare a pitch and it may include:
  - An overview of your organisation and/or the individual that you'd like supported;
  - What support are you looking for – monies, donations of goods, providing team jumpers, holding regular fundraising at the store, group registrations at the store, etc;
  - How the donation will be used and your timing.
  - Is there anything you can offer in return to IGA?
  - Don't forget to include your contact details.

## Example

**The Humpty Dumpty Foundation** The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Independent Grocers of Australia (IGA) made a significant difference to the lives of Sydney children. From January 2017, IGA made 11 donations across NSW and ACT to support much-needed medical equipment for hospitals to the value of \$150,000. IGA's support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation and the local community is immeasurable. The support to families in Sydney means children have access to medical equipment that is very much needed by the medical staff and, most of all, it is life-saving.

**Westmead Children's Hospital** Mint Fresh IGA in Baulkham Hills visited The Children's Hospital at Westmead in February to present a \$2,670 Aerogen Nebuliser to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The money for the nebuliser, which makes the administering of medications easier for children with respiratory illnesses.

**Moruya District Hospital** The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Dalmeny IGA purchase a piece of vital medical equipment for the Eurobodalla children. Local IGA retailers presented Moruya District Hospital with a jaundice detector valued at \$4,780 for the Maternity Unit. This jaundice detector is used to help clinicians determine the jaundice levels through the skin without harming the baby.



**MX550 Patient Monitor** IGA retailers and the Humpty Dumpty Foundation donated \$26,920 to fund a MX550 Patient Monitor for the Blacktown Hospital's special care nursery. The monitors are used daily to measure a child's blood pressure temperature, heart rate and respiratory rate to determine how well they are recovering from surgery.

## Limitations

### Eligibility for funding:

To be eligible, the application must:

- be from a not-for-profit, incorporated organisation operating a separate, auditable organisational bank account
- demonstrate the organisation's ability to manage the proposed project/activity in a professional manner
- primarily benefit at least one of the communities where we operate

- projects/activities that are the responsibility of government
- projects/activities that do not demonstrate financial sustainability
- overseas appeals
- research projects
- projects/activities that have already been completed (retrospective funding)

#### Project/Activity Completion:

Projects must be completed within 12 months from the time of funding.

### Overview

The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety has been established to consider the quality and safety of aged care services in Australia, to ensure services provided are effective and efficient.

If a grant has been approved, payments are made by way of reimbursement to legal representatives after the work has been performed.

If you have been:

- called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a hearing of the Royal Commission, or
- requested to attend or attending an interview of the Royal Commission, or
- requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission, and/or
- complying with a notice to produced issued by the Royal Commission

You may be eligible for assistance with legal representation and disbursements costs.

If you have been called in your personal capacity you will be eligible for legal financial assistance.

If your organisation has been called, you may be eligible for legal financial assistance. The organisation will be subject to an assessment of whether they can meet the cost of its legal representation without incurring serious financial difficulty.

#### What costs are covered?

The department will pay for reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs that you incur as a witness for the Royal Commission. These could include your solicitor's costs (e.g. attendance or preparation of documents) and disbursements (e.g. solicitor's travel, photocopying).



## Limitations

### Who can get a grant?

Legal financial assistance may be provided to an entity, as defined below, for their reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs resulting from:

- being called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a hearing of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to attend or attending an interview of the Royal Commission, or
- being requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission, and/or
- complying with a notice to produce issued by the Royal Commission, and
- where the entity, excluding an individual, would not be able to meet these costs without incurring serious financial hardship.

### Definition of an entity:

For the purposes of this opportunity entity means any of the following:

- an individual;
- a body corporate;
- a body politic;
- an incorporated body;
- an unincorporated body;
- another body or group not covered by paragraphs (a) to (e) that is formed for a common purpose, for example a consumer group.

For certainty, 'entity' includes a person who is an employee or former employee of any 'aged care service' defined in the Letters Patent issued on 8 October 2018 who is not representing that entity.

The Supporting Stronger Communities (SSC) grant program gives Neighbourhood and Community Houses and Centres the opportunity to access funds to target poverty and disadvantage in their local communities.

## Overview

The Sidney Myer Fund has formed a partnership with the Australian Neighbourhood Houses and Centres Association (ANHCA) to deliver the SSC grant program.

The Sidney Myer Fund provide grants across Australia to improve peoples' lives in lasting and positive ways. In line with this, the SSC grant program has been developed to enable Neighbourhood and Community Houses and Centres to apply for grants to respond to emerging needs to address poverty and disadvantage to strengthen their local communities.

### Funding available

To ensure that larger registered clubs in NSW contribute to the provision of front-line services to their local communities; and to ensure that the disadvantaged in the community are better positioned to benefit from the substantial contributions made by those clubs.

### Overview

Applying for ClubGRANTS funding is quick and easy. All funding is processed locally and community groups can contact their local clubs easily and at any time for information and advice. ClubGRANTS is also flexible, allowing clubs to provide support quickly, efficiently, and often as soon as a need emerges.

Funding and in-kind support is available under three separate categories:

- **Category 1** supports community welfare and social services; community development; employment assistance activities; community health services; and projects aimed at improving the living standards of low income and disadvantaged people.
- **Category 2** Provides funding for general community development and support activities, such as junior sport.

The Universal Charitable Fund (UCF) was founded by local business people in South Australia as a simple and cost effective way to provide practical support and encouragement to local Non Profit organisations doing a terrific job in helping people in need both in SA and overseas.

## Overview

The focus in awarding grants is on those small charities where “local heroes” do a great job and where small grants have a strong multiplier effect thanks to the input of volunteers.

UCF has awarded over 100 small grants since it’s beginnings when a group of successful Adelaide business people decided they wanted to “pay it forward”.

Directors will evaluate your application against the following criteria :

- Impact:
  - Will the funds provided make a significant difference for those the project is designed to assist? How?
  - How many people will be assisted?
  - Are there objective measures of impact? What are they?
  - How will the applicant know that the project has been successful?
- Funding:
  - Is the applicant a small charity or is it a programme within a larger charity?

- Does the programme receive government funding?
- Does the organisation receive government funding?
- Key Interest Areas (not in any order)

  - Health
  - Building self-sufficient communities (sustainable)

## Limitations

Universal Charitable Fund (UCF) is a non-profit Public Ancillary Fund (DGR2) and as such is constrained by law to distribute grants to Australian registered charitable organisations with Deductible Gift Recipient status (known as DGR1) and tax deductibility.

What this means to you:

- We cannot make grants to individuals (even if you are raising money for a good cause)
- Applications must be from the organisation to which the grant will be awarded
- We do not make donations to general funds. We typically do not fund printing, advocacy or marketing
- The applying organisation must have Deductible Gift Recipient status, commonly known as DGR and tax deductibility
- Typically, the organisations we award grants have an income of less than \$1 million
- DGR status is not the same as having Income Tax Exemption. If you are in any doubt please enter your organisation's ABN at <http://abr.business.gov.au/Index.aspx> – at the bottom of the information will be stated whether or not your organisation has DGR status

## Purpose

The grants provide small amounts of money that organisations and community groups can use to help their volunteers. The grants form part of the Government's work to support volunteers, as well as to encourage and increase participation in volunteering.

## Overview

The objectives of Volunteer Grants are to:

1. help community organisations to support the efforts of Australia's volunteers
2. help community organisations to support the inclusion of vulnerable people through volunteering
3. encourage, support and increase participation in volunteering.

The intended outcome of the program is to strengthen community functioning by increasing participation in volunteering.

Up to \$10 million is available in 2019-20. Funding of up to \$66,000 is available in each of the 151 Federal electorates.

Grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 are available to eligible not-for-profit community organisations. This funding is to be used to:

- purchase eligible small equipment items for use by volunteers
- contribute to volunteers' fuel costs
- contribute to transport costs for volunteers with disability who are unable to drive in association with their volunteering activity.
- assist with the costs of training courses for volunteers
- undertake background screening checks for volunteers.

**Note: To be eligible to apply you must be invited to apply by your Federal Member of Parliament. This is a new feature of this funding.**

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To be eligible to apply you must:

- **be invited to apply by your Federal Member of Parliament**
- use a large proportion of volunteers in your organisation. At least 40 per cent of the organisation's staff must be volunteers
- be a not-for-profit organisation
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN) or be willing to provide a Statement by Supplier Form (reason for not quoting an ABN).
- have an account with an Australian financial institution

NOTE: If you are applying as a Trustee on behalf of a Trust, the Trustee must be an eligible entity as listed below.

be one of the following entities:

- Indigenous Corporation
- Company
- Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Corporate State or Territory Entity
- Non-corporate State or Territory Statutory Authority
- Cooperative

- Incorporated Association
- Statutory Entity
- Partnership
- Person aged 18 or over representing a volunteer based community group as an authorised signatory (eg president, chairperson, secretary, treasurer)

### **Community groups that are not legal entities**

Community groups that are not legal entities are eligible to apply for funding, however the application must be from an authorised signatory (president, chairperson, secretary or treasurer) within the community group. This means that:

- the individual, as a legal entity, is applying for the funding on behalf of their community group
- the individual will enter into a Grant Agreement with DSS
- the grant will be paid into the bank account of the community group represented by the individual
- the individual (aged 18 years or over) will be held legally responsible for making sure the grant is spent in accordance with the Grant Agreement.

The community group must operate independently with a formal governing structure that meets regularly and supports local community volunteers within its group.

The individual representing a community group must:

- be an authorised signatory (president, chairperson, secretary or treasurer) within the community group
- have obtained the full knowledge and agreement of the community group they are applying on behalf of
- provide the funding to the community group for expenditure on the requested items to benefit the volunteers of the community group
- keep evidence/receipts that document appropriate spending of the funding for five years.

### **Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?**

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- ***not nominated by your Member of Parliament***
- a Sole Trader
- a for-profit organisation
- a Non-corporate Commonwealth Entity
- a Non-corporate State or Territory Entity
- a Commonwealth Company
- a non-corporate Commonwealth Statutory Authority
- a Local Government Entity
- an International Entity

### **What the grant money cannot be used for**

You cannot use the grant for:

- items that do not directly benefit the organisation's volunteers
- advertising, logos, banners, display boards, uniforms, badging, or other things that advertise your organisation/ community group
- administration costs such as leasing, rental, hiring, labour, utilities, insurance and travel
- fees, charges, and subscriptions
- service charges, extended warranties and other labour costs
- conferences and functions
- vehicles and powered boats
- buildings, renovations and permanent fixtures - plumbing, kitchens, hot water systems, fencing, etc
- window coverings (such as curtains and awnings) and floor coverings
- consumable supplies - food, books, stationery (such as paper and folders), cleaning products, ink, toners, soil, sunscreen, maps, refilling of gas bottles, etc
- gift-cards (with the exception of pre-paid fuel cards)
- gym equipment, heart rate monitors.

Fuel costs that are not eligible:

- fuel already paid for by other sources
- fuel to operate the organisation's equipment, vehicles or machinery

- fuel costs to travel to and from a conference or event where the person is not volunteering.

Transport costs that are not eligible:

### Purpose

The aim of the Individual Capacity Building (ICB) Program is to provide people with disability the skills and confidence to participate and contribute to the community and protect their rights.

### Overview

The ICB Program will achieve this by enabling systematic access to peer support, mentoring and other skills building for people with disability, carers and families, to develop their individual capacity. This could include activities that empower a person to be independent and to engage in social, economic and community life.

The grant can fund activities that align with the following two activity types:

- **Activity type 1:** Individual Capacity Building (ICB), which are activities that build the capacity of people with disability by ensuring that they have the knowledge, skills and confidence they need to set and achieve their goals. Proposed activities must be for the primary and direct benefit of people with disability, and developed and delivered in collaboration with people with disability.
- **Activity type 2:** Organisational Capacity Building (OCB), which are activities that improve the ability of DPO/FOs to deliver their organisational mission and to deliver ILC in the community.

A total of \$85million (GST Excl.) is available for up to two years for this Individual Capacity Building grant opportunity.

The table on pages 9-10 of the guidelines document outlines how much is available and the duration of the grants for the different organisation types that can apply.

This grant round will be a national round with a spread of grants across all jurisdictions. Applicants can apply to deliver activities nationally, across multiple jurisdictions, state-based or in particular regions or local areas.

Only applicants that meet the DPO/FO criteria can apply to deliver OCB activities. Further, DPO/FO applicants cannot apply to deliver only OCB activities. DPO/FO applicants must also apply to deliver ICB activities.

### Outcomes

The intended outcomes of the ICB activities are:

- knowledge and skills of people with disability
- motivation and confidence of people with disability
- participation and contribution to community by people with a disability

The intended outcome for the OCB activities is to build the capability of Disabled Peoples and Families Organisations (DPO/FOs) to improve their delivery of current and future ILC activities.



## Example

Below are some examples of projects under \$90,000:

- Supporting existing peer led groups for the maintenance and support of the group such as venue hire, assistance with interpreting, and other costs associated with running the group.
- Small scale projects or pilot projects that contribute to building the capacity of people with disability in the local community.
- Building capacity of a place-based community or community of interest while also strengthening the infrastructure of the group to further its mission.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

DPO/FOs and PCL criteria

1. Disabled Peoples Organisations with paid staff and a Board, who meet both of the eligibility criteria outlined below:

- strongly align with the Social Model of Disability and;
- be run by carers and families of people with disability for carers and families of people with disability.

2. Family Organisation:

To apply in this category, the organisation must:

- strongly align with the Social Model of Disability and;
- be run by carers and families of people with disability for carers and families of people with disability.

3. Priority Cohort Led Organisations (PCLs) - these organisations must represent one or more of the following cohorts:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities; and/or organisations registered with the Office of the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations (ORIC); and/or
- Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities; and/or
- Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex, Queer/Questioning, Asexual and Plus Cohort (LGBTIQA+).

### Eligible entity types

The National Disability Insurance Agency can only provide funding to an organisation that is a legal entity. To be eligible you must:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN), or be willing to obtain one prior to the execution of the grant agreement
- be registered, or willing to register for the purposes of GST if your income turnover as a result of a successful grant will exceed the threshold defined by the Australian Tax Office
- have an account with an Australian financial institution
- have public liability insurance cover for the duration of the project.

You must also be one of the following legal entity types:

- A Company
- An Incorporated Association
- An Indigenous Corporation registered under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006
- A Cooperative
- A Local Government entity, only as an auspisor of a Disabled Peoples Organisation or Family Organisation.
- Corporate State or Territory Entity, only as an auspisor of a Disabled Peoples Organisation or Family Organisation.

Non-legal entities, such as unincorporated associations, may apply through an auspice arrangement with another organisation if the lead organisation is an eligible legal entity.

### Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an individual, sole trader or partnership
- an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
- an unincorporated association, unless auspiced through an eligible entity type
- a Commonwealth, state, or territory government, agency or body (including government business enterprises)
- a Local Government entity, unless acting as an auspisor
- a Corporate State or Territory entity, unless acting as an auspisor
- an overseas resident/organisation
- a Partner in the Community organisation (providing Local Area Coordination and/or Early Childhood Intervention services through the National Disability Insurance Scheme Partners in the Community Program) unless they are acting as an auspisor

The Equipment and Facilities Grant Program supports schools and services to fund equipment and facilities that enable new services to establish and existing services to expand.

### Overview

Infrastructure Fund Objectives

The objectives of the Infrastructure Fund are to:

- Increase the number of approved before and after school care places for NSW government primary school children.
- Increase the number of NSW public primary schools with onsite Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) services in Metro and Inner Regional NSW.
- Increase the number of NSW public primary schools with access to OSHC services in Outer Regional, Rural and Remote NSW.

Applicants may seek up to \$30,000 (GST exclusive) for their project and applications will be assessed based on the level of demand for the increase in places and how well the proposed project will address the issue.

### Limitations

#### Eligible applicants

NSW Government schools and not for profit OSHC providers or services supporting government school students that can demonstrate unmet demand and the capacity to establish a new service or to increase the number of approved places may apply for grants under the Program.

Applications must be submitted by an authorised officer, either:

- The school principal, if the proposed new service or service expansion is on a school site.
- A person legally able to enter into agreements on behalf of the approved provider or service provider, if the proposed new service or service expansion is not on a school site.

#### What projects are eligible?

To be eligible for funding, the application must:

- Be associated with the provision of before and/or after school care from an approved OSHC provider

- Be supported with evidence of unmet demand for the service
- Enable an increase in the availability of approved places to NSW government primary school children via the establishment of a new service or expansion of an existing service to meet the unmet demand
- Have approval from Schools Infrastructure NSW (local Asset Management Unit) for any works proposed on a NSW government school site

### What activities or projects can be funded?

Activities or projects are eligible for funding where the funding is to be used to increase the number of approved places for NSW government primary school children. This may be by establishing a new before and after school care service or expansion of an existing service.

## Purpose

To mitigate the risk of closure of services prior to the full implementation of the \$120 commitment, the Before and After School Care Reform Team has established an Interim Support Fund.

## Overview

The NSW Government is investing \$120 million into expanding before and after school care to make more places available to parents with children at government primary schools. As part of the \$120 commitment, \$20 million has been made available as part of an implementation fund which is aimed at communities where a standalone service may not be viable, including smaller schools and rural and remote communities.

Different areas and services will need different solutions. The before and after school care reform team are working closely with schools, communities and providers to pilot some new approaches beginning end of 2019 and into 2020. This will help to better understand the needs of parents and communities.

During this period of designing, piloting, testing, and implementing the grants program, the Department of Education (NSW) want to ensure that we mitigate the risk of services closing, which is why the Interim Support Fund has been established.

Services are most at risk of closing when student enrolments are low and the income derived from session fees is insufficient to cover general operating expenses. Many small schools (particularly in remote or rural settings) do not have the scale to support a dedicated provider and are on the edge of viability.

The total funding pool available through the Interim Support Fund is \$150,000. Individual funding requests will be limited to a maximum of \$15,000 and grant applications will be assessed against the eligibility criteria strictly on a first come first served basis.

The interim support fund will open in December 2019 and will remain open until the end of Term 1 2020 or until all the available funds are expended, whichever happens first.

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Service Providers providing approved before and / or after school care places for NSW Government primary school children. Eligible services may be not-for-profit, for-profit or P&C operated.

### Who is eligible?

The following eligibility criteria is required for an interim support package:

- Service must provide before and/or after school care for NSW government primary school children
- Service must show evidence of sustained losses
- For services on NSW government school sites: - Evidence of support of the school Principal to continue to operate - Efforts have been made to reduced license fee in accordance with actual enrolments
- No outstanding contentious, issues noted by the Regulator
- Service must work closely with the school and the Department's BASC Reform Team to identify and implement solutions to long-term sustainability.

### Fund use

Awarded funding must be used to cover operational or recurrent expenses to support the ongoing delivery of before and/or after school care services.

Within these parameters, the funds can be used for the following activities:

- License fees or rent for operating premises
- Direct staffing costs
- Administration expenses
- Resources and food
- Marketing and promotion of service
- Programs/activities to attract or retain enrolments

Funds **cannot** be used for the following:

- To contribute directly to the profit of the service
- Activities not related to the delivery of before and after school care services
- Capital expenses
- Activities that are already fully funded by another government grants program
- Activities that have already occurred

To be considered for community investment, whether financial or in-kind, applications must demonstrate how the initiative will make a positive contribution to the community and should target at least one of the following focus areas:

- Education
- Enterprise Development
- Health
- Environment
- Identified Local Need

Additional local and regional priority areas may also be communicated by individual Glencore Coal operations. Applications that address these priority areas may also be accepted.

### What funding is available?

Applications of any amount will be accepted and assessed on merit and value to the community.

- core operating costs of an organisation e.g. staff, operational expenses
- projects/activities that are the responsibility of government
- projects/activities that do not demonstrate financial sustainability
- overseas appeals
- research projects
- projects/activities that have already been completed (retrospective funding)

### Project/Activity Completion:

Projects must be completed within 12 months from the time of funding.

## Purpose

To reduce crashes on Australian roads and to target those road locations where crashes are occurring.

## Overview

The Australian Government will provide \$744.5 million to the Black Spot Program from the 2013 to 2014 financial year to the 2021 to 2022 financial year, with an on-going commitment of \$60 million each year following.

Road crashes are a major cost to Australians every year. Black Spot projects target those road locations where crashes are occurring. By funding measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at dangerous locations, the program reduces the risk of crashes.

The Black Spot Program makes an important contribution in reducing the national road toll under the [National Road Safety Action Plan 2018–2020](#).

Anyone can nominate a 'black spot' for funding consideration, using the official nomination form. Candidate projects are first assessed by the relevant state road authority, which has details of the crash history of the site and the expertise to assess the appropriate treatment.

**Community Consultation** Widespread community consultation and participation is fundamental to this program, ensuring that local concerns are addressed.



Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

**Coordination** States and territories play an important coordinating role. A Consultative Panel has been established in each state and territory. It consists of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry, the Australian Government, local government and state road and transport agencies. Panels provide comment to the Australian Government on nominations for Black Spot works.

**Rural Projects** More than 60% of road deaths and a significant proportion of serious injuries occur outside metropolitan areas. In line with national road safety policy objectives, approximately 50% of Black Spot funds in each state (other than Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory) are reserved for projects in non-metropolitan areas. This ensures that crash locations in rural areas are treated.

## Limitations

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

### What makes a site eligible for funding?

Funding is mainly available for the treatment of Black Spot sites, or road lengths, with a proven history of crashes. Project proposals should be able to demonstrate a benefit to cost ratio of at least 2 to 1.

For individual sites such as intersections, mid-block or short road sections, there should be a history of at least three casualty crashes over a five-year period. For lengths of road, there should be an average of 0.2 casualty crashes per kilometre per annum over the length in question over five years.

The requirement of a history of crashes ensures that those sites that have a recurrent problem are targeted first for treatment.

The Black Spot Program also recognises that there are road locations that could be considered as 'accidents waiting to happen'. Therefore, some program funds may be used to treat sites where road traffic engineers have completed a Road Safety Audit and found that remedial work is necessary. This allows an opportunity for proactive safety works to be undertaken before casualties occur.

Funds cannot be used for the purchase of road-building plant or equipment, or for operational or maintenance costs.

To assist with the bushfire recovery of communities, St.George Foundation, Bank of Melbourne Foundation and BankSA Foundation will provide funding to eligible organisations in Australia.

## Purpose

To support netball and community organisations directly affected by the 2019-2020 bushfire disaster events.

## Overview

Netball and community organisations across Australia directly affected by the 2019-2020 bushfire disaster events may be eligible to receive bushfire recovery grants from the Confident Girls Foundation Bushfire Recovery Fund.

There will be two tiers of grants available, providing small grants up to \$1,500 and larger grants up to \$10,000.

The application process is designed to be flexible to support a range of needs, however the Foundation anticipates that initial needs are likely to focus on infrastructure, purchasing equipment, covering the costs of registrations and fees for participants, holding clinics and special community events and supplying uniforms.

Broader netball and community activities could include:

- Bringing the netball community together to support social skills, connectedness and build networks and friendships through group activities, e.g. community barbecues, regular coffee mornings and community meetings
- Projects that are recovery focused and aim to build on the netball community's and members' resilience, healing and capacity building
- Initiatives offering comfort, reassurance and assistance to communities and individuals to address practical needs and return to normal routines; and/or
- Practical advice and skills development, e.g. for parents to help provide support for their children, addressing particular needs of isolated older women, or future netball club bushfire planning and preparedness.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

Applications are encouraged from local not-for-profit netball community organisations in bushfire-affected locations, who work closely with their local community. However, the Foundation may also support groups, including councils, schools and universities that are based outside the directly affected areas but are delivering services into affected areas, if that support is requested by or strongly endorsed by local community leaders.

Organisations need either an ABN or incorporation certificate and will be required in the application process to demonstrate how grant funding will be of broad community benefit.

Projects that fall into any of the following categories will not be considered for funding:

- Initiatives that duplicate existing activities and services.
- Activities that are covered under and insurance claim.
- Communities that were not impacted by the 2019-2020 bushfires.
- Activities that, in the Foundation's reasonable opinion, are unrelated to bushfire recovery.
- Initiatives that would require ongoing funding.
- Alcohol purchases for community or other events.
- Projects that subsidise commercial activities (e.g. ongoing business operational costs).
- Retrospective funding - projects which are already completed are not eligible for consideration.
- Applications for activities taking place outside of Australia.
- Applications for projects that have previously been declined by the Foundation cannot be resubmitted unless there are material changes to the project.
- Applications will not be accepted from organisations that have not successfully acquitted previous grants from the Foundation.

### Limitations

#### Eligibility

##### Primary Producer

When activated, grants are available to primary producers who meet the following criteria:

- You are a property owner, share-farmer or lessee in the grazing industry (as confirmed by your Land and Stock Return).
- Your business operates as a sole trader, partnership, trust or private company and trades agricultural products.
- You have suffered direct damage as a result of the specified event.

- The business is registered with the Australian Taxation Office as a primary producer, and has an Australian Business Number (ABN).
- As the owner and operator, you earn more than 50% of your gross income from your primary production business under normal seasonal circumstances.

### Small Business

When activated, grants are available to small businesses that meet the following criteria:

- Have fewer than 20 full time (or equivalent) employees;
- Under normal circumstances, derive more than 50 per cent of their total gross income from the small business enterprise.
- Are a registered business, partnership or sole trader with an Australian Business Number (ABN). If the business has applied to the ATO but not yet received an ABN, they may be considered eligible.

### Not-for-profit organisations

When activated, grants are available to NPOs that meet the following criteria:

- They are located within the disaster affected area.
- They are incorporated charities or NPOs which are registered with the Australian Charities and Non-Profits Commission (ACNC) or an equivalent state regulatory body.
- These NPOs may include: non-profit schools, religious institutions, homeless hostels, aged persons homes, organisations relieving the special needs of people with disabilities, community child care centres, cultural societies, environmental protection societies, neighbourhood associations, public museums and libraries, scouts, sports clubs, surf lifesaving clubs, or traditional service clubs.

In-kind contributions are non-cash contributions. These can include labour contributions and facilities, equipment and services provided by the applicant or project partners to the project. In order for in-kind contributions to count towards your contribution, they must directly relate to eligible activities.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

We cannot consider your application if you do not satisfy all eligibility criteria.

To be eligible you must:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- implement the project in one of the eligible trial regions

and be one of the following entities:

- an entity incorporated in Australia
- a local government agency or body as defined in appendix A
- a Regional Development Australia committee.

An entity incorporated in Australia includes companies, incorporated trustees on behalf of a trust, incorporated associations and Indigenous incorporations.

To be eligible your project must:

- provide opportunities and assistance to help unemployed people prepare for and find work
- have at least \$10,000 in eligible expenditure.

**You are not eligible to apply if you are:**

- a Commonwealth, State or Territory government body (including government business enterprises) unless acting as the legal entity for an unincorporated Regional Development Australia Committee.
- a trust (however an incorporated trustee can apply on behalf of a trust).

## Purpose

To provide support for people undertaking projects that will make a positive difference to the natural living environment, in land, sea or air, rural or urban.

## Overview

Grants are usually under \$10,000. The Foundation also grants on behalf of donors, and their programs can be over \$10,000 e.g. the landscape restoration and education grants. If you have a project over \$10,000, check with the Foundation first.

Universities and academics can only apply for up to \$5,000.

The Foundation is looking for projects around:

- flora and fauna conservation (Australia-wide)
- threatened mammal conservation (Australia-wide)
- landscape restoration and education (Victoria only)

These projects should involve any of the following:

- monitoring, recording and sharing data
- delivering community education
- providing community capacity building (e.g. training)
- research and science

Grants are awarded four times a year – February, May, August and November.

There are opening dates for these grant rounds, but no closing dates – a round is closed when a suitable number and spread of applications have been received to present to the Trustees. So it's best to get in as soon as you can when the round opens.

Here are dates when the rounds open and the application form appears online:

- 2nd December 2019 (funding released February 2020)- **closed**
- 1st April 2020 (funding released (May 2020)
- 1st July 2020 (funding released August 2020)
- 1st October 2020 (funding released November 2020)
- 1st December 2020 (funding released February 2021)

The Trustees meet four times a year to decide on applications. If you apply in December, you find out in February. If you apply in March, you'll hear in May. If you apply in June, you'll hear in August. If you apply in September, you'll hear in November. See the Dates for applying page for dates. We can't fund retrospectively so make sure you get the dates right.

## Limitations

### Can you apply?

- Is your project about Australian flora and fauna conservation, threatened mammal conservation, or landscape restoration and education?
- Do you have partners?
- Is your project ready to go, and can you do it? Be sure before you apply.
- We fund projects as small as \$1,000, and sometimes fund over \$10,000, but grants are usually under \$10,000. Please don't just stick \$10,000 in the budget line – *we aren't a government agency and don't appreciate people asking for the maximum amount. Ask us for what the project **really** costs.*

- Universities – you can apply for up to \$5,000. But we don't fund pure research, you must be partnering with an 'on ground' group and be able to show it. **You must have a community partner.**
- All grant recipients must fill in a final report on-line at the end of their project. The signed grant conditions letter is your written agreement to this. Please don't apply unless you are willing to do this report. *If you don't report, you can't apply again.*
- If you're not sure whether to apply, email **Beth**, who is more than happy to give advice before you make an effort to fill in the form. But please don't send documentation to read about your project.

#### What will be funded:

- Projects that directly make positive changes to biodiversity conservation in Australia.
- Projects with long term objectives and values.
- Projects that show the following: enthusiasm, collaboration, passion, innovation
- Projects that use citizen science
- Projects that are about community education relating to conservation

#### What we don't fund:

- Art projects
- School projects
- Advocacy
- Tree planting, fencing or pest plant or animal control
- Private property owners or farm projects
- Workshops alone, any workshops need to be a part of a larger project with an 'action' component
- Invasive monitoring
- Gardens- bush good gardens, sensory gardens, veggie gardens, chicken houses, water tanks, arboretums etc. (particularly in kinders and schools)- we're too small to fund all these projects around Australia so please don't apply
- Animal or wildlife refuges and their activities
- Pure academic research- academic applicants need to show how their research is directly linked to a community group doing conservation work. Research needs to be of benefit to those groups working on habitat or species conservation. eg. applications for research on how climate change will affect particular species without the research being done in conjunction with a group that can work towards conserving that species on the ground will not be accepted.

**Global High Schools:** The category is open to all high schools with students between 11-19 years old. The application must be supported by the school and its management. The winning projects will show how they meet the three criteria: impact, innovation, inspiration, explained in more detail below.

The school must have multiple years of students (i.e. it cannot be a semester school). The project should benefit the school community for several years. It should be able to be built and operational within one to two years. We encourage schools to get quotes from suppliers for the cost of their project and include this estimate as an attachment to their application. This helps to make sure the project is realistic and helps us to get a clearer idea of how much the project will cost.

## Purpose

VFFF aspires to a stronger and brighter future for Australians in NSW and QLD by supporting organisations with aims compatible with VFFF's goal that people and places experiencing disadvantage thrive.

## Overview

VFFF makes grants to charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC). Grants between \$20,000 and \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW or Queensland. Grants above \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW.

Founder Sir Vincent Fairfax was a committed Christian and actively involved in the Anglican Church. Christian faith was a central pillar of his life and character, providing purpose, a robust ethical framework and the basis of care for others. Today, VFFF seeks to support a spiritually rich society that values Christian faith in action through their Christianity funding stream.

The GCE initiative funds innovative ideas that could lead to new vaccines, diagnostics, drugs, and other technologies targeting diseases that claim millions of lives every year, as well as improvements and innovations in agriculture development and other priority areas of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

## Overview

Grand Challenges Explorations (GCE) supports hundreds of early-stage projects – including many ideas that have never before been tested – and innovators from a wide range of disciplines and regions.

GCE is an extension of the foundation's commitment to the Grand Challenges in Global Health, which was launched in 2003 to accelerate the discovery of new technologies to improve global health. Since then, GCE has expanded to include global development and communications challenges, and the Grand Challenges family of programs launched additional funding opportunities in 2014.

Awards of \$100,000 USD are made in Phase I. Phase I awardees have one opportunity to apply for a follow-on Phase II award of up to \$1,000,000 USD.

The two current open opportunities are:

1. Innovations in Materials Science for a Transformative Menstrual Health and Hygiene Product
2. Innovations for Improving the Impact of Health Campaigns

## Limitations

### Eligibility Criteria

GCE is open to both foreign and domestic organisations, including:

- government agencies
- academic institutions.

The Foundation will not consider funding for:

- Proposals not presenting clear innovation for improving the planning, implementation, or evaluation of health campaigns.
- Interventions that are better classified as technical assistance or campaign implementation (e.g. focused on the delivery or improvement of a single campaign).
- Proposals seeking to apply existing tools in ways that do not transform the current practices used for campaign-based delivery.
- Proposals where the solution is to leverage one health campaign for co-delivery of other goods or services (e.g. using a NTD campaign to deliver vaccine reminders).
- Incremental improvements or small, non-transformative operational improvements (e.g. use of mobile data collection instead of paper-based collection) with no clear link to dramatically improved campaign effectiveness.
- Proposals focused on improving access to existing tools or technologies.
- Innovative ideas without a clearly-articulated and testable approach.
- Approaches not directly relevant to low-income settings. Approaches for which proof of concept cannot be demonstrated within the scope of the GCE Phase 1 award (\$100,000 over 18 months).
- Secondary analysis of existing studies or systematic reviews unless there is a clear way in which the analysis can be scaled and will fundamentally change practice.
- Proof of concept studies that do not clearly consider the current context of available financial systems and infrastructure for resource poor health settings. For example, ideas that are tested using expensive devices or require government-issued IDs in a country where few people have them, or to populations which require hospital deliveries in settings where this is not the norm.
- Approaches that circumvent the public sector completely.
- Approaches which would require a donor's long-term financial support to sustain.
- Innovative ideas that repeat conventional approaches without novel application.

## Purpose

The research grants acknowledge the vital contribution general practitioners and general practice registrars make in furthering medical advancements within the community. By raising funds to support a diverse range of research grants, scholarships, fellowships and awards, the RACGP Foundation provides general practitioners with the opportunity to undertake vital research into primary health care.

## Overview

### MAIC/RACGP Foundation Research Grant

This grant encourages general practitioners to undertake research on issues related to the management of RTC injuries which are relevant to GPs, their patients and local communities.

- One research grant of up to \$100,000 (excluding GST) is available for a period of 18 months to provide a GP or GP registrar with an opportunity to conduct research into the management of injuries resulting from road traffic crashes.

#### **RACGP Foundation/HCF Research Foundation Research Grant**

This grant focuses on research into health services issues of relevance to general practice

- Two grants of up to \$60,000 each (excluding GST) are available for a period of one year to fund research into health services issues of relevance to general practice. This might include access to care, effectiveness of care, quality of care, efficiency of care, or cost of care.

#### **RACGP Foundation / Diabetes Australia Research Grant**

This grant supports research into diabetes management, prevention, and/or clinical care in general practice.

- One grant of up to \$60,000 is available for a period of one year to fund research into diabetes management, prevention, and/or clinical care in general practice.

#### **RACGP Foundation/BOQ Specialist Research Grant**

This grant encourages innovation in preventative healthcare in general practice.

- One grant of up to \$20,000 (excluding GST) is available for a period of one year to provide a GP researcher or GP registrar with an opportunity to conduct research into preventive care in general practice.

#### **RACGP Foundation /ANEDGP Research Grant**

The purpose of this grant is to conduct research within the former boundary of the Adelaide North East Division of General Practice.

- The RACGP Foundation and the ANEDGP grant is available for a period of one year to provide GP researchers with an opportunity to conduct research that advances the profession of general practice. Funding of up to \$20,000 (excluding GST) is available.

#### **Family Medical Care Education and Research (FMCER) Grant**

This grant is to encourage and support GPs in the early stages of their research career to conduct research into an aspect of primary health care.

- The Family Medical Care Education and Research (FMCER) grants are available for a period of one year to provide new and emerging GP researchers with an opportunity to conduct research. Funding of up to \$20,000 (excluding GST) is available for research that benefits primary health care. Two grants are available.

#### **Indigenous Health Award**

This grant aims to support the provision of high quality health care to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

- One or more RACGP Indigenous Health Awards, valued at up to \$9,000 in total (excluding GST), are available for a period of one year to provide support for:
  - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander medical students
  - medical students to gain experience in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health
  - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander medical graduates undertaking GP training
  - GP registrars and GPs undertaking research and educational projects in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health
  - other activities supporting the provision of high quality health care to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

#### **Chris Silagy Research Scholarship**

This grant supports research into an aspect of evidence-based primary health care.

- The Chris Silagy Research Scholarship is designed to support a 12-month research project into an aspect of evidence-based primary health care by a general practitioner researcher. The scholarship is to the value of \$15,000 (excluding GST) which includes a return economy airfare for the recipient to either attend a meeting of the Cochrane Collaboration, or visit a Cochrane Research Centre during the year of the scholarship.

#### **Walpole Grieve Award**

This award supports an early career researcher to travel for research or educational purposes.

- The award, to the value of \$5,000 (excluding GST), is designed to support travel for research or educational purposes. Travel can be within Australia or overseas, and the award must be used within 12 months of being awarded.

#### **Charles Bridges-Webb Memorial Award**

This award is targeted at general practice registrars who recently were, currently are or will be undertaking an academic term in a discipline of general practice or rural health.

- The award of up to \$1,000 (excluding GST) is available to pay for direct research costs associated with the conduct of any study that has ethics approval and is deemed to have relevance to general practice, health care, health outcomes or health professional education. Direct research costs include any item or service that materially contributes to the collection and analysis of data relevant to the aims of the research project. For instance, it can include payments to practices for participation in a research project, payment for equipment and disposables, payment for paper or photocopying, telephone calls, data entry and statistical help.

## Purpose

The objective of the Community War Memorials Fund is to help conserve, repair and protect war memorials across NSW to support community commemoration.

## Overview

The Community War Memorials Fund awards grants of up to \$10,000 (excluding GST). Grants for work to improve the accessibility of war memorials are capped at \$2,000 (excluding GST).

### Types of projects that might be funded:

- Specialist conservation advice for war memorials:
  - Condition assessment reports
  - Conservation management plans
  - Arborist advice for war memorial trees
  - Structural assessment reports
- Preservation work:
  - Protective measures for memorials e.g. repairs to damaged barriers and fences that surround and protect a memorial
  - Having protective coatings applied by a specialist conservator
  - Stabilisation of fabric
  - Painting
- Restoration work:
  - Removal of inappropriate accretions e.g. graffiti
  - Cleaning and corrosion removal by specialist conservators e.g. treatment of rusted original memorial gates or fences
  - Repairs to the damaged lettering on war memorial cenotaphs and rolls of honour e.g. regilding, repainting
  - Conservation and repairs to stonework on war memorials
  - Repointing mortar joints
  - Restoring war memorial landscapes to their original design, intent or purpose
  - Repairs to damaged sculptures
  - Replacement of decayed or missing elements where repair is not feasible



- Other:

- Works to improve equitable access to a memorial (\$2,000 cap)
- Relocation of memorials for public safety

**Important:** Applicants to the Community War Memorials Fund are expected to seek conservation advice from a qualified specialist before planning any physical work to a memorial.

The Community War Memorials Fund can award funding to pay for specialist heritage advice. If you do not have access to specialist heritage advice for your project, you should first submit a Community War Memorials Fund application for funding to have a condition assessment of your memorial undertaken.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria:

- Applications must be for an existing war memorial commemorating Australia's military heritage and the war memorial must be located within the State of NSW or, if located outside NSW, of direct and substantial relevance to the State.
- The definition of a "memorial" includes public monuments, memorial places, landscaped spaces, buildings, sculptures, trees and avenues as well as indoor fixtures such as honour boards, plaques, busts or bas-relief sculptures.
- An application may be made by any organisation, provided the owner or custodian of the memorial, local RSL sub-branch and local council support the bid, where applicable
- Before applying to the Community War Memorials Fund the memorial must first be recorded on the Register of War Memorials in NSW ([warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au](http://warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au)).
- Applications must be for the repair, protection and/or conservation of existing memorials.
- Applications relating to memorials located on either private or public property are eligible for funding, however the memorial must have a public function and be accessible to the public.
- The State War Memorials Committee will announce grants biannually, with applications closing on Anzac Day and on Remembrance Day. However, the Committee may make extraordinary grants as circumstances require.
- Applications to fund works that have already been completed are not eligible.
- The State War Memorials Committee may in extraordinary circumstances approve applications that do not meet all of the above criteria.

Projects that are not funded by the Community War Memorials Fund:

- Work that does not meet the eligibility criteria
- Inappropriate work and methods that do not align with best practice heritage conservation
- Work that has already been started or completed
- Constructing new war memorials
- Replacing existing war memorials
- Adding of new commemorative elements e.g. plaques, service badges
- Maintaining or replacing flagpoles
- Adding names to war memorials
- Capital expenditure for the purchase of assets e.g. office furniture, equipment
- Costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- Council approval costs
- Ongoing expenditure, i.e. website hosting, memorial maintenance
- Projects relating to the display of military memorabilia
- Work to graves
- Seating for war memorials
- Interpretive signage
- Work to war memorials that are not recorded on the NSW War Memorials Register

## Purpose

The Volunteer Museum Grant Program provides assistance to volunteer-initiated community museums and Aboriginal Cultural Centres (with artefact collections and displays) in NSW.

## Overview

This is a Create NSW devolved funding program, administered by Museums & Galleries of NSW (M&G NSW) on behalf of the NSW Government. The program provides access to funding for collection-focused projects, in addition to providing experience in the grant application process.

Leg Up Grants are “quick response” grants for volunteers in volunteer managed museums and Aboriginal Cultural Centres who require financial assistance to attend some form of skills development activity, or to bring such an activity into their museum.

### Amount available

The maximum amount that can be applied for under the program is: \$500

Note: Leg Up Grants require funding from Museums & Galleries of NSW to be matched dollar-for-dollar by the applying museum/cultural centre.

### Timeframe

Leg Up Grants can be applied for at any time throughout the year, until all funds are expended. Acquittals are due two months after the completion of the activity.

Leg Up Grant applications must be received by M&G NSW at least 3 weeks before the skills development activity (e.g. conference, workshop, seminar) is scheduled to take place.

Applicants must contact M&G NSW to discuss your project. Staff members are on hand to provide advice on writing grant applications, developing a project, budgeting and sourcing appropriate consultants.

## Limitations

### Eligibility

To apply for a Leg Up Grant, an organisation must:

- Be incorporated (or provide the details of an auspicing body that is incorporated, such as a local council)
- Be not-for-profit
- Be an established museum, museum network (such as Museums Australia) or an established Aboriginal Cultural Centre with artefact collections and displays (not an archive or historical society without a museum function)
- Be regularly open to the public (ie not open by appointment only)
- Not have more than the equivalent of two full-time paid positions
- Provide a written commitment to contribute 50% of the overall costs of the project, thereby matching the amount funded by the Leg Up Grant
- Agree to abide by the terms and conditions of the grant Not apply for a VM Grant if they have also applied for, or received, Create NSW funding for the same activity.

### Leg Up Grants will fund:

Various skills development projects, such as (but not limited to) the following:

- Workshops, conferences, meetings or seminars in NSW and the ACT
- Networking opportunities - one or more volunteers visiting other museums/sites/venues, to share information on a similar project and learn new practices

- Hosting an event - hosting an event that develops skills in the museum, such as an in-house workshop or guest speaker
- Travel costs, accommodation and registration fees (excluding meal costs)

#### Leg Up Grants will not fund:

- Retrospective projects or projects that have already started (for instance, training that has already been undertaken)
- The cost of meals

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## Purpose

The National Cultural Heritage Account helps Australian public cultural organisations buy significant objects that they could not otherwise afford.

## Overview

A total of \$500,000 is available each year. You can apply at any time. Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis.

The National Cultural Heritage Account keeps Australian protected objects in Australia so they can be preserved and made available to the public.

Cultural organisations that can care for and provide permanent public access to Australian protected objects have a priority for funding.

Individuals can also apply if they intend to gift the object to an eligible cultural institution with a permanent public collection. In these cases, the grant and the gifting of the object must be simultaneous.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups can apply for funding even if they do not have a permanent public collection. This is because of the special significance of Class A objects of heritage to Indigenous communities.

### How to apply:

You must apply in writing.

Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis and usually covers a proportion of the fair market value of the object. Fair market value is determined by recent auction prices or the actual price paid.

The [National Cultural Heritage Committee](#) considers applications and provides recommendations to the Minister for the Arts.

You might be asked to provide at least two independent valuations from valuers approved under the Commonwealth's Cultural Gifts Program.

## Priority

The following Australian protected objects are priorities for funding:

- Class A objects in Australia and overseas
- Class B objects that have been denied an export permit
- Class B objects that have been granted an export permit on condition that they be available at fair market value for purchase by an eligible cultural organisation
- Class B objects that are overseas.

## Limitations

### Who can apply

Australian cultural institutions can apply for funding. This includes museums, art galleries, libraries, archives, historic buildings, national trusts and local history museums and galleries, and Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander keeping places for sacred/secret material.

The maximum amount that can be applied for under the program is: \$2,000 (GST exclusive) All Volunteer Museum Grants are awarded free of GST. If the applicant is registered for GST M&G NSW will pay that component. If the applicant is not registered for GST they may request that the GST component be added to the grant. ## Purpose

The 1,000 Jobs Package provides wage subsidies to support increased employment opportunities across remote Australia. Eligible employers could receive financial support for up to two years to hire Community Development Program (CDP) participants in ongoing jobs.

## Overview

Tranche Two of the 1,000 Jobs Package has a General stream and Youth Engagement Jobs (YEJ) stream. The General stream is open to any industry, if the proposed job and employer meet the eligibility.

The YEJ is for employers who want to create jobs to work with young people to strengthen their engagement with their culture and community and/or promote mental health and social wellbeing. YEJ can be filled by CDP Participants of any age and should be tailored to the needs of the local community.

### Grant amount and grant period

Over two years, eligible employers could receive:

- a wage subsidy of up to \$51,000 (GST exclusive) paid at an hourly rate in arrears.
- a retention bonus of up to \$5,000 (GST exclusive) for retaining a CDP participant in employment, paid in instalment.
- Tranche Two includes a Youth Engagement Jobs stream for employers who create employment opportunities for CDP participants to work with youth. Jobs under the Youth Engagement Jobs Stream are eligible for additional incentives, including:
  - a commencement payment of \$1,000 (GST exclusive) for employers.
  - an employee bonus of up to \$2,000 (GST exclusive) for remaining in employment, paid in instalments. Payments will be made to employers to be passed on to employees.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

To be eligible, a job must:

- be new
- be ongoing (an employer should have no known reason why the job would not continue)
- be part-time or full time for a minimum of 15 hours per week and up to 38 hours per week
- employ a current CDP participant in the job (at the time of employment)
- be located in a CDP region
- involve a normal employer/employee relationship.

To be eligible an employer must:

- have consulted with a representative of the NIAA on the job
- have consulted with the local CDP Provider on the job
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be registered for the purposes of GST
- have an account with an Australian financial institution
- be compliant with the relevant Commonwealth and state/ or territory legislation including but not limited to work place health and safety and workplace equality
- be one of the following entity types:
  - an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Corporation
  - a company incorporated in Australia
  - incorporated Associations



- incorporated Cooperatives
- organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or state/territory legislation including public benevolent institutions, churches, universities and Land Councils
- an Australian state or territory government body
- an Australian local government body
- an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
- a partnership or a joint (consortia) application with a lead organisation that satisfies the entity type
- an individual with an ABN.
- Be financially viable.
- Have rectified any issues of previous non-compliance with existing Commonwealth agreements to the satisfaction of the Commonwealth, or be in the process of rectifying any issues of non-compliance with existing Commonwealth agreements to the satisfaction of the Commonwealth.

A job is not eligible for a grant if it:

- displaces an existing employee (with the exception of a job currently filled on a drive-in, drive-out or fly-in, fly-out basis)
- is a casual job
- is a religious occupation
- is to be fully funded under a Commonwealth, state or territory government program – employers can only claim for the unfunded portion of the job
- involves work that is not suitable and safe
- is likely to bring the program or the Commonwealth into disrepute
- is involved in the delivery of services under an executed CDP Funding Agreement (with the exception of a job funded under the YEJ stream).

An employer is not eligible for a grant if they are:

- engaging an employee to be employed under the Public Service Act 1999
- declared bankrupt or subject to insolvency proceedings – as relevant to the entity type
- listed as non-compliant under the Workplace Gender Equality Act 2012; or
- any organisation not included in the list above.

### **Additional YEJ stream eligibility**

A YEJ stream job must:

- meet all the Tranche Two general eligible criteria
- have duties that are primarily focused on working with youth to strengthen their engagement with their culture and community and/or promote mental health and social wellbeing.
- be filled by CDP participants that have (or have the ability to gain prior to employment) appropriate registrations or qualifications (i.e. working with vulnerable people registration).

The Foundation provides grants to Aboriginal communities and individuals to support projects which advance the aims of the Foundation.

## Overview

In view of the limited resources available to the Foundation, priority for funding is being given to the following categories:

1. Seeding grants:
  - to research the relevance and value of new projects that may be ineligible for support from existing agencies
  - to facilitate schemes or projects of benefit to Aboriginal health, welfare or education which have potential for wider application.
2. One-off grants in support of:
  - health and well being of artists and their families
  - education through art projects which will benefit health and well being
  - individuals and communities, with a connection to Aboriginal art and/or artists, to meet special needs

The Foundation will usually fund projects between \$500 to a limit of \$5,000.

Grant applications are considered by the Board of the Foundation at each directors meeting. The Board currently meets approximately 6 - 8 times each year.

In extreme and special circumstances, the Board may allocate funds outside these guidelines.

The Foundation provides grants to assist Aboriginal Communities and Individuals.

Please note, for legal reasons, the ABF may only pay grant money to organisations or companies endorsed as a "Deductible Gift Recipient" (a DGR).

## Purpose

The Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Grant (EDAEG) initiative aims to promote diversity, innovation and service responsiveness in the NSW workforce by subsidising the salary, development and support costs of Aboriginal employees in public service agencies or local government authorities.

## Overview

The objectives of the Grant are to:

- encourage the permanent employment and professional mobility of Aboriginal people in NSW public service agencies and local government authorities, with special incentives for the employment of Aboriginal people with a disability, and
- promote innovation in achieving education, employment and training outcomes for Aboriginal people.

The EDAEG comprises three elements.

### 1. Permanent (Ongoing) Employment – \$30,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant to subsidise the permanent employment of an Aboriginal person.

The proposed position must be at a minimum Clerk Grade 7 or above, based on the Crown Employees (Public Sector – Salaries 2018) Award or equivalent for local government authorities. An existing mainstream position can be converted to an Aboriginal Identified position, on the condition that the position remains a permanent Aboriginal Identified position in your organisational structure.

### 2. Temporary (Term Employment) Secondment – \$20,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the salary cost of a temporary position (Minimum six months, up to twelve months) that will provide a significant skill development opportunity for an Aboriginal person who is already permanently employed in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

Agencies may apply for funding of graded positions at the minimum grade 5 or equivalent of Local Government Authority that shows career mobility and progression for an Aboriginal person. Funding amounts are based on the below table

Grade	Grant Amount	Approx. Salary
5-6 (or equivalent)	\$20,000	\$83,000*
7-8 (or equivalent)	\$30,000	\$94,000*
9 and above	\$40,000	\$108,000*

*\*This amount is inclusive of superannuation and any other employer entitlements.*

*\*If the position for either the Permanent or Temporary Element is part-time a Pro-rata amount will be calculated against the positions proposed hours.*

### 3. School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SBAT) – \$10,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the creation of a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship for an Aboriginal student in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

The Apprenticeship or Traineeship must be established under the provisions of the Apprenticeship and Traineeship Act 2001; approved by the Board of Studies; and contribute to the attainment of the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

## Limitations

### Eligibility

The EDAEG provides funding to organisations (not individuals) to support Aboriginal education, employment and training.

Organisations applying for funding under the EDAEG must be registered, based in NSW and provide services within the State.

To be eligible, organisations must be a:

- **NSW public service agency**; or
- NSW local government authority operating under the Local Government Act 1993

### Ineligibility

Grant applications will be deemed ineligible for the following circumstances:

Permanent and Temporary:

- positions that form part of an organisation's bulk or annual recruitment intake;
- existing positions within an organisations staffing structure (Unless a permanent position has been converted to an identified role);
- a position(s) that has previously been funded under the Grant;
- employment of a person who was unemployed (Temporary element); or
- a position(s) that has been filled prior to applying for EDAEG.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs.

SBAT:

- an apprenticeship or traineeship position has been already filled prior to the organisation's application to the EDAEG i.e. no retrospective funding.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs. The Department will consult with other Government agencies when it considers the funding application. Applicant organisations will need to advise the Department on the application form whether they have applied or have received other Government funding for the project.

Screen Australia aim to assist the career development of talented writers, directors and producers who have the potential to make a significant contribution to screen culture and the national cultural life. Screen Australia engage actively at all stages with key creatives in the development and production of their works.

In the case of teams:

- In the case of co-writing teams, made up of Indigenous and non-Indigenous writers, the original concept must come from the Indigenous writer. This must be shown in the application.
- the producer or the director must have at least one eligible documentary credit.

To be an 'eligible documentary credit' under this program, a project must be a broadcast half hour or longer and have:

- been broadcast by a recognised broadcaster or channel; or
- had a commercial theatrical release; or
- been invited to screen at IDFA, Hot Docs, or equivalent.

Note that credits must fall within the definition of 'documentary' set out here. Corporate, education, training, sports, news programs etc are not acceptable.

Where the request includes shooting material, a director must be attached.

The purpose of NAIDOC is to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

## Overview

NAIDOC Week is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities but by Australians from all walks of life. The week is a great opportunity to participate in a range of activities as well as support your local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.

### What funding is available?

Will all applicants receive funding?

- No, the application process is competitive. There will be competing applications for the limited funding available. Successful applications will be those that best address the assessment criteria.

Is there a limit on the amount of funding that can be applied for?

- There is limited funding available. Small grants in the order of \$500 - \$1,000 are typically available. Where an applicant demonstrates more significant events, applications up to \$3,000 can be considered.

Will a successful application receive all the funding it has requested?

- Not necessarily. Partial funding may be offered to a range of projects to enable a wider and more equitable distribution of funds across a number of competing projects. Partial funding may also be offered if not all of a project's activities are considered eligible for funding.
- If partial funding is offered, applicants will need to assess whether the project remains viable or whether it needs to be modified due to the reduced funding. Alternatively, the balance of funds could be obtained from other sources.

Can I submit more than one application for funding?

- Only one application needs to be completed for a particular NAIDOC event. However, if an event will be taking place at several locations, a separate application will be needed for each event.

### What types of projects are eligible?

What projects can be funded?

The following are examples of the types of events and activities that are eligible for a grant:

- Community festival
- Public exhibitions
- Community gatherings
- School community based activities.

## Purpose

Prescribed Bodies Corporate (PBC) Capacity Building Funding is available to provide support PBCs maximise the economic and social potential of native title through the effective and sustainable management of their land.

## Overview

The primary objective of this funding is to assist PBCs generate economic benefits through the effective and sustainable management of their land. This funding aims to contribute to the outcomes described in Annexure 1 (Section 22) of the IAS Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme, with a particular focus on the outcome 'Indigenous Australians use their land and sea assets to create economic and social benefits'. This funding will support this outcome by building the capacity of PBCs to maximise the economic and social potential of native title.

### What can be funded?

There are three elements to this funding:

1. direct support to increase the capacity of PBCs to take advantage of economic opportunities;
2. support for training to build long-term organisational capacity within PBCs and to procure professional expertise (for example, business or agribusiness consultancies, accountancy or legal services); and
3. direct support for effective native title agreement-making.

It is strongly recommended all potential applicants discuss proposals with their local PM&C Regional Network office in the early stages of development and before preparing an application.

### How much funding is available?

A total of \$20.4 million is available over the first four years, comprising:

- \$2.519 million in 2015-16;
- \$5.037 million in 2016-17;
- \$6.296 million in 2017-18 and
- \$6.548 million in 2018-19.

Funding for the programme is ongoing, but funding amounts have only been allocated until 2018-19.

## Limitations

### Who can apply for funding?

All PBCs are eligible to apply for the funding. Native Title Representative Bodies and Service Providers (NTRBs-SPs) and other third parties, for example, law firms and interest groups, can also apply to receive and administer the funding on behalf of, and with the authorisation of, one or more PBCs.

Applicants must also meet all eligibility criteria outlined in the IAS Grant Guidelines, and undergo financial viability checks and a risk assessment.

### What cannot be funded?

Activities which will not be funded are stipulated in the IAS Grant Guidelines under the Jobs, Land and Economy Programme. These activities include but are not limited to:

- applications that do not clearly address at least one of the IAS programme streams
- activities that are more appropriately funded by other Government agencies (including State/Territory and local Government) under their priorities
- retrospective items or activities, and
- costs reasonably covered by proponent parties.

PBCs will not be funded for costs that would be payable under the 'Basic Support Funding' under the Native Title and Land Rights Activity under the Jobs Land and Economy Programme and administered by NTRBs-SPs, as this would duplicate available funding.

While eligibility for PBC capacity building funding is restricted to PBCs or support for PBCs only, PBCs can apply for funding under other IAS funding streams and Australian Government programmes. PBC capacity building funding is intended to complement other sources of grant funding. A specific activity cannot be funded under more than one programme.

- Assist Indigenous Australians to generate economic and social benefits, including through the effective and sustainable management of their land.
- Assist Indigenous Australians to progress land and sea claims and township leases under Commonwealth native title and land rights legislation.

## What can be funded?

This open grant funding process will support services or activities that will have a positive impact on the Government's priority area of:

1. Employment— The primary aim is to support activities for Indigenous Australians to overcome disadvantage in the labour market, connect them to real and sustainable jobs, to gain experience that builds work-readiness and contributes to the broader community. Sustainable employment implies an ongoing job which is not dependent on continuous government funding. The ongoing job may be part-time or full-time.
2. Indigenous participants prioritised for support will include youth, school leavers at risk of disengaging or long term unemployed, those not in the labour force, jobactive Streams B & C job seekers, those in the Community Development Programme (CDP) and Disability Employment Services (DES are considered disadvantaged).

The types of activities that may be funded include:

- Tailored assistance to support employers to engage and retain Indigenous jobseekers into real and sustainable ongoing jobs, as well as address barriers to recruitment and retention.
- Support for Indigenous senior school students to gain work exposure through School Based Apprenticeship/ Traineeship activities, including activities that support and school students to transition from education into sustainable employment or further education/training.

The Department encourages applications for the funding of activities tailored to local circumstances with the involvement of Indigenous communities.

Where funding is available, organisations will be able to apply for Tailored Assistance Employment grant funding at any time.

Potential applicants are encouraged to discuss their proposal with their **local PM&C Regional Network office** before preparing an application.

## Limitations

### Eligibility criteria

#### Organisation:

To be eligible for grant funding under the IAS, applicants must be a legal entity and have full legal capacity to enter into a Project Agreement with the Commonwealth. For example, applicants may be:

- Aboriginal Corporations (incorporated under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006 and administered by the Office of the Registrar of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporations [ORIC]).
- Incorporated Associations (incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Association' or 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name).
- Incorporated Cooperatives (also incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name).
- Companies (incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 – may be not-for-profit or for-profit proprietary company (limited by shares or by guarantee) or public companies).
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or State/Territory legislation (many public benevolent institutions, churches, universities, etc.).
- A partner on behalf of a Partnership.
- Trustees on behalf of a Trust.
- State/Territory or Local Governments.
- Where a particular need has been identified, the Department may also consider an individual or individuals (either jointly or separately) for contractual arrangements.

An unincorporated association is not a legal entity and will not be contracted by the Department.

Community groups that may not be eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible organisation.

#### Individual:

While it is expected that grant funding will primarily be provided to organisations, individuals will not be precluded from receiving grant funding, unless otherwise specified in the application documentation.

#### Incorporation requirements:

All organisations receiving grant funding of \$500,000 (GST exclusive) or more in any single financial year from funding administered by the Indigenous Affairs Group within the Department are required to:

- Incorporate under Commonwealth legislation – Indigenous organisations will be required to incorporate under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006; with other organisations incorporating under the Corporations Act 2001.
- Maintain these arrangements while they continue to receive any level of such funding.

#### What cannot be funded?

Activities that will not be funded are:

- Youth engagement and compulsory school-aged children activities that are not directly aimed at improving employment outcomes.
- Training that is not connected to sustainable employment. Activities, services or jobs that are the responsibility of the states and territories or other Commonwealth programmes that are already funded, including:
  - Adult vocational education and training (VET) activities.
  - Cultural heritage, land rights and land management activities subject to state or territory legislation
  - Employment services including Community Development Programme and jobactive
  - Funding for wages of employment positions irrespective of the project outcomes.
- Board or Executive positions in organisations where it is normally part of the organisations operational costs
- Retrospective funding for activities that have already commenced or completed.

The Grand Challenges family of initiatives fosters innovation to solve key health and development problems.

### Overview

The information on this page is specific to the Grand Challenges streams.

There are two streams of Grant Challenges currently open:

**1. Improving Access to and Use of Safe and Appropriate Cesarean Section** - proposals are invited for interventions to address the following challenges related to the cesarean section:

- Increasing access to cesarean section where it is currently inadequate
- Increasing quality and safety of cesarean section to reduce iatrogenic harm to both mothers and newborns
- Reducing rates of non-medically indicated cesarean section.

There are two levels of grants within this stream.

**Seed Grants of \$100K for up to 24 months:** These grants are intended to provide proof of concept of an intervention that is entirely novel at small scale (e.g., single facility or district). Applicants should conduct a literature review to verify that the proposed intervention has no documented evidence; documentation of the methods and outcomes of this review must be provided in the application. These grants should demonstrate the feasibility of a novel intervention and its impact on one or more of the c-section challenges identified in this call for applications.

**Validation Grants of \$300K for up to 24 months:** These grants are intended to demonstrate the feasibility of a single intervention or a combination of interventions at the scalable unit<sup>1</sup> of a health system. Validation grants must replicate, confirm or more rigorously test one intervention - or multiple interventions - that have previously demonstrated proof of concept at a smaller scale. Given the complexity of the problem, we acknowledge that multi-component interventions are required, and we encourage applications exploring these.

**2. Accelerating Discovery for Non-Hormonal Contraceptives** - proposals for awards of up to USD \$2 million for up to three years are invited to identify new approaches and concepts directed at the characterization of novel contraceptive drug targets, the identification of active contraceptive compounds useful for target validation and proof-of-principle studies, and the development of novel and impactful research tools with the potential to revolutionize the field of contraceptive R&D.

### Limitations

#### Eligibility Criteria

Grand Challenges is open to both foreign and domestic organizations, including non-profit organizations, for-profit companies, international organizations, government agencies and academic institutions. Individuals and organizations classified as individuals for U.S. tax purposes are not eligible to receive an award from the foundation as part of the Grand Challenges initiative.

## Purpose

The Direct Aid Program is a flexible small grants program funded by the Australian Government and managed through the Department of Foreign Affairs & Trade (DFAT) overseas posts. The program aims to support projects with a strong development focus that complement Australia's broader aid program which contributes to sustainable economic growth and poverty reduction.

## Overview

DAP supports projects that provide direct benefits to those most in need in the local community, including vulnerable or disadvantaged groups, women, children and youth and people with disabilities. From time to time, DAP also supports one-off initiatives to community groups with discrete inputs such as books for libraries or school furniture.

Applicants can apply for a maximum of AUD30,000 (around FJD50,000) over the life of the project.

DAP activities should primarily be aimed at achieving practical and tangible outcomes of high development impact. DAP is able to fund activities that have a direct, practical and immediate impact, including capacity building programs in the areas of governance and human rights engagement. The Department will favourably consider projects:

- in the areas of community and/or rural development, education, gender equality, disabilities, youth, human rights, the environment, small-scale infrastructure, economic empowerment and ad hoc humanitarian relief;

- Unexpected changes at your studio or transmission site such as a sudden need to relocate
- A financial loan while an insurance claim is being processed and/or funds are raised



- Other costs associated with maintaining transmission and/or operations not able to be reasonably anticipated.

### Opportunities:

- A matched funding opportunity for a project
- Other costs associated with a time-limited opportunity

Grants will be considered outside the normal grant rounds – you will normally receive advice about the outcome of your application within one week.

#### Limitations

To be considered eligible for a Quick Response grant, you will need to answer yes to the following questions:

  - Financial statements demonstrating costs cannot be met from organisation reserves
- Can you provide the following information required within the grant application?
  - Your latest Annual Report with financial statements, even if you have supplied this information to the CBF previously
  - Your current Strategic and/or Business Plans
  - A description of your transmission setup, any apparatus licenses and block diagram of the current and proposed transmission chain (for transmission projects)
  - An agreement with a registered training organisation (for training projects)
  - A competitive quote for any equipment purchases over \$2,000
  - A clear and detailed project budget
  - Contact information for your organisation and a key individual involved in the proposal

### Funding conditions

To receive a Quick Response grant, you must meet the following funding conditions.

- Amount we may fund:
  - Emergencies: 100% of the financial cost of the project
  - Opportunities: maximum of 50% towards the total financial cost of the project
- Loans will need to be fully repaid within the agreed time-frame (even if insurance does not cover the full amount). If loan repayments are not provided within the agreed timeframe, the CBF will not consider grant applications from the organisation.

## Purpose

The NBCF Investigator Initiated Research Scheme will support the research costs (or portions thereof) and salary (if requested) of outstanding investigators with a vision to expand the scale and scope of breast cancer research in Australia.

## Overview

The IIRS has flexibility to span the breadth of the previously offered grant schemes including fellowships, pilot studies, infrastructure and project grants.

NBCF supports breast cancer research through funds raised entirely by the Australian public. In submitting their proposals, applicants should be mindful of the limited albeit substantial funds available every year, and therefore contain their costs so that they are realistic and competitive.

NBCF aims to fund a portfolio that comprises a very small number of large, costly projects and a larger number of small-medium sized projects with a good value for money proposition and a direct line of sight with our goal of “towards zero deaths from breast cancer by 2030”. Projects pursuing highly innovative and original ideas that challenge existing paradigms or break new theoretical ground, including preliminary studies aimed at providing “proof-of-principle” data are particularly encouraged. The aim of these types of studies is to set up a strong platform to enable investigators to be more competitive in obtaining future funding. All projects proposals have to clearly articulate a path leading to translation of the research findings into impactful results for those affected by breast cancer.

NBCF also aims to foster the development and career progression of scientists at all career stages but particularly emphasises its intent to support highly talented mid-career researchers with a strong passion and interest in breast cancer. Established leaders in the field are encouraged to support such researchers to submit research proposals as main applicants. Clinical Practitioners with an interest in pursuing an academic career and the ability to directly translate their research findings to patient care practices, clinical guidelines or health policy changes are also strongly encouraged to apply for funding through this scheme.

## Funding Information

Funding is offered for all aspects of research related costs, and therefore, research proposals could comprise the salaries of personnel directly or proportionately involved in the research project (that are not otherwise funded), as well as the costs of materials and equipment. A maximum of one proposal per applicant will be considered in any round of applications as PI. There is no limit imposed on the number of applications a researcher can be named as a Co-I or AI.

The duration of the funding period that will be considered is 1 to 5 years. Depending on the category of the nominated PI, there is a cap on the maximum duration of the proposed grant, as detailed in Table 1.

## Purpose

This Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) Coronavirus Research Response Initiative grant opportunity will accelerate research to develop treatments for severe acute respiratory distress in late-stage patients infected with COVID-19.

## Overview

Given the rapidly evolving nature of the COVID-19 outbreak, applicants must propose a clinical trial that accelerates the implementation of treatments for severe acute respiratory distress in patients infected with COVID-19 in order to support the response to the COVID-19 outbreak in Australia. Applicants should note that the research funded by this grant opportunity is not intended to be used for development of vaccines or anti-viral therapies for COVID-19. ## Overview

Cancer Council NSW Project Grants for 2021 are now open to all Australian cancer researchers. Project Grants will be awarded for up to three years, commencing in January 2021.

Project Grants support research in any aspects of cancer, including: its causes, mechanisms, prevention, treatment and care, and the organisation and performance of cancer control services.

2. The extent to which the applicant can maximise local community benefits in regional Australia with the Qantas Regional Grants Program funding.
3. The extent to which the project or activity will celebrate and highlight the work of the applicant and help boost the profile and strength of the applicant for the future.
4. The ability of the applicant to demonstrate innovation in their project strategy, goals and mission, and how these align to improving their service offering and increasing regional impact.

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

Entry is open to Australian based individuals, not-for-profit community groups and organisations of any size, who are seeking funding to help enhance the lives of people in regional communities

Charitable organisations must be:

- registered in Australia
- endorsed as income tax exempt

## Purpose

The Tackling Tough Times Together (TTTT) program gives drought affected communities across rural, regional and remote Australia the opportunity to access funds that benefit their immediate and long-term needs. Grants are available for grassroots, community-led initiatives that directly benefit local communities.

## Overview

This program is designed to provide flexible funding to support community-based activities that both help to relieve current stressors and symptoms, and most importantly, build capacity and resilience for the future. Funds could also support activities that engage your local community in being proactive, exploring options and creating something that will stand the test of tough times.

Three streams of grants are available:

1. Up to \$20,000 - Projects to be finalised within 18 months of approval;
2. Up to \$60,000: Projects to be finalised within 18 months of approval;
3. Up to \$150,000: Applications for this tier are by Expression of Interest. Multi-year projects (up to three years) are welcomed. Projects that deliver long-term community benefits are highly regarded.

**The objectives of the program are to:**

1. Reduce social isolation by facilitating strong social cohesion and connection;
2. Support and engage the community in leadership development and skills training;
3. Support opportunities for social and educational participation and address disadvantage caused by the drought, for children and young people;
4. Reduce volunteer fatigue and build the capacity, capability and sustainability of local not-for-profit organisations to provide support to their communities, particularly where they are playing an increased role during the drought; and
5. Support local economic recovery or renewal through projects that stimulate economic activity and cash-flow within communities.



## Round 16

Late May 2020 for applications received by 25 February 2020. EOIs for the \$150K tier have now closed.

## Round 17

Late August 2020 for applications received by 28 May 2020. EOIs for the \$150K tier must be received by 16 April 2020.

## Priority

The program has a strong preference to support grassroots organisations based in drought-affected regions over those delivering services to, but not based in affected regions. Projects led by local communities will be given strong preference.

Applications are welcome from any eligible organisation for any eligible purpose; however, the following applications will be prioritised:

- Projects initiated and delivered by local community groups;

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

- Not-for-profit community-based organisations from drought affected communities across rural, regional and remote Australia where funds support projects and activities that offer clear public benefit (i.e. are for a charitable purpose) and address a need in the community (see What Can be Funded below);
- Organisations with an ABN or Incorporation Certificate;
- Organisations with and without DGR endorsement;
- An organisation is eligible to submit one application per grant round.

Projects funded in this round should be undertaken between February 2020 and August 2021, or as agreed in multi-year projects. Projects cannot be funded retrospectively. Community organisations seeking funding for projects in Q1 2020 should apply in this round.

### Who can't apply?

- Individuals, private or commercial businesses are not eligible;
- Projects that support core business and areas of responsibility of Federal, State and Local Governments are not eligible.

## Project Eligibility

Costs that can be considered include:

- Delivering activities, programs and services;
- Purchasing or hiring equipment and materials;
- Community infrastructure projects;
- Art, drama and creative expression projects to assist people to creatively express their experiences, which are otherwise limited due to the drought;
- Experiences for school children such as camps that connect young people and provide an opportunity to have fun with other young people off-farm.

Operational and administrative costs associated with your project will be considered. This could include wages, paying a skilled contractor, or paying for overhead costs incurred in the project's delivery.

What can't be funded?

- Ongoing core organisational operational costs (e.g. rent, utilities, regular wages, loan repayments);
- The encouragement or advancement of sport, recreation and social activities are not considered charitable activities under Australian law. Applications from sporting organisations need to clearly demonstrate charitable outcomes and benefit to the wider community that are above and beyond the sporting activities of the club;
- Overseas travel and overseas projects;
- Prizes, gifts, trophies or awards;
- Projects that have already occurred or will occur before the grant is confirmed;
- Political lobbying;

- Projects solely focused on animal welfare cannot be considered;
- Projects that are for private benefit or which are the core responsibility of Government;
- Projects that do not directly support drought affected communities.

It is important to note that applications will be considered ineligible if the:

- Application is submitted without required financial documentation;
- Final report/s from any FRRR grant program from the previous seven years has not been acquitted (auspiced organisations should check with your head organisation to see if there are any outstanding final reports owed to FRRR);
- Application is not for charitable purposes, i.e. is for private benefit or is the core responsibility of Government;
- Application is for a project or activity that has already occurred / is occurring;
- Application is incomplete

## Purpose

The Seniors Staying Social Grant program aims to combat social isolation for older people through one-off grants for organisations to provide quality and lasting social connection opportunities.

## Overview

The Seniors Staying Social Grant program aims to combat social isolation for older people aged 65 years and over, or 55 years and over for Aboriginal people. The primary target cohort for this grant is older people who are currently socially isolated or at risk of isolation. This program seeks to support projects that help older people connect with each other through group activities (e.g. interest groups, social events or environmental activities) that bring them together in person and enable them to develop quality relationships that can be maintained beyond these activities.

The provider is looking to support initiatives that are:

- effective in addressing social isolation for older people and providing quality and lasting social connection opportunities for them
- able to attract and sustain participation from older people who are considered to be socially isolated or at risk of social isolation and have on the ground impact for older people
- able to attract and sustain participation from older people considered to be at high risk of social isolation (especially older people who are hard to reach)
- locally focused, community driven and delivered locally
- self-sustainable beyond the funding provided through this grant program (i.e. that do not require additional or recurrent government funding or financial support to continue)
- value for money in terms of overall costs and the outcomes and benefits that will be delivered.

## Funding

Three funding categories, each having a funding pool of \$200,000, will be open for distribution in one-off grants to eligible and successful applicants across NSW to deliver projects or activities that will provide opportunities for older people aged 65 years and over, and 55 years and over for Aboriginal people, who are socially isolated or at risk of social isolation, to get together within a group and develop quality and lasting relationships:

- **Category 1:** (\$3,000–\$15,000) 15 to 40 one-off grants open to all eligible organisations to a total of \$200,000.
- **Category 2:** (\$15,001–\$70,000) Four to 10 one-off grants for larger local level organisations (or organisations working in a partnership with one or more groups) to a total of \$200,000.
- **Category 3:** (\$100,000) Two one-off grants for large organisations with existing infrastructure to implement a program in multiple regions within NSW, to a total of \$200,000. Organisations will be encouraged to take a lead and work in partnership with local groups to make a joint application.

A minimum number of participants is required for each project depending on the funding category and the amount awarded. Refer to the table on page 8 of the [Grant Guidelines](#) as a guide.

## Priority

A focus on the following priority groups is encouraged due to these groups being considered at higher risk of social isolation:

- older people in rural, regional and remote areas
- Aboriginal people aged 55 years and over
- older people from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds
- older people who are Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex or Queer (LGBTIQ)
- older people with disability or living with dementia or chronic disease
- older people who are carers

Consideration in project planning of additional factors that impact on the risk of social isolation among older people is also encouraged. These include:

- low or fixed income
- living in low socioeconomic communities
- living with housing stress or homelessness
- being single, childless or living alone
- limited or low levels of literacy where this reduces access to information and services
- limited or no communication technology skills, where this reduces the ability to locate and access services
- being at risk of elder abuse
- inadequate transport and/or unsafe environments
- limited trusted formal or informal support networks
- risky or addictive behaviours (alcohol/drug or gambling addiction).

## Limitations

### Who can apply?

Applicants must be a legally constituted Australian-based entity. This includes:

- Incorporated not-for-profit organisations, including community organisations
- local councils and shires based in NSW, including regional organisations of councils and consortia of councils.

Organisations based outside NSW are not eligible to apply unless they can demonstrate that core business already includes program or service delivery in NSW, and they have already established relationships with local organisations appropriate to the project. Such organisations must also meet all NSW regulatory and business requirements.

This grant program encourages projects that are delivered in collaboration with new or existing partnerships that could be between local government, local community-based agencies working with older people, local service organisations, multicultural organisations, ethnic services, Aboriginal organisations, LGBTIQ services and organisations, or local clubs and groups. Partnerships are particularly encouraged for organisations seeking funding under Category 2 and 3.

Organisations submitting proposals that involve partnerships need to nominate a project lead, who will apply on behalf of the partnership. They will need to demonstrate they are working within a collaborative structure for project planning and implementation that brings together key players, with well-defined roles, that can assist and influence the proposed project outcomes and lead to sustainable outcomes. The project lead will have a contractual relationship with the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) for the project and be responsible for ensuring there are effective governance relationships and communication channels with all partners.

Partnerships with businesses will be considered where it is demonstrated this is an essential component for and will ensure the sustainability of the project beyond the duration of the grant. However, the project lead in any such partnership must be a not-for-profit organisation. Applications will not be accepted from organisations that have outstanding acquittals due to DCJ.

The Impact Investment Ready Growth Grant, funded by the Australian Government Department of Social Services as part of the Sector Readiness Fund, provides capacity building grants of up to \$140,000 to mission-driven for-profit and not-for-profit organisations, allowing them to secure investment capital to scale their social impact.

### Overview

Growth Grants were created in recognition of the potential for impact investing to change the way Australia addresses social issues and the important role that access to capital can play in delivering better outcomes for people and communities. They support enterprises that are high growth, can deliver positive social outcomes and have the potential to secure capital investment.

#### WHAT GROWTH GRANTS FUND

All grant funds must be used to pay for capacity building services from external intermediaries (Providers) that are directly related to your investment readiness and securing capital.

The support financed by the grant must get you all the way to your capital raise. The support needed is largely dependent on the characteristics of your organisation, but often includes:

- Financial modelling and preparation of the investment case
- Preparation of term sheets, legal documentation and information memorandum
- Review of the organisation's constitution and legal structuring
- Liaison with and introductions to investors

EOIs are open on a rolling basis. Once a round meets capacity, any existing EOIs will be automatically be rolled over for consideration as early-entrants to the next round. We anticipate about 4 rounds/year.

- An AED
- AED familiarisation instruction
- A minimum of six years of essential defibrillator maintenance

Grants are available up to 50% of the selected AED package price in Zones 1 and 2 and up to 75% in Zone 3, capped at the levels stated below.

Applicants can request more than one AED.

Funding should be expended within six months of the date of signing the funding agreement.

Grants for AED packages are available up to:

- Zone 1: \$1,250
- Zone 2: \$1,300
- Zone 3: \$1,900

## Priority

In determining priority for allocation of defibrillator package, the Office of Sport may consider:

1. Profile of participants and spectators of club and facility i.e. type and size, calendar of events, season dates, game schedule etc.
2. Facilities that provide the highest community access to the AED, including where the device will be installed, how it will be secured i.e. installation of AED in the building providing the highest level of access and available hours, installation of a 24 hour access cabinet, strategies to maximise community awareness around AED availability and ease of use outside your clubs normal hours of operation. In Zone 3, in the absence of a secure building the AED should be in the custody of the club for use for the duration of the season, and then in the custody of the other sport in the case of a sharing arrangement.
3. Meet a demonstrated need in the community club or facility i.e. type of sport and physical activity undertaken, age profile and % of higher risk participants, stats of known medical conditions or previous incidents etc.
4. Address barriers faced by the club to access emergency services and clubs without an existing AED.
5. Capacity of organisation to apply systems and processes to successfully undertake the ongoing use, management and maintenance of AED.

## Limitations

### Who is eligible to apply?

- Incorporated, not-for-profit sports clubs or other organisations in NSW
- State or national sporting organisations on behalf of member clubs located in NSW, to a maximum of 10 per Zone
- Licensed sporting clubs, providing that the project directly benefits sporting activities

- Sport clubs associated with a school, church or university providing they are an incorporated not for profit club in their own right
- Councils, sport and recreational facilities owners on behalf of sports clubs
- Service clubs such as Rotary, CWA and Lions, on behalf of sports clubs

### What is not included?

- Ongoing maintenance outside of the scope of the maintenance schedule and any extended warranty as specified by the Approved AED Panel Service Provider
- Accredited CPR, First Aid, ongoing or additional face to face AED familiarisation instruction
- Out of warranty repair of equipment
- Replacement costs of consumables including batteries and electrode pads
- Replacement or temporary replacement of the AED if it is damaged or unrecoverable through wear and tear, vandalism, accident, theft or misuse
- General first aid maintenance items or equipment (items requiring cleaning and disinfecting after use)

Note: This is a general guide only. Sport clubs/organisations should refer to the details set out in the particular AED Providers' packages when making a choice of provider.

### Purpose

Events Tasmania is committed to increasing the number of people coming to Tasmania, and ensuring that they travel around the state while they are here.

### Overview

As part of meeting these objectives, Events Tasmania is offering incentives to organisers of motor vehicle, motorcycle, and cycle tours that come to tour around Tasmania.

Grants worked out on a scale of attendance and duration (see page five of the grant guidelines) up to a maximum of \$15,000 are available to eligible organisations who conduct a tour:

- held in the March – November period (tours held in December, January and February are not eligible)
- attracting more than 40 people from outside Tasmania
- staying five nights or more in paid commercial accommodation (hotel, motel, B&B, cabin)
- spending 40% or more of the tour in regional areas (outside Greater Hobart).

Motorhome, caravan, camping and walking tours may also be eligible, but only for the days that participants spend in paid accommodation, and with the same ratio of 40% paid accommodation in regional areas.

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

## Limitations

Reasons you may not be eligible for a grant:

They won't fund conferences, conventions, symposiums, exhibitions, theatrical productions, concert series, touring arts products, trade fairs, fundraising events, markets, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through a Major Event Partnership you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

## Purpose

Provides business incubators with grants to access top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts. This expertise aims to increase the capabilities of incubators and improve the chance of commercial success for start-ups in international markets.

## Overview

The \$23 million Incubator Support initiative supports the Australian Government's commitment to:

- assist Australian start-ups to develop the capabilities required to achieve commercial success in international markets and realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would
- develop Australia's innovation ecosystem including in regional areas.

The objective of the Expert in Residence component is to:

- increase the capabilities of incubators and improve the chance of commercial success for startups in international markets by organising and providing access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts.

The initiative's intended outcomes are to:

- support new Australian incubators targeting innovative start-ups to assist them to trade internationally
- expand the scale and operations of existing Australian incubators to increase innovative startups' chances of success in international markets
- develop new innovative Australian start-ups with a focus on international markets
- create opportunities for Australian start-ups to develop sustainable international businesses through access to open public data.

**Grant amount:**

The grant amount will be up to 50 per cent of total eligible project value.

- The minimum grant amount is \$5,000

  - supporting the five key areas of focus outlined in the Australian Government's Regions 2030: Unlocking Opportunity report (jobs and economic development, infrastructure, health, education and communications)
  - understanding and drawing on knowledge from the Industry Growth Centres
  - providing feedback to the department on issues facing incubators, particularly in regional areas.
- supporting the delivery of the Entrepreneurs' Programme by:
  - promoting and marketing the Incubator Support initiative

## **Limitations**

### **Who is eligible?**

To be eligible you must

- be an existing incubator or establishing a new incubator that can foster and facilitate the development of innovative start-ups focused on international trade
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)

and be one of the following entities:

- an entity incorporated in Australia
- an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
- an incorporated not for profit organisation
- a publicly funded research organisation (PFRO) as defined in Appendix A
- an Australian local government agency or body as defined in Appendix A.

Joint applications are acceptable and encouraged, provided you have a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project and is eligible to apply.

### **Who is not eligible?**

You are not eligible to apply if you are

- an individual
- trust (however, an incorporated trustee may apply on behalf of a trust)
- a Commonwealth, state or territory government agency or body (including government business enterprises and corporate Commonwealth entities).



## Eligible projects:

To be eligible your New and Existing Incubators project must:

- include eligible activities and eligible expenditure
- have an eligible project value of at least \$52,000 for projects in major cities
- have an eligible project value of at least \$40,000 for projects in regional areas.

## Eligible activities:

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project. To be eligible your project must:

- be aimed at giving start-ups access to incoming experts or supporting outgoing experts to develop their international networks.

## Additional eligibility requirements

We can only accept applications that provide the following mandatory documentation:

- for grants over \$50,000, an Accountant Declaration that confirms you can fund your share of the project costs. You must use the Accountant Declaration form available on [business.gov.au](https://business.gov.au) and GrantConnect.
- Where your project involves incoming experts, additional eligibility requirements include:
  - experts are not a current employee of your incubator (this includes contractors, shareholders, board members, directors etc)
  - resume for each expert, outlining their experience and capabilities.
- Where your project involves an outgoing expert to other incubators, additional eligibility requirements include:
  - a letter of commitment from the host incubator or incubators they are visiting
  - a satisfactory summary of your project that describes how the new knowledge will benefit your incubator and innovative start-ups in line with program objectives.

## Eligible expenditure

You can only spend grant funds on eligible expenditure you have incurred on an agreed project as defined in your grant agreement.

- For guidance on eligible expenditure, see appendix B.
- For guidance on ineligible expenditure, see appendix C.

We may update the guidance on eligible and ineligible expenditure from time to time. If your application is successful, the version in place when you submitted your application applies to your project.

If your application is successful, we may ask you to verify project costs that you provided in your application. You may need to provide evidence such as quotes for major costs.

Not all expenditure on your project may be eligible for grant funding. The program delegate makes the final decision on what is eligible expenditure and may give additional guidance on eligible expenditure if required.

To be eligible, expenditure must:

- be a direct cost of the project
- be incurred by you for required project audit activities.

You must incur the project expenditure between the project start and end date for it to be eligible unless stated otherwise.

You must not commence your project until you execute a grant agreement with the Commonwealth.

## Purpose

Provides new and existing business incubators with funding to assist Australian start-ups develop the capabilities required to succeed in international markets.

## Overview

The \$23 million Incubator Support initiative supports the Australian Government's commitment to:

- deliver high quality services to start-ups to improve their chances of commercial success in international markets
- partner with first-generation migrant and refugee support organisations to assist migrant and refugee founders to establish their business both nationally and internationally
- assist start-ups with a regional focus to expand and scale their business.

### Grant amount:

- The minimum grant amount is \$13,000
- The maximum grant amount is \$500,000 The maximum grant percentage varies depending on your project location as defined in the regional locator tool. For this initiative, we consider Inner Regional, Outer Regional, Remote and Very Remote locations as regional areas and all other locations as major cities.
- Incubators in major cities may receive a maximum grant of 50 per cent of the eligible project value.
- Incubators with projects located in regional areas may receive up to 65 per cent of the eligible project value.

If you apply for the greater percentage, you will need to demonstrate in your application that your project is located in a regional area. We consider your project is located in a regional area if you can attribute at least 80 per cent of your eligible project value to activities in a regional area.

The minimum cash contribution you must make to your project also varies depending on your project location.

- Incubators in major cities must make a minimum cash contribution of 30 per cent of the eligible project value.
- Incubators with projects located in regional areas must make a minimum cash contribution of 15 per cent of the eligible project value.

The maximum project duration is 24 months.

### Eligible projects:

- providing or facilitating access for start-ups to new knowledge (such as customer acquisition and/ or business development methods) to promote or facilitate international trade
- facilitating start-ups' access to new international networks (e.g. investors and customers)
- providing or facilitating access for start-ups to resources (such as purchase of technical equipment) to promote or facilitate international trade.

We may also approve other activities.

### Eligible expenditure

## Purpose

Championship grants of up to \$7,000 are on the table for eligible competitions that bring more than 100 competitors and supporters to Tasmania, who stay in paid commercial accommodation for three nights or more, and are able to promote pre- and post-championship travel within the state as part of their event marketing.

## Overview

Grants are worked out against set criteria up to a maximum of \$7 000 and are available to eligible competitions, championships and sporting events that:

- attract more than 100 people from outside Tasmania
- stay three nights or more in paid commercial accommodation (hotel, motel, B&B, cabin)
- promote pre- and post-championship holidays and regional touring as a part of their event promotion.

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

Grants are valued from \$2,000 to \$7,000, depending on how many interstate or overseas visitors are coming to your Championship, which time of year it is held and where the event is held.

There are no application deadlines for Championship grants, but you are asked to lodge your application at least three months prior to commencement of your event.

## Limitations

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

This funding programs don't support conferences, conventions, symposiums, trade fairs, fundraising events, expos and events that are primarily a showcase for stall-holders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through a Major Event Partnership you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

### Purpose

To create a more just society by giving every young person in Australia an equal opportunity to access the skills to negotiate life's journey.

### Overview

Matana's focus is on improving the welfare and wellbeing of young people from severely disadvantaged or marginalised backgrounds, or whose concerns and issues are not readily funded from other sources. Recognising that disadvantage takes many forms, we prioritise projects and organisations that address the causes of youth disadvantage by:

- Providing programs primarily targeting school retention and increased education achievement for students who are at risk of dropping out of school or who have already dropped out. The focus is on early identification, customised learning and mentoring.
- Providing programs that target employment skills development, employment and career pathways and transitions into employment.
- Providing programs that target social and community connectedness, personal significance and social and emotional outcomes.
- Providing services in geographical areas across Australia where funding is difficult to source.

We welcome applications from financially viable organisations which work to improve the lives and opportunities of disadvantaged young people, particularly where their core activities correlate with our funding priorities. Wherever possible, you will need to demonstrate the tangible impact of your organisation's work in improving the welfare or wellbeing of disadvantaged young people.

There is no minimum or maximum amount, but as a guide, grants are usually in the range of \$1,000 to \$10,000. However, assessment will be made on an individual basis. We also encourage grantseekers to apply to other sources to facilitate joint funding of projects.

Grants may be sought at any time.

### Limitations

Matana can only make grants to organisations that hold the following ATO endorsements:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) - Item 1
- Tax Concession Charity (TCC)

Evidence of endorsements is required at the point of application. If your organisation does not have Item 1 DGR and TCC status, unfortunately we will not be able to consider your application.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications that request funding for:

- Operating costs including salaries and administration costs, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Capital and building expenditure, including equipment, vehicles, travel, furniture, books and conferences, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Retrospective funding or budget deficits
- Fundraising events and campaigns
- Medical programs or research
- Religious activities, where the applicant project involves religious instruction.
