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Aboriginal Benefits Foundation Grants

Purpose

The Foundation provides grants to assist Aboriginal communities and individuals by providing funds to support projects which advance the aims of the Foundation, with the current focus on supporting art, literacy, education, health and cultural projects with a connection to Aboriginal art and/or artists.

Overview

In view of the limited resources available to the Foundation, priority for funding is being given to the following categories:

- 1. Seeding grants:
 - to research the relevance and value of new projects with a connection to Aboriginal art and/or artists preference is given to small and intermediate sized projects that may be ineligible for support from other organisations
 - to facilitate schemes or projects with a connection to Aboriginal art and/or artists which are of benefit to Aboriginal health, welfare or education which have potential for wider application.
- 2. One-off grants in support of:
 - health and well being of artists and their families
 - education through art projects which will benefit health and well being
 - individuals and communities, with a connection to Aboriginal art and/or artists, to meet special needs

The Foundation will usually fund projects between \$500 to a limit of \$5,000.

Applications close Monday 7 February 2022. TheABF will consider projects shortly after.

Priority

The ABF has considered the negative impacts of COVID-19 and adjusted its grant priorities accordingly. In 2021/2022, it will support projects:

- aimed at improving the physical and mental health and wellbeing (including that of children) of indigenous communities in remote, rural and regional Australia
- supporting indigenous arts, acknowledging that this sector has been deeply impacted by COVID-19
- that would typically 'fall through the cracks' because they are not eligible for government funding
- with staged development, for example, deliverables funded in year 1 with scope for additional deliverables with additional funding over year 2-3 subject to progress
- on a scale that would effectively use a grant of \$5,000-\$20,000 per year (note this is higher than the usual value of one off grants offered).

The other general criteria for grant making by the ABF and the conditions on the application form will still apply.

Intending applicants are encouraged to read about other projects supported by the ABF before preparing and submitting applications by the deadline.

Limitations

The ABF only supports organisations or companies endorsed as a "Deductible Gift Recipient" (DGR).

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Purpose

The Aboriginal Families as Teachers program aims to support Aboriginal families to build a rich home learning environment. This supports active participation in early childhood education.

Overview

Through working directly with families and collaborating with early childhood education services, the Aboriginal Families as Teachers program has been developed to encourage early learning and participation in a quality early childhood education program in the years before school.

Objectives

The program has six core objectives:

- support Aboriginal families to provide developmentally rich home learning environments for young children birth to five years
- promote literacy and numeracy rich home learning environments
- build families' confidence in their ability to support the healthy development and learning of their children
- support Aboriginal children and their families for successful transitions to school
- promote the importance of early childhood education within families and communities, including participation in a quality early childhood education program for 600 hours in the year before school (at a minimum).
- support Aboriginal children's developmental outcomes across all five domains (physical, social, emotional, cognitive and language).

Services previously in receipt of the Aboriginal Families as Teachers grant to 31 December 2021, will need to re-apply and be successful as part of this round, to receive the Aboriginal Families as Teachers funding from 2022

Priority

Community based not-for-profit organisations and local councils with links to local early childhood education services and experience working with Aboriginal families, and with children aged 0-5, are encouraged to apply.

The department will prioritise applicants who demonstrate alignment with the core objectives of the program including:

- Aboriginal community-controlled organisation
- a substantial Aboriginal component to the organisation
- demonstrating a strong focus on participation of Aboriginal families and Aboriginal children in early childhood education
- lack of alternative funding sources
- value for money
- evidence of community demand for the program, including evidence of participation of children aged birth to five years
- capacity to employ appropriate Aboriginal staff to support the program
- how a provider will deliver on the objectives of the program but are also responsive to local need
- that the provider have and will engage and consult with Aboriginal families, communities and organisations in the way that they deliver the program

• other prioritisation categories that reflect emerging needs and is considered to support the purpose and intended outcome of the program.

Limitations

Eligibility

To be eligible to apply for the Aboriginal Families as Teachers program **Round 1**, organisations must plan to deliver the program in eligible communities and meet the following criteria:

- be an Aboriginal community-controlled organisation or business
- be a previous recipient of the Aboriginal Families as Teachers program funding

Applicants will need to confirm that the proposed program activities will be developed by a certificate III or diploma qualified early childhood educator, early childhood education teacher, or other person with a relevant tertiary qualification, in order to proceed with the application.

Organisations will also be assessed against the following assessment criteria:

- previous experience working with Aboriginal families and communities
- previous experience working with families with children aged 0-5
- established links with early childhood education providers in the community in which the program is proposed

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Purpose

The COVID-19 Aboriginal Community Response Program will provide small quick response grants to support Aboriginal communities across NSW to reduce their risk of being exposed to COVID-19 and enable them to manage the impacts of the pandemic.

Overview

Grants of up to \$10,000 are available for:

- social and emotional wellbeing support
- keeping communities connected
- responding to immediate needs
- advocacy and information.

The COVID-19 Aboriginal Community Response Grants Program aims to support:

- activities that limit the movement of Aboriginal people outside their homes and ensure this
- movement is COVID safe, to minimise the risk of transmission.
- the provision of trauma informed, culturally appropriate, local community based social and

- emotional well-being support for Aboriginal people impacted by COVID-19.
- Aboriginal people's access to accurate and timely information regarding COVID-19 and its impacts.

Applications will be accepted at any time during the opening period and the assessment panel will meet weekly.

Applicants can apply for grants from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Example

- 1. Social and Emotional Wellbeing Support:
 - Telephone or video appointments for Aboriginal people with counsellors or support staff.
 - Online group workshops or support groups for Aboriginal people.
 - Materials and equipment to support cultural wellbeing and healthy lifestyles such as craft kits for children, sports equipment, cooking equipment and ingredients.
 - Address the withdrawal or reduction of services for adults and children with disability such as respite for parents and carers.
 - Maintain connection to culture for children in Out of Home and Kinship Care.
- 2. Keeping Communities Connected:
 - Online group workshops for Aboriginal people.
 - Purchase of IT equipment, software and online meeting subscriptions.
 - Support to establish new or continue existing community groups, such as Elder's groups, new mums' and men's groups.
 - Training and education to build skills and capacity in online service delivery.
 - Support live streaming of culturally significant events or activities.
- 3. Respond to Immediate Needs:
 - Provide food, clothing, or housing where a funding gap exists.
 - Hygiene, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) packages and delivery.
 - Transport hire, taxi and ride-share fares, vehicle leasing to transport Aboriginal people to access essential items or support delivery.
 - Support access to internet, digital technology, and equipment.
 - Support access to tele-health or videoconferences for specialist services.
 - Access testing facilities or vaccinations.
- 4. Advocacy and Community Information
 - Facilitate access to legal advice relating to public health orders, rental issues, fines, and family violence where funding gap exists.
 - Communication of accurate and culturally appropriate information on vaccinations and testing.
 - Financial counselling and debt management services.
 - Local and tailored Aboriginal community-based messaging.

Limitations

Who is eligible?

Aboriginal run or controlled groups or organisations.

Applicants must be located in NSW and/or delivering a service to Aboriginal communities within NSW and must have public liability insurance of at least \$10 million per claim.

Applicants not eligible for funding are:

- individuals.
- non-Aboriginal groups or organisations.
- for-profit organisations, including Aboriginal businesses.
- Federal and State Government agencies and bodies.
- NSW Public Schools.
- unincorporated Aboriginal organisations or groups without an eligible auspicing organisation
- organisations that have not met project requirements, including acquittal and reporting for grant funding received from Aboriginal Affairs NSW in the previous two years.

Unincorporated Aboriginal groups

Unincorporated groups must be Aboriginal community groups – that is, they must be led by Aboriginal people.

If an unincorporated Aboriginal group wishes to apply for a COVID-19 Aboriginal Community Response Grants Program they will need to partner with an eligible organisation to receive and administer the funding (Auspice).

The eligible organisation must apply on behalf of the unincorporated group.

- Any activity must be community endorsed.
- All organisations must have DGR1 tax status.

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Purpose

Under the IAS, the NIAA considers grant proposals that address a need for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Proposals must be developed with the community or group who will be impacted by the activity.

Overview

Communities, organisations, businesses and individuals will be able to approach the Agency with funding proposals. This will take place under the Agency Collaborates (Non-Competitive) Grant Opportunity Guidelines (GOGs).

The Agency will therefore review your funding proposal, before you are asked to prepare a full application.

The first step for potential applicants is to contact the local NIAA Regional Office, or by calling 1800 079 098 to organise a time to discuss your proposal. You will also need to submit an initial proposal form that outlines the proposed activity. Your local office will provide you with a Community Initiated – Initial Proposal Form and can assist you with completing the form.

NIAA will review your proposal in the context of whether you meet the criteria in the Agency Collaborates GOGs and whether the proposal aligns with regional strategies and program priorities. After this review, if the NIAA considers your idea is within scope, you may be invited to apply and given access to an application form and a unique code. The unique code links your proposal to the application form and is required to submit an application.

Limitations

Eligibility Criteria:

The Agency cannot consider applications that do not satisfy all the eligibility criteria.

Community groups that are not eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible organisation.

Who is eligible for funding?

To be eligible to apply for grant funding under the Agency Collaborates guidelines you must:

- have been invited to apply by the Agency
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN) (exemptions may apply i special cases)
- where relevant, be registered for the purpose of GST

- an incorporated cooperatives (incorporated under state/territory legislation, commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name)
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or state/territory legislation including public benevolent institutions, churches and universities
- an Australian state or territory government body
- an Australian local government body

- an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
- a partnership
- a joint (consortia) application with a lead organisation that satisfies the entity type
- an individual with an ABN.

In addition you must:

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Purpose

The Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Grant adopts a number of strategies to develop and support Aboriginal people through the creation of training and employment opportunities.

Overview

Promoting diversity, innovation and service responsiveness in the NSW workforce, the EDAEG is an initiative of the NSW Government that encourages job opportunities and reduces barriers to employment and promotion for Aboriginal people. The program will achieve this by subsidising the salary, development and support costs of Aboriginal employees in public service agencies or local government authorities.

The NSW Government is committed to supporting strong Aboriginal communities in which Aboriginal people actively influence and fully participate in social, economic and cultural life. The EDAEG supports this strategic direction by assisting Aboriginal people to access employment and career development pathways into the public sector.

The objectives of the Grant are to:

- encourage the permanent employment and professional mobility of Aboriginal people in NSW public service agencies and local government authorities, with special incentives for the employment of Aboriginal people with a disability, and
- promote innovation in achieving education, employment and training outcomes for Aboriginal people.

The EDAEG comprises three (3) elements.

1. Permanent (Ongoing) Employment – \$30,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant to subsidise the permanent employment of an Aboriginal person.

The proposed position must be at a minimum Clerk Grade 7 or above, based on the Crown Employees (Public Sector – Salaries 2018) Award or equivalent for local government authorities. An existing mainstream position can be converted to an Aboriginal Identified position, on the condition that the position remains a permanent Aboriginal Identified position in your organisational structure.

2. Temporary (Term Employment) Secondment – \$20,000 to \$40,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the salary cost of a temporary position (Minimum six months, up to twelve months) that will provide a significant skill development opportunity for an Aboriginal person who is already permanently employed in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

Agencies may apply for funding of graded positions at the minimum grade 5 or equivalent of Local Government Authority that shows career mobility and progression for an Aboriginal person.

3. School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SBAT) - \$10,000

A one-off grant that subsidises the creation of a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship for an Aboriginal student in a NSW public service agency or local government authority.

The Apprenticeship or Traineeship must be established under the provisions of the Apprenticeship and Traineeship Act 2001; approved by the Board of Studies; and contribute to the attainment of the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

Limitations

Eligibility

The EDAEG provides funding to organisations (not individuals) to support Aboriginal education, employment and training.

Applicants

Organisations applying for funding under the EDAEG must be registered, based in NSW and provide services within the State.

To be eligible, organisations must be a:

- NSW public service agency; or
- NSW local government authority operating under the Local Government Act 1993.

Ineligibility

Grant applications will be deemed ineligible for the following circumstances:

Permanent and Temporary

- positions that form part of an organisation's bulk or annual recruitment intake;
- existing positions within an organisations staffing structure (Unless a permanent position has been converted to an identified role);
- a position(s) that has previously been funded under the Grant;
- employment of a person who was unemployed (Temporary element); or
- a position(s) that has been filled prior to applying for EDAEG.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs.

SBAT

- an apprenticeship or traineeship position has been already filled prior to the organisation's application to the EDAEG i.e. no retrospective funding.
- replaces or duplicates funding from any Commonwealth, NSW or local Government programs. The Department will consult with other Government agencies when it considers the funding application. Applicant organisations will need to advise the Department on the application form whether they have applied or have received other Government funding for the project.

Purpose

This grant will support remote stores experiencing significant barriers to address food security risks in their community. This includes increasing capacity to withstand supply interruptions (e.g. due to extreme weather, inadequate storage, regional supply shortages or transport delays).

Overview

Grants available

The total grant funding is \$5 million (GST exclusive) for all activities funded. The grant will run from 1 October 2021 to 10 November 2021. For each applicant:

- there is no minimum grant amount
- the maximum grant amount is \$500,000.

The NIAA may consider grants over \$500,000 in limited circumstances where an extreme food security risk has been identified and high need for urgent additional investment justified.

Grant period

You must complete your project and fully expend all funds by 30 June 2023. Following the project period, an evaluation period of 18 months may commence.

Example

The objective of the grant opportunity is to provide funding for community stores to improve remote Indigenous communities' access to continuous and sustainable supplies of food and essential items.

This may include:

- improving the range, quantity, quality and/or affordability of nutritious foods and essential groceries
- improving access to and continuity of power
- improving stock monitoring and replenishing capability
- strengthening supply chains and distribution infrastructure
- improving or expanding appropriate and secure storage (cold and dry)
- upgrading or acquiring equipment and/or minor infrastructure
- improving store management, governance and/or financial performance and viability.

Examples of eligible activities include (but are not limited to) purchase of: forklifts; electrical upgrades; green, solar and continuous energy solutions; satellite communications; cold storage and transport solutions; storage expansion and security; loading bays; organisational capability development; digital capability for stock inventory, ordering and/or point of sale; infrastructure maintenance and minor upgrades; and other infrastructure for stock and merchandise.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

Community groups not eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible lead organisation, for example, by forming a consortium.

Who is eligible for funding?

To be eligible you must meet all the following criteria:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN) (exemptions may apply in special cases)

- an individual with an ABN

AND

• be a store selling food and other critical groceries

• provide your services to an Indigenous community (Indigenous population of 50% or more) in Remote or Very Remote Australia (as per the Australian Statistical Geography Standard Remoteness Structure).

Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an organisation, or your project partner is an organisation, included on the National Redress Scheme's website on the list of 'Institutions that have not joined or signified their intent to join the Scheme
- a major supermarket chain or conglomerate (e.g. ALDI; Woolworths; Coles)
- providing goods where the Indigenous population is less than 50%
- a non-corporate Commonwealth entity
- an unincorporated association
- subject to the Agency's sole discretion, an overseas resident
- an organisation or individual not included in the list above
- declared bankrupt or subject to insolvency proceedings—as relevant to the entity type
- named as currently non-compliant under the Workplace Gender Equality Act 2012.

Purpose

The ILEF aims to provide a response to short term, one-off funding proposals that help overcome obstacles for Indigenous job seekers in accessing local employment opportunities and provide pathways into short term labour markets, particularly where COVID-19 has had a significant impact on job opportunities.

Overview

Funding is available for proposed activities to address barriers facing Indigenous job seekers and meet their particular needs in local areas. Innovative solutions to help overcome obstacles facing job seekers and employers in COVID-19 affected labour markets are encouraged.

Projects may include, but are not limited to, the following examples:

- service providers to source and match Indigenous job seekers into short-term employment placements
- qualified mentors to motivate and support Indigenous participants as they commence employment
- qualified Indigenous or non-Indigenous facilitators/ coordinators to provide short-term guidance to Indigenous work teams and cross cultural communication between stakeholders
- provision of training and upskilling for Indigenous job seekers (including qualifications for a specific job, drivers' licence acquisition; personal and career development; life skills and money management)
- health and safety support for Indigenous job seekers, which may include mental well-being, nutrition awareness and costs associated with COVID-19 workplace plans
- transport, accommodation, catering or other practical support for Indigenous job seekers as they commence employment
- cultural competency training for your workplace; and
- small scale capital works and purchase of equipment to assist Indigenous job seekers commence work or receive training, if the need is well demonstrated (for example, if the hire cost exceeds the purchase price).

Funding

A total of \$3 million (GST exclusive) over two years is available. The minimum amount per grant is \$5,000 (GST exclusive) and the maximum amount is \$250,000 (GST exclusive). Funding is available until 30 June 2022. You must complete your project by 31 December 2022.

This grant opportunity is open until funds are exhausted or until 31 December 2021, whichever occurs first.

Application process

Organisations must contact and discuss their proposal with the NIAA Regional office in the locality where the project will take place. Some adjustments to the proposal may need to be agreed through this discussion. If the proposal is eligible and funds are available, an organisation may be invited by the NIAA Regional Office to submit a proposal. Example

A broad range of activities that demonstrate a clear link to placing Indigenous jobseekers into employment can be funded.

Activities may include but are not limited to:

- Support for employers and service providers for placing Indigenous job seekers into short-term casual work. Support may include costs associated with a job seeker preparing for and commencing in a role or addressing barriers to remaining in a role. This includes short-term employment for Indigenous job seekers in sectors such as the agricultural, hospitality, retail, construction, transport, manufacturing sectors – particularly those affected by COVID-19.
- Training, mentoring and development by qualified providers for Indigenous job seekers aimed at achieving employment outcomes (not otherwise available under other IAS programs).
- Cultural competency training for workplaces employing or seeking to employ Indigenous jobseekers.
- Health and safety support for Indigenous job seekers entering into employment and during their employment placements. This support may include mental wellbeing, nutrition awareness and costs associated with COVID-19 workplace requirements.
- Support for Indigenous jobseekers to attend training and employment placements, such as on-site accommodation, and transport.
- Post-placement support for participants (Indigenous job seekers).
- Small scale capital works, the purchase of assets and equipment. This will only be considered on a case by case basis. Funding for these activities will depend on the circumstances and need for the project. You must demonstrate that these activities are linked to delivery of services and employment outcomes for Indigenous job seekers and meet NIAA requirements for management of assets.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

Who is eligible for funding?

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Native Title Respondent Funding Scheme



Purpose

The Attorney-General's Department helps native title respondents with their reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs incurred in native title proceedings.

Overview

The Government has approved funding of \$2.2 million over two years to fund the new eligibility. This allows native title respondents to have equitable access to legal representation in the resolution of native title proceedings.

Limitations

Eligibility

The Attorney-General's Department cannot help people facing criminal charges in Australia or with legal matters under state or territory laws. For these matters, contact your local legal aid office.

The Attorney-General's Department will not generally grant funding:

- to people who can meet their legal costs without incurring serious financial difficulty
- for costs incurred before an application is made, unless the scheme allows for reimbursement.

Excluded costs

In this guideline, a cost is an excluded cost if it is any of the following:

- compensation for loss of earnings due to time spent in preparing for, or appearing in, legal action;
- compensation for costs (including legal representation costs) incurred by an applicant to make an application under Part 3 or for a review under Part 5;
- compensation for costs (including legal representation costs) incurred by a grant recipient in dealing with the Department in relation to the grant;
- compensation for costs incurred in the preparation of an itemised bill of costs;
- giving an indemnity for costs that may be awarded against the grant recipient;
- travel for the purposes of participating in legal action in person unless attendance is reasonably required by an entity presiding over the action;
- living expenses;
- filing fees for courts in jurisdictions where the court is able to waive all or part of the filing fee;
- a fee paid to a legal practitioner in advance to secure the legal practitioner to act on the grant recipient's behalf (whether or not it is described as a retainer).

Purpose

Ninganah No More Aboriginal language program aims to increase the level of Aboriginal languages being taught in early childhood services across NSW.

Overview

The program provides an opportunity for Aboriginal culture and identity to be developed and nurtured in the earliest stage of formal education across NSW.

Objectives

Ninganah No More has five core objectives:

- 1. Embed Aboriginal language and culture into ECE educational programs.
- 2. Increase the number of Aboriginal children learning an Aboriginal language.
- 3. Ensure Aboriginal children remain connected to culture and grow their cultural identity through language.
- 4. Develop stronger links between early childhood education services and their local Aboriginal communities.
- 5. Create inclusive learning environments and encourage all children to learn an Aboriginal language.

Applicants should also note that the Ninganah No More program provides an annual grant for four years, and applicants should indicate the annual amount they are applying for. This amount should also reflect the three categories of grant available under the Ninganah No More program, and outlined in the table.

Priority

Where possible the Ninganah No More program will seek to prioritise Aboriginal community-controlled applicants. This is in-line with the NSW Government's commitment to the national agreement on closing the gap, priority reform two relating to strengthening the community-controlled sector. Assessment of applications will apply the following hierarchy in prioritising applications:

- 1. Aboriginal community-controlled ECE services.
- 2. Aboriginal community-controlled organisations partnering with ECE services.
- 3. Eligible ECE services delivering to a significant number of Aboriginal children.
- 4. Existing providers who meet the current requirements for the program.

Limitations

Eligibility Criteria

Applications for Ninganah No More must be lodged by an organisation. Organisations who are eligible to apply include early childhood education service providers and recognised Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander organisations. In order to be considered, applications must satisfy all of the following eligibility criteria:

- The application is not for the delivery of services within one or more of the proposed early childhood education language hub regions (see Table 1, above).
- The program must be co-developed and delivered by a Certificate III, Diploma, or early childhood teacher qualified educator employed at the participating services.
- As per the Ninganah No More grant categories, outlined above, the program is primarily aimed at providing an opportunity for Aboriginal children to learn an Aboriginal language. Once the minimum number of Aboriginal children criteria is met other, non-Aboriginal, children may also benefit from the program depending on the specific service context in which it is delivered.
- The language teaching component of the program must be co-developed and delivered by an Aboriginal and/ or Torres Strait Islander person who has the necessary community and organisational support to deliver a local Aboriginal language program. Documented support will be required as part of the application process and includes:
 - Proof that the organisation responsible for the language component of the program is recognised as an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander organisation (e.g., ORIC registration, documentation showing 51 per cent Aboriginal ownership, or any other relevant documentation); or,
 - Documentation confirming support for an individual to deliver a local Aboriginal language program (e.g., a letter of support from the NSW AECG or their local AECG, NSW Land Council, NSW Aboriginal Regional Alliance or other relevant local Aboriginal organisation).
- Providers of language services must also consider any relevant requirements under the NSW Aboriginal Languages Act 2017, including notification to the Aboriginal Languages Trust of the establishment and operation of their service.

The application can relate to the delivery of the program across more than one service, provided all eligibility requirements are met. Participation of all nominated services must be confirmed as part of the application process. Eligible services include mobile or centre-based community preschools, and long day care services.

A second element of the program is the establishment of Aboriginal ECE language Hubs in selected regions. Services within those regions are **not eligible** to apply for this grant funding, however existing Ninganah No More services in those regions will be contacted to discuss transitional arrangements specific to their service. Please refer to Table 2 of the guidelines.

Spending rules

Successful applicants must only use funding for the development and delivery of the Ninganah No More program, as outlined in their approved application, and in line with the program guidelines and the Terms and Conditions of the Ninganah No More program.

Funding cannot be used to replace existing funding sources.

Activities are to commence during the calendar year for which funds have been provided. Any unspent funds at the end of the calendar year may be required to be returned to the Department of Education.

The Department of Education must be notified of exceptional circumstances whereby approved funding cannot be expended within 12 months of the award of funds. Notification should include an explanation for why funding has not been expended and a timeline for spending the outstanding funds. Any decisions regarding unspent funds will be made by the Department of Education with reference to the Terms and Conditions of funding. Decisions will be confirmed by the department in writing.

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Purpose

The primary objective of this funding is to assist Prescribed Bodies Corporate (PBCs) generate economic benefits through the effective and sustainable management of their land.

Overview

There are three elements to this funding:

- 1. Direct support to increase the capacity of PBCs to take advantage of economic opportunities.
- 2. Support for training to build long-term organisational capacity within PBCs and to obtain professional expertise (for example, business or agribusiness consultancies, accountancy or legal services).
- 3. Direct support for effective native title agreement-making.

How much funding is available?

A total of \$20.4 million is available over the first four years, comprising: \$2.519 million in 2015-16; \$5.037 million in 2016-17; \$6.296 million in 2017-18 and \$6.548 million in 2018-19. Funding for the programme is ongoing, but funding amounts have only been allocated until 2018-19.

There is no closing date for applications and the Department will consider applications throughout the year.

The Department may award grants as one-off payments, or on a single year or multi-year basis at its discretion.

Limitations

Who can apply for funding?

- Any PBC can apply for funding.
- Several PBCs can apply for funding as a group.
- Other parties, such as native title representative bodies and service providers, law firms and interest groups can apply to receive and administer funding on behalf of, and with the authorisation of, a PBC or group of PBCs.

Applicants must meet other eligibility criteria outlined in the IAS Grant Guidelines and undergo financial viability checks and a risk assessment.

General criteria

Organisation:

To be eligible for grant funding under the IAS, applicants must be a legal entity and have full legal capacity to enter into a Project Agreement with the Commonwealth. For example, applicants may be:

- Aboriginal Corporations (incorporated under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006 and administered by the Office of the Registrar of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporations [ORIC]).
- Incorporated Associations (incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Association' or 'Incorporated' or 'Inc' in their legal name).

- Incorporated Cooperatives (also incorporated under State/Territory legislation, commonly have 'Cooperative' in their legal name).
- Companies (incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 may be not-for-profit or for-profit proprietary company (limited by shares or by guarantee) or public companies).
- Organisations established through a specific piece of Commonwealth or State/Territory legislation (many public benevolent institutions, churches, universities, etc.).
- A partner on behalf of a Partnership.
- Trustees on behalf of a Trust.
- State/Territory or Local Governments.
- Where a particular need has been identified, the Department may also consider an individual or individuals (either jointly or separately) for contractual arrangements.

An unincorporated association is not a legal entity and will not be contracted by the Department.

Community groups that may not be eligible to apply for funding are encouraged to consider partnering with an eligible organisation.

Individual:

While it is expected that grant funding will primarily be provided to organisations, individuals will not be precluded from receiving grant funding, unless otherwise specified in the application documentation.

Incorporation requirements:

All organisations receiving grant funding of \$500,000 (GST exclusive) or more in any single financial year from funding administered by the Indigenous Affairs Group within the Department are required to:

- Incorporate under Commonwealth legislation Indigenous organisations will be required to incorporate under the Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006; with other organisations incorporating under the Corporations Act 2001.
- Maintain these arrangements while they continue to receive any level of such funding.

Matching funding is not a requirement, however, other contributions towards the project will improve the value for money of the project. Include details of other contributions to the project including any voluntary labour and project management time as an 'in-kind' contribution (this includes hands on volunteer work, project management, administration, reporting, donations etc.).

There is no funding limit for project applications, however, projects are assessed on their value for money, that is, what is the level of benefit from the project compared to the cost of the project.

There are two different funding application forms to choose from when applying for funding – a simpler, less detailed form for **small projects seeking less than \$10,000** of funding and another form for **large projects seeking more than \$10,000** of funding.

This program is currently open for application. The closing date will be updated as soon as the information is provided.

Example

Ways to improve / maximise the cost benefit of a project:

- Infrastructure projects are usually reviewed in terms of what is the level of the requested funding in relation to the extent the infrastructure benefits recreational fishers. So key things to consider for a fish cleaning table would be how many taps does the table have, or how wide is the fishing platform and how many fishers can use it at the same time?
- Education or research projects are often statewide or regional, benefitting many people, but even if a project is very small scale and localised, it may have statewide benefit if it is run as a pilot project with the results shared through wider networks.
- Investigate all other potential sources of funding that could contribute to the project. Provide evidence of unsuccessful attempts to gain funding from other sources.
- Quotes and estimates for project items should be sought to obtain best value for money. When developing the project costings, any quotes/estimates should be attached to the project application to assist in the assessment of the project's value for money.

Limitations

Who can apply?

Anyone can apply for funding from the Recreational Fishing Trusts, including fishing clubs and organisations, universities, councils, community groups, individuals and so on. Joint applications are also encouraged. **To apply for funds all clubs, organisations and community groups must be incorporated in Australia.**

Eligibility:

Funding applications must relate to the improvement of recreational fishing. Where applicable, projects should:

- have appropriate expertise within the project team to complete the project
- represent value for money by incorporating other contributing funding or 'in-kind' contribution by the applicant and other project partners
- be technically sound and utilise best practice
- link to key strategic recreational fishing objectives and plans, and
- build on and extend the outcomes of projects and work previously funded by the Recreational Fishing Trust

Projects that would not receive favourable consideration, or would be considered a low priority include:

- Commercial ventures or materials developed for a primarily commercial purpose
- On ground projects on private land or land with no free public access
- Requests for funding the business of organisations/clubs including building club premises or improving club facilities that are only available to club members, or holding events that are only available for club members.
- Construction of boat launching ramps, boat wharves, boating pontoons or other boating infrastructure (applicants should in the first instance investigate alternative funding sources e.g. NSW Boating Now program and Regional Boating Plans)
- Construction of general amenities such as picnic tables, car parking, toilet blocks, BBQs, shelters and other picnic area enhancements
- Ongoing maintenance e.g. dredging or general repair and maintenance of fishing and boating infrastructure (this is usually the responsibility of local authorities)
- Projects that have limited benefit to recreational fishing

What project items are ineligible for funding?

As listed above, some things are not generally funded by the Trusts. Project items such as picnic tables and shelters and BBQs are usually considered low priority, however, they may be an important part of a project and can be included as part of the applicant's contribution to the project. For example a local land manager might apply for funding for a fishing platform and their contribution to the project could be to fund the adjoining car parking.

This program seeks to increase the area of sea in Indigenous Protected Areas (IPAs) to strengthen the conservation and protection of the marine environment, while creating employment and economic opportunities for Indigenous Australians.

Overview

The Australian Government is inviting Indigenous organisations and enterprises to apply for up to \$9.7 million in grants under its Sea Country Indigenous Protected Areas Program.

Successful applicants will be funded to:

- undertake planning and consultation activities to support the development of new Sea Country IPAs or expand the area of sea in existing dedicated IPAs.
- employ Indigenous Australians to undertake on-ground/on-sea activities such as pest plant and animal management, threatened species protection, foreshore debris removal, cultural site management and sea patrols.

Grants will be between \$800,000 and \$1.3 million and are only available to Indigenous organisations. Grant projects are expected to start in early 2022 and will be funded until June 2023.

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- have an account with an Australian financial institution and be one of the following entity types:
 - an entity, incorporated in Australia
 - a company incorporated in Australia under the Corporations Act 2001
 - an Indigenous not-for-profit corporation, council or incorporated association
 - an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
 - an incorporated association
 - an incorporated co-operative
 - a registered charity or not-for-profit organisation
 - an Indigenous government agency or body established under Commonwealth, state or territory legislation

The overall purpose of this grant program is to improve the health and safety of wildlife volunteers through vaccinations against Q fever.

Overview

Q fever is a public health concern globally and wildlife rehabilitators are considered an at-risk occupational group. Vaccination is the best preventative measure and is highly recommended for at-risk groups.

Funds Available

A total of \$50,000 is available for allocation over 12 months during the 2020/21 and 2021/22 financial years.

In this program the maximum grant available is \$2000 per application. Groups may submit only one application at a time, and must provide information about all volunteers receiving support through this grant once funds are expended. Annual Organisation funding is provided on an annual basis to support arts and cultural organisations (including service organisations) to deliver multiple arts and cultural activities.

Funding can contribute to any aspect of an organisation's program throughout a single calendar or financial year.

These grants aim to:

- Provide targeted support to individuals and groups in the 'small-to-medium' sector in NSW in recognition of their role as important generators of cultural and artistic activity and crucial employers of artists across the state.
- Mitigate the impact of disruption on the development of new works and collaborations by the small-to-medium sector in NSW

Purpose

Screen Australia aims to support the creation of a diverse slate of quality, innovative, original, culturally significant smallscreen storytelling that resonates with contemporary audiences.

Overview

Screen Australia is required to place particular emphasis on "programs of interest or relevance to children", they acknowledge the particular challenges and opportunities involved in producing programs for children, including the difficulties Commissioning Platforms have in monetising content, as well as the different relationship between first and subsequent windows created by the nature of the audience. For animation, preference will be given to those programs with Australian voices; or, on a case by case basis we may require a separate Australian voice track.

What funding is available?

Screen Australia will not contribute more than 45 per cent of the total budget, inclusive of any Producer Offset amount, other than in exceptional circumstances.

Further, Screen Australia investment is capped at \$2 million in any one children's program, other than in exceptional circumstances. If a project is a co-production, this cap will normally be reduced pro rata according to the percentage of the non-Australian co-production partner(s)' contribution. So, for example if the co-production is a 60/40 Australian majority co production, the cap would be \$1.2 million.

For official co-productions the 45 per cent cap applies only to the Australian component of the budget. Please refer to the website for further information on the Children's program and application deadlines.

Assessment criteria

Investment decisions will be made against the following criteria, and in the context of the slate management principles:

- the quality of the proposal including its innovative and/or cultural significance;
- the project's potential to connect with its target audience;
- the track record and capacity of the creative team;
- the strength of the marketplace e.g. any ROW sales agent and the level of co-finance (excluding Screen Australia and the state agencies);
- diversity of slate.

NOTE: Applicants are encouraged to contact the **Program Operations team** on 1800 507 901 before applications are submitted to discuss any eligibility questions and ensure all the required supporting material is in place.

Limitations

Who can apply?

Children's programs of any broadcast format is eligible for this program, including telemovies, telemovie packages and series (no distinction is drawn between series and mini-series).

The content can be animation or live action, preschool, drama or factual and do not have to be 'P' or 'C' program as classified by the ACMA. However, the primary audience for the content must be children, as opposed to families generally.

Children's Programs, animation or live action, which do not feature predominantly Australian voices will not be eligible.

Whilst Screen Australia will not normally fund long running series, in the case of children's programs we will give due consideration for applications to fund more than 26 viewing hours of any one project, including multiple series (whether or not they have been funded by Screen Australia).

Applicants and projects must meet the general eligibility requirements set out in Screen Australia's Terms of Trade, as well as the specific requirements of these guidelines. With the exception of official Co-Productions, it is Screen Australia's expectation that applications for direct funding will demonstrate that the project is written and directed by Australian citizens or residents.

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Purpose

The Contemporary Music Touring Program (CMTP) supports national touring activity undertaken by Australian musicians performing original contemporary music.

Overview

Under the CMTP performances of original Australian contemporary music can include a wide range of different musical styles.

The tour must comprise of performances in at least three venues outside of the performer's hometown. Tours that include regional and remote destinations, or which assist performers residing in regional and remote areas to tour, are a priority for funding.

- If your itinerary contains only metropolitan performances, you may request up to \$15,000.
- If your itinerary contains at least one regional or remote performance, you may request up to \$25,000.
- If 75% of your itinerary is to remote and/or very remote locations, you may request up to \$50,000.
- Please note: The minimum grant amount you can apply for is \$5,000.
- The Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA) helps determine the regional and remote reach of the tour.

Joint tours, where two or more independent performers are undertaking the same tour itinerary, are eligible under this program. These should be submitted as a single application. In such cases, the funding caps still apply.

We encourage the inclusion of additional activities which extend opportunities for community participation, such as workshops, master classes and all-age performances.

Priority

Tours that include a majority of regional destinations or assist performers from regional areas are a priority for funding.

Limitations

Who can apply

Individuals or organisations may apply to tour live music performances within Australia. Touring musicians must be performing original Australian contemporary music. Funding can be provided to performers, managers, agents, and music networks on behalf of professionals working in the Australian music industry. Applications must contain one tour only.

Who can't apply

You can't apply for a grant if:

- you received a grant, or administered a grant, from the Australia Council in the past and that grant has not been satisfactorily acquitted
- you owe money to the Australia Council.

You can't apply for the following activity:

- a tour to less than three venues
- overseas tours
- tours by non-Australian performers
- tours which are primarily school-based (except for applications seeking remote or very remote funds where the school is the primary venue of a remote or very remote location)

Purpose

The purpose of the package is to ensure that the performing arts remain financially viable so it can continue to make its important contribution to the NSW economy.

Overview

The aim of this package is to provide urgent financial support to performing arts venues, producers, and promoters impacted by the cancellation or postponement of performances resulting from the NSW Government COVID-19 Public Health Orders from 26th June 2021.

It is recognised that the performing arts is particularly vulnerable to the impact of COVID-19 and related Public Health Orders due to its financial reliance on box office sales.

The package is also designed to provide certainty to performing arts venues, producers and promoters of what assistance will be available if further COVID-19 Public Health Orders result in further cancellation of performances or restrictions in audience numbers.

Funding amount

The funding amount per performance will be calculated using a formula of average ticket price multiplied by the number of tickets available for sale and a specified percentage ("Agreed Percentage") tied to the prevailing Public Health Order.

There are five possible "Agreed Percentages" that Create NSW will pay in line with Public Health Orders. Specifically:

- A. Shutdown / unable to perform from 26th June 2021 to a maximum of 7 August 2021
- B. Shutdown / unable to perform for weeks if shutdown extends beyond 7 August 2021
- C. Performances allowed under restrictions of 1 in 4 square meter rule or 25% of total venue capacity
- D. Performances allowed under restrictions of 1 in 2 square meter rule or 50% of total venue capacity
- E. Performances allowed under restrictions of 75% of total venue capacity.

What is the funding to be used for?

The funding is to be used to support Performing Arts activities including the provision of payments to performing artists and arts workers impacted by the Public Health Orders.

Venues are permitted to use the funding towards meeting rent obligations, wages, utility costs, compliance, and insurance only. The funding is not to be used to meet losses incurred as a result of reduced food and beverage sales.

Limitations

Eligibility

To be eligible for funding, the applicant MUST be one of the following:

- 1. An eligible venue (ref Attachment A in the guidelines PDF)
- 2. A producer of an eligible performance scheduled to perform at one of the eligible venues
- 3. A promoter of an eligible performance scheduled to perform at one of the eligible venues.

Eligible venues have been identified through wide sector consultation, review of on-line marketing material of venues and through assessment of tickets on sale through major ticket selling agencies.

If your venue is not an eligible venue as listed in Attachment A an application for consideration can be made through Create NSW. Please refer to Attachment C for more information on how to apply for consideration as an eligible venue.

Eligible Performances

Eligible performances must be evidenced by marketing collateral (website, social media etc) and have ticket sales managed through one of the eligible ticketing systems listed in Attachment B in the guidelines PDF.

The following performances are eligible under this package:

- Theatrical performances (including dance and musical theatre) of running times of greater than 40 minutes
- Music performances (including opera) of running times of greater than 30 minutes.

The following performances are ineligible under this package:

- Film screenings at any of the eligible venues
- Theatrical or music performances produced or promoted by educational institutions other than those listed as eligible venues in Attachment A of the guidelines PDF
- Workshops, classes, and any other educational related performances at any of the eligible venues
- Conventions and other corporate or private activity undertaken at the eligible venues
- Visual art exhibitions held at any of the eligible venues.

The PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation provides grants to promote and encourage music and the music-related performing arts.

Overview

The grants provided are non-recurring (i.e. one-off grants rather than a periodical payment) and are determined by the four trustees of the trust.

- Two (including the Chairman) are appointed by the PPCA;
- One is appointed by the Musicians' Union of Australia;
- One is appointed by the Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance (formerly Actors' Equity).

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for one or more of the following purposes:

- performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged
- scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education
- the promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public
- the aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income.

A grant under the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation can be used for costs associated with the above, including:

- Tuition fees
- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol)
- Accommodation
- Venue hire/ PA hire.

There is no specified limit to how much you can apply for. However, funds are finite and there is no guarantee that you will receive all or any of the funds you request.

It is unusual for grants to be approved in excess of :

- \$3,000 for an individual; or
- \$5,000 for a group or organisation

Limitations

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Although the trust is discretionary, the trustees are guided by the 'purposes' articulated in the trust deed. As a result, it is not their usual practice to approve funding for any project of a commercial nature. This would include:

- investments in recordings (e.g., studio time, producers fees, session musician fees, manufacturing or distribution costs);
- concert or festival promotion or staging costs;
- tour support;
- artist management expenses; or
- equipment purchases.

You should also note that the trustees are unlikely to approve applications seeking funding for the majority of costs related to a project, and look to applicants to contribute and/or explore additional funding sources.

There are also changes to the amount you can apply for under this program. Individuals can apply for up to \$3000, organisations can apply for up to \$5000. There is no minimum grant amount. There is a limited amount in this funding pool, so please ensure your budgets are accurate and you are only applying for the amount that you actually need.

The Quick Response Grants will continue to support immediate need that arises where the activity is unable to be planned for or supported in other funding rounds, for example taking up professional development, skills development or small project opportunities at short notice.

Limitations

Overview

Screen NSW funds production of Australian projects in the following categories:

- feature films
- content-rich factual and documentary television or web programs and series
- adult and children's television drama and narrative comedy including series, miniseries, web series and telemovies
- animation productions
- creative interactive screen entertainment

Applicants may request up to 35% of the budgeted NSW Regional Spend.

NSW Regional Spend is the total of the below the line shooting expenses directly associated with filming in regional NSW. Eligible NSW Regional Spend expenses are limited to:

- location fees
- travel (for cast and crew traveling from other parts of NSW)
- accommodation
- per diems
- local suppliers & services (e.g. construction contractors, security, traffic control etc.)
- catering
- salaries for regionally based cast and crew

Regional spend does not include any above-the-line expenses (including development expenses), indirect costs, company overheads, contingency or post-production expenses.

Support is provided as a grant. The maximum grant per production is \$100,000.

Priority

Screen NSW is committed to supporting increased participation in the industry of people from under-represented groups including women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, people from CaLD backgrounds, people with disability,

LGBTQI people, people from western Sydney and people from regional NSW. Priority will be given to teams including people from under-represented groups.

Limitations

Who is eligible?

Screen NSW general eligibility requirements can be found in the Screen NSW Terms of Trade, which should be read in conjunction with these guidelines.

- At least one of the Key Creatives must be NSW based.
- The production company must be registered in NSW and have its principal place of business in NSW.
- The production must film on location in Regional NSW for a minimum of five shooting days.
- At least 50% of the total budget must be expended in NSW.
- Productions must be fully financed at the time of application, with the exception of contributions being sought from Screen NSW and other state, federal or international agencies (Note: we will only consider an application where those agencies have confirmed their contribution or if the application has been submitted to a funding round running concurrently with the Screen NSW round).
- Productions that have been shortlisted for Screen Australia's Documentary Production Producer Program or Multi-Platform Drama Fund may apply.
- Feature films must have distribution in place.
- Television drama, narrative comedy and factual/documentary programs must have a financial commitment from a broadcaster, subscription service or distributor.

Screen NSW do not fund the production of:

- *infotainment, lifestyle, travel, magazine, sports, education, game shows and other magazine- style productions
- current affairs and news programs
- community television
- shorts, short features (under 60 minutes)
- projects being developed as part of a course of study

*For further guidance on the distinction between infotainment, lifestyle, magazine programs and documentary/factual programs refer to the advice on Screen Australia's website.

- assist companies in the arts and entertainment sector to present new or re-imagined activities which have been disrupted by the COVID-19 restrictions

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Purpose

The aim of the Temporary Interruption Fund (TIF) is to support local film and television producers to start filming again in circumstances where new productions have been halted by insurers not providing coverage for COVID-19.

Overview

TIF is a \$50 million fund made available by the Australian Government and administered by Screen Australia.

The fund provides assistance for new local productions which have been unable to start production due to production insurance exclusions relating to COVID-19.

TIF will provide coverage to productions for specific events relating to COVID-19 that occur during the last two weeks of pre-production and the period of principal photography. Further details are provided at Coverage provided by TIF, below.

Screen Australia's total liability under TIF for a production will be capped at 60% of the total budget, or \$4 million, whichever is less. An applicant can agree with Screen Australia for coverage at a lesser amount than the capped amount.

Screen Australia will not commit more than \$50 million of TIF coverage to productions at any moment in time.

Limitations

Eligibility: Who can apply?

TIF is a fund for Australian productions made in Australia.

To be eligible for TIF:

- feature films, drama series, documentary series or single episode programs:
 - must have passed the Significant Australian Content test or be an official coproduction, as evidenced at the time of application by:
 - a provisional certificate for the Producer Offset; or
 - a provisional official co-production approval, issued by Screen Australia (as appropriate); or
- entertainment or reality series:
 - must, in Screen Australia's opinion, be capable of passing the Significant Australian Content test based on the information provided in the application form.

TIF is available to productions regardless of whether or not they have separately received direct Screen Australia production funding, but applicants must meet the following provisions based on Screen Australia's Terms of Trade:

- the applicant must be a company incorporated and carrying on business in Australia, and have its central management and control in Australia;
- the applicant company must control the rights to carry out the production; and
- the applicant company and its related companies must not be in breach of any obligation under any agreement it has with Screen Australia or its predecessors.

TIF is a fund aimed at getting new productions started. An eligible production must have:

- not commenced principal photography at the time of application; and
- commenced principal photography on or before 30 June 2021.

TIF is a fund aimed at productions with a principal photography component. An eligible production must consist of predominantly live action content created specifically for the production.

TIF operates alongside market based risk minimisation practices. The applicant company must have "Film Producers Indemnity" (FPI) insurance covering named individuals from an approved insurer. Applicants will need to provide an existing certificate of currency or valid quotation.

TIF only applies to productions with FPI insurance that excludes coverage for COVID-19 events.

A production will not be covered by TIF unless it has been approved and the applicant company has executed a TIF agreement between it and Screen Australia (the TIF Agreement).

What is not eligible for this program?

The production will not be eligible for TIF if:

- it is a feature film, drama series, documentary series or single episode program that does not have a provisional certificate for the producer offset (ie. location offset productions, productions below producer offset minimum spend thresholds); or
- it is an animation program unless it is a hybrid live action animation (and is predominantly live action).

Australasian Reporting Awards exists to improve continually the standards of reporting. Reporting, the annual report especially, is an essential mechanism of accountability, a vital element in the governance process.

Overview

There are three types of ARA Award: the General Award which covers the whole annual report; the Sustainability Reporting Award which focuses on sustainability considerations; and the Special Awards which address particular aspects of reporting.

An organisation must enter the General Award to be eligible to enter the Sustainability Reporting Award and one or more of the Special Awards.

General Award:

The General Award provides a measure of the standard of reporting that has been achieved and is not a competition. The entire annual report is benchmarked against the ARA Criteria. A report may achieve a Gold, Silver or Bronze Award, or No Award, according to the extent to which it satisfies the criteria. The very high standard of Gold Award reports makes them model reports for other organisations to follow.

Best of Industry Sector Awards were introduced in the 2021 Awards to recognise outstanding performance in addressing the General Award criteria above and beyond receiving a Gold Award. The winners of these Awards are selected from among the Gold Award recipients in each industry sector. The Gold Awards in each sector are subjected to further review to select the sector winner.

All entrants in the General Award are eligible to receive a Best of Industry Sector Award. Entry to the Best of Industry Sector Awards is automatic.

The Report of the Year Award is presented to the most outstanding annual report entered in the General Award. The winner is selected from among the winners of the Best of Industry Sector Awards.

About the Best of Industry Sector Awards:

The eight Industry sectors are:

- Community & Welfare
- Financial Services
- Health, Research & Education
- Infrastructure, Retail and Services
- Resources and Production
- Public Administration National
- Public Administration State

Sustainability Reporting Award:

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Purpose

The Government's SME Recovery Loan Scheme is designed to support the economic recovery, and to provide continued assistance, to firms that received JobKeeper and also to firms that are eligible flood-affected businesses.

Overview

The Scheme is enhancing lenders' ability to provide cheaper credit, allowing many otherwise viable SMEs to access vital additional funding to get through the impact of Coronavirus, recover and invest for the future. The Government will work with lenders to ensure that eligible firms will have access to finance to maintain and grow their businesses.

The Scheme builds on the framework established in the two phases of the Coronavirus SME Guarantee Scheme, and is only open to recipients of the JobKeeper payment between 4 January 2021 and 28 March 2021 and businesses that are located or operating in eligible Local Government Areas (LGAs) impacted by the floods in March 2021.

Loans are available from 1 April 2021 until 31 December 2021.

Phase Three: Details

- The initial phase of the Scheme was available for new loans issued by eligible lenders until 30 September 2020.
- The second phase of the Scheme started on 1 October 2020 and will be available until 30 June 2021.
- The third phase of the Scheme will begin 1 April 2021 and be available until December 2021.

Key features

Participating lenders are offering guaranteed loans on the following terms under the SME Recovery Loan Scheme:

- The Government guarantee will be 80% of the loan amount.
- Lenders are allowed to offer borrowers a repayment holiday of up to 24 months.
- Loans can be used for a broad range of business purposes, including to support investment. Loans may be used to refinance any pre-existing debt of an eligible borrower, including those from the SME Guarantee Scheme.
- Borrowers can access up to \$5 million in total, in addition to the Phase 1 and Phase 2 loan limits.
- Loans are for terms of up to 10 years, with an optional repayment holiday period.
- Loans can be either unsecured or secured (excluding residential property).
- The interest rate on loans will be determined by lenders, but will be capped at around 7.5 per cent, with some flexibility for interest rates on variable rate loans to increase if market interest rates rise over time.

The rebate will be available until 30 June 2022.

The objective of the CCCF is to support child care services to address barriers to child care participation, particularly targeting disadvantaged and vulnerable families and communities.

Overview

The Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity helps services stay open when something unexpected happens.

Services may be eligible for CCCF Special Circumstances if one of the following applies:

- It is at risk of closure due to an unforeseen event or circumstance. This could be a natural disaster, extreme weather event or pandemic.
- It is at risk of permanent closure, and the closure would result in a lack of suitable child care for the community.
- It is seeking to open a new service in a community where there is no suitable child care.

CCCF Special Circumstances is aimed at services operating in or providing care for disadvantaged and vulnerable communities. A list of priority areas have been identified based on:

- the Australian Early Development Census
- Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas, and
- Australian Bureau of Statistics remoteness and population data.

The funding is paid as a one-off grant, per event. The amount of funding depends on the individual circumstances of the service.

Bushfire, drought, natural disasters and other support

The CCCF Special Circumstances Grant Opportunity also provides support for:

- services in bushfire affected communities,
- services experiencing decreased demand and financial pressure due to drought,

- temporarily meeting standard child care operating costs

- other reasonable activities, as agreed with the department, to ensure continuity of child care is maintained
- activities that respond to the needs of the child care community, such as additional transport services, family
 engagement and other support activities.

What the grant money cannot be used for?

The following are examples of activities grant funding cannot be used for:

- activities not related to the delivery of child care services
- activities that are already fully funded by the CCCF program or any other government source or program
- activities that have already occurred
- any expenses that is claimable under the service's insurance policy.

Purpose

EMDG is a key Australian Government export financial assistance program. Each year it helps some 4,000 Australian small and medium enterprises (SMEs) to start or expand their export business.

Overview

The program is designed to bring benefits to Australia by encouraging the creation, development and expansion of foreign markets for Australian products. This is done by providing targeted financial assistance, for marketing and promotional activities and development of marketing skills, to SMEs and their representative organisations.

For those familiar with EMDG, these Guidelines describe a new EMDG model that:

- is reoriented from a reimbursement model to a grants application program, with much simpler application processes and rules
- is more responsive to the needs of exporting businesses with different types of grants for those new to export, those expanding, and those making strategic shifts
- provides greater up-front funding certainty with grant agreements specifying the amount to be funded over 2 or 3 years
- has expanded help for those looking to export for the first time to become export-ready
- continues to support industry bodies and alliances, described as representative bodies, to undertake promotional
 activities on behalf of their exporting members, and expands the assistance available to them to include training
 members to become export ready.

The principles underpinning EMDG remain, and are:

- Help is focused on export market development and promotion.
- Grantees must spend at least an equal amount of their own money on eligible expenses.
- The EMDG grant is an entitlement-based grant no comparison between applicants is made. Applicants who are eligible will be offered a grant agreement.
- SMEs have access to grants up to a total of 8 years, reflecting the time it takes to build a presence in the market.
- A wide range of expenditure is eligible, reflecting how businesses approach markets in different ways.

Grants are paid in accordance with a grant agreement between Austrade and a grantee.

Assistance for small and medium enterprises

If you are an SME, you will be able to apply for grants up to \$770,000 per applicant over 8 financial years for promotional activities to market eligible products in foreign countries, or training activities to develop skills in such marketing. The 8 years do not need to be consecutive.

Grants will be available in 3 tiers, designed to provide different levels of support to you as you grow your export markets at the different stages of your export journey:

- Tier 1: for eligible SMEs who are ready to begin exporting grants of up to \$40,000 per financial year for 2 years.
- Tier 2: for eligible exporters who plan to expand their exporting grants of up to \$80,000 per financial year for 3 years.
- Tier 3: for eligible exporters who plan to make a strategic shift in their exporting business grants of up to \$150,000 per financial year for 3 years.

To be eligible, you will need to have a turnover of less than \$20 million.

For Tier 1 you will need to be ready to start exporting. For Tiers 2 and 3 you will have already exported.

You can apply for any tier level that suits your organisation. You do not have to progress through each Tier.

Limitations

Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

To be eligible for a grant, you must be Australian and be ready to export (Tier 1), or already exporting (Tiers 2 or 3), products of substantially Australian origin, or be a representative body.

Australian persons

To be eligible for a grant you must be one of the following:

- an individual whose principal place of residence is in Australia
- a body incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001
- an association, or cooperative, incorporated under an Australian law
- a partnership that is Australian, that is if the partnership was formed and operates under a law of a State or Territory, and at least half the partners are Australian persons
- a trust that is Australian within the meaning of the EMDG Rules, that is the trustee, or each trustee, of the trust is an Australian person
- a body corporate established for a public purpose by or under an Australian law
- a representative body.

Partnerships and trusts are treated as if they are persons under the Act and Rules, but with the changes set out in sections 105A and 105B of the Act.

In cases where funding for expensive items of equipment is being sought, these items are to be retained by the organisation supporting the application as part of that organisation's equipment pool.

The following personal characteristics are indicative of some of the circumstances in which we may be able to assist:

- hold permanent Australian residency status or citizenship
- household income levels at or below the level of Centrelink benefits
- no major assets that could be realised
- no other resources that can be accessed (e.g. savings)
- families with young children, particularly single-parent families
- families with disabled children
- adults and children with disabilities particularly physical disabilities
- assistance has been sought/is being sought from other charitable organisations
- some unexpected catastrophic event has caused a crisis
- no assistance is available from family or extended family members
- time payment options have been exhausted in respect of utility and rental arrears if assistance is being sought for these items
- financial counselling, where appropriate, has been embraced in an effort to prevent future crises
- applicants have demonstrated some self-help behaviour and are endeavouring to plan for a viable lifestyle within their resources.

Applying for assistance - Requests for financial assistance should be addressed to:

- a completed Application for Financial Assistance Form signed by the applicant and the Social Worker or other responsible person.
- a letter supporting the Application from the Social Worker or other responsible person, providing:
 - background information covering any of the items mentioned above, as applicable;
 - an assessment of the client's needs; and,
 - some comment about the degree of difficulty and need the client is experiencing.
- copies of quotes obtained for any specific item requested for a client.
- copies of the relevant accounts if assistance is being sought for outstanding debts, eg, electricity, gas, telephone.

Limitations

Applications for assistance can only be accepted through social workers or other responsible persons holding official positions within organisations such as Area Health Services, welfare organisations, hospitals, or recognised church welfare departments. Applications can only be accepted by organisations holding DGR/ITEC status.

We would not usually approve requests for:

- retrospective funding of expenses, i.e. reimbursement of costs already met
- funeral costs
- travelling expenses, except for essential medical treatment
- car expenses, except where the vehicle is absolutely essential for access to medical treatment
- baby items
- repayment of loans & credit cards
- medical treatment that is available under the public health system within a reasonable time frame
- Rental bonds
- home modifications
- purchase of a vehicle
- vehicle modifications
- mobile phone bills
- additional funding where we have already provided earlier assistance.

Purpose

For Australia Day 2022 the National Australia Day Council (NADC) aims to support communities to hold an Australia Day event regardless of the changing nature of COVID restrictions.

Overview

This means supporting eligible event organisers to plan for all eventualities. Events can be a new or existing public event or activity, a community activity, or an online engagement. Organisers of face-to-face events should also plan for a virtual alternative to ensure that regardless of last-minute changes to COVID public health restrictions, their community still has the opportunity to come together to acknowledge our collective contribution to Australia.

The NADC, with the assistance of the Australian Government, is making available grants of:

- between \$10,000 \$20,000 (GST exclusive), for the purpose of assisting eligible event organisers to ensure Australia Day 2022 events proceed despite the social and economic difficulties that have been experienced as a result of COVID-19 (events must proceed in keeping with relevant COVID health directions); and
- up to an additional \$10,000 (GST exclusive) where the event includes strong recognition of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples,

A total of \$7.5 million (GST exclusive) is available through the Program.

The NADC encourages applicants to work together with local Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander communities to create Australia Day events that are meaningful, reflective, and respectful and change the focus of Australia Day from a celebration of nationalism to a demonstration of togetherness.

The intended outcomes of this grant opportunity are to provide funding for Australia Day 2022 events that:

- enable Australia Day events/activities to proceed in a COVID safe environment regardless of last minute changes to COVID public health restrictions
- encourage community participation in Australia Day events/activities
- reflect, respect and celebrate Aboriginal and / or Torres Strait Islander peoples histories and cultures
- create or retain local employment
- support local communities, regions and industries affected by the economic impacts of COVID-19
- promote the messaging of 'Reflect. Respect. Celebrate. We're all part of the story'.

Successful applicants must complete their Australia Day 2022 event/s by 26 January 2022.

Priority

Applicants are encouraged to support local businesses and communities through the planning and execution of the event including through fostering creation and enabling retention of local employment opportunities.

Applicants can apply for an additional \$10,000 toward any costs incurred to ensure a strong recognition of Aboriginal and / or Torres Strait Islander peoples is included. Limitations

Eligibility

Who is eligible?

To be considered for this grant opportunity, the applicant must be either:

- an Australian local government entity
- an Australian state or territory government entity
- an entity that is part of the state and territory Australia Day Network
- an Australian not for profit organisation.

The applicant must also have public liability insurance.

Who is not eligible?

An applicant is not eligible for a grant under this grant opportunity if they:

- are an individual
- are an unincorporated organisation
- are an entity who is not
 - an Australian local government or state or territory government
 - part of the state and territory Australia Day Network
 - an Australian not for profit organisation
- do not have public liability insurance.

The grant funds cannot be used for:

- core costs of the organisation undertaking the event(s) for example salaries.
- purchase of assets or infrastructure including but not limited to:

 - renovations or upgrades to buildings

- costs not clearly attributable to undertaking an Australia Day event.
- events previously held by local, state or territory governments where the applicant intends to financially invest less in the planned 2022 event than it invested in the previous event. The grant is intended to top up the budget for the planned event, and must not be used to offset costs. Note that this requirement does not include contra and sponsorship arrangements.
- events that do not have a clear focus on Australia Day: Reflect. Respect. Celebrate. We're all part of the story.

Funding may be used by successful applicants toward most elements of running an event and associated costs for planning an alternative 'Plan B' celebration. Applicants planning an event that is intended to be face-to-face are encouraged to also plan a virtual alternative that enables them to pivot swiftly in the event of last minute changes to local public health COVID restrictions to still deliver a celebration to their community. All costs incurred for either event will be eligible provided one or the other event is held. If neither event is held the applicant will no longer be eligible for the grant and will be required to repay any grant funds received.

Purpose

The Mercy Foundation Grants to End Homelessness are available for seeding initiatives, services, projects, advocacy and research that will contribute to the goal of ending homelessness by supporting housing first and permanent supportive housing solutions.

Overview

Projects that focus on chronic homelessness and women who experience chronic homelessness are currently priority areas for funding. Grants range from \$5,000 up to \$50,000, with grants likely to be averaging \$20,000 – \$30,000.

Chronic homelessness is defined as an episode of homelessness lasting 6 months or longer or multiple episodes of homelessness over a 12 month period or more. People who experience chronic homelessness are likely to have 'complex needs', which usually means that they have one or more of the following:

- developmental disability
- traumatic brain injury
- serious physical health problems
- history of abuse or trauma
- mental illness
- mental disorder
- psychiatric disability
- addictions.

Applicants must be able to specify measurable outcomes from the initiative. Those outcomes will need to show that the project has contributed to ending chronic homelessness or contributed substantially to increasing knowledge about the pathways into and out of homelessness – thereby increasing our understanding of how to prevent and how to end homelessness. All applications will need to outline their evaluation strategy and make clear how such outcomes will be measured.

Grants over \$5000 will generally receive 25% at the start, 50% following a satisfactory progress report and 25% at the completion of the project. The Foundation takes a commonsense approach to the release of funds. Organisations may negotiate to have their funding released in different proportions over the course of the contract if it is shown that the above funding component release would adversely affect their capacity to undertake or complete the project. Where possible, initiatives funded through the 'Mercy Foundation Grants to End Homelessness' will be visited at least once during their grant period.

The Mercy Foundation has introduced an Expression of Interest Form (EOI) process. This replaces all previous application and proposal forms to the Mercy Foundation's Grants to End Homelessness Program. This process has been put in place to minimise the amount of paperwork that organisations need to prepare to apply for one of our grants.

If your EOI is successful, we will then invite you to submit a full application and proposal form. We will send you all the appropriate forms if your initial EOI has been successful. Moving to this next round, (following this EOI process) is no guarantee that the Mercy Foundation will provide a grant for your project.

If you would like to submit an EOI please contact the Mercy Foundation on 02 9911 7390 to discuss your project before submitting your form.

Priority

Priority is given to applications that focus on ending chronic homelessness particularly for women.

Limitations

Applicants must be a legal entity, such as an incorporated association or company. If not, the applicant will need to be auspiced by an appropriate organisation. Unfortunately at this time, the Mercy Foundation is unable to fund services or projects which require recurrent or indefinite funding. However, depending on the project and its assessed contribution to meeting the objectives of these grants, the Mercy Foundation could choose to fund a project again the following year (subject to a further application). This can only happen in very special circumstances and should not be expected, but if a solid case is made then it might be considered.

Eligibility:

Applications are accepted from not-for-profit community-based groups or organisations (not individuals) within Australia. The Mercy Foundation will only accept one application per organisation in any given year.

- Organisations applying for funds must have a visible and accountable management structure that includes community representatives.
- Organisations applying for funds must be not-for-profit and therefore exempt from income tax but are not required to have Deductible Gift Recipient status.
- Applications are accepted for projects run wholly within Australia by organisations based in Australia.
- Criteria for suitability of projects to apply for grants are derived from the aims and objectives of the Mercy Foundation and the criteria for the grants programs.
- The criteria for grants are made known to potential applicants on the Mercy Foundation website www.mercyfoundation.com.au or when requested by email or phone or post.
- Applicants must demonstrate a capacity to implement the project.
- Applicants must display competency in the field of the projects or have included appropriate capacity building in the project design.

Ineligibility:

The Mercy Foundation does not fund:

- The Mercy Foundation does not fund:
- Individuals
- The core operating costs of an existing organisation
- Vehicles
- General fundraising appeals
- Food parcels, crisis or emergency responses to homelessness
- Deficit funding
- Projects that will rely on recurrent funding from the Mercy Foundation
- Other grant-making foundations
- Projects that do not meet the identified criteria and priority goals of the Mercy Foundation
- Projects located overseas.

In the event that they receive more applications that meet the criteria than they have funds available, the Foundation will prioritise those applicants which demonstrate their grant will have the widest community impact.

Limitations

Eligibility

The Harcourts Foundation can only make grants to organisations with BOTH Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) and Tax Concession Charity (TCC) status. Accordingly, please ensure that your organization has BOTH DGR and TCC status before completing an application. (The Australian Government's Australian Business Register Online (abr.business.gov.au) enables you to search your organisation's name or ABN to see whether it is endorsed as a DGR and TCC.)

Special note re DGR Status: Your organisation must be EITHER endorsed as a DGR by the Australian Tax Office (ATO), or must be specifically named in the Income Tax Assessment Act 1977 as being a DGR.

Please Note – The Harcourts Foundation cannot make grants to other ancillary funds or to prescribed private funds. If your notice of endorsement as a DGR states the 'provision for gift deductibility is item 2 of the table in section 30-15 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997', your organisation will be an ancillary fund and therefore not entitled to receive grants.

Further guidelines

- Grant applications must be for a specific event, project, item, or initiative.
- Requests for the event, project, item, or initiative must be scheduled to occur within four months of the upcoming Grant decision meeting date (meetings are held in the month following the end of the quarter).
- Grants will not be given for items already purchased or events/initiatives/projects already held.
- If the Grant is not used for the purpose for which it was applied, we will request that you return it so we can provide it to another deserving group.
- We may ask for supporting documents such as quotes, references etc.
- If you are a branch of an organisation where another branch has been successful in achieving a Grant from us in the past, this does not mean you automatically qualify for a Grant. Each application will be considered independently based on funds available and circumstances at the time.
- If you are successful, please do not apply within the next 18 months, as we would like to assist other organisations.
- You may apply as a national or regional organisation, however your application must be for a specific community event, project, item, or initiative that fits the criteria.

Please do not submit funding requests for:

- Individual needs the Foundation's focus is on supporting as many people as possible within their communities.
- Overseas or other travel costs (individuals or groups) unless a direct community benefit can be shown.
- Religious, political, lobby causes/activities.

Purpose

Through IGA Community Chest and associated programs, well over \$80m has been raised to help local communities.

Overview

IGA Community Chest raises funds to support local communities, charities and other worthwhile causes. It could be in response to a major event like floods or bush fires or something as simple as new soccer balls for the local under 8's.

The money is raised in a number of ways but predominately through the purchase of products with an IGA Community Chest logo on the label or ticket.

When you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label a percentage is credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account.

In most states IGA Community Chest beneficiary cheques are distributed throughout the year, meaning you can apply at any time.

How are IGA Community Chest beneficiaries chosen?

There is a tiered system for choosing beneficiaries.

- For local activities the beneficiaries are chosen by the local stores
- Regional activities they are chosen by the region or group of stores
- State beneficiaries are chosen in consultation with the State Executive and Board.

Here is a couple of tips on becoming an IGA Community Chest beneficiary:

- It is best to approach your local IGA store directly. Prepare a pitch and it may include:
 - An overview of your organisation and/or the individual that you'd like supported;
 - What support are you looking for monies, donations of goods, providing team jumpers, holding regular fundraising at the store, group registrations at the store, etc;
 - How the donation will be used and your timing.
 - Is there anything you can offer in return to IGA?
 - Don't forget to include your contact details.

Example

The Humpty Dumpty Foundation The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Independent Grocers of Australia (IGA) made a significant difference to the lives of Sydney children. From January 2017, IGA made 11 donations across NSW and ACT

to support much-needed medical equipment for hospitals to the value of \$150,000. IGA's support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation and the local community is immeasurable. The support to families in Sydney means children have access to medical equipment that is very much needed by the medical staff and, most of all, it is life-saving.

Westmead Children's Hospital Mint Fresh IGA in Baulkham Hills visited The Children's Hospital at Westmead in February to present a \$2,670 Aerogen Nebuliser to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The money for the nebuliser, which makes the administering of medications easier for children with respiratory illnesses.

Moruya District Hospital The Humpty Dumpty Foundation and Dalmeny IGA purchase a piece of vital medical equipment for the Eurobodalla children. Local IGA retailers presented Moruya District Hospital with a jaundice detector valued at \$4,780 for the Maternity Unity. This jaundice detector is used to help clinicians determine the jaundice levels through the skin without harming the baby.

MX550 Patient Monitor IGA retailers and the Humpty Dumpty Foundation donated \$26,920 to fund a MX550 Patient Monitor for the Blacktown Hospital's special care nursery. The monitors are used daily to measure a child's blood pressure temperature, heart rate and respiratory rate to determine how well they are recovering from surgery.

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Purpose

The IMPACT Philanthropy Application Program allows philanthropists and Not-for-Profits (NFPs) to connect, and allows NFPs to demonstrate how they improve outcomes for the communities in which they operate.

Overview

Perpetual distributes more than \$100 million annually from the charitable trusts and endowments they manage. The annual IMPACT Program supports their clients and co-trustees in making decisions on where their distributions could be directed.

Past funding has been provided for a wide range of projects at different developmental stages including; pilot and existing projects, capacity building requests and support for early career researchers.

Perpetual recognises that for organisations to achieve their objectives, funds may need to be directed towards operational costs.

The maximum amount an organisation can request is \$120,000 per application.

Focus areas:

You do not need to direct your organisation's application to a specific trust, unless specifically invited to do so. As part of the assessment process, Perpetual will match your organisation to all appropriate trusts and endowments.

Purpose

The Australian Volunteers Program Impact Fund offers small grants to partner organisations to help strengthen the capacity and work of existing partner organisations during a time when the program is unable to provide the usual volume of support through in-country volunteer assignments.

Overview

What funding is available?

In total the available funding for 2021-22 Australian Volunteers Impact Fund is AUD\$700,000. Other parameters of the grants are:

- Grants up to AUD\$10,000
- Projects must be implemented between 01 January 2022, or from when funds are received, and 31 May 2022
- Partner Organisations can submit one application per active volunteer assignment.

- All costs associated with the proposed project should be included in the budget (eg. anticipated International bank fees)
- Please note: Grants are made in AUD. Due to exchange rate fluctuations there may be a discrepancy between the equivalent value of your local currency at the time of application and the time of funds transfer.

In this round of funding the Australian Volunteers Programs Impact Fund aims to:

- Identify, fund and support practical projects which strengthen partner organisations' work in the areas of through an aspect of a current volunteer assignment.
- Strengthen and foster partnerships between the Australian Volunteers Program and its partner organisations.

The application process will be competitive.

A note on further rounds: This year, there will be another three grant rounds, each targeting different priority areas. Round 5 is expected to open in October/November 2021, and Round 6 is expected to open in February 2022.

Priority

Priority will be given to those applications that support a global spread and meet the criteria including program values and priorities:

- Build capacity
- Ensure sustainable outcomes
- Are ethically sound
- Link clearly to the broader work of your organisation.
- Demonstrate the value of volunteering

Example

This fund will consider projects which respond to local needs and support outcomes relating an aspect or objective of a current volunteer assignment. For example:

- Projects that strengthen knowledge and leadership within communities
- Projects that create a network of stakeholders to share knowledge and resources
- Projects that build awareness and promote and share knowledge

Limitations

Who can apply?

- Partner organisations who are currently hosting, or are preparing to host, a volunteer through the Australian Volunteers Program: volunteers must have a start date no later than November 12th 2021
- Partner organisations who meet all due diligence requirements as is required for all active partner organisations of the Australian Volunteers Program
- Partner organisations who are not currently managing Impact Fund projects from previous rounds
- Partner organisations who can demonstrate they have successfully managed funding/grants in the last two years.

Who cannot apply?

- Individuals
- Organisations not already in partnership with the Australian Volunteers Program or not currently hosting, or preparing to host, a volunteer (with a start date no later than 12th November 2021).
- Partner organisations who cannot meet due diligence requirements
- Partner organisations who are currently managing Impact Fund projects from previous rounds
- Partner organisations who have not met reporting requirements of previous Impact Fund projects

The fund will not support costs associated with:

- reimbursement of costs for projects or activities that have already started or related to submission of an application
- projects where duplicate services are already in operation or planned for in a targeted community
- the purchase of land, construction, capital assets, alcohol, tobacco, or drugs
- large/ expensive items, unless an explanation is provided on how you will manage ongoing/ maintenance costs
- · loan funds, sub-grants or contingency funds
- recurrent operating costs
- proselytizing any religious activities
- activities supporting political campaigns or parties
- consultancy fees for services of Australian Volunteers who are currently participating in the program.

The fund will cover costs associated with refreshments related to the project activities. However, this does not include the purchase of alcohol, tobacco, or drugs.

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Purpose

The Strong and Resilient Communities (SARC) Activity – Inclusive Communities Grants aim to support vulnerable and disadvantaged people on pathways to self-reliance and empowerment through local community-driven solutions that support them to participate socially and economically.

Overview

The program will run over 5 years from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2027. The department will run an annual submission period, with grant applications being considered in tranches. This grant seeks applications for projects to be delivered from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2024.

The grants will focus on supporting people of working age (15-64 years) in geographic areas of high socio-economic disadvantage across all states and territories. The grants support vulnerable people address barriers to participating in community activities, reduce social isolation, develop soft skills and support social and economic participation by funding projects that:

- support the development of young people aged 12 to 18 years who are, or are at risk of, being disengaged, marginalised and having limited engagement with education/training
- support people with disabilities and/or mental health issues to participate in their community, and work towards becoming and/or remaining independent and engaged
- support vulnerable women who are, or are at risk of, isolation or discrimination to participate in their community and increase their sense of self agency and empowerment
- support people who are unemployed to address individual barriers to employment and increase their capacity to engage with existing employment/training services and/or work towards gaining employment.

Grants available

- A total of up to \$63.0 million (GST exclusive) over 5 years is available. Up to \$12.6 million will be committed as part of this grant round.
- Projects will have a funding cap of \$180,000 (GST exclusive) per year.
- The maximum grant amount is \$360,000 (GST exclusive) for a 2-year project.

Grant period

- The maximum grant period is 2 years.
- Projects are to be delivered from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2024 (up to 2 years). You must complete your project by 30 June 2024.

• Following the grant period, an evaluation may be undertaken.

The intended outcomes of the program relate to strengthened community connections, economic and social participation and increased levels of self-reliance, wellbeing and mental health.

Outcomes may be achieved at a group or individual level and across one or multiple disadvantaged cohorts. Funded projects under the program may achieve one or more of the following intended outcomes:

- increased social, civic and economic participation
- increased social cohesion, connection and functioning within communities
- reduced levels of social isolation/increased sense of belonging in communities
- people are self-reliant, empowered and experience improved mental health
- people are engaged with education, training and work-ready services and activities
- people have improved work skills and increased opportunities for paid work
- people engage with and sustain engagement with community services and activities
- people are engaged with skills development and learning opportunities in their communities
- people have improved connections and linkages to services that further support their increased social, civic and economic participation

Funding will be available to eligible organisations to deliver one-off, time-limited, projects in their communities. Projects may include a trial, seed or start-up project to establish new activities, short-term interventions, or expand or reframe the delivery of existing activities.

Example

You can use the grant to pay for:

- staff salaries and on-costs, which can be directly attributed to the provision of the grant program in the identified service area or areas as per the grant agreement
- employee training for paid and unpaid staff including Committee and Board members, that is relevant, appropriate and in line with the grant program
- operating and administration expenses directly related to the project as per the grant agreement, such as: rent and outgoings - computer/ IT/website/software - insurance - utilities, including telephone - postage, stationery and/or printing - accounting and auditing - domestic travel/accommodation costs
- assets as defined in the Terms and Conditions that can be reasonably attributed to meeting agreement deliverables.

Up to 7.5% of the grant can be used for evaluation and/or to explore possible options for future sustainability and ongoing viability of the funded project outside of the SARC Activity - Inclusive Communities Grants.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

To be eligible to apply you must be a not-for-profit organisation and be one of the following entity types:

- Indigenous Corporation
- Company
- Local Government
- Cooperative
- Incorporated Association
- Statutory Entity
- Trustee on behalf of a trust.

Applications from consortia are acceptable, as long as you have a lead applicant who is solely accountable to the Commonwealth for the delivery of grant activities and is an eligible entity as per the list above.

Your organisation must also be:

- a legal entity, able to enter into a legally binding agreement
- located in Australia.

Who is not eligible to apply for a grant?

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- an organisation, or your project partner is an organisation, included on the National Redress Scheme website on the list of 'Institutions that have not joined or signified their intent to join the Scheme.
- Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Non-Corporate Commonwealth Entity
- Non-Corporate Commonwealth Statutory Authority
- Commonwealth Company
- Corporate State or Territory Entity

- Non-corporate State or Territory Entity
- Non-corporate State or Territory Statutory Authority
- International Entity
- Sole Trader
- Partnership
- Person
- Unincorporated association.

These grants have a strong focus on the identification, measurement and demonstration of achieved outcomes, not just outputs, that are delivered within the time and resourcing of the grant Activity. Participation in the Data Exchange 'partnership approach' is a requirement of funding (see Section 12.2 in the guidelines for more information) and will assist organisations and the department demonstrate and reflect on consistent outcome-focused data.

Priority

The Foundation periodically identifies a priority area of focus. The Foundation currently has one priority area of focus, being:

Limitations

If lodging a Project Notification form, please note that:

- the project must fall within the Foundation's nominated priority area;
- the organisation must be an eligible recipient under the Income Tax Assessment Act;
- the project must be consistent with the broader aims and objectives of the Foundation (published on this website); and

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Purpose

This collaborative funding round will support innovation and collaboration in the arts and social sectors.

Overview

In 2020 in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic the collaborating foundations recognised that the pandemic had had serious consequences for many for-purpose sector organisations which had been forced to innovate and adapt rapidly to changing circumstances.

It is also apparent that the funding and operating environments for the arts and social sectors are undergoing longer-term change, and that while innovation was precipitated by the pandemic, further innovation and adaptation will be necessary for organisations to be resilient and better able to achieve their respective missions.

Findings and recommendations from a collaborative research project focused on collaboration and innovation, and what the arts and social sectors require to enable them to innovate and to collaborate.

Initiatives are sought in the Social and/or Arts sectors that focus on quality employment outcomes for young people and/ or older women experiencing disadvantage. Initiatives must:

- be both collaborative and innovative. include activities in New South Wales and/or Victoria and may have national scope or application.
- two to three years' duration but up to five years should the project warrant it.

This grant has an Expression of Interest process. EOI applications are open from Monday, 11 October 2021 until Sunday, 31 October 2021, after which successful applicants will be invited to submit a full application, with full proposals due Sunday, 6 February 2022. See the application process details on page 2 of the guidelines PDF for more information.

Funding

A total funding pool of \$1.5 million is offered.

Up to five proposals will be shortlisted for a \$15,000 grant each to develop the collaboration, for implementation over three months, including development of a full proposal

Two to three proposals may be selected for funding of up to \$500,000 each (for initiatives of two-to-three years) or up to \$750,000 each (for initiatives of up to five years).

Duration

Proposals are invited for initiatives of duration of at least two years and up to five years. For initiatives up to three years' duration the maximum grant would be \$500,000 while for initiatives of four to five years' duration the maximum grant would be \$750,000.

Priority

Priority will be given to projects that include a strong evaluation and sustainability strategy. Operational funding will be encouraged and will be considered eligible expenditure for part or all of the grant.

Example

Innovation can be categorised in to four types:

- 4. Radical Innovation a new technology/process/approach which is applied in a new market/sector/collaboration.

Social innovation has been defined as a novel proposal or solution to a social problem that is more effective, efficient, sustainable, or just [fair] than present solutions.

Examples of social innovation include:

- Testing a new concept, idea or way of working (collaboratively) that will lead to a service improvement or an advance in a major community issue
- Applying a new approach to improving service effectiveness and/or service quality Increasing impact and/or service effectiveness through sharing space or back office support, or other forms of partnership, merger or collaboration
- Applying an existing approach proven to be successful and sustainable in one sector to one or more associated sectors to improve service effectiveness and/or service quality
- Scaling up or demonstrating sustainability of a new service model, collaborative work practice or social enterprise.

In 2020, driven by the exceptional circumstances of the pandemic, many social services and arts organisations collaborated in ways they had not before.

Examples include:

- A collaboration between the major national food rescue organisations to distribute meals in all states and territories except Western Australia
- A state-wide youth affairs organisation collaborated with mental health services, a university, a health promotion organisation and a digital safety organisation to deliver information and innovation sharing events.

Funding conditions

Purpose

The Crisis Fund is part of the Start Strong Capital Works Grant Program commitment to increase the number of community preschool places in NSW in areas of need and demand. The maintenance and/or creation of community preschool places is an expected outcome of a Crisis grant.

Overview

The Crisis Fund supports the maintenance and/or creation of community preschool places where there is an immediate and/or urgent need for capital works in at least one of the following circumstances:

- An existing service is facing closure or relocation due to exceptional or unforeseen circumstances, for example, compulsory acquisition of premises.
- An existing service is impacted by a natural disaster or state of emergency and is required to undertake urgent structural remediation work or to relocate.
- An eligible organisation wants to operate a centre-based community preschool in a remote or very remote area (as per the ARIA index) where access to preschool education is limited or non-existent.

Requests for this grant are received all year round or until funds are exhausted.

The maintenance and/or creation of community preschool places is an expected outcome of a Crisis grant.

Crisis grants must also contribute to the following outcomes:

- Maximise the number of community preschool places available.
- Where possible, leverage funds from sources external to the Department, including private finance, charitable donations and grants from state and federal government.
- Ensure the continued operation of the service to deliver community preschool places throughout the ten-year compliance period.
- Support ongoing management of the service in line with applicable regulatory requirements.

Crisis projects must be completed and acquitted within 24 months of the funding agreement being executed. Funding agreements must be signed by an authorised officer in the applying organisation no later than four weeks after receipt.

For applications with a total project cost of \$500,000 or above, applicants will be required to provide evidence of their project managers qualifications and experience in the management of infrastructure projects. Project management costs can be included in the budget for the grant application

Example

What is a crisis

- A service provider who has to urgently relocate as their current lease has been unexpectedly terminated by their lessor and requires funding to undertake capital works on a new site, so their preschool can continue operating.
- A service provider who has to undertake urgent structural remediation work as a result of bushfires or floods, where their insurance has rejected the claims or provided insufficient funding
- A service provider who wants to operate a centre-based community preschool in an area classified as remote as per the ARIA index, and where there is limited or no access to preschool education as evidenced by a lack of preschool services in the community, long distances and accessibility issues such as unsealed roads.

What is not a crisis

• A service provider that chooses to relocate to a different or more suitable site voluntarily and needs to undertake capital works on new site.

- A service provider that needs to undertake repairs to meet compliance and regulatory requirements or maintenance repairs. These costs are the responsibility of the provider to meet.
- An eligible organisation who wants to operate a centre-based community preschool to meet need and demand.
- A service provider operating in any ARIA, who wants to undertake extensions or renovation works to meet need and demand.

What can be funded by the grant

- project management costs
- planning and design costs
- soil hygienist reports
- site preparation, including clearing or demolition
- construction and commissioning
- landscaping and car parking
- fixed fittings and fixed equipment
- removal of contaminates on project sites (e.g. asbestos/arsenic), as long as it is within scope of the State's financial contribution to the project.

Limitations

Who can apply

To be eligible for funding applicants must:

- be registered or incorporated in NSW;
- be a not for profit organisation or association, or a local government entity; and
- operate or intend operate a community preschool service as an Approved Provider with a valid Service Approval.

For-profit organisations cannot apply for Crisis Fund grant.

These are items that you cannot include in project cost estimates in your Crisis Fund application. The elements that cannot be funded by the grant must be covered by the service provider or other sources of funding.

What cannot be funded by the grant:

- site acquisition and lease costs
- routine or cyclical maintenance works
- spaces not used primarily for the delivery of community preschool education (e.g. rooms for community or health services)
- ongoing administration or operational costs
- staff salaries and training
- toys, playground equipment, portable equipment and consumables
- cosmetic upgrades that do not increase capacity
- additional funding due to project cost overruns.

The Crisis Fund will not fund projects that:

- do not maintain and/or increase community preschool places;
- are located outside NSW;
- are submitted by a for-profit organisation or association, including a sole trader or a Pty Ltd company;
- do not align with the program objectives;
- do not meet the requirements outlined in these guidelines;
- do not meet the assessment criteria;
- have already been completed (i.e. retrospective funding);
- have already been funded by the Start Strong Capital Works Grants Program (i.e. the preschool places committed cannot be funded twice); or
- duplicate project elements already funded through another source (i.e. where another grant is funding the same element/s).

Funding conditions

ECE facilities funded through a crisis grant must:

- be operated by an organisation that is approved to provide early childhood education services in NSW or that intends to obtain necessary provider approvals. For new providers, grant award will be contingent on provider approval being obtained;
- offer or intend to offer a centre-based community preschool service with a valid service approval;
- operate a community preschool service for at least ten years from when the project is completed. The places funded by this grant must be available to the community as community preschool places for a ten year period; and
- comply with the requirements of applicable national and state laws and regulations.

Organisation that receive a grant must:

- agree to the requirements outlined in these guidelines. Failure to do so may result in funding being withheld or an offer of funding withdrawn;
- agree to a security instrument as a precondition for funding;
- enter into a Funding Agreement with the department;
- follow the Funding Acknowledgement Guidelines for NSW Government infrastructure grants, including liaising with the Capital Programs team on events such as openings, and erecting signage for projects;

Limitations

Eligibility

To apply, you must meet the following criteria:

- Applicant organisations must be a not-for-profit organisation with an ABN or Incorporation Certificate;
- Project must be for charitable purposes and offer clear public benefit;
- Organisations with or without DGR endorsement are eligible;
- Organisations can submit one application per grant round;
- Projects must benefit communities in remote, rural or regional Australia.
- Projects must take place in a declared fire-affected area. FRRR will use this list to inform eligibility, but it will not be the only basis on which an application is assessed and prioritised. If you believe that you are in a bushfire-affected community whose LGA is not listed, call us on 1800 170 020 to discuss the situation.

Please note, you will be considered ineligible if the:

- Application is submitted by individuals, sole traders, private or commercial businesses (as per the submitted ABN);
- Application is submitted by an organisation that is not a legal entity (i.e. a registered not-for-profit), without the written consent of the governing / partnering body who holds the ABN / Incorporation Certificate;
- Application is submitted without required financial documentation;
- Final report/s from any FRRR grants awarded in the previous seven years have not been acquitted (delivery organisations should check with legal organisation to see if there are any outstanding final reports);
- Application is for a project or activity that has already occurred / is occurring prior to the announcement of funding;
- Application is incomplete. **NOTE**: Due to the volume of applications received, applications are assessed based on the documentation received at the time of application. **FRRR is unlikely to follow up missing documentation after applications have been submitted**

There are several areas that we can't fund through this program. If in doubt, please contact FRRR.

- Projects that support core business and areas of responsibility of Federal, State and Local Governments;
- The encouragement or advancement of sport, recreation and social activities are not considered charitable activities under Australian law. Applications from sporting organisations need to clearly demonstrate charitable outcomes and benefit to the wider community that are above and beyond the sporting activities of the club.
- Overseas travel and overseas projects;
- Prizes, gifts, trophies or awards;
- Political lobbying;
- Projects that primarily benefit private business, a sole trader, or private interests;
- Projects solely focused on animal welfare.

Purpose

The Stronger Communities Programme provides each of the 151 Federal electorates with \$150,000 to fund small capital projects. These projects aim to improve local community participation and contribute to vibrant viable communities. Federal Members of Parliament (MPs) identify potential projects and invite applications from their electorate.

Overview

The Stronger Communities Programme supports the Australian Government's commitment to deliver social benefits in communities across Australia. Round 7 of the program will provide \$22.65 million to fund small capital projects in each of the 151 federal electorates.

The program intends to encourage and support participation in local projects, improve local community participation and contribute to vibrant and viable communities. Round 7 of the program will continue to support Australia's economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. For this special round, grant funding will be up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs except for local governing bodies where grant funding will be up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs.

Community consultation is a critical element of the program. In consultation with their community, each MP must identify potential applicants and projects in their electorate and invite them to apply for a grant. Invited applications will be assessed against the program's eligibility criteria through a closed non-competitive process.

Each electorate has total funding of up to \$150,000 that can be allocated to successful applications. A maximum of 20 projects will be funded in each electorate.

Project details

The grant amount for small capital projects is up to 100% of eligible project costs except for local governing bodies where grant funding will be up to 50% of eligible projects costs. Your grant request must be between \$2500 and \$20,000.

Projects under round 7 of the program will have up to 31 December 2022 to complete.

Important Note: Members of Parliament are responsible for the community consultation process. If you are invited to apply by your local MP, you will receive the link to the online application form in an email from your local Federal Member of Parliament.

Limitations

Eligibility

What are the eligibility criteria?

To be eligible, you must:

Purpose

VFFF makes grants to charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC). For grants over \$50,000, VFFF provides support for organisations working in NSW. Organisations based outside NSW are welcome to contact VFFF but it is unusual that grants are made for work outside NSW. For grants between \$20,000 and \$50,000, VFFF provides support for organisations working in NSW and Queensland.

Overview

Aiming to maximise available funds, VFFF seeks to be catalytic with its grants and:

- Direct its funds into the grassroots of communities, where the causes and opportunities for change lie
- Support local people to drive the changes they want for their communities (community-led)
- · Connect local people with like-minded others who can support them achieve their goals
- Enable communities and organisations to try & test new approaches to persistent issues
- Make investments in organisations we believe in (rather than being project-driven)
- · Support organisations at critical times of transition or development
- Support organisations that are unable to rely on high profile fundraising
- Support cross-sector work and collaborations

VFFF provides support that falls under the following three categories:

- 1. **Core operations -** This refers to organisational and administrative costs such as salaries and overheads that maintain the everyday operation of an organisation. VFFF primarily makes core operations grants for small to medium-sized organisations at a critical time of transition or development.
- Capacity Building Capacity building grants aim to strengthen organisations by investing in core competencies such as business or operational planning, board development and governance, management capacity, staff training, leadership development and infrastructure. This support intends to enhance the ability of an organisation to operate more effectively beyond the conclusion of the grant.
- 3. **Programs -** This refers to costs that are directly related to the development, implementation, delivery and evaluation of a specific program or activity. Most VFFF grants under \$50,000 tend to be for programs as well as some larger grants.

The Transport Access Regional Partnerships Grants Program (TARP program) supports initiatives to improve services and outcomes for transport disadvantaged groups in the community.

Overview

The TARP program provides funding for projects that address specific transport service gaps to a community or a group of people.

Types of projects funded

The following is considered when deciding whether or not an initiative will be included in the TARP program:

- Funding for projects is available on a trial or 'seeding' basis i.e. recurrent funding is not available through this program.
- In most cases, funded projects will need to demonstrate they can become self-sustaining.
- Projects should aim to make better use of existing transport resources.
- Consideration will be given to projects that provide information, transport related capacity building, subsidies or trial services.
- The program cannot fund the purchase of vehicles.

Partnerships with other organisations are encouraged - for example initiatives that include state agencies, local councils, transport operators and/or community organisations.

Duration of funded projects

The duration of funded projects can range from a few months up to 24 months. Projects planned to run more than 24 months are generally not considered. For projects of 12 months or longer, a staged approach with defined milestones may be required.

When is funding available

Applicants can apply to Transport for NSW for TARP program funding at any time.

How is funding allocated

Transport for NSW will assess the applicant's completed TARP program application form on merit. Transport for NSW considers factors such as the level of transport disadvantage experienced by the group, the use the proposal makes of existing transport resources, and the impact the proposal is likely to have on the coordination of effective transport solutions.

Funding is granted with the primary aim of increasing the level and range of transport options available to the target group.

Limitations

Eligible organisations include non-profit community based organisations, incorporated associations, local councils, statutory agencies and current Australian Business Number (ABN) holders.

Other groups or individuals are free to propose projects either directly to Transport for NSW, or to an eligible organisation in their region.

Limitations

The Start Strong Capital Works Grant Program aims to improve access to preschool by creating additional community preschool places in areas of need and demand across the state.

Overview

The Major Capital Works Fund supports the creation of additional community preschool places through new builds, extensions and renovations of centre-based community preschools in areas of need and demand.

Requests for grant funding will be received from 6 October 2021 until 4 March 2022 or until funds are exhausted.

An increase in community preschool places is an expected outcome of a Major Capital Works grant.

Approved funded providers must also:

- Maximise the number of community preschool places available.
- Where possible, leverage funds from sources external to the department, including private finance, charitable donations and grants from state and federal government.
- Ensure the continued operation of the service to deliver community preschool places throughout the ten-year compliance period.
- Support ongoing management of the service in line with applicable regulatory requirements.

Major capital works projects must be completed and acquitted within 24 months of the funding agreement being executed. Funding agreements must be signed by an authorised officer in the applying organisation no later than four weeks after receipt.

For applications with a total project cost of \$500,000 excluding GST or above, applicants will be required to provide evidence of their project managers qualifications and experience in the management of infrastructure projects. Project management costs can be included in the budget for the grant application.

Example

What can be funded by the grant

- project management costs
- planning and design costs
- soil hygienist reports
- site preparation, including clearing or demolition
- construction and commissioning
- landscaping and car parking
- fixed fittings and fixed equipment
- removal of contaminates on project sites (e.g. asbestos/arsenic), as long as it is within scope of the State's financial contribution to the project.

Limitations

Eligibility

Who can apply

- be registered or incorporated in NSW;
- be a not for profit organisation or association, or a local government entity; and
- operate or intend to operate a community preschool service as an Approved Provider with a valid Service Approval.

For-profit organisations cannot apply for Major Capital Works grants.

What cannot be funded by the grant

- site acquisition and lease costs
- routine or cyclical maintenance works
- spaces not used primarily for the delivery of community preschool education (e.g. rooms for community or health services)
- purchase of cars, buses and other vehicles
- ongoing administration or operational costs
- staff salaries and training
- toys, playground equipment, portable equipment and consumables
- cosmetic upgrades that do not increase capacity
- additional funding due to project cost overruns.

The Major Capital Works Fund will not fund projects that:

- do not create additional community preschool places;
- are located outside NSW;
- are submitted by a for-profit organisation or association, including a sole trader or a Pty Ltd company;
- do not align with the program objectives;
- do not meet the requirements outlined in these guidelines;
- do not meet the assessment criteria;
- have already been completed (i.e. retrospective funding);
- have already been funded by the Start Strong Capital Works Grants Program (i.e. the preschool places committed cannot be funded twice); or
- duplicate project elements already funded through another source (i.e. where another grant is funding the same element/s).

Funding conditions

ECE facilities funded through a Major Capital Works grant must:

- be operated by an organisation that is approved to provide early childhood education services in NSW or that intends to obtain necessary provider approvals. For new providers, grant award will be contingent on provider approval being obtained;
- offer or intend to offer a centre based community preschool service with a valid service approval;
- operate a community preschool service for at least ten years from when the project is completed. The places funded by this grant must be available to the community as community preschool places for a ten year period; and
- comply with the requirements of applicable national and state laws and regulations.

Organisation that receive a grant must:

- agree to the requirements outlined in these guidelines. Failure to do so may result in funding being withheld or an offer of funding being withdrawn;
- contribute at least 5% of the total project cost;
- agree to a security instrument as a precondition for funding;
- enter into a Funding Agreement with the department;
- follow the Funding Acknowledgement Guidelines for NSW Government infrastructure grants, including liaising with the Capital Programs team on events such as openings, and erecting signage for projects;

Overview

The Government will provide \$1.1 billion to the Black Spot Program from the 2013-2014 financial year to the 2023-24 financial year, with an on-going commitment of \$110 million each year following.

Road crashes are a major cost to Australians every year. Black Spot projects target those road locations where crashes are occurring. By funding measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at dangerous locations, the program reduces the risk of crashes.

The Black Spot Program makes an important contribution in reducing the national road toll under the National Road Safety Action Plan 2018–2020.

Anyone can nominate a 'black spot' for funding consideration, using the official nomination form. Candidate projects are first assessed by the relevant state road authority, which has details of the crash history of the site and the expertise to assess the appropriate treatment.

Community Consultation Widespread community consultation and participation is fundamental to this program, ensuring that local concerns are addressed.

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

Coordination States and territories play an important coordinating role. A Consultative Panel has been established in each state and territory. It consists of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry, the Australian Government, local government and state road and transport agencies. Panels provide comment to the Australian Government on nominations for Black Spot works.

Rural Projects More than 60% of road deaths and a significant proportion of serious injuries occur outside metropolitan areas. In line with national road safety policy objectives, approximately 50% of Black Spot funds in each state (other than Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory) are reserved for projects in non-metropolitan areas. This ensures that crash locations in rural areas are treated.

Limitations

Community groups, motorist organisations, industry organisations, councils and individuals are invited to nominate Black Spot sites around Australia to be considered for treatment.

What makes a site eligible for funding?

Funding is mainly available for the treatment of Black Spot sites, or road lengths, with a proven history of crashes. Project proposals should be able to demonstrate a benefit to cost ratio of at least 2 to 1.

For individual sites such as intersections, mid-block or short road sections, there should be a history of at least three casualty crashes over a five-year period. For lengths of road, there should be an average of 0.2 casualty crashes per kilometre per annum over the length in question over five years.

The requirement of a history of crashes ensures that those sites that have a recurrent problem are targeted first for treatment.

The Black Spot Program also recognises that there are road locations that could be considered as 'accidents waiting to happen'. Therefore, some program funds may be used to treat sites where road traffic engineers have completed a

Road Safety Audit and found that remedial work is necessary. This allows an opportunity for proactive safety works to be undertaken before casualties occur.

Funds cannot be used for the purchase of road-building plant or equipment, or for operational or maintenance costs.

Limitations

Eligibility

Legal financial assistance may be available to an entity for their reasonable legal representation and disbursement costs in the following situations:

- they are called, or granted leave to appear, as a witness at a public or private hearing of the Royal Commission
- being requested to attend a private session of the Royal Commission (if the Royal Commission authorises legal representation to be present)
- they are requested to attend or are attending an interview of the Royal Commission
- they are requested to provide a written statement that will be used as evidence of the Royal Commission
- they are required to comply with a notice to produce issued by the Royal Commission.

If your organisation has been called by the Royal Commission, the organisation will be assessed to determine whether it can meet the cost of its legal representation without incurring serious financial difficulty.

If you have been called in your personal capacity, you will be exempt from an assessment of financial circumstances.

The 1,000 Jobs Package increases employment opportunities in remote Australia for Community Development Program (CDP) participants. - comply with all relevant Commonwealth and state/territory legislation and regulations, including Work Health and Safety and relevant employment standards.

Is my business eligible?

Your business or Group Training Organisation may be eligible if:

Anything else I should know?

The JobMaker Hiring Credit scheme is an incentive for businesses to employ additional young job seekers aged 16–35 years.

Overview

Eligible employers can access the JobMaker Hiring Credit for each eligible additional employee they hire between 7 October 2020 and 6 October 2021.

Key points

Eligible employers:

- can register with us from 6 December 2020 (see Registering for JobMaker Hiring Credit)
- can claim payments from us in arrears from 1 February 2021 (see JobMaker Hiring Credit key dates)
- can claim payments for eligible additional employees for up to 12 months from their employment start date
- cannot claim JobKeeper and the JobMaker Hiring Credit payment at the same time
- can estimate the payment they may receive by using the JobMaker Hiring Credit payment estimator.

From 15 January 2021, we will write to employers who have registered for the JobMaker Hiring Credit scheme and encourage them to check they meet all eligibility criteria before they claim. This will help ensure:

- eligible employers can make a claim from 1 February 2021
- there are no delays in their payments being processed.

The JobMaker Hiring Credit:

- is paid every three months in arrears to employers
- can be claimed from 1 February 2021 for the first JobMaker period (7 October 2020 to 6 January 2021).

You and your additional employees must meet the eligibility criteria for each JobMaker period you want to claim for.

You can register at any time until the program closes. You only need to register once. However, you must register before the end of the claim period for the first JobMaker period you want to claim for.

Employers that are not eligible to claim the JobMaker Hiring Credit may be able to claim other support payments from the Department of Education, Skills and Employment.

Limitations

Eligible employers

Employers may be eligible for JobMaker Hiring Credit payments if all the following apply.

The employer:

- has registered for the JobMaker Hiring Credit scheme
- either
 - operates a business in Australia
 - is a not-for-profit organisation operating in Australia
 - is a deductible gift recipient (DGR) endorsed either as a public fund or for a public fund you
- operated under the Overseas Aid Gift Deductibility Scheme (DGR item 9.1.1) or for developed country relief (DGR item 9.1.2)
- holds an Australian business number (ABN)
- is registered for pay as you go (PAYG) withholding
- has not claimed JobKeeper payments for a fortnight that started during the JobMaker period
- is up to date with income tax and GST returns for the two years up to the end of the JobMaker period for which they are claiming
- satisfies the payroll increase and the headcount increase conditions
- satisfies reporting requirements, including up to date Single Touch Payroll (STP) reporting
- does not belong to one of the ineligible employer categories (see list below)

An employer is **not** entitled to the JobMaker Hiring Credit scheme for a JobMaker period if any of the following apply.

The employer:

- had the Major Bank Levy imposed on the entity, or a member of its consolidated group, for any quarter on or before 30 September 2020
- is an Australian government agency (within the meaning of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997)
- is a local governing body
- is wholly owned by an Australian government agency or a local governing body
- is a company in liquidation or provisional liquidation
- is an individual who has entered bankruptcy
- is disqualified because the entity terminated the employment or reduced the hours of work of an existing employee or employees for the sole or dominant purpose of receiving or increasing payments under the JobMaker Hiring Credit scheme.

An employer is also not eligible if it is a sovereign entity. The term 'sovereign entity' includes a body politic of a foreign country or a foreign government agency. Resident subsidiaries of a sovereign entity may be eligible employers if the entity satisfies the other eligibility criteria and is not ineligible due to any other exclusion. This is different to JobKeeper (resident subsidiaries were not eligible employers).

Grants available

- For Residential Aged Care and NATSIFACP Services, the maximum grant value has two components: a base funding allocation of \$20,000 plus a funding allocation of \$2,000 for each operational place.
 - Example: ABC Residential Aged Care has 50 operational places and incurs \$130,000 of eligible expenditure. The maximum grant payment is \$120,000 (\$20,000 base funding allocation plus \$100,000 operational places allocation).
- For Home Care Services the maximum grant value has single component: a funding allocation of \$650 per client. You are responsible for any eligible expenditure you incur that exceeds your maximum grant value plus any ineligible expenditure.

Exceptional Circumstances Exemption to Maximum Grant Value

Residential, NATSIFACP and Home Care services that are experiencing exceptional circumstances may request a grant payment for eligible expenditure incurred that exceeds the maximum grant value threshold for a service.

The maximum grant that can be claimed under this provision is 100 per cent of eligible costs incurred in managing direct impacts of COVID-19.

Providers who wish to claim an exceptional circumstances exemption must submit a detailed business case outlining how the costs associated with managing direct impacts of COVID-19 have affected the ongoing viability of the provider.

Any exemption request will only be considered based on a demonstrated need for funding in order to sustain continuity of safe quality care.

Exceptional circumstances provisions do not apply to broader indirect impacts of COVID19 on financial viability including declining occupancy or Refundable Accommodation Deposit payment obligations.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

To be eligible you must be:

- An approved Residential Aged Care provider with one or more services directly impacted by COVID-19; and/or
- An approved NATSIFACP provider with one or more services that is directly impacted by COVID-19; and/or

The Residential Aged Care Employee Support Grant seeks to support the Residential Aged Care Sector in ensuring that all staff within a residential aged care facility are able to receive the COVID-19 vaccine whilst minimising the financial impact on the residential aged care provider and the individual employee.

Overview

Up to \$11 million is available over one year (2021-22) for this grant opportunity.

The program will contribute towards costs incurred by eligible residential aged care providers (Providers) supplying or facilitating COVID-19 vaccinations for staff. Providers can apply for financial support in any or all of the following three categories:

- Category 1: payment for each casual staff member's off-site vaccination (maximum of 2 doses/payments per casual staff member). This payment is a contribution towards the time casual staff are absent from the facility to receive their COVID-19 vaccination at an off-site vaccination clinic; and/or
- Category 2: one day of paid leave for casual staff (not eligible for entitlements) receiving an on or off-site vaccination, who were rostered on for a shift within 24 48 hrs after receiving a vaccination, but suffered side effects from the vaccination and were unable to attend work for this reason; and/or
- Category 3: facilitation of either on or off-site vaccinations for all staff (e.g. transport costs or arranging for groups of staff to be vaccinated off-site).

Providers must ensure payments received under categories one and two are provided to casual staff members in full.

Providers can apply for support from one, two or all three of the categories as per Table 3 below. Providers may claim costs incurred under the categories between 1 March and 29 October 2021.

Purpose

The objective of the Community War Memorials Fund is to help conserve, repair and protect war memorials across NSW to support community commemoration.

Overview

Two application rounds are run each year. The rounds open on Anzac Day and Remembrance Day. The Community War Memorials Fund awards grants of up to \$10,000 (excluding GST). Please note that grants for work to improve the accessibility of war memorials are capped at \$2,000 (excluding GST).

Types of projects that might be funded:

- Specialist conservation advice for war memorials:
 - Condition assessment reports
 - Conservation management plans
 - Arborist advice for war memorial trees
 - Structural assessment reports
- Preservation work:
 - Protective measures for memorials e.g. repairs to damaged barriers and fences that surround and protect a memorial
 - Having protective coatings applied by a specialist conservator
 - Stabilisation of fabric
 - Painting
- Restoration work:
 - Removal of inappropriate accretions e.g. graffiti
 - Cleaning and corrosion removal by specialist conservators e.g. treatment of rusted original memorial gates or fences
 - Repairs to the damaged lettering on war memorial cenotaphs and rolls of honour e.g. regilding, repainting
 - · Conservation and repairs to stonework on war memorials
 - Repointing mortar joints
 - Restoring war memorial landscapes to their original design, intent or purpose
 - Repairs to damaged sculptures
 - Replacement of decayed or missing elements where repair is not feasible
- Other:
 - Works to improve equitable access to a memorial (\$2,000 cap)
 - Relocation of memorials for public safety

Important: Applicants to the Community War Memorials Fund are expected to seek conservation advice from a qualified specialist before planning any physical work to a memorial.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria:

- Applications must be for an existing war memorial commemorating Australia's military heritage and the war memorial must be located within the State of NSW or, if located outside NSW, of direct and substantial relevance to the State.
- The definition of a "memorial" includes public monuments, memorial places, landscaped spaces, buildings, sculptures, trees and avenues as well as indoor fixtures such as honour boards, plaques, busts or bas-relief sculptures.
- An application may be made by any organisation, provided the owner or custodian of the memorial, local RSL subbranch and local council support the bid, where applicable
- Before applying to the Community War Memorials Fund the memorial must first be recorded on the Register of War Memorials in NSW (warmemorialsregister.nsw.gov.au).
- Applications must be for the repair, protection and/or conservation of existing memorials.
- Applications relating to memorials located on either private or public property are eligible for funding, however the memorial must have a public function and be accessible to the public.
- The State War Memorials Committee will announce grants biannually, with applications closing on Anzac Day and on Remembrance Day. However, the Committee may make extraordinary grants as circumstances require.
- Applications to fund works that have already been completed are not eligible.
- The State War Memorials Committee may in extraordinary circumstances approve applications that do not meet all of the above criteria.

Projects that are not funded by the Community War Memorials Fund:

- Work that does not meet the eligibility criteria
- Inappropriate work and methods that do not align with best practice heritage conservation
- Work that has already been started or completed
- Constructing new war memorials
- Replacing existing war memorials
- Adding of new commemorative elements e.g. plaques, service badges
- Maintaining or replacing flagpoles
- Adding names to war memorials
- Capital expenditure for the purchase of assets e.g. office furniture, equipment

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- Costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- Council approval costs
- Ongoing expenditure, i.e. website hosting, memorial maintenance
- Projects relating to the display of military memorabilia
- Work to graves
- · Seating for war memorials
- Interpretive signage
- Work to war memorials that are not recorded on the NSW War Memorials Register

Purpose

These grants support the protection or repairs to declared Aboriginal Places, items listed on the State Heritage Register, or items with a current Interim Heritage Order that have been damaged by unexpected events (such as an extreme storm or accident) and where your insurance does not cover this cost.

Overview

Emergency Works funding is:

- available only for declared Aboriginal Places, items listed on the State Heritage Register, or items with a current Interim Heritage Order, and
- to repair damage to the heritage values or protect against further damage to those values caused by unexpected events such as an extreme storm or accident,
- aims to improve the condition of heritage items and mitigate the risk of further damage.

Funding

Between \$1,000 (ex GST) minimum up to \$10,000 (ex GST) maximum in Emergency Works funding is available with no matching funding required. Each listed item can only receive Emergency Works funding once for each unexpected event.

Funding is available on an ongoing basis; however limited funding is available each financial year. Approval of funding depends on sufficient funds being available at any given time.

Example

Examples of eligible works:

- Repairing damage caused by vandalism at an Aboriginal Place
- Repair of damage to item caused by a traffic accident, for example a vehicle ran into and damaged an Aboriginal Place or State Heritage Register listed property

- Short term protection, for example propping and providing tarpaulins to protect a State Heritage Register listed building that has been damaged following an extreme storm
- Removal of an item causing damage, for example removal of a tree or electrical wires that have fallen during a storm
- Temporary relocation of a movable item, for example to move an archival or museum collection as its usual location has been inundated by flood waters

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

To be eligible for Emergency Works funding the applicant must:

- be an individual, Aboriginal custodian, community organisation, NSW Local Council, Not for Profit Organisation, Religious organisation, private company or university
- be the owner, manager, long-term lessee (generally where the lease is 20+ years), or custodian of an item or place within NSW that is gazetted as an Aboriginal Place, listed on the State Heritage Register or has a current Interim Heritage Order
- have legal responsibility for the item or place's maintenance and repair
- have the support of all owners of the item/place if not the sole owner
- not have acquired or leased the item from a NSW government agency in the last two years and
- not have entered into a conservation agreement in the last two years.

Purpose

The National Cultural Heritage Account helps Australian public cultural organisations buy significant objects that they could not otherwise afford.

Overview

A total of \$500,000 is available each year. You can apply at any time. Funding is approved on a case-by-case basis.

The National Cultural Heritage Account keeps Australian protected objects in Australia so they can be preserved and made available to the public.

Cultural organisations that can care for and provide permanent public access to Australian protected objects have a priority for funding.

Individuals can also apply if they intend to gift the object to an eligible cultural institution with a permanent public collection. In these cases, the grant and the gifting of the object must be simultaneous.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups can apply for funding even if they do not have a permanent public collection. This is because of the special significance of Class A objects of heritage to Indigenous communities.

Limitations

Who can apply

Australian cultural institutions can apply for funding. This includes museums, art galleries, libraries, archives, historic buildings, national trusts and local history museums and galleries, and Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander keeping places for sacred/secret material.

Purpose

The Direct Aid Program (DAP) is a small-grants scheme which aims to support non-profit organisations working in local communities on activities which support sustainable and equitable development.

Overview

The Direct Aid Program (DAP) is a small grants program funded from Australia's aid budget. It has the flexibility to work with local communities in developing countries on projects that reduce poverty and achieve sustainable development consistent with Australia's national interest.

It sits alongside Australia's longer-term country and multilateral development strategies and with its wide geographical reach plays an important role in supporting local community efforts towards poverty reduction across the globe.

The program is founded on a set of principles which:

- advance developmental outcomes in countries eligible for Official Development Assistance (ODA) through projects primarily focused on practical and tangible results. This may include projects which support good governance, human rights and those with a strong advocacy component,
- support Australia's wider foreign and trade policy interests and public diplomacy objectives, including promoting a
 distinctive and positive image of Australia, and
- allow for a wide geographic reach reflecting that Australia has global interests and that DAP provides an effective way to build relationships and maintain Australia's profile.

DAP projects cover a range of sectors such as education, health, water and sanitation, environmental protection, women's empowerment and gender equality, supporting people with disabilities, economic livelihoods, food security and human rights.

DAP projects engage a wide range of partners including community groups, non-government organisations, educational institutions and local governments. Through helping people in need we can show Australia is a supportive and trusted partner in addressing aid challenges in partner countries.

In 2019-20, over 230 projects were funded in over 60 countries.

Limitations

Who can apply for DAP funding?

Funding is available on a not-for-profit basis to community groups, NGOs and other entities engaged in development activities in countries that are eligible for ODA.

There is no minimum amount that a single DAP project can receive but the maximum is \$60,000 over the life of the project (dependent on the country). Activities can run up to a maximum of two years.

The management of the Direct Aid Program varies from mission to mission. To find out more about how the program is managed in a particular country, please contact the Australian mission overseas that administers DAP in that country.

Purpose

The Global Innovation Fund, or GIF, is social impact-first investment vehicle that works with mission-aligned development agencies, philanthropy, and other funders to find and fund evidence-based innovations with the potential to positively impact the lives of millions of the world's poorest people.

Overview

Through grants, loans (including convertible debt) and equity investments ranging from \$50,000 to \$15 million, GIF back innovations with the potential for social impact at a large scale such as new technologies, business models, policy practices, technologies or behavioural insights.

GIF support innovators at all stages of their life cycle, from start-up and pilot-testing through to larger scale implementation. The innovations can be located in any developing country and can focus on any sector relevant to international development, provided they improve the lives of those living on less than \$5 a day.

GIF teams' focus is on solving any major development problems in low or lower-middle income countries. They seek solutions that can scale up commercially, through the public/philanthropic sector, or through a combination of both in order to achieve widespread adoption.

The Global Innovation Fund is supported by the Department for Foreign Affairs and Trade in Australia.

GIF accepts applications on a rolling basis - There are no deadlines or rounds of funding.

Example

GIF have a precise criteria used to assess the fit of applications. See a summary below:

- Target market We invest in innovations designed to bring benefits for those who live on the equivalent of \$5 a day and we are especially interested in funding innovative solutions that impact those living on less \$2 a day or other vulnerable or disadvantaged groups.
- Innovation and Impact We define an innovation as any solution which has the potential to improve the lives of the poor in developing countries more effectively than existing approaches. So, to meet our criteria your approach must be a new approach which is not already commonplace, and you must be able to demonstrate how you think it can improve upon alternative solutions.
- Evidence We expect that innovations we support are informed by evidence of what works. This evidence might focus on the changes in the lives of your beneficiaries or customers or 'how-to' evidence on how your solution can be deployed or scaled successfully. Our expectation of the level of evidence needed increases with the level of funding requested. More information on this can be found in the guidance on Stage of Funding. GIF also expects that our funding contributes to the evidence base for an innovation.
- Scale GIF only funds innovation which have the potential to scale to benefit millions of people. Scaling can take place through in any number of ways– growth of a successful business or uptake by a government partner, for example. The million lives club showcases some of the innovations supported by GIF and others which are either reaching millions of clients or on their way to doing so.
- **Team** We look for innovations which are backed by teams which demonstrate a deep understanding of the problems they are tackling and the context in which they are working. Applicants should demonstrate the track record and skills needed to leverage the partnerships required to succeed and navigate the challenges which come with scaling innovations.

Limitations

Who can apply for GIF investment?

Any type of organisation may apply. This includes social enterprises, for-profit companies, non-profit organisations, government agencies, international organisations, and research institutions in any country. It is recommended that individual innovators, entrepreneurs or researchers apply through an affiliated organisation.

What is not funded:

- Theoretical research, or purely lab-based activities that are not linked to implementation of a specific proposed realworld pilot or demonstration project.
- Approaches that are only applicable in a single country (unless the innovation is expected to scale to a large proportion of one of the world's most populous developing countries).
- Innovations that involve supporting a political candidate or party.
- Innovations where the primary purpose is to support the broader innovation ecosystem, such as incubators, accelerators, or other innovation funds.
- Innovations involving any product or activity deemed illegal under applicable laws or regulations or subject to internationally agreed phase-outs or bans as defined in global conventions and agreements (such as dealing with certain hazardous chemicals or ozone depleting substances, and any activity endangering protected wildlife).
- Innovations that involve production or use of luxury goods, soliciting prostitution or engaging in human trafficking, terrorist activity, or use of prohibited drugs, gambling and pornography.

Criteria

Pride Foundation will invest in projects that benefit either LGBTQIA+ individuals or community or strengthen LGBTQIA+ organisational capacity:

Individuals – an application needs to satisfy at least one of the following intended outcomes. Through the project LGBTQIA+ community members will:

- be more connected to each other and to their community
- have improved skills and knowledge
- have enhanced wellbeing and resilience
- participate more fully in their community

Organisational capacity – an application needs to satisfy at least one of the following intended outcomes. Through the projects LGBTQIA+ organisation will:

- be better able to recruit and retain volunteers and members
- work better with the community and/or other organisations
- improve the skills and knowledge of volunteers/members
- develop resources it needs to undertake its work.

The planned activity must involve and benefit LGBTQIA+ members and promote positive social outcomes in our community.

Small grant rounds are offered four times each calendar year.

Applications can be made at any time, however they will only be considered at the end of each grant round. Applications may be considered in between rounds in exceptional circumstances – please indicate any urgency or deadlines in your application.

Priority

PFA welcome applications that are particularly creative and innovative, and those that are put forward by individuals, communities and organisations that have not received small grant funding in the previous 2 years.

PFA regard favourably projects that work as partnerships between individuals and organisations.

Limitations

Who Can Apply?

Eligible applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Must be a permanent resident or community group, operating in Australia.

How Google Ad Grants works

You'll receive \$10,000 USD of in-kind advertising from Google each month to create text-based ads, and get access to tools to help you build effective campaigns that can display on Google Search when people look for information related to your not-for-profit.

Program basics

Please note that with Ad Grants accounts, there are limits on your Google Ads settings:

- A daily budget limit of \$329 USD, which is equivalent to about AU \$13,000 per month
- Only include keyword-targeted campaigns

- Only include text ads that appear on Google search result pages, in positions below the ads of paying advertisers.
- A maximum cost-per-click (CPC) limit of \$2.00 USD for manual bidding. The Smart Bidding strategies Maximise Conversions, Target ROAS, and Target CPA can bid over \$2.00 to help get more conversions if appropriate to your account goals. Note that other Smart Bidding strategies are capped at \$2.00 USD CPC.

To qualify for Google Ad Grants, your organisation must begin by applying to Google for Nonprofits.

Limitations

Eligibility:

Organisations that meet the following criteria are eligible to apply:

- Organisations must be currently registered with Connecting Up, TechSoup Global's regional arm.
- Organisations must be:
 - deductible gift recipients (DGRs) endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) OR listed by name in the tax law;
 - charities registered with the Australian Charities and Nonprofits Commission (ACNC); OR
 - income tax exempt not-for-profit organisations as defined by the ATO.
- Organisations must be located in Australia or one of the following territories:
 - Christmas Island, Cocos (Keeling) Islands, or Norfolk Island.

You are not eligible for Google for Nonprofits if your organisation is:

- A governmental entity or organisation
- A hospital or health care organisation (charitable arms or foundations associated with healthcare organisations are eligible).

Purpose

Infoxchange have partnered with Telstra for the Telstra Top-up program, which provides a complimentary \$40 mobile credit recharge to those who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness, family violence or impacted by natural disaster.

Overview

The program is available via Infoxchange's SHIP, CIMS and SRS case management systems to housing and family or domestic violence service providers, as well as community organisations providing emergency relief to people affected by natural disasters such as the recent bushfires.

Any client of these eligible providers who is impacted by homelessness, family violence or natural disaster can access the free recharge, provided they are a Telstra pre-paid mobile phone customer.

Given the financial impact of COVID-19 on Australia's most vulnerable people, Telstra have increased the recharge amount to \$40 (previously \$30) as of April 2020.

How does it work?

Once an eligible service has been successfully set up to use the program, service providers can provide their clients with a free \$40 recharge on their Telstra pre-paid mobile phone service by using Infoxchange's SHIP, CIMS or SRS case management system. Specific instructions on how to process the top-up will be provided once a service has opted in to the program.

How does my service or organisation take part?

If your service is eligible, you should have already received an invitation to opt in. If you haven't received an invitation or you're not sure, please get in touch with Infoxchange.

Purpose

Overview

VFFF makes grants to charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC). Grants between \$20,000 and \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW or Queensland. Grants above \$50,000 are available for organisations working in NSW.

Founder Sir Vincent Fairfax was a committed Christian and actively involved in the Anglican Church. Purpose

Provides industry-led collaborations with short term (up to three years) matched funding of up to \$3 million to develop important new technologies, products and services.

Overview

This grant supports short-term (up to 3 years) industry-led collaborative research that focuses on the National Manufacturing Priorities. A small pool of funding will also be available to high quality projects from all industry sectors.

There is no specific amount of funding allocated to each CRC-P round, however past rounds have averaged \$30 million to \$40 million in total.

The number of CRC-Ps that will be funded in each round (and the total amount of funding committed) will depend on the number of applications received, the relative merits of applications, the amount of funding requested, the amount of available funding and the need to ensure sufficient funding is available for future rounds.

A majority of CRC-P Round 12 funding (around 70 per cent) is available to support projects with a focus on the National Manufacturing Priorities (NMPs). The remainder is available to all sectors.

Grant amount and grant period

- The minimum grant amount is \$100,000.
- The maximum grant amount is \$3 million.

The grant amount will be up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs (grant percentage), which includes the total eligible expenditure (outlined in Appendix B of the grant guidelines) plus allowable in-kind contributions (outlined in Appendix C of the grant guidelines).

The 50 per cent of eligible project costs not covered by the grant amount must be covered by you and your partners' contributions.

Only CRC-Ps of exceptional merit are likely to be awarded the maximum grant amount of \$3 million.

The maximum project period is three years.

Limitations

Who is eligible?

Each CRC-P must be an industry-led collaboration with a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project. Only an eligible lead applicant can apply for grant funding and submit an application on behalf of project partners. If your application is successful, the lead applicant is responsible for managing the project on behalf of the collaboration.

To be eligible as the lead applicant you must:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN) and be:
- an entity incorporated in Australia and a trading corporation, where your trading activities
 - form a sufficiently significant proportion of the corporation's overall activities as to merit it being described as a trading corporation; or
 - are a substantial and not merely peripheral activity of the corporation
- an Incorporated Trustee on behalf of a trust, where the trust's trading activities:
 - form a sufficiently significant proportion of the trust's overall activities as to merit it being described as a trading trust; or
 - are a substantial and not merely peripheral activity of the trust.

Each CRC-P must include and maintain amongst its project partners at least:

- two Australian industry entities including at least one SME, and
- one Australian research organisation.

Partners from existing or former CRCs or CRC-Ps can be partners in other CRCs or CRC-Ps.

Partners do not need to commit for the entire project period.

All partners must contribute resources to the CRC-P. We treat partners' proposed cash and in-kind contributions equally for the purposes of calculating the maximum grant amount.

Who is not eligible?

You are not eligible to apply as a lead applicant if you are:

- an individual
- a sole trader
- a partnership
- a research organisation or an entity whose primary purpose is to undertake research
- an unincorporated association
- a trust (with the exception of a trust that has an Incorporated Trustee)
- a Commonwealth, State, Territory or local government body (including government business enterprises)
- an entity where the majority of your funding is from government sources, for example grant programs
- an entity whose primary purpose is administrative or to provide support services to a CRC-P
- a non-corporate Commonwealth entity.

To be eligible your project must:

• have at least \$200,000 in total eligible project value

- include eligible activities
- be a short term, industry-identified and industry-led collaborative research project to develop a product, service or process that will solve problems for industry and deliver tangible outcomes
- benefit SMEs and increase their capacity to grow and adapt in changing markets
- include education and training activities.

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and can include:

- new research
- proof of concept activities
- pre-commercialisation of research outcomes
- industry-focused education and training activities, such as internships and secondments between industry entities and research organisations
- conferences, workshops, symposia related to the joint research
- information sharing and communication initiatives related to the joint research.

Key exclusions

The Foundation will generally not fund organisations related to religious belief or political activity nor programs or activities that are clearly a core responsibility of Government.

New applicants may not be successful if they are seeking funding for similar causes, activities, health conditions or community services already being addressed by an existing Foundation grant recipient.

The Foundation generally does not provide funds for causes outside of Western Australia. The health and well-being of the Western Australian community is foremost in funding decisions.

The main applicant and lead institution must be based in Western Australia, with the main applicant employed by a Western Australian Health Service, University or affiliated Medical Research Institution at the time and for the duration of the proposal.

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Purpose

To support the provision of equipment and capital infrastructure to support outstanding medical research groups.

Overview

The Healthy Australia pillar supports organisations that strive to provide innovative solutions to improve the health of all Australians. The Medical Research stream aims to advance understanding and improve treatment of major diseases by supporting major initiatives by leading Australian research institutes, universities and teaching hospitals in innovative biomedical research.

In the Medical Research stream the Foundation will consider applications:

• To support the provision of equipment and capital infrastructure to support outstanding research groups.

You must speak with the Program Manager before submitting an application to be considered eligible to apply.

Medical Research applications are considered by the Board of Governors once a year.

In general, the recommended minimum grant amount for institutions and organisations is \$100,000 in this program area.

Priority

The Ian Potter Foundation prioritises applications with evidence of collaboration. Please ensure that you have alternative providers of funding, and that your application clearly considers any possible grant from the Foundation in this context. The Foundation are unlikely to fund 100% of a project cost.

Limitations

Eligibility

Under the terms of the deed of The Ian Potter Foundation and Australian taxation laws, The Ian Potter Foundation can only make grants to organisations with BOTH Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Item 1 and Tax Concession Charity (TCC) status.

Exclusions

Specific Exclusions:

- Projects suitable for submission to the Australian Research Council (ARC) and/or the National Health and Medical Research Council (NH&MRC)

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- a non-corporate Commonwealth entity.

Purpose

Purpose

To support the social and economic recovery of our regions, the NSW Government's \$20 million Regional Events Acceleration Fund helps organisations to attract new major international and domestic events to regional areas and supports existing regional events to grow even bigger and better.

Overview

To support the social and economic recovery of our regions, the NSW Government's \$20 million Regional Events Acceleration Fund helps organisations to:

- attract new major international and domestic events to regional areas
- make existing regional events even bigger and better.

Funding will help meet the costs of attracting or retaining major events, such as premier sporting fixtures or competitions, and helps fund the operational and infrastructure improvements existing events need to increase visitation and length of stay.

The types of events eligible for funding include:

- major sporting and lifestyle events
- major food and beverage events
- major music, art and culture festivals.

The funding is for events hosted in regional NSW between March 2021 and June 2022.

The Regional Events Acceleration Fund offers two streams:

Major Event Operations and Infrastructure grants

Grants between \$50,000 and \$200,000 are available to support temporary event infrastructure and operational improvements at existing regional events to help increase visitation.

Examples of the types of event infrastructure and operational improvements that are eligible for funding include:

- securing a major artist/performance to increase an event's appeal
- additional temporary seating areas to increase capacity
- additional staging for a music festival
- establishing a pop-up camping and caravan site to support more overnight stays.

Major Event Attraction and Enhancement grants

Grants for a minimum of \$100,000 for the attraction, delivery and retention of major international and domestic events to regional areas across regional NSW, with a focus on major sporting events providing national or international exposure.

Limitations

Eligible applicants

To be eligible for funding under the Regional Events Acceleration Fund applicants must:

- be the event owner (i.e. own, or have secured the rights to the event and have the relevant approvals for the event)
 be financially solvent
- be a sole trader, company, incorporated association or trust entity
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- have a minimum of \$20 million public liability insurance and other relevant insurance cover.

Applicants must also be one of the following entities:

- the event organiser or committee
- a Local Council or Joint Organisation of Councils
- a not-for-profit organisation, including business chambers, industry associations and charities
- a sporting body (i.e. NSW or National Associations)
- a Local Aboriginal Land Council.

For-profit organisations may be considered eligible for funding only where projects will deliver a clear public benefit. A public/private partnership may seek funding where the lead applicant is an eligible entity.

Section 355 Committees of Council are eligible to apply where they have written approval from council and where the council agrees to receive the funding on behalf of the Section 355 Committee.

Events that have already secured or are seeking funding from another NSW Government program, such as Destination NSW's Regional Events Fund, are eligible for funding through the Regional Events Acceleration Fund and are encouraged to apply. Applicants will need to demonstrate how the activities funded by the Regional Events Acceleration Fund are distinct from other NSW Government funded activities in their application.

Eligible applicants can submit multiple applications for different events.

Ineligible event types

Events ineligible for funding through the Regional Events Acceleration Fund include:

- regular community events such as markets, bazaars, sporting meets (i.e. home/away games, local tournaments), club gatherings (RSL, Rotary, Chambers of Commerce etc.), classes and workshops
- agricultural/country shows and field days
- charity funding events
- regional racing carnivals (i.e. horse or greyhound racing) and events occurring as part of a regular schedule of racing
- touring events and regular theatre programs
- business events and conferences
- events with religious ceremony or celebration as the principal focus (i.e. Easter or Christmas celebrations)
- community public holiday celebrations (i.e. Australia Day or Anzac Day)
- Australian or state/territory government owned and/or operated events.

Eligible locations

Only events hosted in one or more of the 93 regional NSW Local Government Areas (LGAs), on Lord Howe Island or in the Unincorporated Far West Region are eligible for funding through the Regional Events Acceleration Fund. A full list of the 93 eligible LGAs can be found at Appendix A in the Grant Guidelines.

Events must have the landowner's consent and secure development application approval from the local council if required.

Events held on the border of NSW and other states or territories are eligible to apply, however applicants must show at least 80 per cent of the event's activity will be physically located in regional NSW, or at least 50 per cent of its economic benefit will flow to regional NSW.

Events that are proposing to relocate and be hosted in regional NSW from another location outside of NSW will be strongly preferred.

Events hosted in locations that leverage tourism and sporting infrastructure previously supported by the NSW Government are preferable and are encouraged to apply.

The Strengthening Rural Communities program gives small rural, regional and remote communities across Australia the opportunity to access funds that can benefit and help secure their future prosperity. Grants are available for a broad range of initiatives that directly and clearly benefit local communities.

Overview

Small & Vital Stream: Requests up to \$10,000

- Projects that support communities in remote, rural or regional Australia with fewer than 15,000 people;
- Projects initiated and delivered by local community groups and not-for profits;
- Organisations that do not have DGR status.

A broad range of charitable projects are considered under this program, including:

- Delivering, or providing activities, events, programs and services;
- Purchasing or hiring equipment and materials;
- Community infrastructure projects;
- Organisational capacity building;
- Community resource development.

Example

Limitations

Eligibility

Purpose

The Sponsorship Grants for Student Science Engagement and International Competitions provides funds to sponsor young Australians to take part in-person or virtual in STEM engagement activities, activities and competitions.

Overview

This grant opportunity provides organisations, such as schools and community groups, funds to sponsor a student or group of students to participate in:

- in-person and virtual STEM engagement events, activities and competitions hosted in Australia and New Zealand (where permitted by COVID-19 restrictions)
- virtual STEM engagement events, activities and competitions hosted overseas (students to participate remotely from Australia).

For this grant opportunity, \$1.6 million is available each year.

The grant amount will be up to 100% of eligible project costs.

- The minimum grant amount is \$1,500.
- The maximum grant amount is \$15,000.

The maximum grant amount per student is \$2,000 in Australia and \$5,000 for international travel to New Zealand. You may submit multiple applications for the same STEM event, activity or competition, noting the combined total amount of those applications cannot exceed \$15,000.

Limitations

What are the eligibility criteria?

A sponsor organisation must apply on behalf of a student or group of students.

To be eligible you must have an Australian business number (ABN) and be one of the following entities:

- a primary or secondary school that is registered with the relevant authority
- an incorporated not for profit organisation
- an entity incorporated in Australia and
- be able to enter into a grant agreement in your own right or through an affiliated entity.

Schools

Government schools in New South Wales (NSW), South Australia (SA), Tasmania (TAS) and Western Australia (WA) are not legal entities in their own right. You must include your relevant state or territory education department's ABN as Collaborator in your application in order to enter into a grant agreement.

Non-government schools including catholic organisations that are unincorporated entities must apply through a related incorporated entity in order to enter into a grant agreement.

- a partnership
- an unincorporated association or entity
- any organisation not included in section 4.1 of the grant opportunity guidelines.
- a trust (however, an incorporated trustee may apply on behalf of a trust)
- a state, territory or local government agency or body (however, you may execute an agreement on behalf of a school that is not a legal entity and cannot enter into an agreement with the Commonwealth)
- a non-corporate Commonwealth entity
- running the event, activity or competition which you are applying for students to attend.

Specialist Contracts

Purpose

The program encourages projects, programs and activities that seek to actively engage new people, particularly harderto-reach socially isolated older people.

Overview

For Reducing Social Isolation for Seniors Round 2 in 2022, DCJ are again focused on addressing social isolation and the challenges to quality social connections for older people.

Funding

A maximum of \$600,000 will be allocated in one-off funding opportunities of between \$10,000 and \$60,000 for initiatives and projects to reduce social isolation for older people aged 65 years and over, or 50 years and over for Aboriginal people.

Objectives

The objectives of Round 2 of the Reducing Social Isolation Grant Program are to:

- reduce social isolation for older people aged 65 years and over, or 50 years and over for Aboriginal people
- support effective, self-sustaining projects, programs and activities that provide meaningful and lasting social connection opportunities for older people who are socially isolated or at risk of isolation
- support projects, programs and activities that help older people connect and engage with each other through small group activities (e.g. interest groups, social events or environmental activities)that bring them together in person (if possible) throughout the year and enable them to develop quality relationships that can be maintained beyond these activities
- support projects, programs and activities that seek to actively engage new people, particularly harder-to-reach socially isolated older people.

Expected participation

A minimum number of new participants is required for each project depending on the funding category and the amount awarded. Given the funding allocation range for projects, programs and activities is \$10,000 to \$60,000, the expected minimum number of new participants would range from 20 to 120. This is based on an estimated costing of approximately \$500 per person for the total grant value (e.g. a \$10,000 grant would be seeking participation of at least 20 older people).

Projects, programs and activities will need to demonstrate capacity for adaptability in the way social connections will be maintained to accommodate potential changes to social mobility during this period, e.g. moving to online or virtual gatherings should physical gatherings be restricted at any time during the program, to align with any public health orders.

Priority

Preference will also be given to organisations that can demonstrate business continuity planning to keep the project running until the end of-2022 should the provider's operations be directly affected by COVID-19.

DCJ encourage a focus on older people from the following priority groups due to these groups being considered at higher risk of social isolation:

- Aboriginal people aged 50 years and over
- from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds
- people living with disability, dementia, chronic disease or mental illness
- carers
- people in rural, regional and remote areas
- people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, queer or asexual (LGBTIQA+).

Example

The following are examples of projects, programs and activities that may fit within one of the delivery approaches outlined in this section.

- A local conservation group seeks funding to host a program of nature walks or birdwatching tours for those with low mobility, with the assistance of a rehabilitation centre and local seniors club.
- A yarning circle in the Aboriginal community seeks funding to run a yarning circle for older Aboriginal people or to visit older people who are house bound, with the assistance of a local community transport provider.

Purpose

The SACWIC grant opportunity is the second grant opportunity to be established under the COVID-19 Aged Care Support program. It is designed to minimise the risk of an infection occurring in the aged care sector.

Overview

The SACWIC Grant Opportunity is designed to complement, but not duplicate, the existing COVID-19 grant opportunities available across the aged care sector, including:

- Aged Care Support Program (on Funding Centre here),
- Aged Care Workforce Retention Payment (on Funding Centre here),
- Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP) Emergency Support for COVID19 (on Funding Centre here)
- Victorian Government (or other relevant State/Territory Government) initiatives.

The *purpose* of the SACWIC grant opportunity is to minimise the risk of infection to aged care workers, residents and other consumers of aged care services.

The **objectives** of the SACWIC grant opportunity are to:

- assist approved Residential Aged Care providers, approved National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program (NATSIFACP) providers and approved Home Care providers to manage the impact of COVID-19 on their workforce to ensure consumers of aged care services continue to experience safe quality care;
- minimise the financial burden for approved Residential Aged Care providers, approved NATSIFACP providers and approved Home Care providers by:
 - engaging and training additional workers where existing workers are not to attend work due to self-isolation or quarantine restrictions or other COVID-19 health related measures (including workers being unavailable due to having elected to work at another, different service), and
 - who are not to attend work because they have been experiencing COVID-19 symptoms, have been diagnosed as COVID-19 positive, require testing or are subject to self-isolation or quarantine requirements.
- to minimise the financial burden for approved Residential Aged Care and approved NATSIFACP aged care providers as a result of supporting residential and NATSIFACP workers to work at a single site.
 - An underlying principle is that the worker is not to be disadvantaged as a result of working at a single site.

The intended outcomes of the SACWIC are to:

- reduce the risk of:
 - residents, other consumers of aged care services in the declared hotspots and workers in hotspots from being exposed to COVID-19, and
 - residential and NATSIFACP aged care workers unintentionally transmitting COVID-19 by working across multiple sites.
- reduce the financial costs of managing the impacts of COVID-19 before an outbreak occurs for eligible aged care services.

Grant amount and grant period

The Australian Government announced support of \$101.2 million under the Aged Care Preparedness Measure. This funding will be drawn on for this grant opportunity.

Additional eligibility requirements

In addition to the above eligibility criteria, eligible applicants must satisfy at least one of the criteria below:

- An approved Residential Aged Care provider or approved NATSIFACP provider who, for the period being applied for, provides aged care services in a facility located:
 - inside a hotspot and is likely to be incurring additional costs as result of supporting eligible workers (eligible workers are set out in Section 4.3 of grant guidelines):
 - who normally work at multiple residential aged care facilities, but will be working solely at the facility being applied for,
 - who are under award wages and need to take 'Paid Pandemic Leave',
 - who need to take leave for testing, quarantine or self-isolation and don't have access to or adequate personal leave provisions,
 - who need to take leave due to symptoms or being diagnosed as COVID-19 positive and don't have access to or adequate personal leave provisions, or
 - to undertake training in the event a skills gap arises from where existing workers take leave due to experiencing COVID-19 symptoms, or are subject to self-isolation or quarantine requirements.
 - outside a hotspot and is likely to be incurring additional costs as a result of eligible workers who work inside a hotspot:
 - who normally work at multiple residential aged care facilities, one of which is in a hotspot and will be working solely at the facility outside being applied for; to undertake training in the event a skills gap arises from where existing workers take leave due to experiencing COVID-19 symptoms, or are subject to self-isolation or quarantine requirements.
- An approved Home Care provider who provides home care services to clients who also reside inside a hotspot and is likely to be incurring additional costs as result of supporting eligible workers:
 - who need to take leave for testing, quarantine or self-isolation and don't have access to or adequate personal leave provisions

The Impact Investment Ready Growth Grant, funded by the Australian Government Department of Social Services as part of the Sector Readiness Fund, provides capacity building grants of up to \$140,000 to mission-driven for-profit and not-for-profit organisations, allowing them to secure investment capital to scale their social impact.

Overview

Growth Grants were created in recognition of the potential for impact investing to change the way Australia addresses social issues and the important role that access to capital can play in delivering better outcomes for people and communities. They support enterprises that are high growth, can deliver positive social outcomes and have the potential to secure capital investment.

WHAT GROWTH GRANTS FUND

All grant funds must be used to pay for capacity building services from external intermediaries (Providers) that are directly related to your investment readiness and securing capital.

You will be invited to join regular workshops, where we will explore topics relevant to the social enterprise sector during this challenging time, and share resources, tips, insights and stories of social enterprise pivots.

- 2. Places and Spaces: Everyone in NSW having access to places and spaces for sport and active recreation.
- 3. Sustainability: The sector continues to grow sport and active recreation across NSW.

Applications should demonstrate how the project will address at least one of these objectives:

- Increase regular and on-going participation in sport
- Increase participation and access for women, girls or population groups with low rates of participation

 must be included in the application. Events are not to be scheduled prior to 1 January 2022. Consideration should be
 given to travel restrictions and scheduling when preparing for the event.

Projects eligible to be funded for **Sport Access** include:

- Costs associated with overcoming a barrier to participation in sport, e.g., training and playing sport equipment

Applications will be accepted from eligible National Sporting Organisations (NSOs) from 28th October until funds are fully expended.

Limitations

Who can apply?

NSOs who receive:

- Less than \$1.5m AIS HP funding in FY21 and less than \$8m annual turnover for an Able OR Para program, OR;
- Less than \$1.8m AIS HP funding in FY21 and less than \$8m annual turnover for BOTH Able and Para programs.

Funds cannot be used for:

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Purpose

ClubGRANTS is designed to ensure that larger registered clubs in NSW contribute to the provision of front-line services to their local communities; and to ensure that the disadvantaged in the community are better positioned to benefit from the substantial contributions made by those clubs. ClubGRANTS also facilitates contributions by larger clubs towards infrastructure to support sporting, health and community activities.

Overview

ClubGRANTS is one of Australia's largest grant programs, providing more than \$100 million in cash each year to a variety of worthy causes across NSW.

Funding categories

- 1. **Category 1 -** You are considered eligible for Category 1 funding if your project falls under specific community welfare and social services, community development, health services and employment assistance activities, and other projects aimed at improving the living standards of low income and disadvantaged people. Application deadlines apply.
- 2. **Category 2 -** Funding for general community development and support activities, such as junior sport/grassroots sport or veteran welfare activities. Applications are open all year round.
- 3. Category 3 Funding is available to support projects that assist communities with essential infrastructure and disaster readiness.

Funding

Due in part to the different sizes of ClubGRANTS-eligible clubs, there is no standard limit on the amount clubs may provide. However, it is advisable for applicants to contact the Local Committee and consider the amount of funding available in their area. Local Committees and clubs are also in a position to advise on any area-specific limits on funding amounts.

A note on deadlines

There is no standard state-wide closing date for ClubGRANTS Category 1 or 2 funding.

Category 1 funding is allocated on the basis of local government areas, and Local Committees set their own deadlines, which vary from area to area. Opening and closing dates are available on the Find Your Local Grant Round page.

All funding is processed locally and community groups can contact their local clubs easily and at any time for information and advice.

Example

Eligible expenditure can take many forms, including (but not limited to):

- one-off funding to buy equipment, such as a vehicle for an aged care centre;
- extended or one-off staffing costs, such as training or wages for a new counsellor for a youth drop-in centre; and/
- or in-kind support, such as occasional or ongoing use of club facilities for meetings or other activities.

Limitations

Eligibility criteria

To be eligible to apply, you must be a not-for-profit organisation and provide the following project and/or services:

- community welfare or social services,
- community development,
- community health services or employment assistance activities.

You are also eligible if you or your organisation is involved in community or professional sport.

Schools are generally ineligible for ClubGRANTS Category 1 funding, being core budget items for State Government. However, some activities could qualify as Category 1 expenditure, for example a P & F committee running an extracurricular service that assists disadvantaged students, or an out-of-hours program for troubled students.

Purpose

Events Tasmania is committed to increasing the number of people coming to Tasmania, and ensuring that they travel around the state while they are here.

Overview

As part of meeting these objectives, Events Tasmania is offering incentives to organisers of motor vehicle, motorcycle, and cycle tours that come to tour around Tasmania.

Grants worked out on a scale of attendance and duration up to a maximum of \$20,000 are available to eligible organisations who conduct a tour:

- held in the March November period (tours held in December, January and February are not eligible)
- attracting more than 40 people from outside Tasmania
- staying five nights or more in paid commercial accommodation (hotel, motel, B&B, cabin)
- spending 40% or more of the tour in regional areas (outside Greater Hobart).

Motorhome, caravan, camping and walking tours may also be eligible, but only for the days that participants spend in paid accommodation, and with the same ratio of 40% paid accommodation in regional areas.

Applicants can be based anywhere in Australia, and must be able to enter into a funding agreement with the Tasmanian Government.

Limitations

Funding programs don't support conferences, conventions, symposiums, trade fairs, fundraising events, expos, concert series, touring shows and events that are primarily a showcase for stallholders to demonstrate, promote or sell services or products.

If your event already receives Events Tasmania funding through a Major Event Partnership, you are not eligible for funding from the Grants Program for the same event.

Global Fund for Women funds gender justice movements to create meaningful change, with their primary goal being to get resources to gender justice movements around the globe.

Overview

We provide flexible, core-support grants for operating and program expenses, give multi-year grants as often as possible, and offer travel and event organizing grants to support knowledge-exchanges and convenings. Global Fund for Women also provides immediate support to organizations who are first responders in times of natural and human-made crises.

Global Fund for Women is currently transitioning to a model where we primarily support movements for gender justice. This includes feminist, grassroots, and women-led initiatives and organizations.

Global Fund for Women provides three types of grants: general support grants, travel and event organizing grants, and crisis grants.

General Support Grants

- General support grants can be used to fund an organization's projects and programs as well as operating and program expenses, such as rent, salaries, communications, and travel costs.
- Global Fund for Women periodically invites organizations whose work aligns with current funding opportunities to submit proposals for general support funding. The Fund selects these organizations from the Organizational Profiles in their system and through recommendations from advisors. Please see the Priorities section below for more information about current priorities.

Please note that only organizations that have been invited to apply may submit a proposal for general support funding. If you wish to be considered for general support funding in the future, please register your organization by submitting an Organizational Profile.

Travel Grants and Event Organizing Grants

- Have a primary focus on advancing women's equality and human rights, with these goals clearly reflected in its activities. Please note that groups whose sole purpose is to generate income or to provide charity to individuals are not eligible.
- Be a group of women, girls, or trans people working together. The Fund does not accept requests from individuals and do not fund projects proposed by or for the benefit of individuals (including scholarships).
- Be governed, directed, and led by women, girls, or trans people, that is they must fill all or most of the leadership roles throughout the various decision-making levels of the group (including but not limited to the most senior decision-making levels).
- Groups do not need to be registered non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to qualify for funding.

In addition, please note that Global Fund for Women does NOT fund the following:

- Government entities
- International organizations proposing projects with local partners
- Political parties or election campaigns
- · Women's branches/departments/projects of mixed gender organizations

Exceptions

Women-focused projects within mixed-gender organizations may occasionally receive support from Global Fund for Women if they work with particularly marginalized groups: for example, women within groups of people with disabilities or women within LGBTQI organizations.

SheEO is a global venture that helps women-led businesses with a social conscience to scale up, thanks to the generosity of other women.

Overview

Women face unique challenges when it comes to scaling budding businesses – and one common hurdle is securing the necessary funding to grow.

If you're looking for an injection of funds to support your business, SheEO's program could be a perfect fit.

How does the SheEO model work?

The model brings together hundreds of radically generous women called Activators who contribute \$1100 each (or twelve monthly payments of \$92) for Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the USA; or £850 (or twelve monthly payments of

As a funded Venture, you meet with your Guide twice a month during the first year for help with individual, team and business issues, such as identifying priorities, developing business strategy, and better understand and develop your team, thinking talents, and communication style. Many Ventures find it so useful that they continue to work with their Guides for several years.
- Access To A Network Of Thousands Of Smart, Generous & Connected Women: Through our Ask + Give app and online community, we give Ventures access to the large and rich SheEO network of diverse and passionate supporters and have them navigate their own path. As Ventures reach out and women in the network respond, Ventures select who is the best fit to help them. Through this self-serve approach, Ventures find and create a team of advisors, mentors and supporters who are perfectly suited for them. Unlike many advisors and experts who think they know the answer and share what worked for them – which may or may not work for the person they're talking to – we believe that there is often no "right" answer, no "right way" of doing something. We each have our own path. We know that getting to a new world is not necessarily going to happen by following what has worked in the past. We've designed things differently: we're committed to helping you have strong social and financial returns and pioneering new business models and mindsets.

Limitations

Application Criteria

- Company must be working on creating a better world through their business model and/or product and service as defined by the UN Sustainability Goals.
- Majority owned (51%+) by cis* or trans woman, non-binary, gender-fluid or gender nonconforming people.
- Majority led by a cis* or trans woman, non-binary, gender-fluid or gender non-conforming person. For SheEO, "led by" refers to the senior leadership role of CEO/ President.
- You have generated between \$50K \$2M in Australia, New Zealand, Canada or the USA, or £40K £2M in the United Kingdom, in recurring revenue, from customers, in the last 12 months. If you are a not-for-profit or charity that generates revenue and can pay back a loan over 5 years, then you can apply.
- Your Venture is registered as a legal entity in the region for which you are applying and has export potential.

Purpose

The NSW Government is encouraging not-for-profit community organisations and local councils within NSW to apply for a grant to hold events and activities that celebrate women during NSW Women's Week between 7-13 March 2022.

Overview

NSW Women's Week celebrates the diverse contributions of women and girls. It is an opportunity to reflect on the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women and girls and promote gender equality.

NSW Women's Week provides local organisations with an opportunity to give back by delivering education, mentoring and participation activities that benefit local women and girls. Women across NSW make important contributions at work, in our families, communities and neighbourhoods.

Funding

The total grant funding is \$100,000 which will comprise of individual grants from \$3,000 to \$5,000 (exclusive of GST).

Grants objective

Events must promote at least one of the three priorities of the NSW Women's Strategy 2018-2022:

- 1. Economic opportunity and advancement
- 2. Health and wellbeing
- 3. Participation and empowerment

Example

Grant focus

NSW Women's Week events or activities will need to align with at least one of the three targeted priorities that women from across NSW have consistently said are important to them.

Economic opportunity and advancement

Economic opportunity and advancement aims to improve women's financial wellbeing and security, and support diverse and flexible employment opportunities for women and girls.

Funding for events in this category should:

- celebrate and promote women's financial wellbeing and security
- promote diverse and flexible employment opportunities for women and girls
- celebrate and promote women in diverse employment categories/industries.

Examples of events/activities that may fit into this category are:

- financial information sessions for women
- careers advice for women in STEM industries
- local inspiring women speaking about their work/careers.

Health and wellbeing

Health and wellbeing aims to promote and support a holistic approach to women's health across their lifespan. Women's physical, social and economic potential is maximised when they are healthy and their health needs are addressed.

Funding for events in this category should:

• celebrate, promote and support a holistic approach to women's health across the lifespan.

Examples of some events/activities that may fit into this category are:

- school information sessions for girls on healthy body image
- sport participation programs celebrating/promoting health and well being
- mental health promotion events for managing anxiety and depression.

Participation and empowerment

Participation and empowerment recognises the importance of supporting women's engagement through social networks, access to information and building confidence using diverse representations of women and girls.

Funding for events in this category should:

- provide opportunities that enable women and girls to actively participate in their communities
- build confidence and resilience of women and girls
- celebrate achievements of women and girls.

Examples of some events/activities that may fit into this category are:

- mentoring events
- networking events
- club events promoting/increasing women's participation.

Limitations

Who can apply?

- All Incorporated not-for-profit community organisations that are registered and approved as not-for-profit bodies by NSW Fair Trading.
- NSW local councils (and their section 355 committees) operating under the Local Government Act (1993) are obliged to cash match or provide in-kind support up to the value of \$5000.

Note: Organisations listed on the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) Register must have a current record.

Ineligible organisations

- individuals or groups of individuals
- unincorporated organisations
- for-profit commercial organisations
- NSW Government or Australian Government agencies and their entities (including public trusts) Note: NSW Government schools, Area Health Services and public hospitals are ineligible to apply, however, an associated incorporated not-for-profit body, such as a Parents and Citizens Association or hospital auxiliary will be eligible to apply for funding.

Grants cannot be used to fund the following:

- Any activity of a commercial nature that is for profit.
- Capital works including building work.
- Permanent salaries/wages (costs for temporary tutors/instructors for your project or event can be included).
- Permanent equipment purchases for example tables and computers.
- Business as usual costs or general operating expenses.
- Events that encourage gambling such as bingo, or the consumption of alcohol.
- Projects and activities coordinated by NSW Government Departments and Statutory Authorities.

Purpose

To create a more just society by giving every young person in Australia an equal opportunity to access the skills to negotiate life's journey.

Overview

Matana's focus is on improving the welfare and wellbeing of young people from severely disadvantaged or marginalised backgrounds, or whose concerns and issues are not readily funded from other sources. Recognising that disadvantage takes many forms, we prioritise projects and organisations that address the causes of youth disadvantage by:

- Providing programs primarily targeting school retention and increased education achievement for students who are at risk of dropping out of school or who have already dropped out. The focus is on early identification, customised learning and mentoring.
- Providing programs that target employment skills development, employment and career pathways and transitions into employment.
- Providing programs that target social and community connectedness, personal significance and social and emotional outcomes.
- Providing services in geographical areas across Australia where funding is difficult to source.

Applications are welcome from financially viable organisations which work to improve the lives and opportunities of disadvantaged young people, particularly where their core activities correlate with our funding priorities. Wherever possible, you will need to demonstrate the tangible impact of your organisation's work in improving the welfare or wellbeing of disadvantaged young people.

There is no minimum or maximum amount, but as a guide, grants are usually in the range of \$1,000 to \$10,000. However, assessment will be made on an individual basis. We also encourage grantseekers to apply to other sources to facilitate joint funding of projects.

Grants may be sought at any time.

Limitations

Matana can only make grants to organisations that hold the following ATO endorsements:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) Item 1
- Tax Concession Charity (TCC)

Evidence of endorsements is required at the point of application. If your organisation does not have Item 1 DGR and TCC status, unfortunately we will not be able to consider your application.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications that request funding for:

- Operating costs including salaries and administration costs, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Capital and building expenditure, including equipment, vehicles, travel, furniture, books and conferences, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Retrospective funding or budget deficits
- Fundraising events and campaigns
- Medical programs or research
- Religious activities, where the applicant project involves religious instruction.

The Matana Foundation will not consider applications for funding from:

- Individuals, state and federal government bodies
- Organisations outside Australia.
